If you have an item you would like to donate to the auction, they have room and time left to display it.

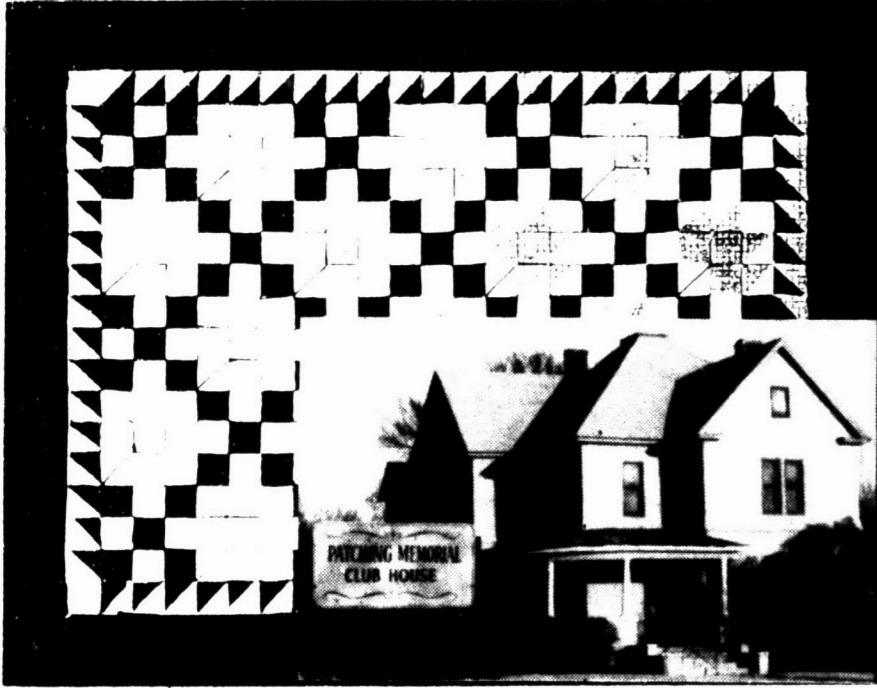
A Book sale will be held on June 8th. Many, many books are being offered at bargain prices. The hard back books will be \$1.00 and paper backs will be 50 cents.

PATCHING MEMORIAL CLUB HOUSE

Work Day Planned

A work day for "Patching Up The Patching Club House" has been scheduled to begin June 2nd, at 10 a.m.

Clarendon residents and especially the Federated Women's Clubs, have so many reasons for the Work Day. One of the primary goals is to get the place so spruced up that it will qualify for the Texas Historical Commission Medallion.

If we are able to meet the standards of the Commission, the grandson of Fred Patching who is Dr. Anthony Bass of Amarillo will purchase the marker as a gift to the heritage landmark and to the Women's Clubs of Clarendon.

The Patching Club House has a turn-of-the-century heritage which will be of interest to the people in Clarendon.

The land on which the Club house stands was owned by Charles Goodnight in 1891. As time progressed W.A. SoRelle and his wife Carrie Elizabeth purchased the land in 1906 and built the house that now stands there. Mrs. SoRelle's father S.B. Hoisington, who was a fine building contractor from Illinois came to Clarendon and built the house for the SoRelle family. They lived there only a short time and sold the house to Fred Patching Sr. Mr. Patching Sr. left the house to Fred Jr. and Eva Patching and in 1949 they sold the house, for \$10.00 to the City of Clarendon, "for the exclusive use and benefit of the Ladies Clubs of Clarendon."

Any organized woman's club may hold meetings in the clubhouse and the building is available for shower receptions, reunions, and etc. Currently four clubs, The Les Beaux Art Club, The 1926 Book Club, The Pathfinders, and Xi Lambda Xi Sorotiy feel privileged to have meetings and socials in the Clubhouse and along with permanent board members see to the care of the house and grounds.

Insurance Update

The State Board of Insurance has published an updated, revised edition of its report on complaint statistics of insurance companies doing business in Texas.

The April 1990 edition compares calendar year 1989 complaints with premium volume for 1988, the most recent year for which all financial data has been entered in the agency's computers.

All property-casualty and life-health insurance companies licensed to do business in Texas are listed in the report.

Complaints per \$100,000 in premium volume are listed for each company, and the publication includes a rank-order listing of companies with 12 or more complaints and \$1 million or more in premium volume.

What Happened To My Grass?

I'm sure by now many of you have figured out that something happened to your bermudagrass lawn this year. It just doesn't look very good, and has some bare spots in it where the grass looks dead. This may not be the case in every bermudagrass lawn, but there is a lot of yards in the county that do have that problem. What is the problem? Most of it is cold injury, which was probably caused by the extremely cold, dry weather we had in December, 1989.

I have had many phone calls at the Extension Office and visited with many folks that say the same thing about their yards. Their grass is not coming out, parts of the yard look dead or they have very thin stands. Bermudagrass seems to have received the most damage with other lawn grasses showing very little injury. Homeowners may also have noticed some injury to trees and shrubs that will become more apparent in months to come.

Common bermudagrass is a very good lawn grass for this area, tolerating heavy traffic, moderate salinity and close mowing, but it has very poor shade tolerance and is susceptible to winter kill where winter temperatures are below 10 degrees. We did have a few days of 10-12 degree F temperatures this past December.

Some home owners have already tilled up their bermudagrass yards and replanted. If your yard still has some live bermuda grass in it, then chances are you can get your lawn back in shape with good care and maintenance. But it will take time and extra care, such as fertilization, weed control, and extra watering.

If you would like to take this opportunity to put in a new and different type of lawn, you might want to consider Buffalo grass, Tall Fescue, Kentucky Bluegrass or others. We are limited somewhat on types of lawns in this area because of the weather conditions in the Panhandle.

Crop Scouting Principles To Be Taught At Workshop

Training of scouts who survey crops to assess pest population densities in integrated pest management (IPM) programs across the area will be conducted in Plainview, June 1, at the Ollie Liner Agricultural Center, on South U. S. 87 (Business). The workshop is open to summer scouts of private crop consultants and aerial applicators as well as farmers who scout their own fields.

This year's workshop will provide instruction on scouting cotton and grains, identification of plant disease and nutrient deficiency symptoms, use of herbicides and safe handling or pesticides, said Dr. W. Pat Morrison, entomologist at Lubbock with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, which conducts the course. Training begins at 8:30 a.m. and ends at 4 p.m.

IPM is a coordinated approach to management decisions which are based on pest populations and economic thresholds to effectively control weeds, insects and diseases and maximize net profit, yet create minimal harm to the crop or environment.

Scouts examine fields in a systematic pattern at regular intervals each week. Producer treatments for pests are based on economic threat to the crop, presence of beneficial insects which are enemies of the pests and proper timing of pesticide use for maximum returns with the lowest chemical input.

Topics for the workshop, and the instructors, all of whom are Extension Service specialists or pest management agents, are:

Principles of IPM sampling, Dr. James Leser, Entomologist, Lubbock; Cotton Growth and Development, Dr. James R. Supak, Agronomist and Cotton Specialist, Lubbock; Thrips, Fleahoppers, and Aphids, Mark Brown, Crosby-Floyd Pest Management Agent, Crosbyton; Bollworms and Miscellaneous Cotton Pests, Leser; Major Diseases and Symptoms, Dr. Harold Kaufman, Plant Pathologist, Lubbock; Plant Nutrient Deficiency Symptoms, Dr. Michael Hickey, Soil Chemist, Lubbock; Herbicide Injury and Common Weeds, Kerry Siders, Castro-Lamb Pest Management Agent, Dimmitt; Beneficials, Craig Forbis, Dawson-Lynn Pest Management Agent, Lamesa; Corn and Sorghum Growth and Development, Dr. Brent Bean, Agronomist, Amarillo; Corn Pests, Greg Cronholm, Hale Pest Management Agent, Plainview; Sorghum Pests, Morrison; Sunflower and Soybeans, Mike Blanton, Bailey-Parmer Pest Management Agent, Farwell; Pesticide Safety, Morrison.

Additional information about the workshop is available at county offices of the Extension Service.

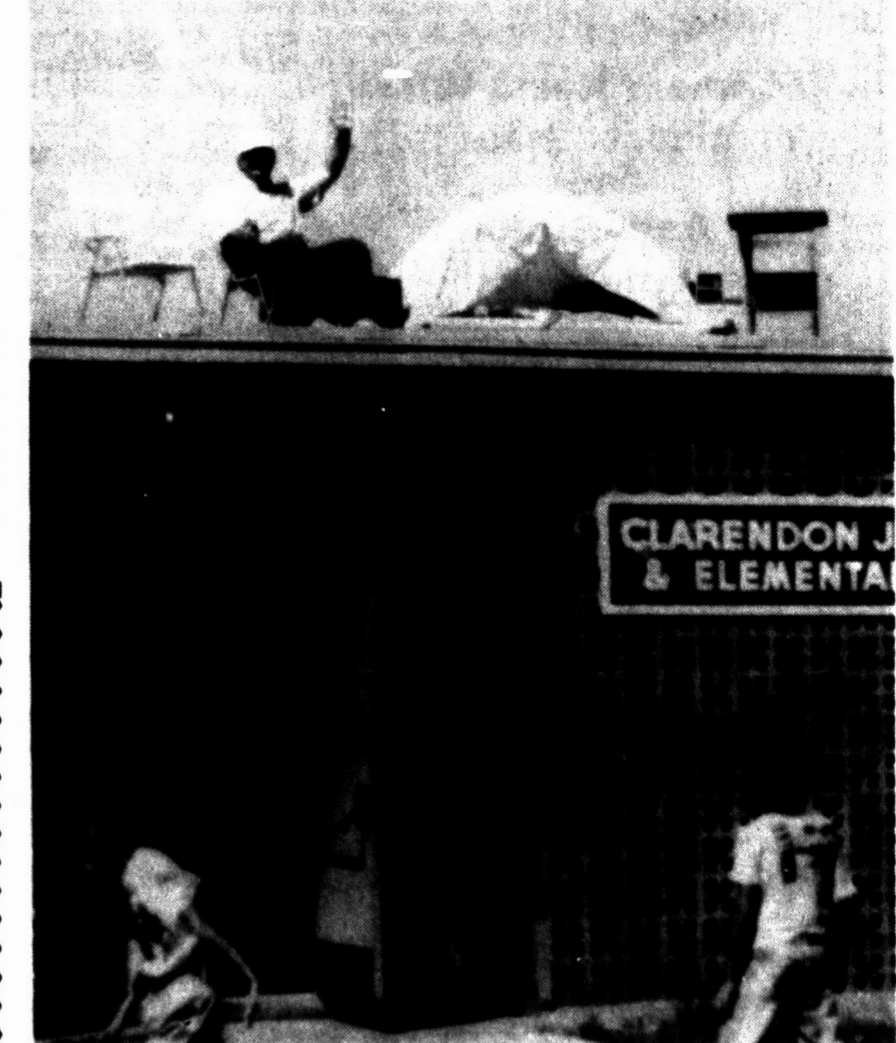

1. If you know or suspect that the Red River Pipeline is leaking or damaged, stay away from the site. Do not strike matches, start cars, smoke, or provide any source ignition in the area of the gas. Encourage others to stay away from the site. NOTIFY RED RIVER immediately at the telephone number listed above.
2. Gas leaks may be detected by observing blowing earth, bubbling water, sound of gas escaping, and by smell where gas is odorized.

Facts about Sweet Natural Gas

1. Sweet gas is colorless and odorless.
2. It is lighter than air and will rise and diffuse rapidly.
3. It is neither toxic nor poisonous, but can cause suffocation.
4. It will burn when mixed with air and ignited. Escaping gas can be ignited by open flames or sparks from electrical switches and motors, ignition systems, mechanical equipment and flying rocks striking substances which may cause sparks.
