WTU Asks For New Rates

The West Texas economy could get a boost if the Public Utility Commission of Texas approves recommendations made recently by West Texas Utility Company. "WTU has filed a request to offer new services designed to attract and encourage business expansion in this area, according to Jerry Chambliss, WTU's area manager for Clarendon. The three new experimental tariffs will allow WTU to provide economic development service, curtailable service or interruptible service. These services will be available to customers that voluntarily request and qualify for one of the service option.

New or existing industries served by WTU which add ten new employees and substantially expand their facilities could gain up to 40% reduction in the demand charge portion of their electric bill for the first year. The reductions would gradually be phased out over a four year period.

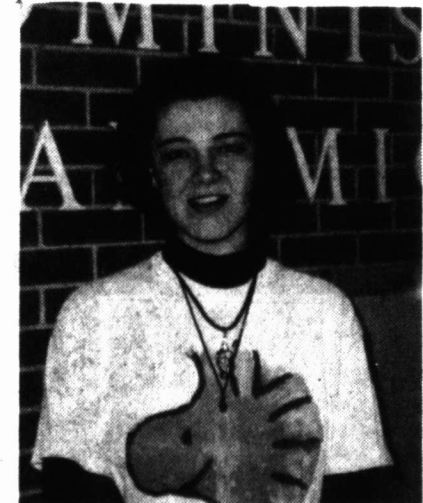
New or existing customers of WTU that might qualify for the economic development tariff are business like manufacturing, warehouse, petroleum, agri-business and many others. "This is a great way to attract new business and encourage existing businesses to expand," Chambliss added.

The proposed curtailable and interruptible rates can significantly reduce certain existing industrial customer's bills. Under the new curtailable tariff a customer must be willing to shut down

part of their electrical usage at any given time at the request of WTU. A customer requesting service under the interruptible rate would agree to allow WTU to occasionally disconnect the designated load. The circumstances that could prompt the company to take this action, which might include unusually high usage of electricity or a power system emergency, would normally occur only a few times each year. In return for his willingness to allow these occasional interruptions, the customer gets a year round discount on his cost of electricity.

A good example of how the curtailable or interruptible rate could be helpful is in the case of marginal oil field operation. By agreeing to have their electric service occasionally interrupted for a brief period of time WTU would discount their electric cost. By reducing the cost of pumping, the oil field operation could continue to operate at a profit when otherwise it might have to shut down.

The new tariff proposals, which the company has asked the PUC to approve by March 1, 1992, would be a benefit to all WTU customers because they would encourage new and existing businesses. In addition, the curtailable and interruptible rates can help delay the need to build new power plants in the future.

Test Soil Now For Spring Crops

It's time to test soil and determine which fertilizer nutrients should be used for spring crops, according to a Texas Agricultural Extension Service soil scientist.

Sound soil fertility programs are the foundation upon which profitable farming businesses are built, said Dr. Willis B. Gass of the Extension Soil Testing Laboratory. A reliable test should be used to determine which nutrients can minimize losses and ensure that crop production is economical, environmentally sound, profitable and sustainable, he said.

Nitrogen is the most frequently deficient soil nutrient, he said, but it is sometimes over-applied. Extension testing laboratories in College Station and Lubbock can assess residual or carryover nitrogen levels in soils by analyzing for nitrate nitrogen. By determining the amount of available nitrogen in the soil, the lab can recommend what additional amounts are needed to reach desired crop yields, resulting in savings to producers.

Phosphorous is the second most commonly deficient nutrient in most Texas soils and should also be applied when tests indicate low or moderate levels, he said.

Although most farmers do a good job fertilizing with nitrogen and phosphorous, micronutrient needs may be overlooked, Gass said.

For instance, his laboratory has found zinc deficiencies in more than 50 percent of soil samples submitted from the Blackland Prairies. Corn and grain sorghum are particularly sensitive to zinc deficiencies, Gass said, adding that cotton, wheat and other crops can also be affected. According to county agent Tim Trimble, soil testing is more important now to a farmer than it has ever been. With the continued emphasis on sound environmental practices, what better and more economical way can a farmer show his concern and commitment to the environment than taking soil tests each year and fertilizing accordingly.

"Soil testing can help you make those major economic decisions with greater confidence," he said.

Soil Testing sample bags and details on soil testing are available at County Extension offices across the state.

Holiday Safety Tips

Drunk Driving continues to be one of the nations most serious health and safety problems. However, Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety says that Federal, State, Local, and private efforts to reduce the incidents of drinking and driving are having an impact.

Major Cawthon says with the approach of New Year's eve that this trend can continue if each of us will do our part in pre-planning our New Year's eve celebration.

It is recommended that if you are going to host a party, that soft drinks be available for your guest so they will have a choice. Introduce people to one another, a good host is not just a bartender. Don't rush refills, don't double up because it's not generous, it's rude. Attempt to have a meal or snacks available throughout the evening and, above all, if someone drinks to much at your house, you are responsible. Provide lodging or get them a safe ride home.

If your plans include traveling this New Year's Eve, than make plans that only allow a totally sober driver to be behind the wheel. It's a good idea to check with your local media outlets to see if any organizations will be providing ride home programs. For those who think it will never happen to them, the Texas Department of Public Safety, along with other local law agencies, will have stepped up patrols and DWI enforcement over the New Year's Eve holiday.

Major Cawthon went on to say that one of the best defenses against a drunk driver is to fasten your safety belt, but its only effective if the driver and all occupants take time to do so.

Obituary

Joseph J. DeRaad

Joseph J. DeRaad, 78, died Tuesday, December 17, 1991, in Amarillo.

Services were held Monday, December 23, 1991, in Elizabeth Jane Bivens Home for the Aged on T-Anchor Blvd. with Charles M. Carney, minister of Fort Worth Street Church of Christ in Wellington officiating. Burial will be in Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia by Schooler-Gordon Bell Avenue Chapel.

Col. DeRaad, born in Webb City, Mo., attended Morningside College where he reported for the Sioux City Tribune. He received his law degree in 1939 from the Des Moines College of Law and became chief of the Iowa Bureau of Narcotics. In 1940, he worked as a special agent for the U.S. Secret Service assigned to the White House detail.

Col. DeRaad entered the services as a second lieutenant and during his second active duty from 1948 until 1963, he advanced from

major to colonel. He had served in the China-Burma theater, in Orje, France, and in Bremen, Germany, by the end of World War II. After retiring from the U.S. Air Force in 1963, he became the Woodbury County Juvenile Court Judge.

He returned to Amarillo in 1974 and moved to the Bivens home in 1984. He was a 32nd degree Mason of Amarillo Lodge No. 731, a Khiva Shriner and a member of the Lions International, Polk Street United Methodist Church and the Tascosa Country Club.

Survivors include his wife, Louise W. DeRaad; a son, Alan J. DeRaad of Front Royal, Va.; two daughters, Pat Sikes of Amarillo and Judy Welch of Clarendon; nine grandchildren; and five great-grandchildren.

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

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Preventing Middle Ear Infections in Children

According to a recent report in the medical journal *American Family Physician*, more than 80 percent of all children in the United States have at least one middle ear infection (*otitis media*) by the time they reach three years of age. We now know that middle ear infections in children sometimes can be prevented.

The results of a recent study of almost 200 children at day care centers in Finland indicate that vaccinating children with flu (influenza A) vaccine may reduce the incidence of ear infections. The number of children who did not get the vaccine and had one or more middle ear infections was significantly greater than the number of children who got the vaccine and did not have an ear infection. This study suggests that reducing the incidence of viral infections, such as the flu, may help prevent ear infections.

Several studies in the United States and Europe have shown that giving children antibiotics, such as *amoxicillin* and *sulfisoxazole*, reduces the number of episodes of ear infections. According to *Postgraduate Medicine*, these studies suggest a 50 percent or greater reduction in the risk of infection. Other methods of reducing middle ear infections in children include the surgical placement of ventilating tubes in children's ears and surgical removal of the adenoids.

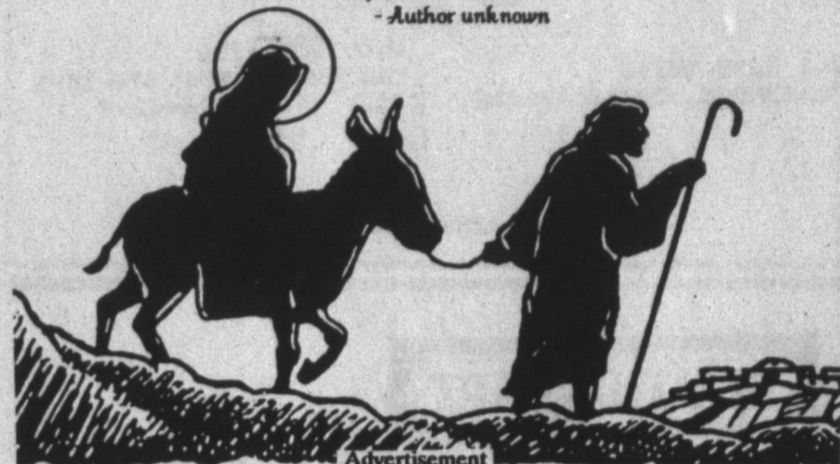

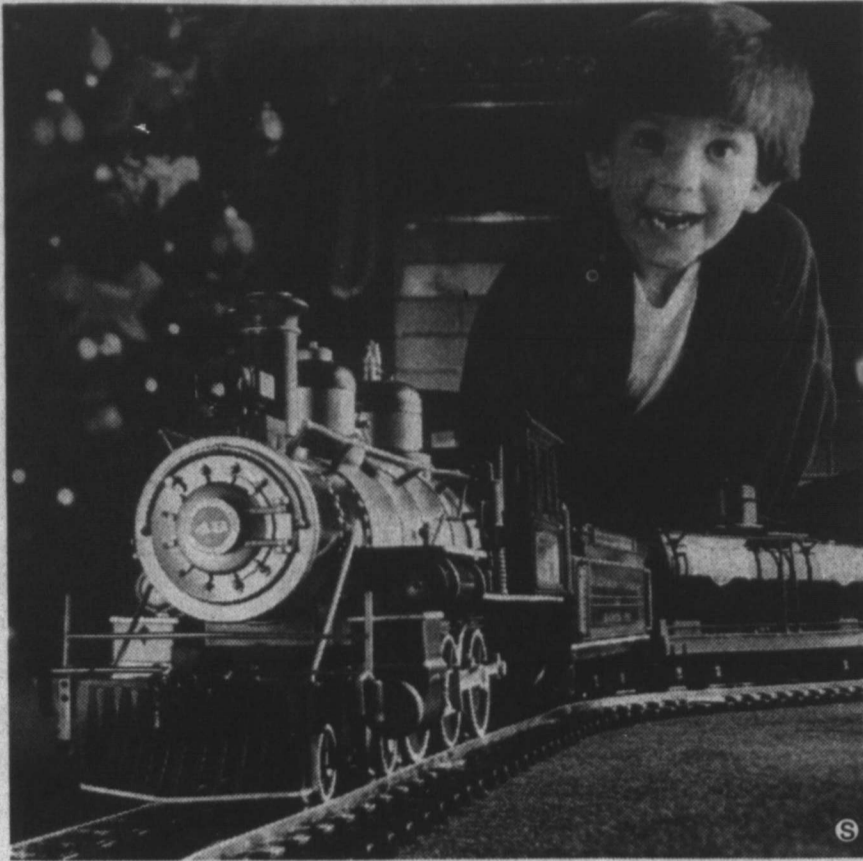
Now your tree shimmers and shines. But is the decorating done? Not according to the traditionalists who believe a tree's not done until it has a train underneath.

The train-under-the-tree tradition began in the early 1900s with German tin-metal sets powered by wind-up engines. In the '20s and '30s, the first electric sets appeared and, by the 1950s, the train was firmly established as a part of Christmas.

As interest in formal and theme tree decorating has increased in recent years, Bachmann Industries, the model train manufacturer, has seen an increase in the percentage of train sets purchased by women. Sets are primarily purchased by men during the rest of the year, but the percentage purchased by women surges to 65 percent during the holiday season.

needed help from SSI, according to the Social Security Administration.

Under the SSI rules, single persons may have assets valued up to \$2,000 and a couple up to \$3,000 without affecting their SSI payment. And some assets are excluded in figuring SSI eligibility. These may include a home and adjacent land; personal effects and household goods, with a total equity value of \$2,000 or less, a car; life insurance policies with face value totaling \$1,500 or less per person; property used in a trade or business; burial plots of space regardless of value, if intended for business use by a person or his or her immediate family; or burial funds set aside for an individual and his or her spouse, up to \$1,500 each.

The applicant must agree to sell the assets that exceeds the limits above within a specified time (9 months for real property, 3 months for personal property). SSI payments received pending the sale of the assets have to be repaid out of the proceeds of the sale.

Another rule excluding any real property that cannot be sold because it is jointly owned and its sale would cause the other owners undue hardship due to loss of housing; or its sale is barred for legal reasons; or the owner's reasonable efforts to sell have been unsuccessful.

Social Security News

A 3.7 percent cost-of-living adjustment will affect the amount of Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments received in January.

This change raises the maximum Social Security retirement benefit to \$1,088 a month and the Federal SSI payment to \$442 a month for an individual and \$633 a month for a couple.

The tax rate for Social Security remains unchanged at 7.65 percent each for employees and employers. However, the wage base, the amount of earnings subject to the Social Security tax, increases from \$53,400 to \$55,500. The wage base for the Medicare portion of the Social Security tax increases from \$125,000 to \$130,200.

Benefit increases are made annually based on the change in the consumer price index as measured from the third quarter of one year to the third quarter of the following year.

Other changes announced by the Social Security Administration include new limits on the amount of money a beneficiary can earn and still receive full Social Security benefits. The limits for 1992 increase from \$7,080 to \$7,440 for beneficiaries under 65; from \$9,720 to \$10,200 for people 65 to 69. The earnings limits do not apply to people 70 and older.

Applicants May Sell Possessions To Qualify For SSI

Elderly people, people with disabilities, and those who are blind have limited income should know they may still qualify for monthly benefits under the Supplemental Security Income (SSI)

program even if there assets are over the SSI limits, if they agree to sell these assets within a specified time. The rule permits some people to qualify immediately for much
