The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Cancer Council for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. 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
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Hancock-**Dorris Wed**

The Gainesville Cyclone of 1854

T. Lindsay Baker

Eight-year-old Tommy and 9year-old Louise Howeth, brother and sister, lie side-by-side in the Fairview Cemetery at Gainesville in the Red River Valley. Their graves are in what today is Division D in the burial ground in front and south of the chapel. The thing that sets them apart from the other people there is that they started the cemetery.

The story of Tommy and Louise goes back to the evening of Sunday, May 28, 1854. They were in the home of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Howeths, together with an aunt and uncle and their two children. The Howeths lived on the fringe of settlement, their home being one of the handful that had been built west of Gainsville.

Thursday, June 7, 1990 In May 1854 Gainsville was barely a town. When W. B. Parker visited the community a few weeks later, he described it as being a "collection of five or six log cabins,

dignified with the name of a town." On the evening of May 28, 1854, the sky darkened and the winds began to rise as a typical late springtime convectional storm brewed toward the west. W.W. Howeth, then a boy, later recalled, "A tornado was forming, and in a few minutes. . . reached from the earth to the cloud above, with all its blackness, whirling and roaring."

Having nowhere else to seek shelter, the two families all huddled in the William Howeth's cabin. Little did they imagine the force that the cyclone was about to exert. The entire house was blown down upon its inmates, killing all of the children but one. The two wives were so severely injured that their lives were threatened.

Other frontier families in the Gainsville area suffered as well. Mrs. William C. Twitty and her stepsister, Mrs. Olivo, had spent the Sunday visiting in the home of Mrs. Twtti's father, Daniel Montague. Late that afternoon, as the two ladies headded for their respectives homes, the clouds darkened and the thunder began to rumble.

The Standard in Clarksville, farther down thej Red River Valley, reported that the homes of both the Twitty and the Montague families were

. . . even the bed clothes torn to shreads by the force of the winds." The storm struck after Mrs. Olivo had retuned home, and she saved her children from its furey only by " placing them in a small cellar under the floor," although she herself was seriously hurt.

In the same neighborhood, James Rutledge suffered damage to crops and home. "The roof of his house was blown clear away and has not yet been found, reported the paper."

Some of the damage was incredibly gruesome. When he passed through Gainsville shortly after the storm, W.B. Parker noted " a horse was blown into a tree, where iut happened to catch by its fore-leg and shoulder; these were torn from the body and were still hanging there, the balance of the carcass lying in a field a full quarter

Summarizing the devastation at Gainsville, the standard described the cyclone as having been " a gale unparalleled save by the hurricanes of the tropics. "... and that it was.



Letters To The Editor

Dear Editor,

What will happen on June 1 if the Master appointed by the Court decides how the schools in Texas will be financed?

William Kilgarland, who is the Master, is a former Justice of the Texas Supreme Court. He was asked to resign by Governor Clements because while he was on the Court, Kilgarland took two weekend trips to Las Vegas with a law firm which had cases pending before his court at the time!

What are the Master's options? The court cannot levee a local property tax or a sales tax, and I doubt that he would even bother trying to raise fees.

He really has two options. He can divide the existing money differently, cutting sums like \$50 million from Dallas and \$70 million from Houston. But Kilgarland lives in Houston, and I don't think he's going to make a decision like that.

Another option is that he could consolidate school districts so every student would have equal access to property value, so similar tax efforts would raise similar amount of local funds. That way he would have state funds available to allocate. He could say that inner city districts needs more because they have to pay a higher teacher salary or because land is more expensive (that's usually called the Price Differential Index or PDI). He might say that rural districts should get additional money because of long

The problem with that option is that rural Texas always gives up more than we get.

We cannot allow the Master to combine our districts. In the Panhandle, we would probably have one district and the school board might be elected by people from Amarillo or Lubbock, or maybe even Odessa!

The proper place to decide this issue is in the legislature, not in the court. The only fair way to provide the money, in my opinion, is the sales tax combined with budget cuts. Let's not let the courts make this situation worse, or ask the ad valorem tax payers to pick up the tab again, since they pay 53% al-

The bottle neck to the passage of a fair and equitable bill is in the governor's office. The legislature needs your help and your voice in convincing Governor Clements that another expensive and timewasting legislative session is futile, when he has the solution in his hands.

The suit is styled "Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, Plaintiff, vs. MCI Telecommunications Corporation, A Member of the Class of Texas Intrastate WATS and 800 Service Customers Who Paid Overtime Charges From September 1976 Through February 1987, Defendant," and identified as Cause No. 471,460 in the 126th Judicial District Court of Travis County, Texas.

Pursuant to the settlement, while not admitting liability, Southwestern Bell, the other local exchange telephone companies in Texas, and AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. have agreed to pay refunds to those WATS/800 customers who paid overtime charges attributable to the rounding practices for intrastate WATS/800 services at any time between September, 1976, and February, 1987. The refunds will be based upon either the actual or estimated amount of overtime charges attributable to such rounding practices. An exact refund will be determined for customers able to produce copies of their WATS/800 service bills. For customers who do not have copies of their WATS/800 service bills to establish actual overtime charges paid, an average refund of \$4.53 to \$5.95 per WATS/800 service line per month will be applied. All claims will be subject to verification. The refunds will also include interest at the rate of 7.80% per annum.

Those customers who think they may be entitled to a refund or who desire more information must call 1-800-782-3026, 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, or write to WATS Refund Pool Administrator, One Bell Plaza, Room 670, P. O. Box 650376, Dallas. Texas 75265-0376, to request a WATS Refund Information Package. The WATS Refund Information Package will contain further information regarding the lawsuit and eligibility for a refund, a description of documentation required to support a customer's claim for refund. and a refund claim form to be filled out and submitted requesting a refund. REQUESTING A WATS REFUND INFORMATION PACKAGE DOES NOT OBLIGATE YOU IN ANY WAY.

All claims for a refund must be received by the Refund Pool Administrator by Friday, October 5, 1990, and all rejections of the settlement (that is, requests for exclusion from the class action lawsuit) must be received by the Court by Wednesday, September 5, 1990. Only those who respond by filing a claim or by filing a rejection of the settlement, as explained in the WATS Refund Information Package, will receive notice of future developments in this proceeding.

Several years ago it became fad-dish in certain educational circles not to have grades or report cards. The grades don't really mean anycountered, any grade system is imperfect, but the report is a needed

indication of what the student can do, and, more importantly, is doing. And, like most fads, the no-grades, no-report-card thing died a quick, quiet death.

Wouldn't it be nice, just once in while, to receive a report card from the Lord? Wouldn't it be beneficial to see something like

Surely receiving such a report would help us to see where we perform well, and where we need extra work. Well, wouldn't it? Why doesn't God issue report cards?! Did you ever hear two students comparing their cards like this:

"I beat you in English." "Yeah, but I beat you in Math, nyah, nyah!"

"Of course you did. Old Lady Smith likes you. She hates me!" Could Christians find themselves

in that sort of competition? It's pretty easy to get into an "I'm-asuper-Christian-and-you're-not" mentality, even without report cards, isn't it?

Would receiving a low mark in, say, Church Visitation, cause us to focus on quantity instead of quality? ("I'll sign up ten more people in Sunday School this year. Surely that'll get me an 'A'." Aren't we pretty number-conscious as it

Would receiving a report card make us too success-oriented? We're already too inclined to believe that the results of our witnessing depends upon us, instead of upon the wooing of His Spirit.

Actually, the whole question is amiss. God DOES keep us posted, and He does it in a way that avoids the pitfalls just mentioned.

How does He let us know where we stand?

First and most importantly, He speaks through His Spirit. "The Spirit itself beareth witness with our spirit, that we are the children of God" (Romans 8:16).

Secondly, we are rated by the Word. "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, dent members of your class? The for correction, for instruction in righteousness" (II Timothy 3:16).

Thirdly, any good teacher, any good parent, knows long before report card time when a student strays from the right path. Something, proponents of the fad ar-gued. But most educators and are required. "As many as I love, I parents disagreed. True, they rebuke and chasten," the Lord says in Revelation 3:19.

In the fourth place, the Lord

speaks through blessing. It is true that the rain falls on the just and the unjust, but any Christian can tell you he didn't really know anything about blessing until he began walking with the Lord.

Finally, we receive an indication of the Lord's pleasure in our work by receiving more responsibility in the Kingdom's work. "Well done, good and faithful servant; thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things: enter thou into the joy of thy lord" (Matthew 25:23).

No, God doesn't leave His children floundering in the darkness, having no earthly idea whether they're on track. His signs, His Word, His Spirit are everywhere.

Do you see no report at all? Read Hebrews 12:6-8. Perhaps God isn't speaking. Get worried!

Midyear Crop **And Livestock** Reports

Beginning June 1, representatives from the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state to help set the 1990 planted acreage estimates and midyear livestock inventories.

State Statistician Dennis Findley emphasized that information from these surveys will help producers adjust their production and marketing plans for 1990. "Good marketing re quires good information and advanced planning. Information from these surveys will provide Texas producers with solid facts and figures they can use when making their marketing plans.

"There are many uncertainties facing agriculture," Findley added, "and accurate, reliable figures will give producers a chance to make sound production and marketing decisions during the coming year."

Results of the confidential interviews, conducted by tele phone or in person by field enumerators, will be published later this summer. The 1990 planted acreage report will be released June 28 and the U. S. cattle inventory will be released

To reduce survey costs, Findley is return the mailed questionnaires as soon as possible. Individual reports will be combined with other reports to state estimates.

"Remember, these are sample surveys, so if you are contacted it is important to provide the requested information, since your one report represents similar operations of the same size and type. Our estimates can be no better than the numbers producers provide," Findley added.
