Explorers Study Paleontology

This past Friday and Saturday, members of Explorer Post 2437 assisted in the recovery of a fossil discovered about 6 miles northeast of Clarendon. Dr. Jack Hugh, Professor of Anthropology (retired) at West Texas State University directed the excavation. The fossil, according to Dr. Hughs is the scapula of a mammoth. Mammoths lived in this area during the later part of the Pleistocene epoch, from about 1 million BP to about 12,000 BP, at which time they disappear from North America. The reason for their disappearance is not clear, but they are lost from fossil records about the same time man becomes evident in the records. Indeed, there is evidence that man may have contributed to their extinction through overkill. However, no evidence at the site indicated how this animal died. In addition to the one mammoth bone recovered, Post members discovered a fragmentary mammoth tooth and a nearly complete horse tooth in the same deposit. All the fossils date, Dr. Hughs believes, from about 1 million years ago.

The bone, teeth, and other fossils were taken to Clarendon College for storage and eventual museum preparation.

Insurance Complaints Published

The State Board of Insurance today released complaint data for all insurance companies doing business in Texas during Fiscal Year 1989.

"It is the hope of the State Board of Insurance that this information will be useful to Texas consumers as they shop for insurance coverage," said Insurance Commissioner A.W. Pogue.

"While a complaint ratio may not tell you whether an insurer is 'good' or 'bad,' it does offer some notion of a company's level of policyholder satisfaction."

Publication of complaint ratios was one of several initiatives announced by the Board in June to improve the insurance marketplace for senior citizens and other consumers.

Local Firm in National Magazine

The November issue of *Equipment Today* featured Clarendon Manufacturing's Model 252 elevating scraper in a prominent article. Earthmovers and contractors all over the world read the magazine which features heavy equipment.

The Model 252 scraper was designed and built in Clarendon, but is gaining attention all over the United States. There are currently two prototypes "showing their stuff" in various locations. One has been working in California for several weeks.

The Clarendon company sells other scrapers, but the new unit seems to fill an empty niche in the market. It is powered by an 80 hp Caterpillar engine and drivetrain.

Clarendon Manufacturing also rebuilds Hancock, Clark and other older scrapers. Their old acronym "CMDCO" has been replaced in recent weeks with a plate that says "Clarendon" in big, white block letters on a black background. Wherever a Model 252 goes, its home-town will be publicized.

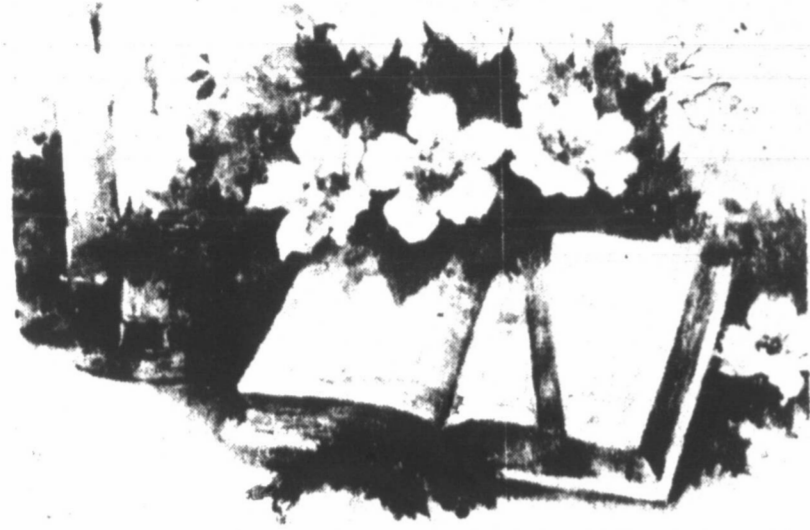


EQUIPMENT TODAY recently featured the Clarendon Model 252 earthmover, built by a local firm.

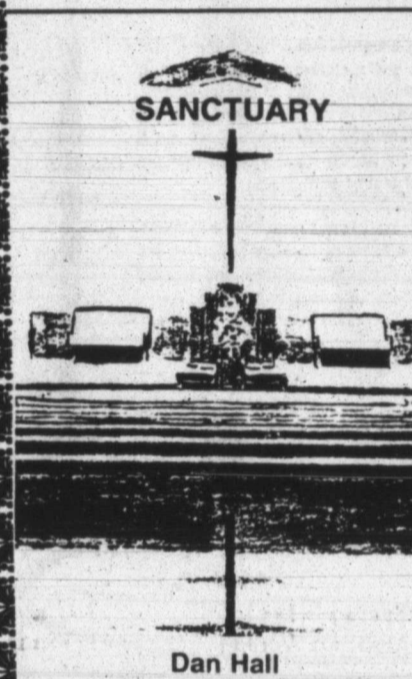

Traditional Worship

Each church has its own tradition for "worship". What happens that hour on Sunday morning is determined largely by tradition and habit. Sometimes—after the fact—someone will collect a batch of proof texts to justify the status quo. And the routine itself may become sacred to some people.

But the whole tradition of Sunday Morning Worship is more traditional than Scriptural. While it may be appropriate to meet together in the morning on the first day of the week to celebrate Jesus' resurrection, no where in the New Testament is there a command to do so. Nor is there a command to gather together to sing and pray and listen to a sermon on Sunday morning.

In Acts 20 the congregation at Troas met on the first day of the week "to break bread", but that meeting was in the evening, and Eutychus became the first recorded person to sleep in church (though obviously not the last). In Acts 2:46, there is an example of a church that assembled daily. Hebrews 10:25 has been used as a proof text to browbeat folks into coming to church, but that may be stretching the meaning: "Let us not give up meeting together as some are in the habit of doing, but let us encourage one another ..."

If the most current practice is based on tradition, then what does the Bible say about worship? The answer is surprising—perhaps shocking.

Jesus had much to say in the gospels about the individual disciple's attitude. But he said little about "corporate worship" or "public worship"—terms that are not found in the New Testament. In the Epistles, the words translated "worship" are found primarily in the context of condemning heathen practice.

However, look at James 1:27: "Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and keep oneself from being polluted by the world." The word "religion" there might better be translated "worship". How consistent that is with Psalm 51:17: "The sacrifices [acceptable to] God are a broken spirit, a broken and contrite heart O God, you will not despise!" And how much that sounds like the teaching of our Lord!

Apparently Jesus concept of worship is very different from our divisive ecclesiastical traditions.

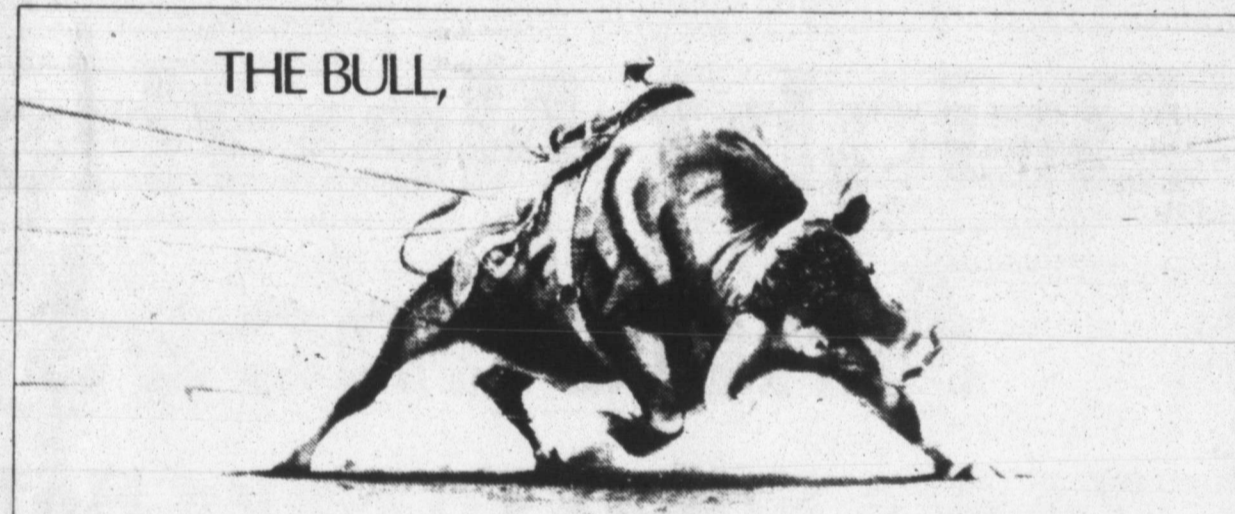

Understanding strategies for marketing wheat, feed grains and cattle futures and options is the focus of the upcoming marketing workshop for High Plains producers in Amarillo, on Dec 15. Dr. Dave Weaver, weed specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said the meeting will provide updates on chemicals and other control measures used to combat insects.

disease and competitive weeds. He said plant protection involves keeping plants free of these pests, while attempting to increase crop yields and quality and lower production costs.

Speakers will include Dr. Earl Butz of Purdue, former U. S. Secretary of Agriculture; Dr. Perry Adkisson, chancellor of the Texas A & M University System and Dr. Charles Arntzen, TAMU System deputy chancellor for agriculture.

"Getting Down to Earth" is the theme for the meeting at the College Station Hilton.

About 400 people are expected to take part, including those from agribusiness, agricultural chemical dealers and applicators, farmers, consultants, university scientists, county Extension Service agents and representatives of other agricultural agencies.

Weaver said sessions will focus on chemical use on peanuts, wheat, tree crops, vegetable, cotton, corn and rice. Speakers also will discuss variety selections, disease control and management, resistant weed management strategies, insect control and vegetative and water management in tree crops.
