Voters To Get Replacement Registration Cards

Donley County voters will be getting new registration cards in their mail boxes in the next few days. The new salmon and white cards will replace the current white cards, which expire December 31. The new two-year voter certificates will be valid from Jan. 1, 1990 to Dec. 31, 1991.

All registered voters should be receiving their new cards after Nov. 20. Any voters who have changes of name, residence address or mailing address should give written notice by mail or in person to the voter registrar as soon as possible.

The voter certificates cannot be forwarded and will be returned to the registrar's office in cases of incorrect names or addresses. Also check the date of birth to be sure it is correct.

If you do not receive your new cards by December 1, 1989, please call or come by the voter registrar's office.

Sheriff Reports on October

Donley County Sheriff Jimmy Thompson reports that October was a relatively quiet month. There were 26 arrests, but fortunately there were no serious accidents.

Emergency personnel responded to 33 ambulance calls and seven fire calls. There were 28 traffic tickets issued in the County.

Even in a routine month, though, things remain busy at the jail/sheriff's office. Prisoners spent a total of 210 inmate days in the hoosegow, which meant that the staff had to serve 630 meals.

Outside the jail, deputies served 23 papers and sent two criminals to the penitentiary.

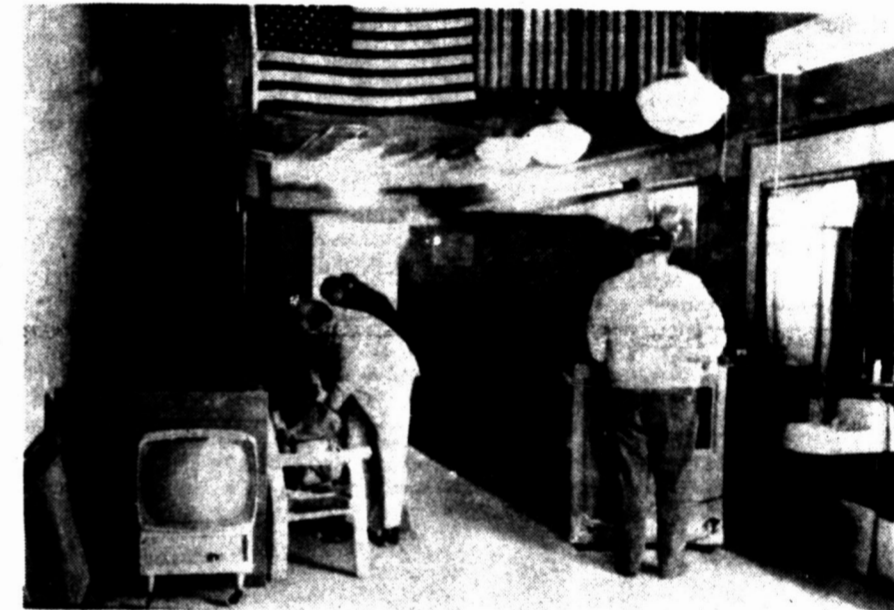
PTA to Serve Stew

(AUSTIN)--Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower has said that Texas farmers will earn only 2.8 cents this year for producing a single serving of Thanksgiving dinner that includes turkey, stuffing, rice, corn, salad, milk and dessert.

"We all eat too much at Thanksgiving, but it's the giant food processors, commodity brokers and shippers who are really getting fat," Hightower said, noting that food industry profits continue to increase while the farmer's share of the consumer food dollar continues to decline.

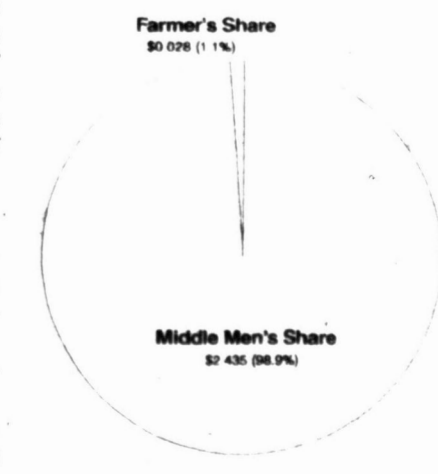
According to the annual survey conducted by the Texas Department of Agriculture, the ingredients for a 10-item Thanksgiving dinner will cost Texas consumers an average of \$2.46 per serving, or 12 cents more per serving than it did last year.

Texas producers will actually lose 3.7 cents for providing an eight-ounce serving of turkey and the ingredients that go into a two-ounce slice of pecan pie. On only three of the menu items--stuffing, grapefruit and a glass of milk--will Texas producers earn more than a penny per serving. Texas farmers will receive only a fraction of a penny for providing each of the remaining five

higher prices to consumers.

"For the past 20 years, U.S. farm policy has been written by the lobbyists for the giant food processors, shippers and commodity brokers. These policies have resulted in: the wholesale exploitation of family farmers by holding commodity prices artificially low for the benefit of multinational traders and processors, forcing 650,000 good producers out of business in this decade; a dangerous depletion of America's soil and water resources.

Lyme Disease: A Treatable Condition

Lyme disease is an infection that is caused by a spiral shaped bacterium called a "spirochete" which is transmitted to humans by a tick that lives on the white-tailed deer. This condition was first studied in the area of Lyme, Connecticut - hence the name *Lyme Disease*.

Adult ticks receive blood, which is necessary for survival, from deer and other hosts. In the fall, after mating, the female tick falls from the deer to the ground and deposits her eggs. The following summer newly hatched ticks emerge. As these ticks mature they feed on humans, deer, or mice. People may come in contact with deer ticks as they hike or camp in wooded areas.

Although deer tick bites are painless, they can cause a red "bull's-eye" rash, stiff neck, and aches in the joints and muscles. Weeks later, shaking, joint pain, and thinning of the skin may occur. Months later, arthritis-type symptoms may occur.

According to a recent article in the journal, *Postgraduate Medicine*, tick repellants containing *permethrin* will kill ticks on contact. If Lyme Disease is contracted, treatment with antibiotics has been shown to be effective in eradicating the disease.

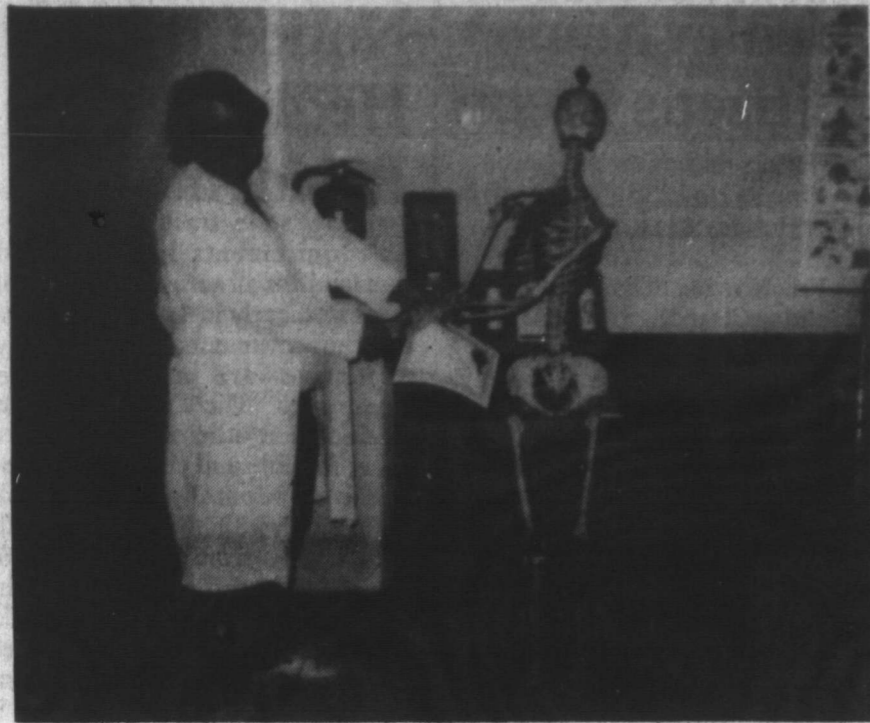

Fire Safety Message

With a high fuel load and extremely dry conditions, Donley County residents are advised to use extreme caution and practice fire safety at all time but more now than ever. On days with low humidity and any wind at all, the potential for disaster is great. A good example is the recent fire in Howardwick where two structures and several cars were completely destroyed and several occupied homes were in danger due to a rapidly spreading grass fire started by a homeowner burning trash in a barrel. Only relatively light winds kept this fire from becoming a major disaster and all available units from Clarendon and Howardwick were committed to the fire.

This stresses another point, there is no such thing as a "controlled burn". Any fire can get out of control and become dangerous in a matter of seconds due to a wind shift or such. Clarendon residents are reminded that burning is illegal and that it is extremely dangerous particularly now. A newly enacted law makes it a felony for arson if any property not belonging to the owner is damaged or destroyed by an intentionally set fire. This includes grassland, etc. not just homes and businesses has been the case before. In addition to being prosecuted for arson, a property owner could be held liable for damages to the property of others.

If a property owner does decide to burn and fails to notify the sheriff's department dispatcher, the fire gets called in not as an intentional burn but as a spontaneous fire and the county fire departments get called out to fight it. Consider this, in most instances, the person who starts a fire that results in the injury or death of a firefighter can be held liable for that injury or if death of a firefighter can be held liable for that injury or if death occurs, can be charged with capital murder. This includes injuries and deaths occurring while responding to or from the station and to or from the fire. This would be a charge in addition to the charge for arson. According to the National Fire Protection Association, in 1988, 129 firefighters were killed in the line of duty. Of that number, 28.7% occurred while responding to or from a fire call when fire apparatus were involved in accidents. Clarendon has ten fire units and 41 members and most of the time at least five or more units and an average of 20 to 30 firefighters respond to every call. There is a good chance for an accident any time you have this many people responding. Anytime units are called out to an intentional burn or on a false alarm, particularly to a distant location in the county there is always a chance that a fire could arise on the other end of the county and cause a great delay in getting apparatus and manpower to the legitimate fire scene. Also, every response costs you the taxpayers money and causes wear and tear on fire equipment.

There have been several fires recently which were set intentionally. The City of Clarendon has a reward available for information which leads to the arrest and conviction of any person for arson. If you have any information on an arsonist's activities, you should contact the Donley County

Man Convicted Of Murder

Testimony began Monday, November 13th in the 100th Judicial District Court Room, in the Donley County Court House, Judge John Forbes presiding, in the murder trial of Freddie Dehois of Wichita Falls, Texas.

Mr. Dehois was charged with the murder of Rueben Torres, of Memphis, on Dec. 18, 1988. Mr. Torres was attending the wedding of friends when he was shot three times in the side, and once in the back. Mr. Torres died in route to the Amarillo Emergency Center. The affray was reported to be over the defendants undesirable attentions to one of the female guests.

Mr. Dehois was the driver of the band. His brother was a member of the band and had asked him to drive the group from Wichita Falls to Clarendon.

A signed confession by the defendant to the murder was taken by the District Attorneys special investigator Doug Wright, on Dec. 20, 1988, at which time bond was set and the defendant was released from custody.

Mr. Dehois's attorney tried to get his confession thrown out on Monday, but Judge Forbes after hearing the evidence ruled that it could be entered.

District Attorney, David McCoy presented the evidence for the state, Tuesday November 14.

The Attorney for the defense, Randall Walker, presented the evidence for the defense beginning at 1:00 p.m., Wednesday. After presenting the evidence and resting the defenses case, a 12 man jury was charged by Judge Forbes and retired to the jury room.

The 12 man jury, from Donley County, brought in their verdict at 9:40 p.m. They found the defendant, Freddie Dehois, guilty of murder. At this time, Judge Forbes read the punishment phase to the jury and they retired back in the jury room to set the punishment. At 11:00 p.m. the jury came back in the courtroom with their verdict.

Judge Forbes read the punishment to the court. Mr. Dehois was sentenced to 12 years in the Department of Correctional Facilities. He was taken into custody by the Donley County Sheriff's officers and placed in jail, awaiting transfer to prison.

Anger

Sometimes it is hard to concentrate when the TV is on in the other room. The script for every program seems to be angry people screaming at each other.

There is a murder trial in progress in town. A man got mad at another and killed him. Anger led to murder.

The Bible says a great deal about anger. No where does it make excuses for it.

In Galatians 5:19-20 there is a list of sins that God finds intolerable. And anger is listed along with idolatry, drunkenness, and similar sins.

The apostle Paul specifically says that anger has no place in the lives of a Christian: "Get rid of all bitterness, rage and anger," Ephesians 4:31. He repeats the same message in Colossians 3:5-8, "...you must rid yourself of all such things as these: anger, rage, malice, slander ...".

James describes how Christians should act in James 1:19-20 "...everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry, for man's anger does not bring about the righteous life that God desires."

Indeed, man's anger provides Satan with a tremendous opportunity for destructiveness. Ephesians 4:26 reads "Do not let the sun go down while you are still angry, and do not give the devil a foothold."

And anger certainly interferes with maintaining a Christ-like attitude, which is why Paul gave specific instructions to young Timothy "I want men everywhere to lift up holy hands in prayer without anger or disputing."

Anger, rage and screaming may be staples for depraved screen writers. They are not acceptable behavior for a disciple. In fact, Christians should not even associate with those who are contentious, (Titus 3:10-11), for anger is too contagious.

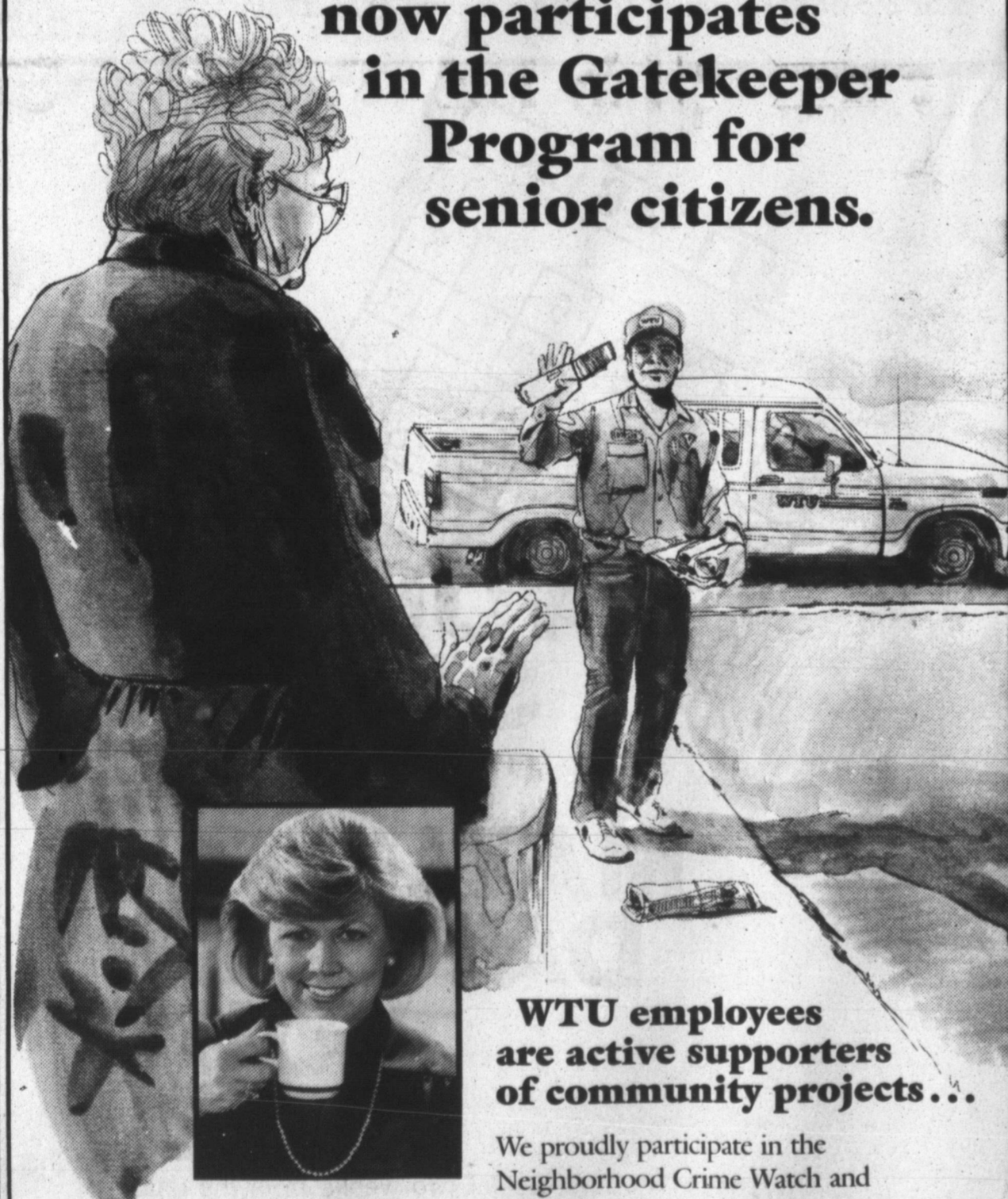

MINUTES

NOVEMBER 14, 1989

Mr. Earl Cobb of Southwest Equipment Company gave the Board prices on trash trucks. Motion was made and seconded to accept the proposal for lease of a 25

yard International truck with sanitizing equipment. Motion carried.

Motion was made and seconded to order an audit for the 1988-89 fiscal year. Motion carried. Gordon Maddox will be contacted to perform the audit.

Motion was made and seconded to approve the Receipts and Disbursements of the Clarendon Fire Department for the month of October 1989. Motion carried.

Bills for the month of October 1989 were presented, and upon a motion by Alderman David Davidson, seconded by Alderman Bobbie Kidd, to approve said minutes. Motion carried.

There being no further City business at this time, motion was made by Alderman Bobbie Kidd, seconded by Alderman Paul Bivens, to adjourn. Motion carried.

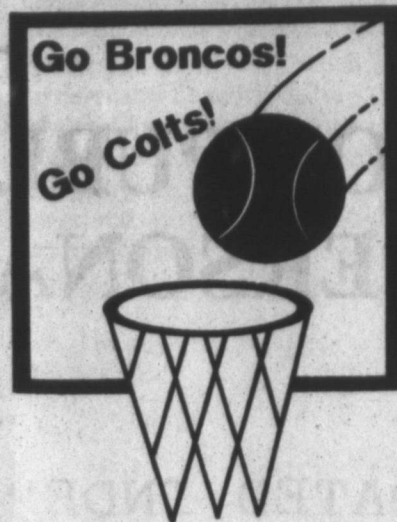

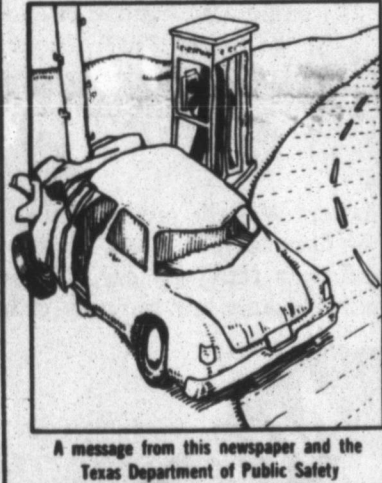

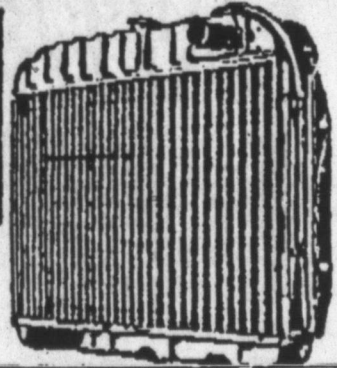
