Local highway boosters were jubilant today as the outlook was promising for a Clarendon-Turkey road and the hardsurfacing of a portion of Highway 88.

With 89 WPA workers technically idle, Donley County commissioners were working overtime to secure right-of-way for an allweather extension on Highway 88. The project will keep the men busy until construction can be started on a caliche "cut off" from the Sawyer corner into Clarendon.

The extension will be on the north end of the recently completed river hill project.

Meanwhile state engineers were surveying the proposed new route into town which will intersect Highway 5 near where the Fort Worth and Denver section house was situated.

According to commissioner G. G. Reeves and J. H. Hermesmeyer, the project will ultimately result in a paved road from Clarendon 71/2 miles north on 88.

A survey for the new state highway from Clarendon to Turkey was also started this week after W. J. Van London, state division engineer Saturday promised local delegates, headed by Reeves, to start the work immediately. The survey had been indefinitely pigeon-holed before the conference.





Only 5,174 Get Tickets For **Highway Infraction**

AUSTIN, Aug. 26.-Texas highway patrolmen charged 5,174 drivers in traffic complaints and warned 23,314 others during the month of July when Texas was credited with a continued decrease in street and highway fatalities, according to state police reports. ed to this Church. Hundreds of

> During July 278 patrolmen investigated 280 traffic accidents, recovered 34 stolen automobiles and apprehended 43 fugitives while working with local peace officers. The force was credited with traveling 751,351 miles in automobiles and 84,259 miles on motorcycles enforcing traffic regulations.

The report stated that 75 drivers were arrested for intoxication, 283 were charged with misdemeanor intoxication and eight were arrested for leaving the scene of an accident. 




