Texans aged 65 or older can postpone paying delinquent and current Property taxes on their homes. They can take advantage of a tax option

Appraisal office Once a homeowner files an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the
appraisal district, no taxing unit can start or continue a lawsuit for delinwent taxes as long as that person owns and lives in that homus for delin Taxpayers need to be aware that tax deferral for the elderly only postponess paying delinquent taxes on the home, it does not cancel them. When the elderriy taxpayer no longer owns or tives in the home, the taxe. become due. Taxing units can then sue to to collect all the deferered tax and Filing of the deferral affidavit does not forgive penalties that are arready due. Also, if the taxes remain delinquent more than 90 days after the deferral ends, an added penalty may be charged if the account goes to

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production This "produrtivity rather than on its market value This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is laxed based on its abilty to produce crops, livestock And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

## When is the application deadine?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal, you must apply to your local appraisal district by our 1993 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may. still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

## Doyou need to reapply annumily?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply uniess the chief appraiser requires you to. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.

4. Support and protect school personnel in the proper performance of their duties.
. Vote to appoint the best qualified personnel available after consideration of coommendations of the Superintendent
5. Hold confidential all matters pertaining to school that, if disclosed, may need lessly injure individuals or the schools, and respect the confidentiality of informa ion that is privileged under applicable law
6. Attend all regularly scheduled Board meetings insofar as possible and become informed concerning the issues to be considered at those meetings.
7. Delegate authority for the administration of the school to the Superintendent.
8. Endeavor to make policy decisions only after full discussion at publicly held Board meetings, render all decisions based on the available facts, and refuse to surrender that judgment to individuals or special groups. [I.e. see all sides, epresent all people.]
9. Encourage the free expression of opinion by all Board members and seek sys tematic communications between the Board and students, staff and all elements of the community.
10. Communicate to Board members and the Superintendent at appropriate times expressions of public reaction to Board policies and school programs.
11. Become informed about current educational issues by individual study and hrough participation in programs providing needed information, such as those ponsored by state and national school boards associations.
12. Refrain from using my Board position for personal or partisan gain
13. Make certain the Board remains responsive to the community.
14. Remember always that my first and greatest concern must be the educational welfare of all the students attending the public schools
