
Explorers Study **Paleontology**

Memphis Convalescent

The fossil, according to Dr. Hughs is the scapula of a mammoth. Mammoths lived in this area during the later part of the Pleistocene epoch, form about 1 million BP to about 12,000 BP, at which time they disappear from North America. The reason for their disappearance is not clear, but they are lost from fossil records about the same time man becomes evident in the records. Indeed, there is evidence that man may have contributed to their extinction through overkill. However, no evidence at the site indicated how this animal died. In addition to the one mammoth bone recovered, Post members discovered a fragmentary mammoth tooth and a nearly complete horse tooth in the same deposit. All the fossils date, Dr. Hughs believes, from about 1 million years ago.

The bone, teeth, and other fossils were taken to Clarendon College for storage and eventual museum preparation.



Traditional Worship

Each church has its own tradition for "worship". What happens that hour on Sunday morning is determined largely by tradition and habit. Sometimes--after the fact--someone will collect a batch of proof texts to justify the status quo. And the routine itself may become sacred to some people.

But the whole tradition of Sunday Morning Worship is more traditional than Scriptural. While it may be appropriate to meet together in the morning on the first day of the week to celebrate Jesus' resurrection, no where in the New Testament is there a command to do so. Nor is there a command to gather together to sing and pray and listen to a sermon on Sunday morning.

In Acts 20 the congregation at Troas met on the first day of the week "to break bread", but that meeting was in the evening, and Eutychus became the first recorded person to sleep in church (though obviously not the last). In Acts 2:46, there is an example of a church that assembled daily. Hebrews 10:25 has been used as a proof text to browbeat folks into coming to church, but that may be stretching the meaning: "Let us not give up meeting together as some are in the habit of doing, but let us encourage one another"

If most current practice is based on tradition, then what does the Bible say about worship? The answer is surprising--perhaps shocking.

Jesus had much to say in the gospels about the individual disciple's attitude. But he said little about "corporate worship" or "public worship"--terms that are not found in the New Testament. In the Epistles, the words translated "worship" are found primarily in the context of condemning heathen practice.

However, look at James 1:27: "Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and keep oneself from being polluted by the world." The word "religion" there might better be translated "worship". How consistent that is with Psalm 51:17: "The sacrifices [acceptable to] God are a broken spirit, a broken and contrite heart O God, you will not despise!" And how much that sounds like the teaching of our Lord!

Apparently Jesus concept of worship is very different from our divisive ecclesiastical traditions.
