Students Win State Medals

All of the Clarendon High School participants who traveled to the State Track Meet in Austin, brought home a medal.

Bobbie Havens brought home two silver medals, placing 2nd in both the 100 Hurdles, 15.2; and 300 Hurdles, 45.7.

Billy Wilson placed 2nd in the Triple Jump, setting a new school record of 48' - 01/4". He received a silver medal for his efforts. He also placed 4th in the High Jump 6'6"; and 6th in the Long Jump, 22' 1/4".

The 400 Relay team brought home bronze medals by placing third in the meet. It was a photo finish to determine second or third place. This was also a new school record. Those receiving medals were Spencer Smith, Ricky Smith, James King, and Ron Suiter, time 42.2.

The boys team came in 5th place in the meet.

Awards Given

Former Donley County residents Judy and Mack Garrison were recently honored with academic awards at Arlington Baptist College.

Judy received the Johnny Kostecki Award, which is given annually to the four students of the college, excluding the valedictorian and Salutatorian, having the highest grade point average. The award, which included a \$50 cash scholarship, is based upon first semester performance; Judy's grade point (GPA) for the semester was 3.76. It was especially significant that Judy maintained such a high average during a semester which saw the arrival, on October 15, of their son Breigh.

Mack earned the Bill Overall Award for the highest GPA among male students of the entire college for their first semester. Mack's GPA was 4.0.

Both Judy and Mack have double majors. Judy is studying Bible and Elementary Education. Mack is majoring in Bible and Foreign Missions. The couple are completing their second year at Arlington, Texas school.

Three Indicted for Assault

A Grand Jury indicted three Pampa youths for aggravated assault Monday. The indictments were the result of a "skip days" incident at Greenbelt Lake on Friday, May 7.

Twin brothers--the Johnsons--and Brant Spencer, all of Pampa, were named by the Grand Jury as the culprits in the affair. More than 60 subpoenas were issued and a small crowd gathered on the Courthouse lawn Monday as the court heard testimony.

The Judge has not yet announced the date for the trial. Conviction on Aggravated Assault charges carries a penalty of two to 10 years in prison and a fine of \$10,000.

Officials from the Sheriff's Department and from the District Attorney's office emphasize their intent to vigorously pursue prosecution. "This kind of violent conduct is just not going to be tolerated in Donley County," said Chief Deputy Jerry Holland. Sheriff Jimmy Thompson and DA's Investigator Doug Wright have expressed similar sentiments.

New Envelopes Coming

To provide extra convenience and more account information to the people it serves, West Texas Utilities Company has improved the monthly bill it mails to customers.

Beginning May 14 the postcard-style bill customers have been receiving will change to a full-page, more detailed bill that will be mailed in an envelope. A return envelope will be enclosed for convenience when paying by mail.

The most obvious change in the bill will be its appearance. The letter-sized format will be noticeably larger, with a detachable bill portion at the top and a detailed statement below. The top portion of the bill will be identified by WTU's logo and light blue color.

While the new bill is more attractive, its real purpose is to serve WTU customers more efficiently. The biggest change most customers will notice is how much more information the new bill provides about their accounts. "The new format has more space, so we can include additional information regarding each customer account," said Jerry Chambliss, Clarendon Area Manager. "You'll see exactly how your bill is calculated with meter reading usage, fuel, and other factors."

Now customers will see a detailed breakdown of their energy usage and rates, as well as how much they owe. The bill will also show more detailed information on other matters such as merchandise accounts.

The return envelope will have a window. The top portion of the bill you return to WTU, when placed correctly in the envelope, will position the address of your local WTU office in the window.

The full page format fared well in selected customers tested early this year. WTU randomly chose 100 accounts company wide to receive the new bill. Afterward, each of the 100 customers called personally and asked reactions. Some of the features customers especially like include: the new bill is easier to read; having the return envelope provided for them; the privacy of their account information going through the mail in a sealed envelope; and having more detailed information about their accounts.

The only change customers should notice is more information and added convenience. There won't be an increase in customers' bills to pay for the new features.

Although the return envelope is provided for customer convenience, those who prefer to pay their bill in person at their WTU local office may continue to do so. Your favorite WTU office personnel can still take your payment in person.

Any customer with a question or comment about the envelope billing may call his or her WTU area office for more information.



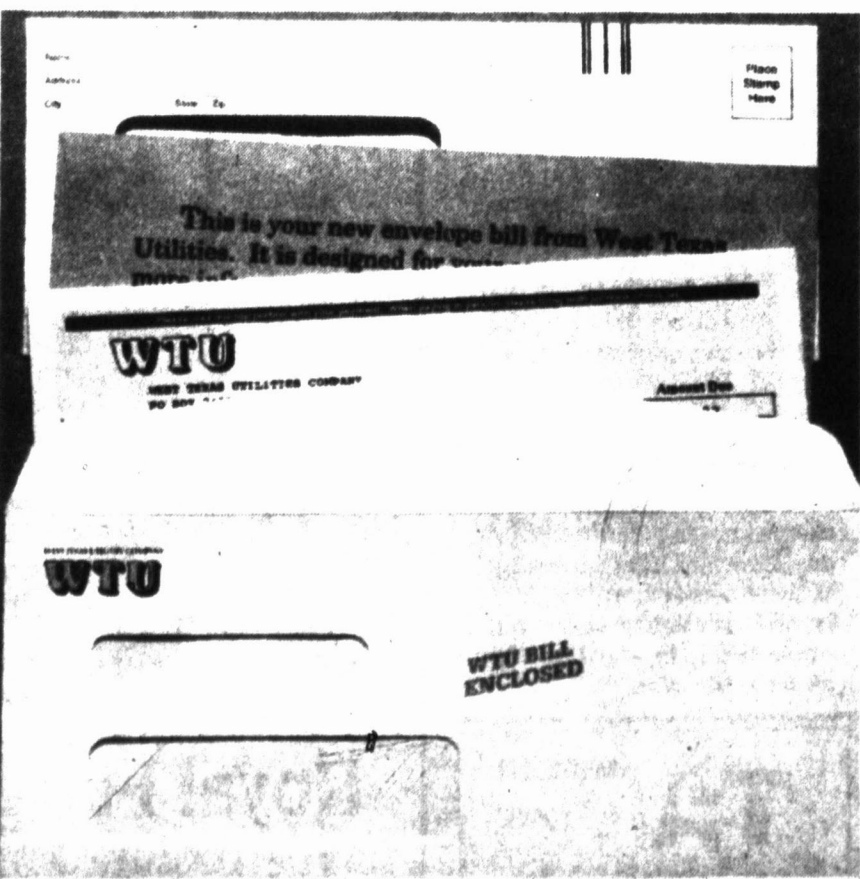

Judge Forbis to Retire Soon

Judge John Forbis of the 100th Judicial District of Texas will retire July 31. Forbis was first elected in late 1984.

The 100th Judicial District encompasses Donley, Carson, Childress, Collingsworth and Hall Counties.

Forbis has been a prominent and popular individual throughout his district. "I have thoroughly enjoyed the bench," Forbis told the *Childress Index*. But the judge is looking forward to retirement.

Governor Ann Richards will appoint an interim successor. That interim appointee may or may not run for election in November 1994.

Many area citizens are urging the Governor to appoint District Attorney David McCoy to the judge's unexpired term.

Judge Forbis will continue to be a popular and entertaining public speaker at events in the area. And he can probably anticipate the sort of good-natured ribbing that he has gotten from Donley County residents in the past.

Motion by Wayne Hardin, seconded by Derlene Graham to approve minutes of the April 8, 1993 regular meeting, April 20, 1993 special meeting, and May 3, 1993 special meeting as presented. Passed unanimously, 6-0.

Motion by Johnny Floyd, seconded by Phil Fletcher to approve payment of bills for April 1992 as presented. Passed unanimously, 6-0.

Motion by Fred Clifford, seconded by Derlene Graham, to approve installation of memorial designation for football field as Walker Bronco Stadium with sign installed at south entrance. Passed, 5 for, 1 (Lynne Williams) opposed.

Dan Hall and Elmonette Bivens were sworn in as new board members.

Motion by Derlene Graham, seconded by Lynne Williams to nominate Johnny Floyd as [board] president.

Wayne Hardin moved Phil Fletcher be Vice President. Derlene moved that the nominations cease and that Phil be elected by acclamation. Passed 6-0.

Motion by Elmonette, to nominate Derlene Graham for secretary. Motion by Derlene to nominate Lynne Williams for secretary. Dan Hall moved nominations cease. Two votes Derlene; 4 votes Lynne.

Motion by Derlene Graham, seconded by Elmonette Bivens to reimburse the Classroom Teachers Organization for the food provided during the Superintendent search activities in the amount of \$140. Passed 6-0.

Motion by Derlene Graham, seconded by Dan Hall, to continue participation in Region XVI, deleting MMS services. Passed 6-0.

Motion by Phil Fletcher, seconded by Wayne Hardin, to appoint Phil Barefield to the Regional Advisory Council. Passed 6-0.

Motion by Wayne Hardin, seconded by Elmonette Bivens to approve Cornell Company for the 93-94 year audit. Passed, 6-0.

Mike Word reported on coming events for the Elementary/Junior High. Attendance count for the day was 366. He reviewed accomplishments of new computers, computer literacy progress in all grades, improved test results (lower only in 7th grade reading and some results are not yet available), curriculum advance, teacher training. Band received a II in sight reading and III in concert; choral program improved. Sent a maximum of two per grade to each Gifted and Talented Seminars. The elementary library is progressing. He commended the Elementary Staff for a job well done. He requested that the elementary computer program be expanded to the 4th Grade (\$30-32,000 estimate). The Elementary/Junior High has adopted the Mifflin Publishers Series.

Solomon Kepley reported that senior students will be able to earn concurrent college credit next year in English and History if the student meets academic and testing requirements. Tech Prep Courses will be offered through the college also (Electronics, Ag, Nursing, etc.). Extra state funding should be available the second year. He discussed TAAS scores (100% [of students tested passed in] Writing, 97% Reading, 73% in Math). He discussed some student behavior problems and a re-admission request. The drop-out rate was .006. Achievements: guest speaker and AIDS program, athletics, student council achievements, extended lunch, expanded computer usage, field trips, literary meet, UIL (third in district), academics and expanded curriculum.

Open Forum: No word on Thompson hearing--this could take up to six months.

Phil Fletcher reported that [school] will receive \$44,673 from the CED on May 27, 1993. School finance was discussed. Senate Bill 7 would benefit the Clarendon Schools.

Consolidated Cotton Co. donated funds to lunch room based on 11 bales.

Johnny Floyd urged the Board to put the past behind them and work together for the good of the school.

Phil Fletcher moved and Dan Hall seconded a motion to approve UIL Stipends as presented. Passed 6-0.

Move to increase local [teacher's salaries above state, base] was deferred until the state selects a funding plan. Increasing local increments for Extra Curricular Personnel was also tabled. No candidate was recommended for hire.

Motion by Dan Hall, seconded by Derlene Graham, to adjourn. Passed unanimously, 6-0.

Cancer Screening Scheduled

On Saturday, June 12, from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., The Don And Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital Mobile Mammography Unit will be in Clarendon at Clarendon Medical Center Clinic, HWY 70 North. Exams are done by appointment only. For information or to schedule an appointment call 1-800-377-HOPE (4673) or (806) 359-4673.

The total cost of the screening is \$70.00. This includes the x-ray, physical breast exam, and the radiology fee for reading the mammogram. Funding has been provided by the Texas Department of Health to allow for free breast screenings for women who qualify.

The major goal of the clinic is the early detection of breast cancer. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self examination, and a mammogram. Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are: 1. Learn and perform breast self examination every month. 2. Have a physical examination every year. 3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age: 35 to 39 - one baseline mammogram; 40 to 49 - a mammogram every 1 to 2 years; 50 and over - yearly mammograms.

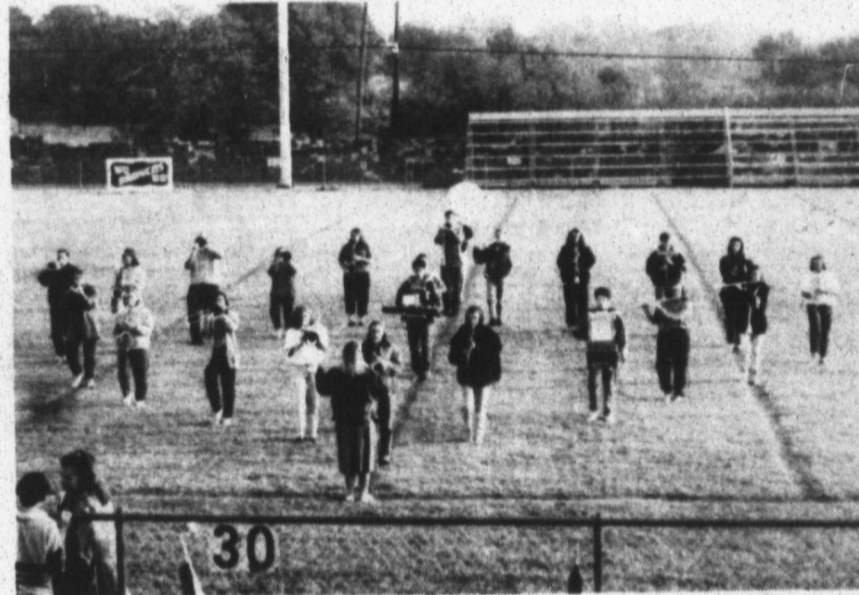

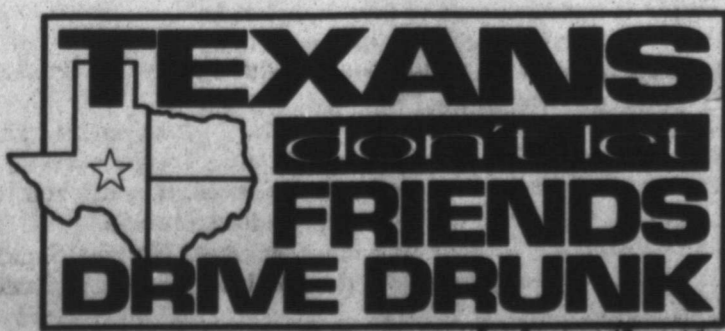

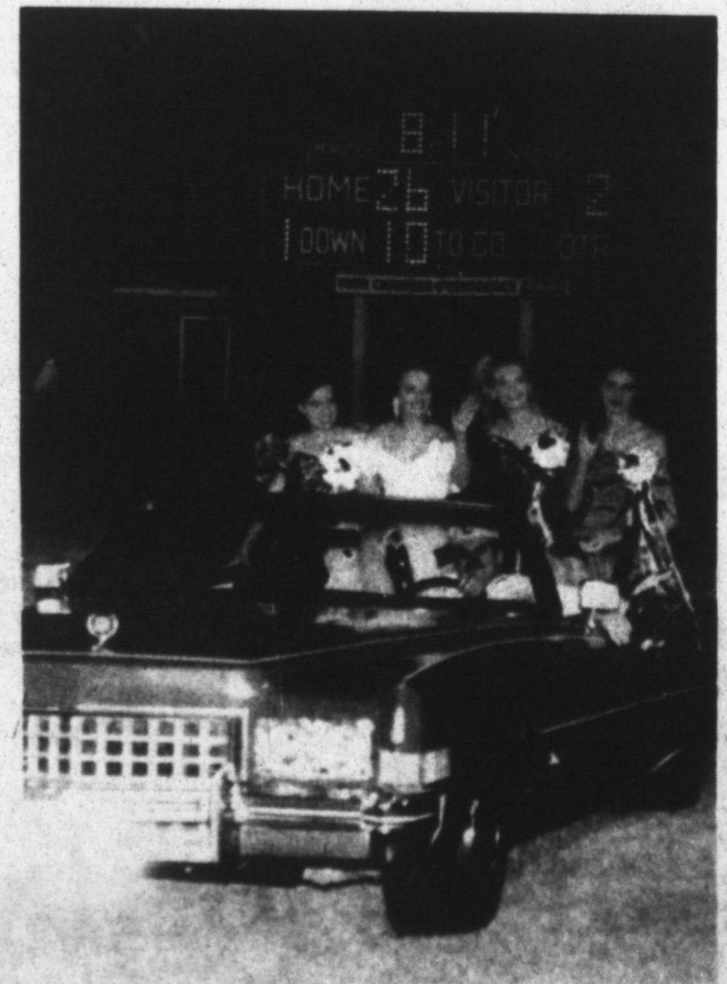

VETERANS

The VFW and Vietnam Veterans

(NU) - For more than a quarter century, the Veterans of Foreign Wars has been in the vanguard of the fight for veterans of Vietnam.

We've waged that battle on several fronts, including passage of legislation, support for GIs during the war, contributions to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial and continuing efforts to resolve the fate of the war's missing in action.

Leading the Organization

In the 20 years since the last U.S. troops left Indochina, Vietnam veterans have played a prominent role in the VFW's development. The year 1984 saw the election of the first Vietnam veteran as commander-in-chief. He was followed by two more in 1989 and 1991. This year, another will take the helm to be succeeded by still another in 1994.

The story is the same at the local and state levels. Of current department commanders, at least a dozen are of the Vietnam generation. Chances are a survey of post positions would reveal similar involvement.

Moreover, the staffs in both Kansas City and Washington, D.C., are 95 percent Vietnam veterans. Since some 25 percent of VFW members served in Vietnam, it's no surprise that they have such a pivotal role in decision-making.

Fight for Benefits

VFW can claim many important victories on behalf of this entire gen-

eration of war veterans. Beginning with the GI Bill of Rights for Vietnam era veterans, passed in June 1966, we advocated benefits on a par with those granted earlier veterans.

As the need for greater and more specialized benefits became apparent, the VFW was there to bear the standard.

Education was at the top of the list. We won an extension of education benefits from eight to 10 years, along with a 35 percent increase in monthly stipends. Advanced payments, an outreach program and campus veteran representatives were other VFW ideas.

We also called for renewed and innovative employment programs, including affirmative action in government hiring and special emphasis on Vietnam veterans at the Labor Department.

On the Home Front

When much of the nation turned its back on returning Vietnam servicemen, VFW members individually and collectively extended a welcome home.

A key element in all of this has been "VFW Magazine." Its crusade on behalf of Vietnam veterans continues today. Recently the magazine paid a 20th-anniversary tribute to the 2.6 million GIs who served their country in Vietnam.

The VFW's future is in their hands.

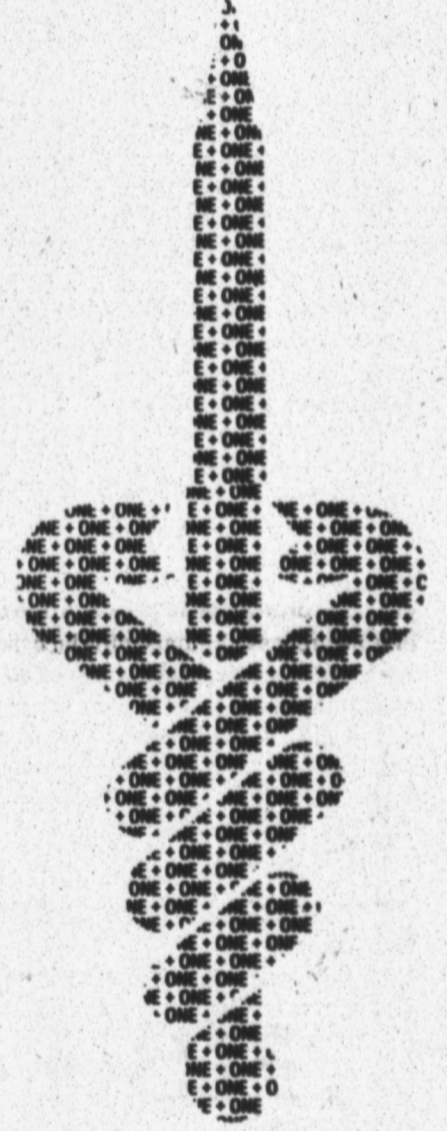

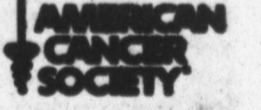

Killing Bugs The Natural Way

No one loves a cockroach, or so the saying goes. More specifically, no one likes finding a cockroach at home. 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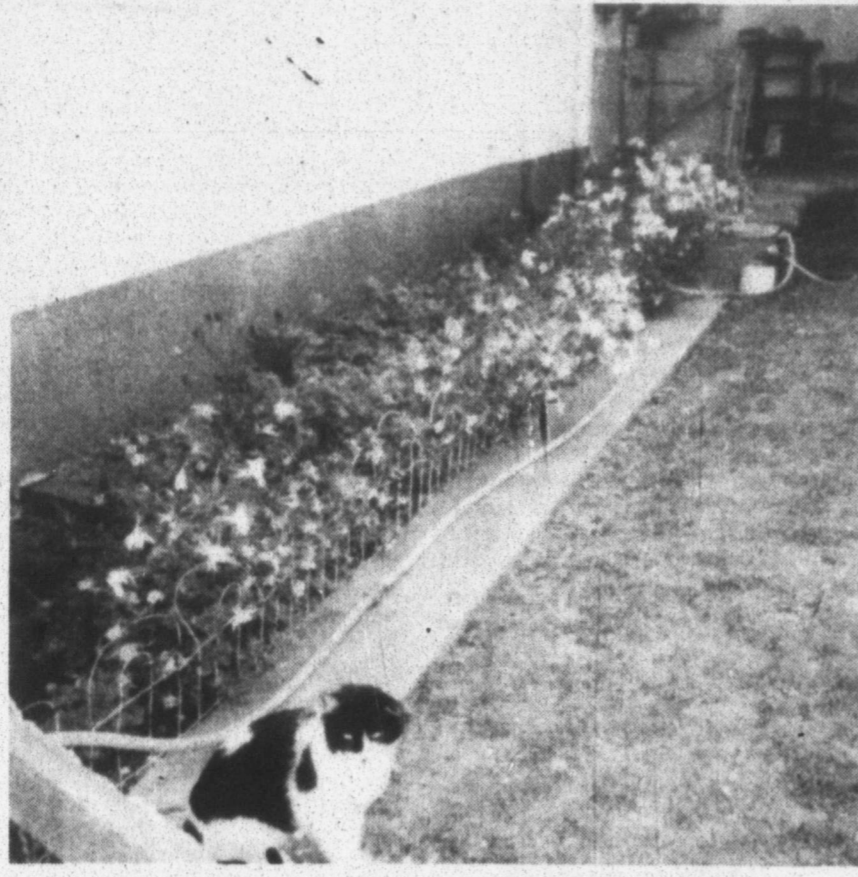

Seasonal Songbirds Soothe The Senses

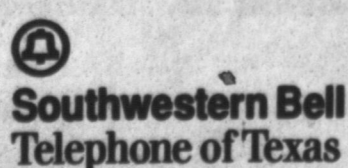
On April 16, 1993, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (SWBT) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) for approval of a new optional service, Network Subscriber Information Interface (NSII). NSII is a new service feature developed primarily for the provision of Voice Messaging Service (VMS). It will give a VMS provider (as SWBT's customer) the ability to receive originating call information from SWBT's central office and to activate and deactivate a Message Waiting Indicator (MWI) on the line of the VMS provider's patron. NSII also gives the VMS provider the ability to activate and deactivate an intermittent dial tone on a patron's line in multiple offices. The VMS provider will be able to perform these functions in multiple offices through a connection to a single Message Node office. The Message Node will be a pre-designated central office and will interconnect with all central offices within the Message Node Service Area. Upon approval of this application, NSII will be available to customers where facilities are available. Available facilities are not currently deployed statewide. The proposed effective date of this service is June 20, 1993.

SWBT estimates these new services will increase its annual revenues during the first year by approximately \$2.4 million. VMS providers and Telephone Answering Services and their subscribers are the types of customers likely to be affected by approval of these services.

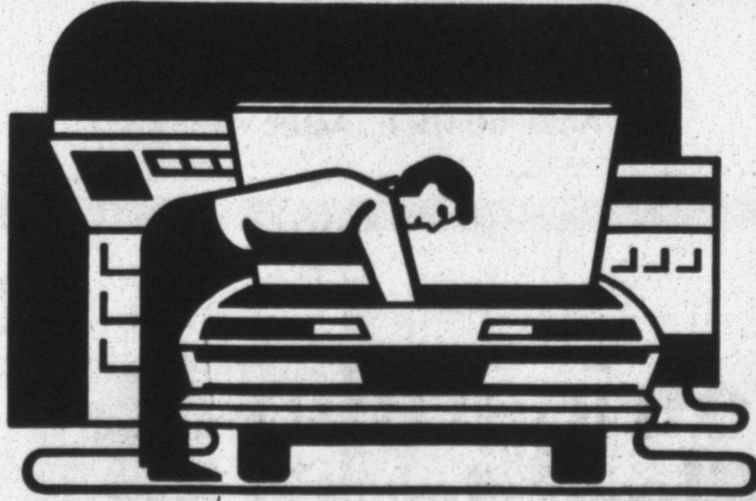

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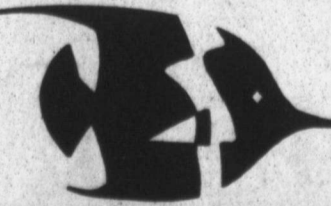
