Phone Scam Running Again

A shady office-supply firm is calling Donley County businesses again. The caller typically represents herself as a representative of the dealer or the manufacturer of an office machine. Sometimes the caller purports to be checking the address of merchandise already ordered. When the "order" arrives, the price is about twice what normal retail would be. A reputable office supply company in Amarillo reported that they were aware of the racket. "Last year a similar company paid a three million dollar fine, but made \$25 million profit."

Donley County businesses are urged to warn employees that the telephone solicitors word their message in such a way that employees would not normally realize that they are ordering new merchandise. Office managers can protect themselves from such scams by buying from legitimate area firms. If your business gets hooked by the fraudulent operators, contact the Sheriff. The con artists seem to prefer to operate out of Florida and California.

Texans Being Shortchanged

Austin, Texas -- State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Monday Texas is being shortchanged more than \$2.4 billion a year in federal funds. "Texas gets an 'F' for failure --not 'or fair share--on federal money," Bullock said. Bullock's comments came as he released the first of a series of five

planned reports on ways to increase federal assistance to Texans and to Texas state and local governments. "Some of the fault lies with federal laws and policies, but we're missing 80 percent of it just because Texas hasn't gone for it," Bullock said. Further, he said, Texas and Texans could get \$1.7 billion of the \$2.4 Billion "without the state raising an additional dime in matching money."

Bullock said that most of the federal money "is for human service programs--the kind of help Texans need most in these tight economic times." Bullock said that much of the federal money would not directly ease the strain on the states tax-supported budget, but it would go to the human, root causes of many of our problems in the vicious cycle of poverty, illiteracy, crime, hunger and homelessness. "Human tragedies end up as government burdens and economic losses, and the right federal help

Looking To The Future

There is a lot of attention given to day to economic growth in the State of Texas. In Austin, our legislators are working with state and local groups to develop a plan for economic growth, as we look to the economic future of our state. In towns and cities all over the state interested citizens, Chambers of Commerce, and governmental entities are looking for ways to spur growth in their communities. Rural communities are certainly no exception. We at the Medical Center

feel as though we have made a positive impact on Clarendon and Donley County. As of the present date, the Medical Center employs 64 persons on either a full-time or part-time basis. In fiscal year 1988-89 our payroll totaled \$458,000.00, and our projected payroll for fiscal year 1989-90 is \$472,000.00 we are glad that we can have this type of positive impact in our community. We also us local businesses in areas such as food purchases, plumbing and electrical repair, building and maintenance supplies, and drug and central supply items. With the hop of expansion, we can have a still greater impact on our community. First of all, additional personnel will be needed and at the present projections that would be an additional 12 to 15 persons. For those who require long term care we will have the ability to more adequately meet that need. And after all, that is the main purpose of our expansion plans. We are hopeful that local suppliers and contractors will be utilized during any new construction.

Projected income derived from an addition to the nursing home is hard to accurately calculate, but I do have some preliminary figures that I've been working with. The proposed addition will be 16 beds and based on the current average daily Medicaid rate were receiving, we could generate approximately \$250,000.00 to \$255,000.00 per year in additional revenue. One of the most important factors in considering the expansion is the response

we receive from the residents of Clarendon and Donley County. I have only talked with a few people as a result of the first two articles I've placed in the newspaper. It's critical that I know how the people in the community are thinking in regard to our expansion. It's the desire of the Board of Directors and myself to be a positive factor in the future growth and prosperity of our county.

Who's Next?

On October 31, 1988 a Burlington Northern train struck a car near the Community Center. Alta Shaller, the driver of the car, died a few hours later. As a result of that accident, the City of Clarendon, the State of Texas and the Burlington Northern Railroad began trying to get signals for the heavily traveled crossing.

The City--through the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation--applied for funding under the Federal Railroad Signal Program. They were soon notified that the project would not be funded in fiscal 1989.

The application for a signal on the railroad crossing on Ayers Street was re-submitted for the 1990 fiscal year. Federal authorities again refused to fund the project. They reported that the projects were selected on the basis of a complicated formula. Clarendon's crossing was rated at a priority index of 301. The cut off point was 321.

Federal authorities encouraged the Highway Department (acting for the city) to reapply for fiscal year 1991. They were quick to point out that changes in the number of trains or the number of automobiles could change the formula. Another death would certainly increase the chance for funding! In essence the bureaucrats are saying, "Get somebody else killed there and then we'll make the crossing safer."

Donley County citizens who feel that safety should come before tragedy should write to their elected representatives, both State and Federal.

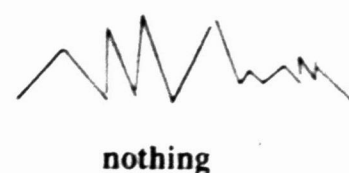

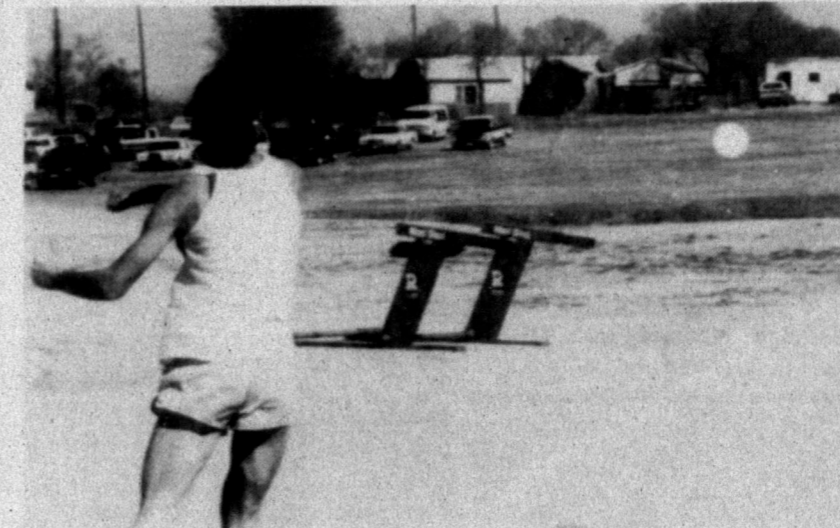

can stop that," Bullock said.

He said that future reports in the series will detail available programs, both those "that are there for the asking, and those that would require congressional or federal actions."

The series of reports is based on three years of research by the Comptroller's Economic Analysis Center and will be the most comprehensive report on federal funding ever issued by any agency in any state, Bullock said.

NOTICE OF TARIFF CHANGE TO CENTRANET® SERVICE

The names of the three CentraNet® packages have changed from Standard, Premium, and Deluxe to CentraNet® 1000, CentraNet® 2000, and CentraNet® 3000, respectively. Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet® packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet® 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to CentraNet® 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

The proposed rates are on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are available for public inspection at the offices of GTE Southwest Incorporated. Render Income-Producing Personal Property Now

Austin -- Jim Robinson, executive director of the State Property Tax Board (SPTB), today reminded business owners that they must file property rendition forms with local appraisal district offices by April 2, 1990.

The legal deadline for renditions is actually March 31, which falls on a Saturday this year. As a result, the 1990 deadline has been moved to the first working day after March 31. Property owners may receive a 30-day extension, but must file a written request with the appraisal district by April 2, 1990.

A rendition is a report a property owner files each year, listing taxable property he owns or manages as of January 1.

"The law requires certain property owners to file renditions every year," noted Robinson.

Anyone who owns or manages income-producing personal property on January 1 must file a rendition statement with the local appraisal district. Businesses, for instance, must report their inventories, furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment, and other tangible business property on a rendition. It is to their benefit to do so because chief appraisers use the rendition report to establish the property's fair taxable value," Robinson explained.

"When business personal property isn't rendered, the chief appraiser is forced to estimate the

value," he added.

The chief appraiser may also require other property owners or managers to render property; if so, the chief appraiser will send a notice and the appropriate rendition form.

While only business personal property must be rendered, anyone may voluntarily file a rendition with the appraisal district. Texas law does not require a property owner to render a home or other real property, but Robinson pointed out that homeowners who do render are in a better position to exercise their rights as taxpayers, for several reasons.

First, by filing a rendition, property owners ensure that the correct address will be on their value notices, notices of hearings which may be scheduled if they protest the appraisal of their property, and on their tax bills.

"It is essential that property owners receive this information in a timely manner," said Robinson. "For instance, if the tax collector cannot deliver a tax bill because of an incorrect address, the property owner is still responsible for paying the taxes plus penalties that result from late payment."

Second, rendition is an opportunity for a property owner to record an opinion of the property's value.

Third, by recording an opinion of the property's value, the property owner has ensured that the chief appraiser must send the owner notice before placing a higher value on the property. This notice allows the property owner time to gather information to protest the appraisal if the proposed value is too high.

If a property is appraised by more than one appraisal district, the property owner should file a rendition in each appraisal district.

Property owners whose homes were damaged last year by a storm,

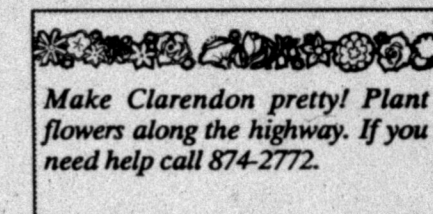
flood, or fire may also file a special type of rendition report with chief appraisers, called a report of decreased value. The deadline for filing this report for 1990 is April 2.

Rendition and report of decreased value forms are available at local appraisal district offices. The law requires that the property owner provide all information requested on the form. Noted Robinson, "It is a criminal violation to make false statements on renditions and reports of decreased value."

Self-Care With OTC Medicines

The sale of OTC (over-the-counter) medicines continues to increase along with the public's interest in self-care. Much of the emphasis on self-care seems to come from the increased cost to go to the hospital or to see a health professional.

Many conditions can be treated less expensively through self-care. In addition, many people like to take care of their own health problems. Much information is available to help in the care of the less serious health problems.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) is promoting self-care by switching a number of prescription-only medicines to OTC status. These are medicines that the FDA has deemed to be safe enough to be used routinely without the supervision of a physician.

Former prescription-only medicines which are now available to consumers as OTCs include antihistamines for colds and hay fever symptoms, low-dose steroid creams and ointments for skin irritations, two antihistamine sleep-aids, a topical medicine for athlete's foot, and an effective anti-diarrhea medicine. At least 12 prescription-only medicine ingredients are being mentioned as potential OTC candidates.

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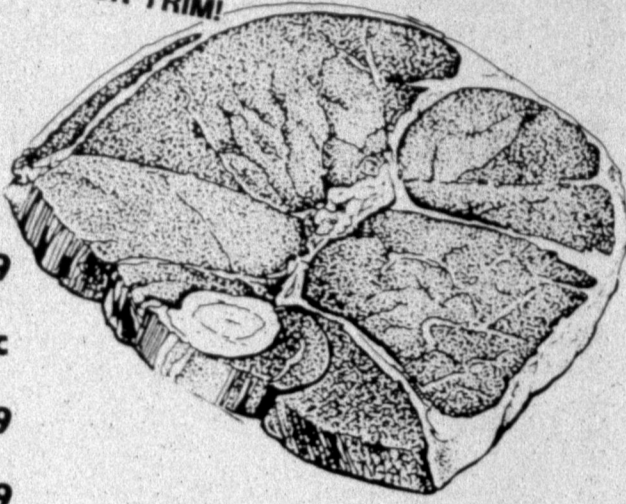

How Many Texans Does It Take To Answer The Census?

The answer is all of us. April 1, 1990 is the day for all Texas

residents to stand up and be counted. Texas needs a complete and accurate count of its population in the 1990 Census to get its fair share of political representation in Washington D.C., as well as federal dollars to which residents are entitled. If Texas is undercounted, it won't have the opportunity to get its fair share for ten years as the next Census will not occur until the year 2000.

The U.S. Census is taken at the beginning of each decade and provides national, state and city demographics which are used in numerous ways by government, the private sector and the general public. Information from census questionnaires is combined and reported only for geographic areas, and none of the data identifies any single individual. Answers provided by each household are confidential.

It is everyone's right to be counted, and the Constitution directs that every person in the nation be counted including non-citizens. In fact, the short version of the questionnaire, which will be sent to 5 out of 6 households, does not ask about citizenship status.

The Census Bureau estimates that it missed only one to two percent of the total population in the United States in 1980. Minorities were undercounted at a much higher rate, however; as much as six to eight percent of all Blacks and Hispanics may not have been included in the enumeration. If the same percentages hold true for 1990, Texas can expect an undercount of 500,000 to 600,000 persons, which amounts to about one congressional seat.

In addition, more than \$38 billion in annual federal grants to the state and local governments--in areas ranging from highway construction to the nutrition programs--are allocated using census data. The \$38 billion averages out to about \$150 per person per year. The 500,000 to 600,000 Texans who may not be counted could cost state and local government as much as \$90 million per year in potential funding, or \$900 million over the decade.

The key to improving the count in Texas is to convey the message that the census is truly confidential. All it takes to complete the questionnaire when it arrives in the mail on March 23 is a pencil and few minutes of time. Not responding to the Census hurts all Texans with fewer votes in Congress and less federal dollars for state and local services.

The mission of the Texas Department of Commerce is to encourage a climate that will stimulate business and other economic activities resulting in the retention and creation of jobs for Texas residents.

Commerce administers the Texas State Data Program, an ongoing cooperative state-federal effort to disseminate U.S. Census Bureau data throughout Texas.

Some were playing tennis, some basketball, some riding skateboards, and a few were just hanging out enjoying the sun.

The High School had to give the land to the city, for only the City of Clarendon could file for the necessary funds from the Parks and Wildlife Department. While the school contributed to the matching funds, the city did some site work so that the actual value is higher than the \$79,000 figure on the sign in front

of the courts.

The new courts are solid slabs of stressed concrete. They cannot crack and separate like the old courts did.

Because of the new facilities, the school will now host two tournaments per year. That will bring lots of students into town--and their money. That would not have been possible on the old, broken courts.

With the new courts in such heavy use, it is obvious that youngsters are practicing on their own. Maybe we will see a winning tennis team in the near future.

The project is still not finished, however. The two south courts will get an all-weather surface as soon as the weather allows. Coach Smith says the covering is a new acrylic product that will give a better surface for play.

The courts are not all that new, however. Just west of town Don Stone has done a tremendous job (as usual) renovating the sign that advertises Clarendon. It will soon have a companion on the other side of town. The Chamber has already made all the arrangements.

Has anyone ever mentioned how fortunate we are to have someone of Don's caliber in Clarendon? Well, maybe that should be another column ...

Extension Service Deals With Education

The mission of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is to develop research-based educational programs designed to meet the changing needs of the population. One method used in determining the needs of people in Donley County is a process known as Long Range Extension Program. In 1986, representatives worked the Extension staff to develop a Long Range Extension Program for Donley County. Study groups

identified critical issues affecting persons in Donley County. Since the time of the study group meeting and development of the 1987-1990 LREP, the Extension staff has been busy implementing programs aimed at dealing with these critical issues. One issue the group identified was lack of Nutrition Education, especially for teenagers, minorities and low income families. Study group members felt that a large portion of Extension clientele have difficulty determining what an adequate diet is, and how to provide this diet safely and economically.

Several programs have been especially effective in dealing with this issue. The 4-H Foods and Nutrition Project has reached over

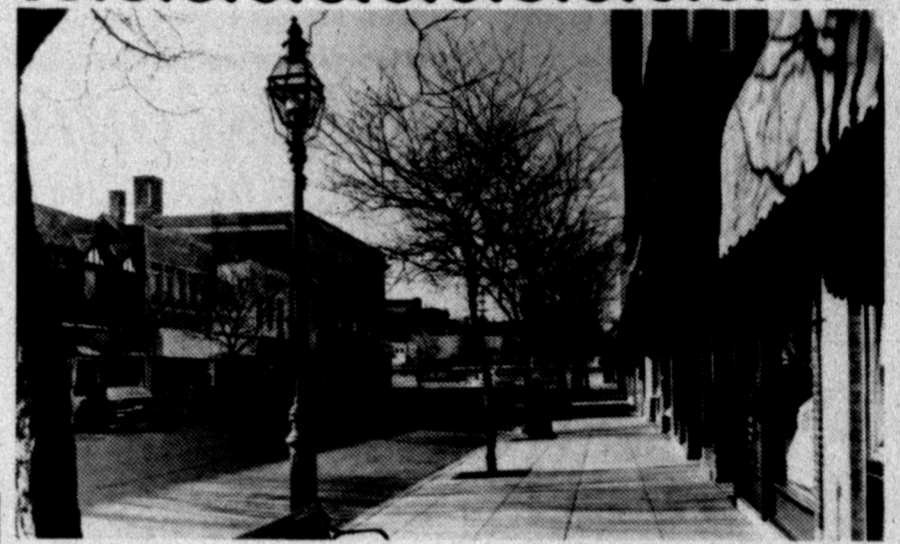

Please complete the listing of your taxable personal property and return the forms by the end of March. All personal property must be rendered each year even if there has been no change from the prior year. You should include cars, pickups, trucks, RV's, travel trailers, motorcycles, boats, and airplanes.

If you own a business, you should also render your business inventory held for resale and other business related equipment.

January 1 of each year is the assessment date in Texas; render only that property which you owned on January 1, but make your rendition before April 1.

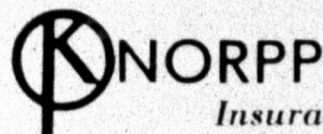

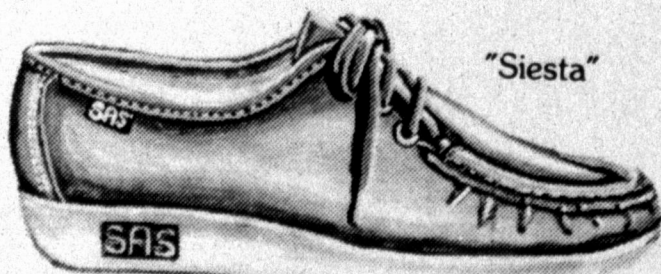

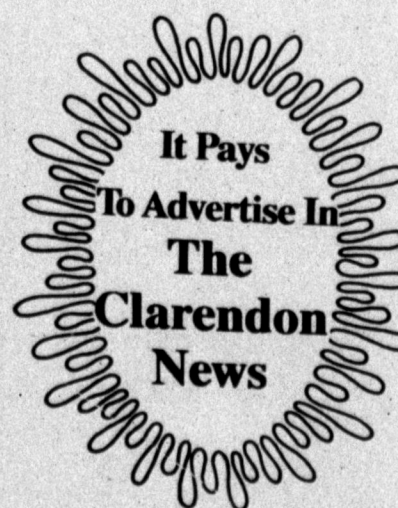

1990 Farm Program Signup

ASCS is accepting applications for the 1990 farm programs according to Drew Thornberry, County Executive Director of the Donley County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The U.S. Department of Agriculture is requiring acreage reductions of 5 percent for wheat and oats; 10 percent for corn, sor-

ghum and barley; and 12.5 percent for upland cotton.

Farmers who meet the acreage reduction requirements and comply with other program provisions will be eligible for price support loans and deficiency payments. "Producers may request 40 percent of the estimated total deficiency payments when they sign up for the 1990 program," Thornberry said. The payments will be issued in cash, and will be limited to the farmer's intended program acreage.

Wheat and feed grain producers may again choose to participate in the optional acreage diversion program known as 0/92, the same as in 1989, when they devote all or a portion of their permitted acreage. Upland cotton and rice producers may participate in a similar program where they devote up to 50 percent of their permitted acreage to conserving uses.

For additional details on these and other 1990 farms program provisions farmers may contact the Donley County ASCS office. The 1990 acreage reduction program signup ends April 13, 1990.

T.W. "Bo" Noble

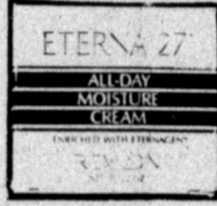

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Housing Authority of Clarendon, Texas (herein referred to as Housing Authority) currently owes to the City of Clarendon (herein referred to as the Government Entity) funds

known as Payments in Lieu of Taxes (herein referred to as PILOT) which have accrued through March 31, 1990, pursuant to Section 301 of Part II of the Consolidated Annual Contributions Contract executed between the Housing Authority and the United States of America; and

WHEREAS, the Government Entity and the Housing Authority have determined that it is in the best interests of both parties that the Government Entity waive the PILOT which have accrued through March 31, 1990, and

WHEREAS, the Government Entity and the Housing Authority mutually agree and understand that the funds made available by this waiver of the accrued PILOT will be used by the Housing Authority to defray operating expenses of the Housing Authority, concomitantly benefiting the citizens of the City of Clarendon and of the County of Donley.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY the City of Clarendon as follows:

(1) That the PILOT which have accrued through March 31, 1990, pursuant to Section 301 of Part II of the Consolidated Annual Contributions Contract executed between the Housing Authority and the United States of America are hereby waived;

(2) That the Mayor of Clarendon is hereby authorized and directed to execute a Letter of Waiver in accordance with the provisions of this Resolution.

one hundred and fifty youths since 1986. This project enables participants to make food choices that result in adequate nutrition and improved health status.

Over eight hundred county residents received nutrition information in Commodity Nutrition Day Programs, held in conjunction with commodity distribution. Many recipients requested information additional to that provided.

In 1988, one hundred and thirty-three took advantage of the Donley County Health Fair. Participants saved over \$1,700.00 through free screening and information gained.

An ongoing program since 1987 has been Senior Citizens Lunch and Learn Nutrition Program. Clients are using information gained in these monthly sessions to increase awareness of person at risk factors and their relationship to disease and disability.

County Extension Agents have presented programs to Extension Homemaker Clubs and numerous civic groups in the county on various nutrition topics.

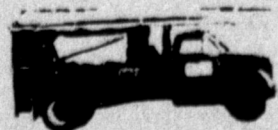
