## **NEGRO IS GIVEN DEATH PENALTY** ON CHARGE OF CRIMINAL ASSAULT

Nine days after his alleged brutal attack upon a Clarendon white woman, Morris Norman, 20year-old Chicago negro was on his way to death in the electric chair at the Texas State prison in Hunts-

Sentenced in one of the speediest trials ever to be recorded here. Norman accepted the death penalty after waiving his right to ap-

District judge A. S. Moss set the execution date for December 16.

The trial of the negro youth opened promptly at 9 o'clock Tuesday morning. A jury of 12 men was selected in one hour from the first 26 veniremen questioned. Total time elapsed for the trial was 41/2

#### Traffic Deaths Total 126 **During September**

AUSTIN, Oct. 26.-With the September traffic death toll up to 126, state patrol statisticians pointed to several causes of most of the traffic tragedies.

Of the 1,173 collisions reported last month, 146 occurred because drivers did not observe right-ofway regulations which permits vehicles approaching intersections from the right to pass first, provided intersections are not locally

The drinking driver was held responsible for 129 accidents while 122 others were caused by vehicles traveling too close to centers of nighways and streets. Seventyseven were brought about by fast driving and 50 because of improper passing of other vehicles.
