Ayers Street Signal Due in May


According to officials with the Burlington Northern Railroad, installation of crossing signals on Ayers Street can be expected in April or

The crossing signals were previously scheduled for December, but were delayed due to schedule conflicts.

Burlington signal crews are reportedly running far behind schedule. The crews are installing electrically operated switches and block signals on the railroad as a result of Federal directives resulting from the abandonment of cabooses. The switch-and-signal project was to have been completed in December, but is still in progress. As a result, all other projects are also late.



Recently someone called 911 with an emergency. The computer screen automatically displayed the number that was reporting the emergency. But it did not show the address or location. No one had ever turned in that vital information.

Fortunately--at least in this case--the results were not serious. There was a small delay while the person reporting the emergency tried to described where they were located, but emergency personnel found the house. But when seconds count, failure to have turned in location information could be deadly.

Any area resident who has not filled in a form like the one shown above should do so. It could save the life of a loved one.

Any anyone who has not put house numbers up in a prominent place should do so. Some people may be able to find a house from a description like, "Oh, we live across the street from John Doe," but is it worth taking a chance? What is \$3 for house numbers worth in the event of a fire? Or will you wish that you had taken five minutes to fill in a location form as you wait twenty minutes for the ambulance crew to find your home?

Eastern Redcedar

The Eastern Redcedar is a juniper rather than a true cedar. It is a hardy plant and is adapted to a wide range of soil and moisture conditions. Male and female flowers appear on separate trees and bloom in February or March. The fruit is a berry about 1/4 inch in diameter, born only on the female plants. This tree is able to withstand extremes in temperature and moisture. Because of its dense, compact foliage and branching near the ground, Eastern redcedar makes an excellent wind barrier. Another added value of this tree is that it is especially well liked by quail, pheasant and turkey as well as numerous songbirds.

• Did you know that over a 50 year lifetime, a tree will... provide \$62,000 of air pollution control, generate \$31,250 worth of oxygen, control \$31,250 worth of soil erosion, recycle \$37,000 worth of

water, (Published by Michigan State University). By providing shade and evaporative cooling, trees affected local times as military bases begin to close

temperatures. Clusters of urban trees can cool amvient temperature by 10 degrees Fahrenheit, reducing local energy demand (for air conditioning) by 10 to 50%. The energy saved reduces global warming by about 15 times the amount of CO absorbed by those trees.

The average American uses the equivalent of 7 trees every year. That's over 1-1/2 billion trees used annually in the United States.

Trees, humans, and animal life are dependent on each other. We require oxygen and produce carbon dioxide (CO); trees and other plants require CO and produce oxygen.

Planting trees has a cumulative effect; each tree you plant will provide benefits for years to come. For example: if only 100,000 people plant a tree this year, the trees will still be absorbing over a million pounds of CO annually in the year 2010. But if the same people plant a tree every year from now until 2010, the trees will absorb over 20 million pound of CO in

It is estimated that each mature tree consumes, on average, about 13

Don't just stick a tree in the ground and ignore it. Like other growing plants, trees need a little care for the first two years; including water, vertical support, and mulch.

If we all recycled our Sunday papers, we could save over 500,000 trees

Veterans receive job training through state program

I am a veteran of Desert Storm. Due to recent cuts in defense spending, I was discharged from the military and am having a hard time finding a job. Where can veterans find assistance with job placement?

Many veterans are facing tough and the job market becomes increasingly saturated with recently discharged veterans. If you are within 48 months of your date of separation, disabled or are a veteran of the Vietnam Era or Persian Gulf War, you are eligible for job training and placement through the Veterans Employment and Training Program.

The Veterans Employment and Training Program (JTPA Title IVC) was created through the Job Training Partnership Act to increase the longterm employment and earned incomes of participating veterans. The Texas Department of Commerce and the Texas Employment Commission match funds dollar for dollar and join forces with community based organizations for veterans to maximize the delivery of the program.

The program provides veterans with on-the-job training, vocational training, job placement, job counseling and support services. The program emphasizes service to those veterans who are unskilled or have military skills that are not transferrable to the civilian job market.

To benefit from the Veterans Employment and Training Program, veterans need only contact their local veterans program office. Local offices are located in Houston, Dallas, San Antonio, Austin, Fort Worth, Corpus Christi, El Paso, Longview

The Texas Department of Commerce contracts with two community based organizations, American GI Forum and the National Association of Developing Colleges, to design a training program best suited for the veteran. Once training is complete, the sub-contractor helps the veteran find a job and settle into the new role, making sure the vet is confident in his or her ability to meet the new job




