Junior High Honor Named


Clarendon Junior High School is pleased to announce that Amy Thornberry and Jason Lee are the honor students for the 1992 Eighth

# Available

Texans aged 65 or older can postpone paying delinquent and current property taxes on their homesteads by taking advantage of a tax option called "over-65 deferral." The elderly home-owner simply signs a deferral affidavit at the Donley County Appraisal District office.

This special form of tax relief can also halt a lawsuit already filed to collect delinquent property taxes on an older Texan's homestead, according to SoRelle, chief appraiser of the Donley Appraisal District. To stop a delinquent tax suit, SoRelle said, the over-65 homeowner files the deferral affidavit with the court in which the suit is pending.

"This law means that, if the proper affidavit is on file, an older homeowner cannot lose a homestead because of delinquent taxes," SoRelle said.

Once a homeowner files an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can initiate or pursue a suit for delinquent taxes as long as that person owns and lives in that homes-

SoRelle stressed, though, that tax deferral for the elderly only postpones paying delinquent taxes on the home-stead, it does not cancel them. During the deferral period, taxes and delinquent interest continue to add up, he said. "When the elderly taxpayer no longer owns or lives in the home, those accrued amounts become due. Taxing units can then sue to collect all the deferred tax and in-

While a penalty may not be imposed on the delinquent taxes during the deferral period, the filing of the deferral affidavit will not forgive penalties which were already due. Also, an additional penalty associated with referring the account to a delinquent tax attorney may be charged if taxes remain delinquent more than 90 days after the deferral ends.

Forms for filing a tax defer-ral affidavit are available at the appraisal district office. "The homeowner should fill out the form and have the signature witnessed by a notary public," SoRelle said. 





Pain Relievers: Non-Narcotic and Narcotic

Mild to moderate pain such as occasional headache frequently is relieved through the use of one of several excellent nonprescription medicines. Such products usually contain aspirin, acetaminophen, or ibuprofen. Prescription pain relievers are classified as narcotic or non-narcotic. Sometimes narcotic and non-narcotic pain relievers are given together or they are combined in the same tablet or capsule.

Non-narcotic pain relievers requiring a prescription include pentazocine, propoxyphene, and the large group of nonsteroidal antiinflammatory agents which include tolmetin, mefenamic acid, sulindac, indomethacin, piroxicam, and naproxen. Medicines in the last group primarily are used for relief of pain associated with arthritis. They work by inhibiting the production of substances called prostaglandins.

Narcotic pain reliever medicines include morphine, codeine, hydromorphone, and meperidine. Many narcotics are derived from the opium plant. These powerful medicines relieve pain by acting on the brain and altering the way pain is perceived. In many instances, severe, chronic pain will not respond to any type of pain reliever other than a narcotic. Other medicines which may be given with non-narcotics and narcotics to help relieve pain include antidepressants, anticonvulsants, corticosteroids, and amphetamines.





Compensation of \$10,000 offered

Eligibility for Compensation

1. You must give written notice to Hall County Hospital and state the name and address of the individual you have contacted. The notice must specify when (date and time) you contacted the physician and must be received by the hospital within 30 days of the contact with the physician. In the event two people give written notice of having contacted the same individual, the credit will be given to the individual who first contacted the physician.

2. The physician must state on the application that you have contacted him/her and verify the date of such contact.

3. When the physician signs a contract to practice at Hall County Clinic, you will receive payment of \$2,000. After the physician has practiced with Hall County Clinic for six months, you will be paid \$3,000. After the completion of one full year of practice by the physician at Hall County Clinic, you will receive the final payment of \$5,000.





Get To Know Your Cotton Plants

If you're a cotton grower and you're not plant mapping, chances are you're guessing about some of the most important crop management

Plant mapping, or plant monitoring as it's often called, is such a reliable guide to what your cotton needs to produce more fiber that it has gained widespread support across the U.S. Cotton Belt.

Plant monitoring will help you manage your crop inputs so you get the most lint with the highest quality.

Ideally, plant mapping should be done weekly. Usually the time required to map a field is 10 to 20 minutes. Even if you don't have time for a complete plant map every weekly, plant mapping will teach the observation skills needed to read the crop's progress.

Each plant stage, from pre-squaring to late bloom, will be mapped on a field by field basis. Focus on early crop stages because you can use the information you gather for immediate production decisions.

It's a good idea to record your plant monitoring on paper for comparison throughout the season. Plant mapping kits to make it easier are available free of charge through our office or from the National Cotton Council or the Extension Office.

This mapping program bases management decisions on fruit retention at the first position (the one closest to the main stem) on fruiting branches. If we lose first position fruit at lower nodes -- from the moneymaking positions -- it doesn't matter what's happening at other positions. Fruit retention is the single most controllable and important factor in

In addition to fruit retention, plant mapping helps us look at the crop's growth potential, called plant vigor.

The plant vigor index indicates the "horsepower" of the plant -- growth potential that is going to be expressed in vegetative or reproductive growth. By comparing height vs. number of nodes we ask the question "How tall is this field for its age?".

If vigor is low or not increasing, the cause should be identified and corrected because low vigor cotton is not capable of producing top yields. High vigor plants may need to be restrained with a plant growth regulator to avoid excess leaf and stalk that can shade bottom fruit and delay maturity.

As you map plants at various times of the season, you'll be looking for different plant structures. I'll describe some of these so you'll know what you're looking for.

Nodes are the places on the plant mainstem from which branches and leaves grow. Even after a leaf falls off, the node will still leave a bump on the mainstem.

Vegetative branches grow at the lower end of the stalk or mainstem. Vegetative branches grow straight, just like the mainstem.

Fruiting branches grow in a "zig-zag" pattern, changing direction slightly at each fruiting site. I point out this difference so that if you've lost all the squares off your first fruiting nodes, the "crooked" look will keep you from mistaking them for vegetative branches.

Aborts are locations on fruiting branches where the squares or bolls have shed. Aborts can be recognized by the small scar on the top of the fruiting branch with two small leafy projections on either side.

#### Northrup **Promises** Enforcement of Federal Law

Assistant U.S. Attorney Tanya Northrup promised strong enforcement of federal laws designed to create drug-free and gun- free zones around schools during a visit to Clarendon.

Ms. Northrup joined Claren-don Independent School District Superintendent Jeff Walker, and Clarendon High School Principal Solomon Kepley in unveiling a sign at Clarendon High School on May 14, 1992 noting the 1,000-foot zone around the campus.

Ms. Northrup's appearance was part of a day-long effort by the U.S. attorney to inform educators and law enforcement officials about the new law, which took effect last year.

Passed by Congress in 1990, the law makes it a federal offense to knowingly possess drugs or firearms on a school campus or within 1,000 feet of the school.

The drug conviction carries a mandatory one-year jail term if the criminal activity is committed at the school, plus any sentence the person receives could be doubled. People convicted of carrying guns on or near a campus face a five-year term and a possible \$5,000 fine.

"We will enforce the statue," Ms. Northrup said. "We will vigorously prosecute violators in federal court, and those caught with drugs and guns within the zone will serve their sentence in federal prison where is no early parole. We take this statute very seriously."




