 What will happen on June 1 if Court Texas will be financed? William Kilgarland, who is the Master, is a former Justice of theTexas Supreme Court. He was asked to resign by Governor Clements because while he was on the
Court, Kilgarland took two Court, Kilgariand took two law firm which had cases pending before his court at the time! What are the Master's options? The court cannot levee a local
property tax or a sales tax, and doubt that he would even bother trying to raise fees.
He really has two He really has two options. He can divide the existing money different-
ly, cutting sums like $\$ 50$ million y, cutting sums like $\$ 50$ million
from Dallas and $\$ 70$ million from Houston. But Kilgarland lives in Houston, and I don't think he's going to make a decision like that.
Another option is that he could consolidate school districts so every student would have equal access to property value, so similar tax efforts would raise similar amount of local funds. That way he would
have state funds available to allohave state funds available to allo-
cate. He could say that inner city districts needs more because they have to pay a higher teacher salary or because land is more expensive
(that's usually called the Price Dif(that's usually called the Price Dif-
ferential Index or PDI) He might say that rural districts should get additional money because of long
bus routes.

We cannot allow the Master to

Beginning June 1, repre-
sentatives from the Texas sentatives from the Texas
Agricultural Statistics Service will begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state to help set the 1999 planted acreage estimates and midyear livestock inventories.
State Statistician Dennis Findley State Statistician Dennis Findley
emphasized that information from emphasized that information from
these surveys will help producers adjust their production and marketing plans for 1990. "Good marketing re quires good informa-
tion and advanced planning Infortion and advanced planning. Infor-
mation from these surveys will provide Texas producers with solid facts and figures they can use when making their marketing plans. "There are many uncertainties racing agriculture," Findley added, give producers a chance to make sound production and marketing decisions during the coming year." Results of the confidential interin person by field enumerators, will be published later this summer. The 1990 planted acreage report will be released June 28 and the U . S. cattle in
July 2 .

To reduce survey costs, Findley is urging farmers and ranchers to return the mailed questionnaires as
soon as possible. Individual reports soon as possible. Individual reports
