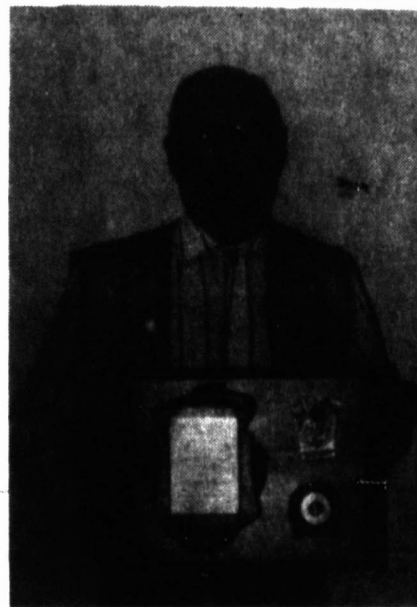
Fross Arrives For Duty

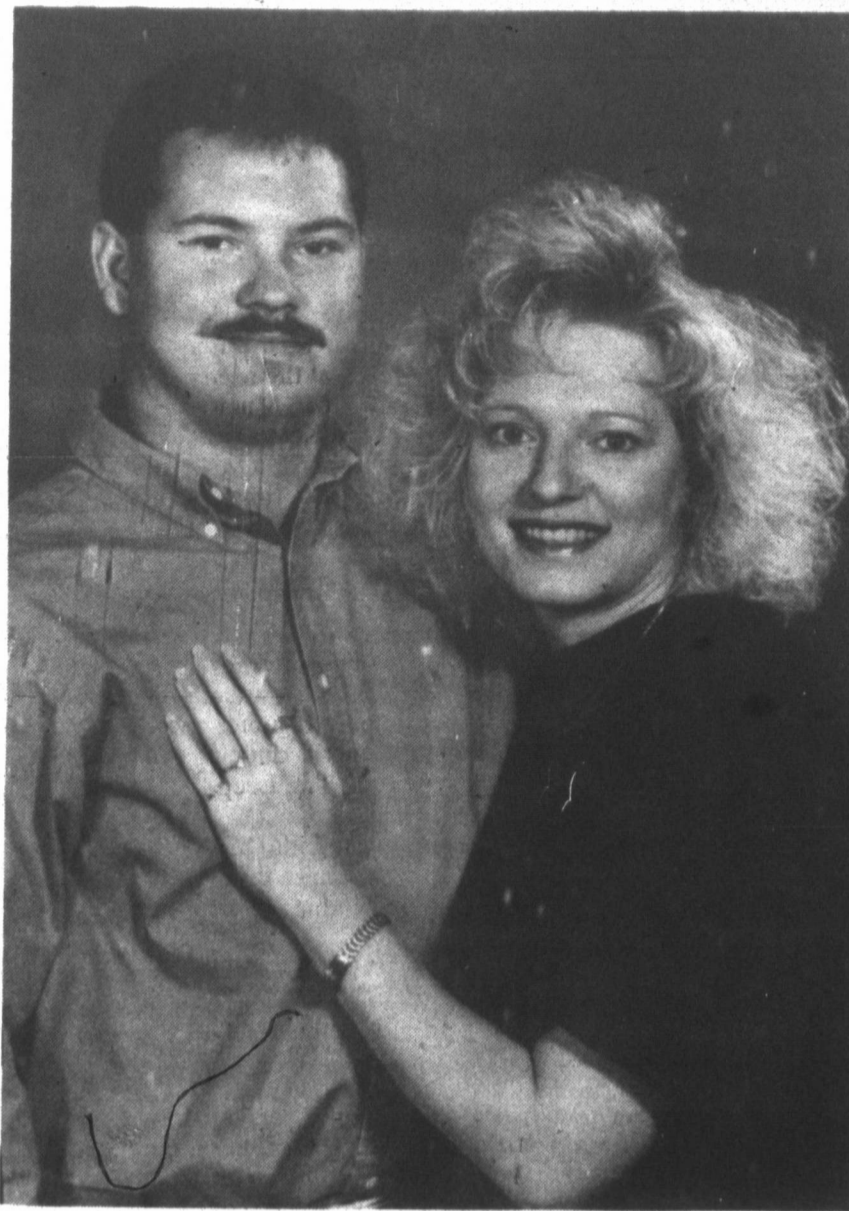

Simpson and Collins Win

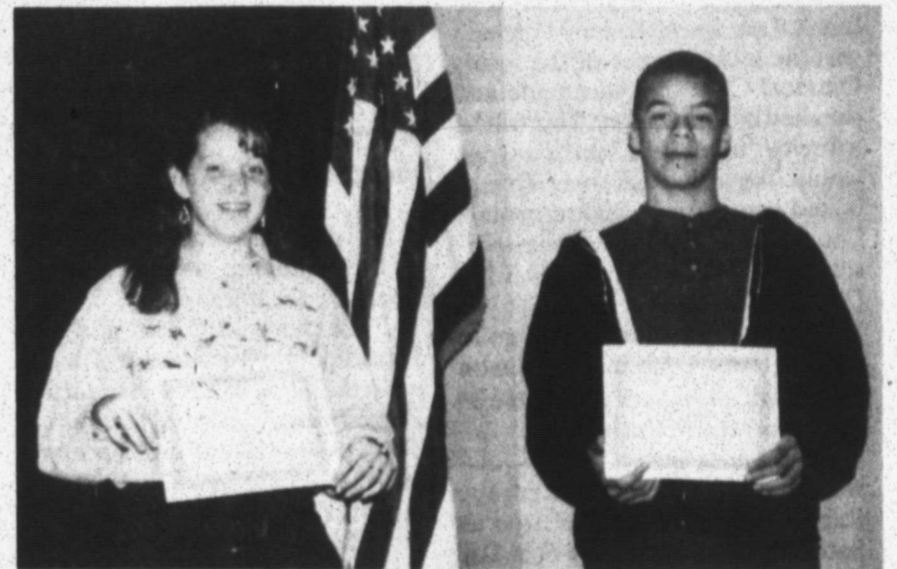

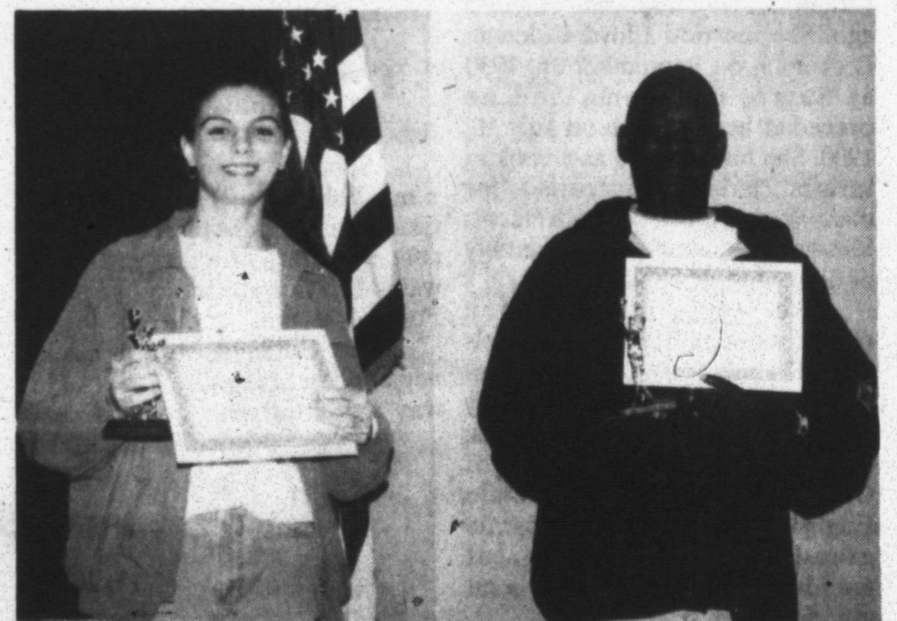

U.S. DOE Insulation Recommendations Can Help Lower Energy Costs And Protect The Environment

Heating And Cooling Account For Up To 70% Of Home Energy Use

With the rapidly rising cost of energy, and the expectation that it will continue to climb during this decade, homeowners are more than ever looking for ways to reduce their utility bills.

According to the U.S. Department of Energy, 50% to 70% of the energy used in the average American home is for heating and cooling. Another 20% is for heating water. Everything else combined accounts for just 10% to 30% of utility bills.

So though it's important to turn off lights and appliances when not needed, the way to substantially reduce energy costs is to decrease the amount of energy used for heating and cooling.

The DOE states that most of the existing houses in the U.S. are not insulated to optimal, recommended levels, and that adding insulation may save enough money in reduced utility bills to pay for itself within a few years, and then continue to save the homeowner money as long as he or she lives in the home.

DOE Recommends Insulation R-Values

To guide owners of existing homes, and builders of new ones, the DOE has published updated R-value recommendations.

R-value is the measure of thermal resistance by which insulation is specified. "R" means resistance to heat flow. The higher the R-value, the greater the insulating power.

The DOE recommendations divide the country into eight insulation zones, with specific R-value guidelines for ceilings, floors and exterior and crawlspace walls.

Manville pocket guide shows DOE map, explains R-values.

Homeowners can verify the precise recommendations for their specific area with their building materials dealer, insulation contractor, public utility or state energy office.

The DOE points out that insulation not only saves money, but also helps reduce the rate of depletion of our nation's limited energy resources. In addition, it can make a home more comfortable by maintaining a uniform temperature throughout the house.

Walls, ceilings and floors will be warmer in the winter and cooler in the summer. Fewer drafts mean the house will remain comfortable at lower thermostat settings.

Insulation also acts as a sound absorber, keeping noise levels down.

Insulation Can Offer Additional Benefits

Some states offer a tax credit for money spent on measures to reduce home energy use, including added insulation, weatherstripping and caulking, says the DOE.

In fact, many states are presently considering endorsing the 1989 "Model Energy Code," which has even stronger R-value recommendations than those of the DOE.

State energy offices can be a valuable resource for information, while local utility companies also often pro-

vide technical advice. Some even offer rebates or financing assistance.

A home energy audit will identify the amount of insulation already in place, any additional amount needed, and can recommend other improvements such as storm windows.

Insulation Priorities

The DOE considers the following to be the key insulation priorities: Insulate the attic to the recommended level, including the attic door, or hatch cover.

Insulate under floors above unheated spaces, and around walls in the

basement, crawl spaces and foundation, and on the edges of slabs on grade.

Consider exceeding recommended levels of insulation for exterior walls of existing houses, particularly when remodeling or re-siding, or for new houses.

R-Value Map Available

The recommended R-value map and chart are also available in color in the "Homeowner's Insulation Guide," published by Manville Building Insulation, the makers of Manville brand fiber glass insulation.

This 16-page, illustrated pocket-size guide covers everything from how to determine if you need more insulation to how to install it.



Boss Lion Cherry thanked them for an interesting meeting and adjourned with this thought for the evening.

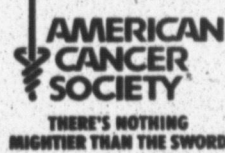

Social Security News

Where you live may affect your SSI Payments

One of the most frequent questions I get comes from Supplemental Security Income (SSI) beneficiaries who are confused by the effect that their living arrangements, where they live and with whom they live has on their SSI Payments. It can be complicated, but there are several simple rules to keep in mind when you consider how your living arrangements affect your SSI.

As a general rule, if you get SSI and receive help in paying for food and shelter, your SSI payment may be reduced. This is because eligibility for SSI and the amount of your payment is based on the income and resources you have. If someone else is helping to pay for your food or shelter, the value of their contribution must be considered as part of your income.

We also look at such things as whether you are living in your own home or the home of someone else, paying rent in the home of someone else, or living in an institution.

If you are living in your own home, regardless of whether you (or your spouse) own or rent, you'll generally qualify for the highest SSI payment rate. You may also qualify for this rate if you are living in the home of someone else but pay rent and buy your own food.

A child living with his or her parents also may get an SSI payment up to the maximum rate. However, the parent's income and resources and the number of children in the home are considered in determining SSI eligibility and the payment amount for a child.

The instances in which your living arrangements may reduce your payment amount included in the following:

*If you are living in the home of someone else and are not paying your share of the household expenses, Your federal SSI payment is generally reduced by as much as one-third.

*If you are living in a public institution where your lodging is provided at Taxpayer's expense (such as a State mental hospital and prisons), you're probably not eligible for SSI.

A homeless person generally may receive the maximum SSI payment rate. That is why we make special efforts to get SSI information to the homeless, the payments can help them find permanent lodging. If you live in a public shelter, a special rule lets you receive SSI payments for up to 6 months out of any 9 months that you live there while you look for permanent housing.

Any changes in living arrangements must be reported to Social Security. To report a change, or for more information on how your living arrangements may affect your SSI payment, contact your local Social Security office or call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, business days between 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.
