Houston Rodeo have announced a 27-star line-up for the 1990 Rodeo, the largest number of entertainers in Show history.

Clint Black opens the 1990 event at 4 p.m., Sunday, Feb. 18. The first week continues with 7:45 performances nightly: The Judds, Monday, Feb. 19; Conway Twitty and George Jones, Tuesday, Feb. 20; George Strait, Wednesday and Thursday, Feb. 21 and 22; and Chicago, Friday, Feb. 23. The weekend features Rodney Crowell and Restless Heart at the 11 a.m. Saturday matinee, Feb. 24; Ricky Van Shelton, Saturday night, Feb. 24; Steve Wariner for the 1 p.m. Sunday matinee, Feb. 25; and Vikki Carr, Roberto Pulido y Los Clasicos, and Emilio & Rio Sunday night, Feb. 25.

The second week continues the award-winning line-up with Bill Cosby, Monday, Feb. 26; The Oak Ridge Boys, Tuesday, Feb. 27; Patti LaBelle and James Ingram, Wednesday, Feb. 28; Expose' and Lisa Lisa and Cult Jam, Thursday, March 1; Nitty Gritty Dirt Band and Tanya Tucker, Friday, March 2; Anne Murray, 11 a.m. Saturday matinee, March 3; The Highwaymen-Willie Nelson, Johnny Cash, Waylon Jennings and Kris Kristofferson, Saturday night, March 3; and Alabama, 4 p.m. Sunday twilight performance, March 4.

Show president Hal Hillman announced an expanded shuttle bus schedule and more available park and ride locations to make getting to and from the Show easier. The Coors Light Rodeo METRO Express will run every day, beginning Saturday, Feb. 18, 9 a.m. to midnight Saturdays and Sundays and 5 p.m. to midnight Monday through Friday.

The shuttle also will pick up passengers at three shopping centers this year: Gulfgate, Meyerland and Northline malls, still for only \$1 per person round-trip.

Another Show highlight, the Conoco Rodeo Run, will again officially kick off the downtown rodeo parade, Saturday, Feb. 17, 10 a.m.

Conoco donated \$52,000 in entry fees from the 1989 10K Rodeo Run to the Show's scholarship fund, making them the largest single scholarship donor. They expect 4,500 to 5,000 runners again this year.

Proclamation Declared

County Judge W.R. Christal has signed a proclamation designating February 11-17, as "Farm Bureau Membership Week" in Donley County.

The week is part of a statewide observance during which county Farm Bureaus will make a special effort to enroll new members, according to Roy Lee Helms of Clarendon, president of the Hall-Donley County Farm Bureau.

Harold White of Hedley is chairman of the membership committee which is responsible for membership acquisition and maintenance.

"The Texas Farm Bureau, with more than 325,000 member families, is influential in both state and national affairs on behalf of agriculture," the proclamation reads.

"Farm Bureau is a grass-roots organization. Its foundation is the county unit. There are 214 organized Farm Bureaus in the state including the Hall-Donley County Farm Bureau," the proclamation states.

President Helms said the local county Farm Bureau has 832 member families and is seeking to exceed that figure in 1990.

He said that the Farm Bureau is a general farm organization that seeks to improve income and living conditions of farm and ranch families. It represents the farmer and ranchers at the local county courthouse, in Austin, and the nation's capital, Washington, D.C.

Food Program Offered

The Texas Department of Human Services announces the availability of the Summer Food Service Program to eligible organizations next summer.

The program provides meals to children from needy areas when schools are closed for vacation. About \$7 million, appropriated through the U.S. Department of Agriculture, is available to operate the program in Texas. The program is to be offered without discrimination due to race, color, national origin, sex, age or handicap.

Service institutions eligible to sponsor the program include public or non-profit private schools, residential summer camps, and local, municipal or county governments. Service institutions must contact DHS by Feb. 28, 1990, for more information. Applications should be received by April 15, 1990.

Service institutions may also subcontract with food service management companies to provide meals. To be eligible to bid for contracts for the Summer Food Service Program, these companies must be registered with DHS. Applications will be mailed to companies that were registered in the last two years. Applications for registration must be received by March 15, 1990.

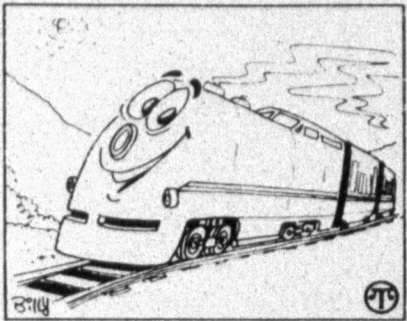

DID YOU KNOW?

As we enter a new decade, a lot of people are talking about our nation's crumbling, congested highways. Hundreds of billions of dollars must be spent, it is said, to pave over more land in order to ease highway congestion and to rebuild existing highways that were built 30 years ago to last only 20 years. Is money the only solution?



Maybe there is a better way--rail.

While the nation's highways are crowded and crumbling, our rail lines are solid and underused.

Rail operations are environmentally benign in terms of energy consumption, air pollution, public safety and land use disruption.

Easing the load on highways by moving more freight by rail would cost American taxpayers nothing, because railroads own, maintain and pay taxes on their rights-of-way.

On the other hand, large trucks--the railroads' major competitors--pay as little as 50 percent of their highway cost responsibility and make no contribution to highway overhead costs. The remainder is borne by taxpayers and highway users in cars and light trucks.

One heavy truck can cause the same highway damage as 9,600 passenger cars. Drivers say it's not fair to force other vehicles to subsidize trucks.

Our federal government can eliminate this subsidy. Then, more freight would move to the nation's rails--benefiting all citizens, while costing them nothing in subsidies.

Rheumatoid Arthritis Medicines

The symptoms of rheumatoid arthritis include pain, heat, redness, swelling, and limitations in the movement of body joints. The most effective relief of rheumatoid arthritis symptoms consists of rest, appropriate exercise during remission phases, and medicines.

Aspirin is the most commonly used and one of the most effective medicines available for the treatment of arthritis symptoms. With appropriate doses, aspirin may relieve morning stiffness and joint swelling. An alternative to aspirin is the nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs which include naproxen, ibuprofen, sulindac, mefenamic acid, and piroxicam. It may be necessary to take the nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory medicine for up to 6 weeks to determine its effectiveness.

Corticosteroids may be needed for those who cannot be managed with aspirin or other agents. Antimalarials such as hydroxychloroquine may be useful when used with other medicines. Gold compounds, given by mouth or by injection, have been helpful in relieving morning stiffness and joint pain. Cytotoxic agents such as methotrexate are sometimes used when other agents are not effective.

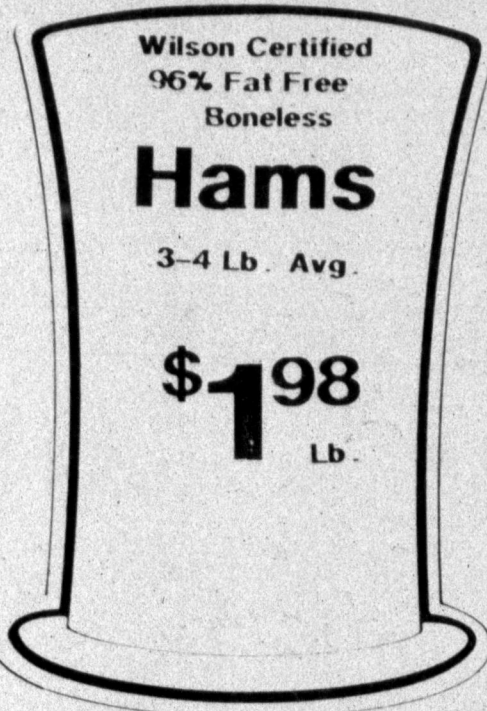
