McAneer Wins State FFA Award

Todd McAneer of Clarendon and a member of the Clarendon FFA Chapter proudly accepted his \$100 check for winning the State FFA Diversified Crop Production Proficiency Award at the State FFA Convention.

Now Todd has submitted his application to compete against other state winners to be named one of the four National finalists. Only one winner will be selected from each of the four FFA administrative regions.

The four National finalists in Diversified Crop Production will receive a plaque, a \$250 check and partially paid travel expenses to the national FFA Convention in Kansas City, Missouri, in November. At the Convention one of the four finalists will be chosen National winner and will be awarded a plaque and check for \$500.

The Diversified Crop Production Award program is designed to encourage vocational agriculture students to become established in crop production by employing the best management practices available for the efficient production and marketing of crops. Each student's practical experience program will be different, but will include a combination of two or more crop enterprises such as cereal, feed grain, forage, oil or fiber crops.

There are 29 National FFA Proficiency Award program areas recognizing FFA members for achievement in activities leading to careers in agriculture.

The awards for the Diversified Crop Production Award program are sponsored by Cargill, Incorporated as a special project of the National FFA Foundation.

Bobbie Thornberry of Clarendon was among several hundred PTA leaders who attended the Texas PTA 1988 Summer Leadership Seminar July 16 - 18 in Austin.

Featured speaker was General (U.S. Army Ret.) Richard E. Cavazos the first Hispanic of any of the Armed Forces to wear four stars, who spoke at the general meeting Sunday night July 17 held at the LB J Auditorium.

State PTA President Kathryn Whitfill presided at the general sessions July 17. Some 60 workshops were held at Pester Center, along with special training for local unit presidents and council presidents and the Leadership Training Course.

Among the topics covered at the workshops for the statewide PTA leaders were programs on AIDS education, Project 2000, parenting, alcohol/drugs, child lures, PTA membership, liability insurance, legislation, child and youth safety, learning disabilities, health and fitness, self-esteem, and others pertinent to PTA work.

Twelve Texas Ranches to Meet in Annual Cowboy Showdown

Twelve of Texas' best-known ranches will meet in Wichita Falls August 19-20 to put their skills to the test in a real cowboy showdown-the annual Texas Ranch Roundup.

Now in its eighth year, the Texas Ranch Roundup showcases the time-honored skills and talents of the state's working cowboys. On the line for participating ranches are bragging rights as the best ranch in Texas.

Patterned closely after daily ranch chores, Texas Ranch Roundup competition includes team roping, team branding, penning, horse breaking (better known as bronc riding) and wild cow milking.

These and other events highlight the rugged, romantic lifestyle that Texas ranchers have maintained since the birth of the cattle industry.

In addition to arena competition, roundup participants challenge each other in a chuckwagon cookoff; a first lady contest honoring ranch women for contributions and knowledge of the industry; and a talent competition featuring painting and photography, as well as favorite campfire songs and skits. "The Texas Ranch

Roundup illustrates just what its like to be a Texas cowboy -- the kind who still works cattle every day for a living," says event coordinator Ruth Ann Allred of Falls Distributing Co. "Ranch life has withstood the test of time, changing very little since the cattle industry's inception on the Texas frontier."

This two-day event, adds Allred, also revives the traditional concept of the "rodeo," which began as both reunion and friendly competition. "Like their forefathers did for the early rodeos in the late 1800's, entire ranch families and crews come from throughout the state to visit, swap tales and watch as their outfits compete at working cattle."

Returning to defend its 1987 Texas Ranch Roundup win is the Randerbrook-Spade Ranch (Colorado City). Also competing this year are Cowan & Son Circle Bar Ranch (Seymour), Double U Hereford Ranch (Levelland), JA Cattle Co. (Palo Duro), King Ranch, Inc. (Kingsville), Lewis Ranches (Clarendon), Moorhouse Ranch Co. (Benjamin), Pitchford Land & Cattle Co., (Guthrie), R. A. Brown Ranch (Throckmorton), Ton-

gue River Ranch and Spur Headquarters ranches (Dumont), and W. T. Waggoner Estate (Vernon).

The 1988 Texas Ranch Roundup, held at the Wichita County Mounted Patrol Arena, is co-sponsored by Budweiser and the North Texas Rehabilitation Center. Proceeds from the event benefit the North Texas Rehabilitation Center (Wichita Falls), the West Texas Rehabilitation Center (Abilene) and the West Texas Boys Ranch (San Angelo).

Roundup tickets are \$9 reserved and \$4 general admission. Tickets may be purchased at the gate or at the following ticket outlets in Wichita Falls: The Cow Lot, Cooley's Western Wear and Western World.

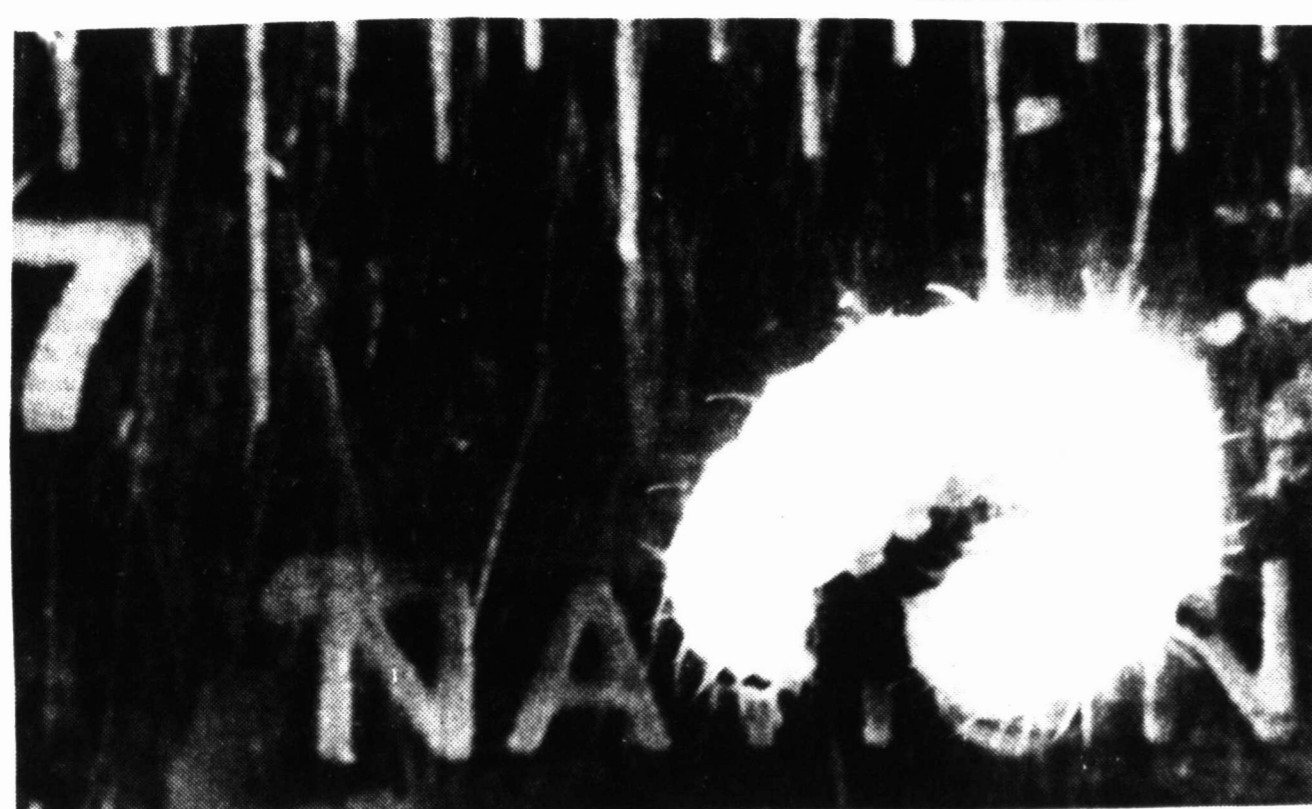


Fish 'n Pal One Man Fishing Boat

THE PRETTY LITTLE creature shown above may have a face not even a mother could love, but it surely has not endeared itself to area cotton farmers. This is a cotton bollworm, a ravenous little caterpillar that does millions of dollars of

Bollworm Causes Problems

Cotton bollworms are becoming a problem for some area farmers. In a few fields the nasty little moth larvae are already numerous enough to warrant spraying.

Prudent farmers should watch their cotton plants closely, or contact an insect scout. When the worm population reaches threshold levels,

they start to decrease yields enough to reduce profits.

If there is any doubt as to the identity of a caterpillar, the insect should be taken to an entomologist or sent to A&M for positive identification. County agent, Ronald Gooch, can help with much of the above.

Auction to Benefit Yesterday's Children Scheduled for November

Donley County Extension Service Gets New Computer

The Donley County Extension Service has a new computer. The new machine is a Compaq Portable -- "portable" in the sense that a portable sewing machine is portable.

The new computer will be used for a variety of jobs. Initial training for County Extension personnel included word processing and mailing list maintenance. But there are a variety of programs that the office staff can run on the machine. Many are spread sheet based.

Texas A&M University has over 150 programs for Texas farmers to use. Many of these programs are appropriate for the Donley County residents.

Some of the programs from A&M

are budgets for cow-calf operators, stocker cattle programs, ag loan analysis programs, 205 day weaning weight programs and animal health programs.

Other programs are oriented more to row-crop farms. These include irrigation fuel cost analysis, cotton insect programs and others.

A&M has also prepared budgeting programs for ranchers and farmers with hunting leases. These programs may help the operator increase his income substantially.

**Special Exam
by Internal
Revenue
Service**

Individuals who wish to take the 1988 internal revenue service special enrollment examination must submit applications to IRS postmarked by the U.S. Post Office no later than July 31, 1988. No extensions to time to file for the examination will be granted.

The examination is given annually to individuals who wish to apply for enrollment to practice before the IRS. It is scheduled for Thursday and Friday, September 29 and 30, 1988, in Dallas and Lubbock. The examination includes true or false and multiple choice questions, and problems that require some computations the IRS said.

The application fee is \$50 for those taking all four parts of the examination, and \$40 for prior-year examinee taking fewer than four parts. Checks or money orders must be made payable to the Internal Revenue Service.

Persons interested in taking the examination should obtain the Special Enrollment Examination Application Packet by writing Internal Revenue Service, Mail code 1600 MSAT, 1100 Commerce Street, Dallas, Texas 75242. The enrollment packet can also be ordered by calling IRS at 742-2440 in Dallas; 263-9229 in Fort Worth; or toll-free 1-800-424-1040 elsewhere in Texas.

The packet includes materials on the requirements for enrollment and for taking the examination; For 2587, "Application for 1988 Special Enrollment Examination and Instruction"; and Form 4190A, a special order form requesting special enrollment study materials.

Try Native Plants For Low Maintenance Landscaping

A drought can be tough on gardeners and homeowners because it can ravage those prize landscape plants and turn an otherwise lush area into a desert scene.

One way to combat this year's drought as well as to prepare for others that are sure to follow is to plant drought tolerant native plants.

"Plants accustomed to growing in dry conditions with little care can really be a 'lifesaver' during a year such as the one we are currently experiencing," said Doug Welsh, horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Not only do these plants fit in well in the landscape but they take the pressure off watering. And in severe situations when water rationing is imposed, these plants will not be lost."

Such plants as lantana, and verbena and cenizo (Texas sage) fit in well in a home or business landscape without a lot of fuss and bother, Welsh said. Many native plants are as showy as the more popular exotic plants, flowering throughout much of the year, even in the hot summer. These plants will withstand extreme conditions such as the current drought and even during more normal years, will not demand the attention that other plants do.

"A low maintenance landscape can look good without a lot of care," said Welsh. "That's its forte. Now is a good time to consider such a landscape, and county Extension agents in several counties have demonstration sites established for public viewing. Further information on native Texas plants and low-maintenance

landscaping is available at any county Extension office or from Welsh, Department of Horticultural Sciences, Texas A&M University College Station, Texas 77843; 409-845-7341.

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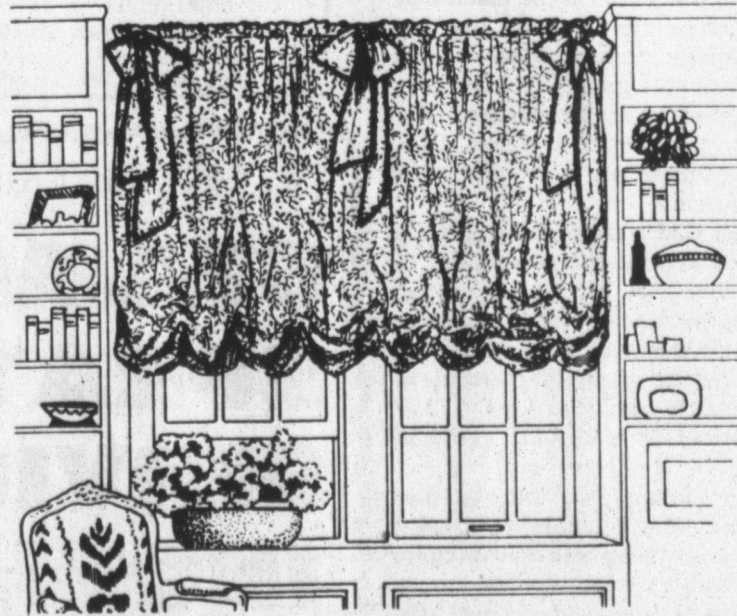

Deuteronomy 6:7-9 THE HYDROLOGIC CYCLE

The Hydrologic Cycle refers to the process in which water is recycled naturally. The processes or steps in this system of recycling water is: Evaporation, Transpiration, Precipitation, Infiltration, and Run-off.

When water falls in the manner of Precipitation (rain, snow, hail, or sleet) a large portion of the water is soaked into the ground. This process is referred to as Percolation. The remaining water is absorbed back into the atmosphere by the process of Evaporation.

When God created the world He included a precise measurement of water to be used by mankind. Today we find that fresh water supplies are divided in this manner: 75 percent in the polar ice caps, 25 percent in groundwater storage and only 1/3 of 1 percent of this is found in lakes and rivers.

In St. John 2 we see the first recorded miracle that Jesus brought to pass. He along with His disciples and mother were invited to a wedding in Cana of Galilee. On arriving there Jesus discovers that all the wine for the wedding had been used up. Jesus instructs for there to be placed six water pots of stone before Him. Each water pot held two to three firkins of water apiece. A firkin, by some theologians, is believed to be a measurement of water close to a U.S. gallon. Then Jesus instructs the pots to be filled with water. The pots were then filled to the brim. Then Jesus commands that the water be drawn out and served beginning with the governor. When the water was drawn out of the stone pots it had changed from water into wine.

In conversation today we often hear how the miracles of God are things of the past and are of no use in these modern times. We sometimes hear these words: "Where are all the miracles of God now?" or "Why doesn't Jesus do that now days!"

In studying the Hydrologic Cycle we see water fall in the form of Precipitation. Then we discover how

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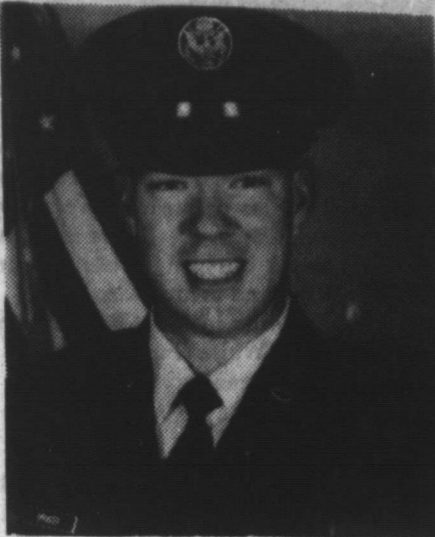

Texas Seeks Deathless Day

Three weeks into the summer driving season, the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts had not yet reached its goal of "One Deathless Day" during the 101 Days of Summer.

The Department of Public Safety recorded no deathless days between May 28 and June 15, the first 19 days of the vacation season. "From our preliminary counts, it appears that our best day so far was June 13. We had three people killed that day," said Public Information Officer David Wells. "The worst day we saw was June 4, with 12 deaths. Again, all numbers are preliminary at this time." Fatality counts are compiled by DPS Statistical Services.

Law enforcement officers, community groups, and private busi-

nesses in many parts of Texas have joined the effort to promote one day without a traffic death between May 28 and September 5. The last deathless day on Texas roadways was January 5, 1977.

"Our message goes out, not just to Texas residents, but also to our summer visitors," said George R. Gustafson, president of Texas Safety Association and a spokesperson for the safety belt coalition. "We're urging all of them to buckle up, avoid driving under the influence of alcohol, and watch out for the other driver!"

"Summer driving means that there will be more vehicles on the road and more miles driven, which increases the chances of injuries and deaths," added Wells.

VA Q and A
Q--If I make arrangements with a funeral home to pre-pay all costs for my burial, can my family receive reimbursement from the Veterans Administration at the time of my death?
A--Yes. Reimbursement can be made to the estate of the deceased veteran when the burial expenses were prepaid. However, no reim-

bursement can be made for a prepaid headstone.
Q--What type of income should I report on my annual income questionnaire to determine eligibility for VA pension benefits?
A--All income from all sources must be reported. The VA will determine what sources and amounts will be counted and the amount of income to be excluded.

Q--Can a veteran get a farm loan from the VA?
A--No. If the farm has a residence that will be personally occupied by the veteran, the property may qualify for a VA guaranteed home loan.
Q--For training by correspondence under the Montgomery GI Bill, how much will the participant be reimbursed?
A--Reimbursement will be for 55


percent of the approved established charges for the course.
Q--I applied for a VA-guaranteed home loan. I was advised it could not be processed until I paid an outstanding debt for education benefits. Is that true?
A--Yes. It is the policy of the VA to reconcile all outstanding debts to the U.S. Government prior to approving a home loan application.

Q--I received a Certificate of Eligibility for a VA home loan guaranty several years ago but never had the opportunity to use it. Have my benefits expired?
A--Loan guaranty entitlement is not subject to an expiration date.
Q--Can a veteran obtain a VA-guaranteed loan for the purchase of property in a foreign country?
A--No. Real property must be located in the United States, its territories or possessions. The latter includes Puerto Rico, Guam, Virgin Islands, American Samoa and Northern Mariana Islands.


Q--Can a veteran get a VA-guaranteed loan to purchase a condominium unit?
A--Yes, provided the unit is located in a condominium complex approved by the Veterans Administration.
Q--I own a manufactured home on a rented lot. I would like to purchase a lot for it. Can I do this using the VA guaranteed loan program?
A--Yes. A VA-guaranteed loan may be used to buy and improve a lot on which to place a manufactured home you already own and occupy.
Q--Does the VA offer special mortgage insurance for veterans?
A--A veteran may purchase Veterans Mortgage Life Insurance if he or she has received a grant for specially adapted housing.

Cattle Grubs
Before
Damage Done**

Cattle grubs are internal parasites that go undetected until it is too late, yet they cause greater economic losses to the U.S. beef cattle industry than any other pest, says Ronald Gooch, Donley County Extension Agent.

While grubs are usually found on the backs of infested animals during the winter months, that is not the time for control measures since the pests have already done their damage.

Grubs are the larvae or worm stage of heel flies, and adult heel flies are active over most of the state from March through May. Calves seen running with their tails over their backs are a sure sign heel flies have started working.

The time to control grubs is during the period of June through August when grubs are small and before infested animals suffer stress, weight loss and decreased feed efficiency.

Heel flies cannot sting, have no functional mouth parts and cause no pain to cattle. Yet, they frighten animals, making them difficult to handle. Heel flies lay their eggs on the animal's hairs in the lower region, glued in position. Tiny larvae hatch in a few days, crawl down to the base of their hair and burrow into the animal's skin.

Then they begin a migratory course through the animal's body, congregating in the throat after a few months and after six to eight months, appear in the grub stage on the animal's back.

If a producer has a history of grubs in his cattle herd, treat each animal over three months of age with one application of an approved systematic insecticide or injectable treatment during the mid-June through August period.

Systematic insecticides are absorbed directly through the animal's skin, circulated throughout the body, and kill grubs when they are small. Pour-ons such as Warbox or Neguvon are popular with many producers, but caution should be practiced when using them on some breeds of cattle.

Injectable treatments are circulated in the animal's body fluids to kill the invading pests. One such injectable is Ivomec.

Insecticides come in various forms -- dips, sprays, pour-ons, injections, and sponge-on treatments. Whatever the choice, use them like the label says to avoid problems later on.

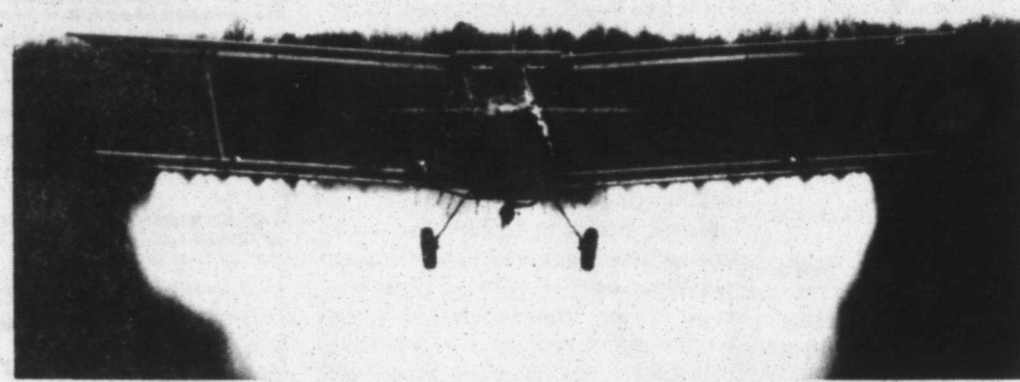

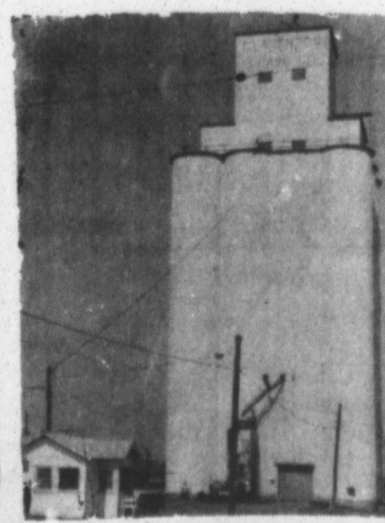

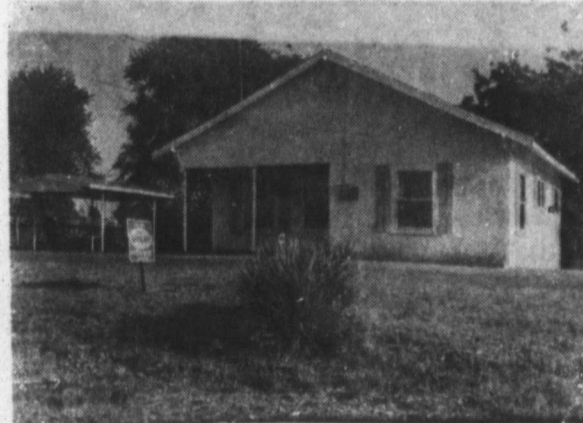

[The caterpillar looks white in this picture.] Farmers who are doing their own scouting should look for worms of roughly this size. The number of insects-per-acre necessary to justify spraying varies with the time in the growing season.

Keep Grass Clippings for Compost

Mowing the lawn generates grass clippings that are excellent for the compost pile.

Compost is a good source of organic matter for gardens and flower beds, says Ronald Gooch, county agent with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. Furthermore, composting is an excellent way to dispose of garden debris leaves and similar plant material.

Make the compost pile 4 to 6 feet wide and any length depending on material and space available, said Gooch.

The simplest composting method is to alternate 4 to 6 inch layers of plant matter, such as leaves or grass, with 2 to 4 inches of good garden soil. Add manure to the soil layer if it's available, and sprinkle commercial fertilizer on each layer of plant matter to hasten decomposition. Use a cupful of fertilizer with a 1-1-1 ration per 10 square feet, Gooch said.

The top layer of the composts pile should be soil and should form a basin to hold water. Water each layer of organic matter before adding the soil layer.

Water the pile thoroughly when completed; then add water as needed to keep the material moist but not soggy. Leaves decompose slowly if too dry.

Turn compost every three to four months to aeriate the material and speed decomposition, said Gooch. Within six months to a year, it will be ready to use, and you'll be glad you saved those grass clippings.
