Ayers Street Signal Due in May

According to officials with the Burlington Northern Railroad, installation of crossing signals on Ayers Street can be expected in April or May.

The crossing signals were previously scheduled for December, but were delayed due to schedule conflicts.

Burlington signal crews are reportedly running far behind schedule. The crews are installing electrically operated switches and block signals on the railroad as a result of Federal directives resulting from the abandonment of cabooses. The switch-and-signal project was to have been completed in December, but is still in progress. As a result, all other projects are also late.

Materials for the Ayers Street crossing have arrived or are arriving in Springfield, Missouri, where Burlington offices and dispatchers are located. They complex mechanisms will be assembled there and then shipped to Clarendon.

Mr. Ernie Wilson, Burlington Northern official, said, "The signal people tell me that they may start as soon as April, so it is reasonable to expect the project in April or May."

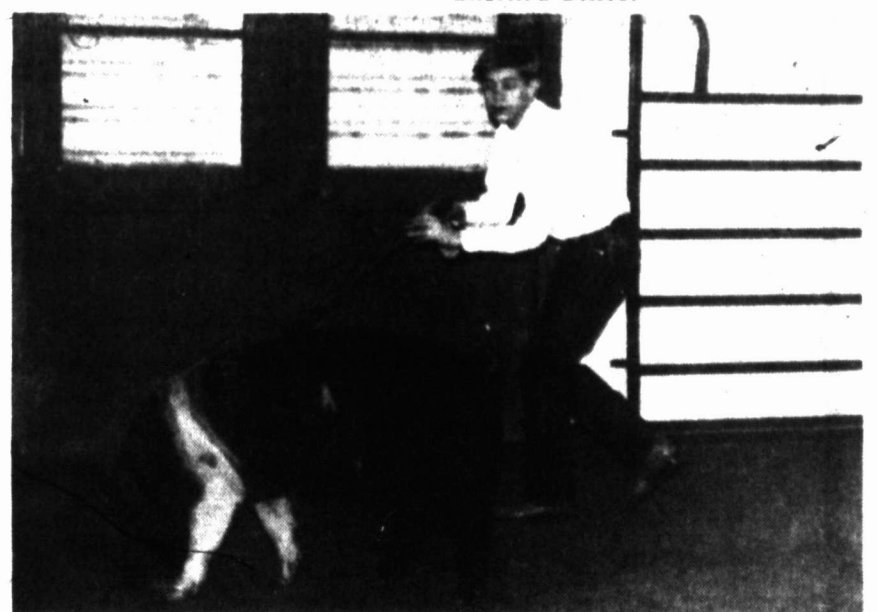

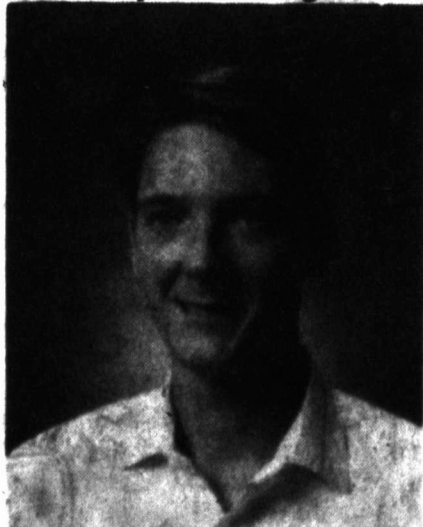
Prior to attending TSTC, he was a student at Amarillo College in Amarillo. He plans to graduate from TSTC in March.

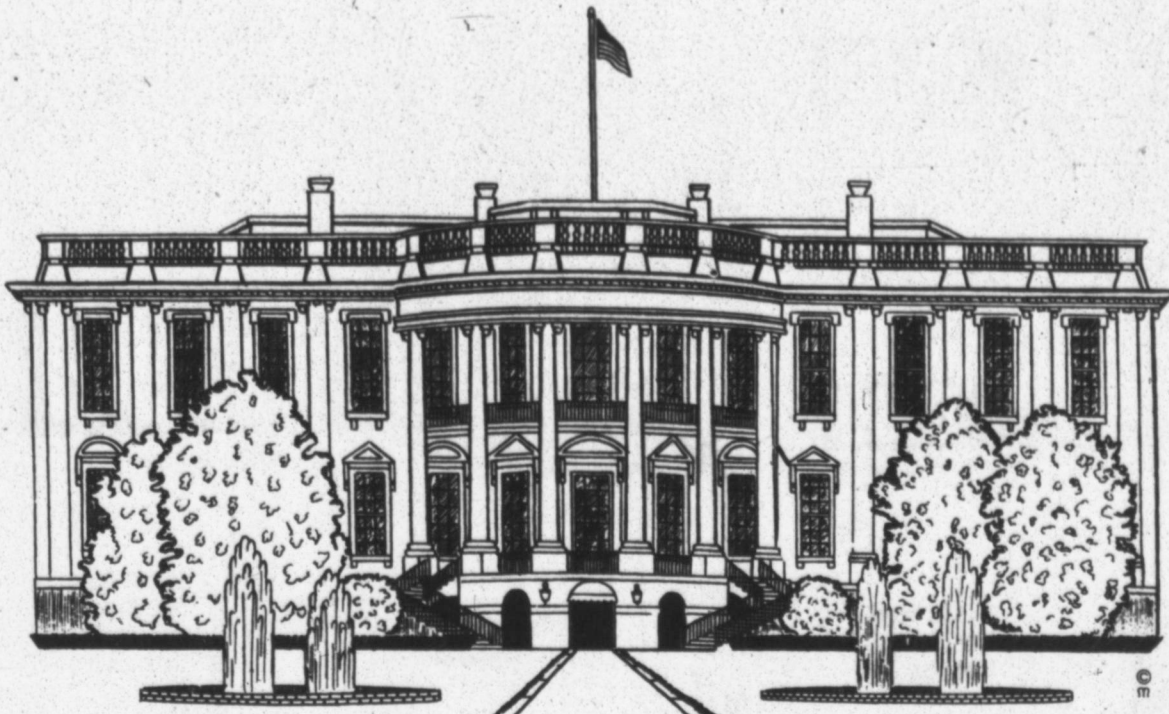

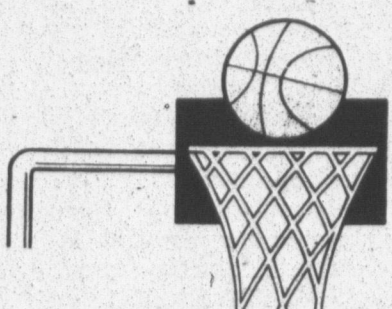

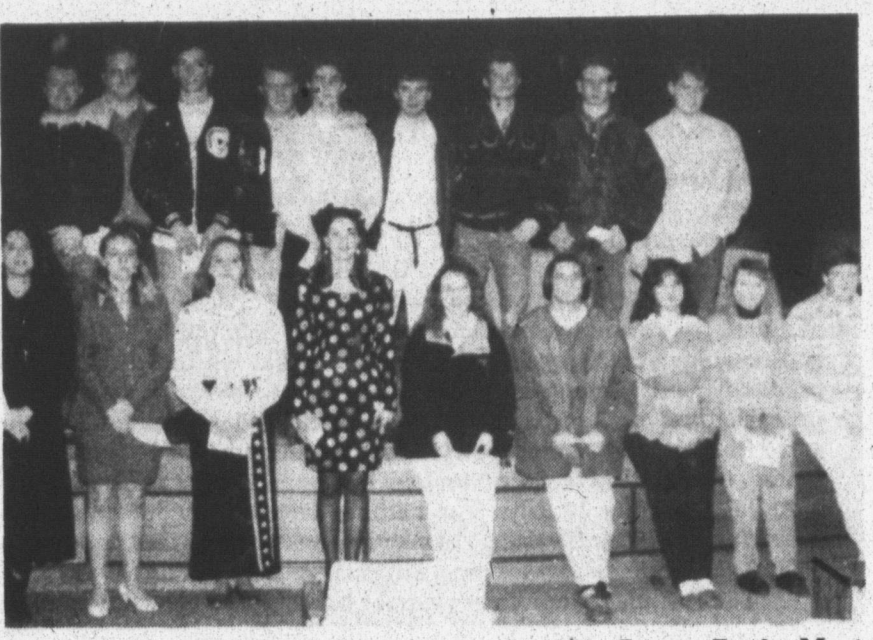
The Lady Broncos lost to Panhandle by a score of 68 to 22. Leading the scoring were Shields and Fletcher with four points each.

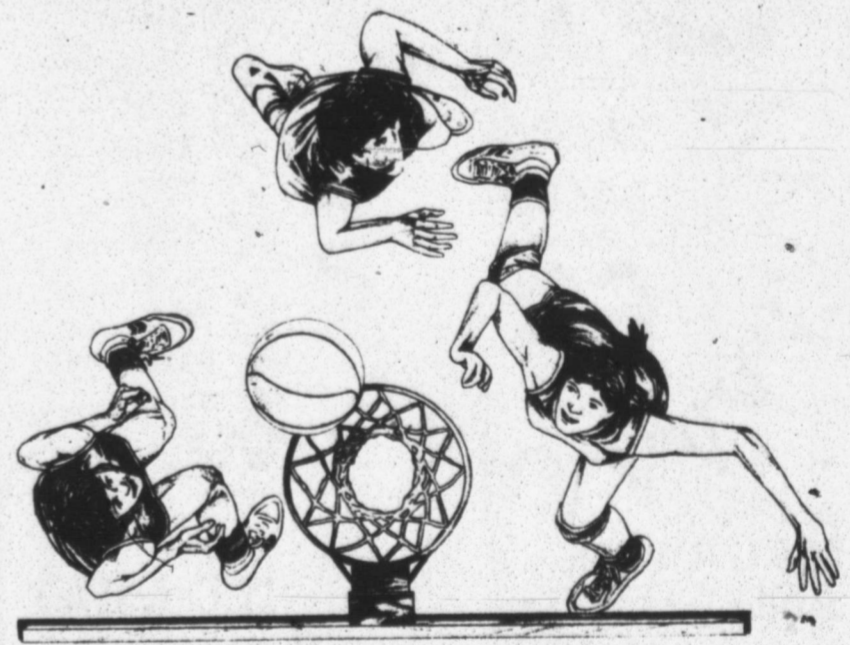

Minutes of the December 10, 1992 Regular Meeting, January 6, 1993 Special Meeting and January 6, 1993 Special Meeting were read. Motion by Wayne Hardin, seconded by Phil Fletcher to approve minutes. Passed 6-0.

The financial statement of December 1992 was approved by board action. Bills incurred by Clarendon Public School and the Business Office were presented. Motion by Johnny Floyd, seconded by Derlene Graham that bills be allowed and ordered paid. Passed 6-0.

Tom Jarboe, representing the Texas Association of School

Boards appeared before CIS board to explain the contract presented and answer any questions the board might have. [He] also explained confidentiality laws as they apply to TASB and the board. The fee and expenses of TASB were also explained to the board. Also expenses of all candidates were discussed. The contract, as presented, had been previously approved by the board in the January 6, 1993 meeting. Contract was signed January 14, 1993.

People to be invited to profile sessions: Business leaders, senior citizens, primary tax payers, PTA group, booster clubs, ex-school board members, staff (teachers), auxiliary staff, students, general public, ministerial alliance, college staff. Get their ideas concerning the type individual desired by the community as a whole as well as what the responsibilities of the superintendent should be. The board in no way relinquishes its responsibility for selection of Superintendent to any individual, group or to TASB for final decision on the individual selected. The final decision rests absolutely with the board of TASB.

[The board discussed] work on calendar for profile meetings with groups and individuals, date applications open and close, dates to screen applicants down to finals. Tentative calendar set.

Salary to be proffered to candidates was tentatively set at mid-

\$40,000 to mid-\$50,000 range dependent on experience and proficiency of candidate selected.

Motion by Phil Fletcher, seconded by Lynne Williams to accept bids as presented by Charles SoRelle for property repossessed. Copy of bids and property put up for sale by Donley County Appraisal District. Passed unanimously, 6-0.

Motion by Fred Clifford, seconded by Derlene Graham to table approval of Academic Excellence Indicator System for further review by members. To be re-introduced at next scheduled board meeting on January 21, 1993. Unanimously, 6-0.

Motion by Derlene Graham, seconded by Wayne Hardin to approve Textbook Committee as presented. Unanimously 6-0.

Motion by Lynne Williams, seconded by Johnny Floyd to accept cafeteria food and non-food item bids from: Ben E. Keith Foods, San Jacinto Foods, McLane Food Services and Affiliated Foods, Inc. on a line item bid, accepting the lowest bid from each. Passed unanimously, 6-0.

Mike Word discussed TAAS (Texas Assessment of Academic Skills) Test results of Grade 3 and Grade 7 on the testing done September 19, 1992. The scores were greatly improved over 1991 and were far better than state averages. Each year the test results show improvement at CISD, but improvement can still--and will be--made. Mr. Word recommended that any student who scores in the 35 percentile be required to go into Chapter One reading improvement program.

Mr. Word also discussed the results of our new computers and how they are working out. He is very pleased with how the students are taking to its programs.

Solomon Kepley discussed the TAAS results for the High School taken from Fall 1992--the State of Texas expect students to be achieving at the 90% level by 1996-1997. Among exit level (grade 11) Non-special Education Students scored for the '92 terms: Writing 100%, Reading 97% and Mathematics 73%. It is very encouraging that our school has already exceeded state recommended 1996 levels in two categories and exerting every effort to define the problems existing in math and alleviating the problems existing in math and alleviating the problem, perhaps by transferring strengths from the other two categories.

Also discussed holding UIL Contest, January 30, 1993. Also discussed marked increase in all levels of computer use.

Social Security Increase

As the result of annual cost of living increases, Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) beneficiaries received a 3 percent increase in their December 31, 1992 benefit checks," said Talbot, Social Security manager in Amarillo.

The average monthly benefit for individual Social Security retirees increased from \$634 to \$653. In a family where both spouses are beneficiaries, the monthly benefit increased from \$1,029 to \$1,106. Average disability benefits went up from \$608 to \$627 per month. The maximum monthly SSI benefit for one person increased from \$422 to \$434 and the rate for a couple went up from \$633 to \$653.

Other changes effective January 1, 1993 are based on "automatic adjustment" provisions in the law and are tied to the increase in average wages.

Although the Social Security and Medicare tax rate does not go up in 1993, the "wage base", the maximum amount of earnings taxed for Social Security and Medicare tax rate remained at 7.65 percent for employees and employers and 15.3 percent for the self-employed.

The Medicare "wage base" increased to \$135,000 from \$130,200. People who make more than the Social Security wage base of

\$57,600 will pay the Medicare portion of the Social Security tax on earnings up to the new Medicare wage base. (The Medicare portion of the Social Security tax is 1.45 percent for employees, 2.9 percent for self-employed)

In 1992, the amount of wages needed to earn one Social Security "credit" was \$570. In 1993, it is \$590. Since the maximum number of credits that may be earned each year is 4, anyone earning more than \$2,360 in 1993 will receive 4 "credits" for the year.

(To be eligible for Social Security benefits, a worker needs a specific number of credits. The number depends on the worker's date of birth and type of benefit involved. Most people need 40 credits to be eligible for retirement benefits, but some younger people qualify for disability and survivors benefits with as few as 6 credits.)

The maximum amount of money that beneficiaries between the ages of 65 and 69 can earn in 1993 without reducing the amount of their Social Security benefits is \$10,560. In 1992, the limit was \$10,200. For every \$3 a person earns over the new limit, \$1 is withheld from his or her benefit.

For individuals under age 65, the corresponding limits will be \$7,680 in 1993, up from last year's level of \$7,440. For every \$2 a person under age 65 earns over this limit, \$1 will be withheld from benefits. (The earnings limits do not apply to people aged 70 or older who continue to earn wages.)

Eastern Redcedar

The Eastern Redcedar is a juniper rather than a true cedar. It is a hardy plant and is adapted to a wide range of soil and moisture conditions. Male and female flowers appear on separate trees and bloom in February or March. The fruit is a berry about 1/4 inch in diameter, born only on the female plants. This tree is able to withstand extremes in temperature and moisture. Because of its dense, compact foliage and branching near the ground, Eastern redcedar makes an excellent wind barrier. Another added value of this tree is that it is especially well liked by quail, pheasant and turkey as well as numerous songbirds.

Fun Facts and Information

- Did you know that over a 50 year lifetime, a tree will provide \$62,000 of air pollution control, generate \$31,250 worth of oxygen, control \$31,250 worth of soil erosion, recycle \$37,000 worth of water. (Published by Michigan State University).

By providing shade and evaporative cooling, trees affected local temperatures. Clusters of urban trees can cool ambient temperature by 10 degrees Fahrenheit, reducing local energy demand (for air conditioning) by 10 to 50%. The energy saved reduces global warming by about 15 times the amount of CO absorbed by those trees.

The average American uses the equivalent of 7 trees every year. That's over 1-1/2 billion trees used annually in the United States.

Trees, humans, and animal life are dependent on each other. We require oxygen and produce carbon dioxide (CO₂); trees and other plants require CO₂ and produce oxygen.

Planting trees has a cumulative effect; each tree you plant will provide benefits for years to come. For example: if only 100,000 people plant a tree this year, the trees will still be absorbing over a million pounds of CO₂ annually in the year 2010. But if the same people plant a tree every year from now until 2010, the trees will absorb over 20 million pounds of CO₂ in that year.

It is estimated that each mature tree consumes, on average, about 13 pounds of CO₂ per year.

Don't just stick a tree in the ground and ignore it. Like other growing plants, trees need a little care for the first two years; including water, vertical support, and mulch.

If we all recycled our Sunday papers, we could save over 500,000 trees every week.

Veterans receive job training through state program

I am a veteran of Desert Storm. Due to recent cuts in defense spending, I was discharged from the military and am having a hard time finding a job. Where can veterans find assistance with job placement?

Many veterans are facing tough times as military bases begin to close and the job market becomes increasingly saturated with recently discharged veterans. If you are within 48 months of your date of separation, disabled or are a veteran of the Vietnam Era or Persian Gulf War, you are eligible for job training and placement through the Veterans Employment and Training Program.

The Veterans Employment and Training Program (JTPA Title IVC) was created through the Job Training Partnership Act to increase the long-term employment and earned incomes of participating veterans. The Texas Department of Commerce and the Texas Employment Commission match funds dollar for dollar and join forces with community based organizations for veterans to maximize the delivery of the program.

The program provides veterans with on-the-job training, vocational training, job placement, job counsel-

ing and support services. The program emphasizes service to those veterans who are unskilled or have military skills that are not transferrable to the civilian job market.

To benefit from the Veterans Employment and Training Program, veterans need only contact their local veterans program office. Local offices are located in Houston, Dallas, San Antonio, Austin, Fort Worth, Corpus Christi, El Paso, Longview and Tyler.

The Texas Department of Commerce contracts with two community based organizations, American GI Forum and the National Association of Developing Colleges, to design a training program best suited for the veteran. Once training is complete, the sub-contractor helps the veteran find a job and settle into the new role, making sure the vet is confident in his or her ability to meet the new job requirements.

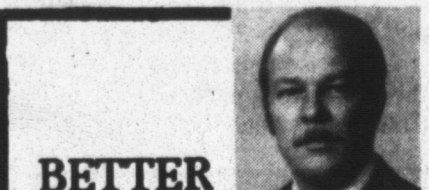


