Terrorism in NY, DC ignites patriotism

Donley County residents, like the rest of America, reacted with shock and horror when terrorists hijacked, then crashed two airplanes into the towers of the World Trade Center in New York City last Tuesday shortly before and after 8 a.m. local time.

Both towers later collapsed due to the structural damage and intense heat caused by the burning jet fuel. At presstime this week, nearly 5,000 people were reported missing in New

A third plane was crashed into the Pentagon in Washington, DC, Tuesday after it missed what is believed to have been its primary target - the White House. A fourth plane was also hijacked and re-routed for the nation's capital. That plane crashed in rural Pennsylvania, and it is believed - based on a cell phone call - that at least three passengers acted to thwart their hijackers' plans.

### editor's Commentary



### America has had enough of terrorism

Like most of you, I spent much of my time the last several days watching television. The utter devastation is something that cannot be described here. The pictures on television tell the whole story.

The constant topic of conversation amongst the pundits, broadcasters, and also the people on the street has been centered on what President Bush's administration is going to do about the attack.

I've listened to both sides - from those who want to go in and just nuke all of Afghanistan to those who literally want to do nothing and give peace a chance. Clearly, something has to be done; and I'm sorry, but I think the days of pussyfooting around with these lunatics

The threat of terrorism is one that seeks to destroy Western Civilization in general and the American Civilization in particular. If our allies know what's good for them, they will join the United States in its efforts to end terrorism. But we should not wait for them; we don't need the permission of socialist whiners in the United Nations. The United States Constitution charges the federal government with defending our nation. Indeed, providing for the common defense was one of the principal reasons our government was formed.

President Bush has said that America will go after the terrorists and those who support them, and he has said that we are now at war. It would be good for this effort if Congress would go ahead and formally declare

But whom do we declare war upon? History shows that the United States can declare war on a group of people without a country - namely the Barbary Pirates - who were terrorists about 200 years ago. We could limit ourselves to a war on Usama Bin Laden's organization and other terrorist groups, but there is today reason enough to declare war at least on Afghanistan and Iraq.

Now we hear from the hand-wringers that making war on these poor people won't help matters and besides, they say, it's not their fault. That is flat, dead wrong. A great deal of the blame for terrorism lies with the people whose governments take part in, finance, and harbor terrorist activities.

Thomas Jefferson wrote that governments are instituted to secure the liberties of the people. And, he wrote, whenever a government becomes abusive of those rights and subjects the people to despotism it is their right and their duty to overthrow such government. That is our Declaration of Independence in a nutshell.

The argument that the Iraqi or Afghan people are poor and destitute doesn't really carry water as an excuse for them to permit their governments to behave this way.

In 1776, thirteen colonies with a ragtag army defended themselves against one of the world's greatest superpowers at the time. In 1836, a group of poor settlers suffered tragic defeats and major setbacks before defeating a mighty army in one battle that lasted less than 20

In the stories of both the American and Texas Revolutions, people fought against superior forces in the face of immeasurable odds all in the name of freedom, and they succeeded in freeing themselves from tyrants.

Given those facts, I have no problem with the United States and its allies going in to attack so-called innocent people in these other countries. They are not innocent; they are accomplices.

President Bush should demand the Taliban government in Afghanistan hand over Bin Laden and all of his lieutenants immediately, and he should do the same for the governments harboring other terrorist groups. Those that don't comply should face the full wrath of the United States Armed Forces, and the nuclear option should not be ruled out. Terrorism, the people who commit it, and the people who tolerate it must be eradi-

Some people may be queasy with this approach. They will favor diplomatic solutions and limited attacks. But for those people, I would reiterate something I heard a retired military man say on one of the news programs: "Have we had enough yet?"

It wasn't enough when our embassy in Iran was taken hostage. It wasn't enough when Marine barracks were bombed. It wasn't enough when the first bomb was set off at the World Trade Center years ago. It wasn't enough when airplanes were hijacked or blown out of the sky. It wasn't enough when our embassies were bombed. And it wasn't enough when a hole was blown in the side of one of our warships.

Now, the Pentagon has been attacked, two landmarks of capitalism are heaps of rubble, our president was targeted for assassination, and some 5,000 Americans - innocent civilians - are dead.

Have we had enough yet? Yes, I think we have.

### A ready source of talent goes unnoticed

As children load their backpacks, yellow buses roll, and stadiums fill with Friday night football fans, a real problem looms in classrooms across the Lone Star State. According to some education experts, we are some 40,000 teachers short in Texas public schools. Teacher associations hammered this point across during the last legislative session as they lobbied for a statewide teacher health insurance program. Their theory was and remains that we can't find people willing to enter the classroom because the pay is low and benefits are inadequate.

The irony is that while we have this "crisis" in education, the solution lies in a mechanism already in place but seldom utilized. Alternative certification is the method of putting teachers in the classroom who have not gone through coursework in the traditional colleges of education. And maybe one of the reasons we are short is because prospective teachers don't find the subject matter in colleges of education very appealing. Instead of listening to lectures on pedagogy and didacticism that one would find in the education curriculum, students might find anthropology or political science more useful and interesting.

Alternative certification allows men

and women to be certified to teach in their areas of proficiency as long as they hold a bachelor's degree, take a six-week "teaching" course and pass the ExCET exam prior to entering the classroom. There is a built-in talent pool for new teachers right now in Texas. Retirees from the military and private sector as well as men and women ready for a career change are often in search of new challenges and would be eager to teach if they could bypass the colleges of education. Recent high-tech layoffs make new math and technology teachers readily available.

So, why aren't more teachers bought into the teaching profession who possess these qualities? After all, statistics show that these people make good teachers. The reluctance comes from local school district personnel who assert they don't have the man power to administer such a program or that implementing one is not in their budgets. In fact, only four school districts offer an alternative certification program.

Some teacher associations make the "quality over quantity" argument against alternative certification. But when you peel away the layers of rhetoric on this issues, you get to the heart of the matter - alternative certification is maligned because a teaching shortage gives teacher unions more leverage to lobby for additional pay and increased benefits.

We all agree the teachers should be paid well, but we also want vacancies filled with qualified teachers who are not currently being utilized by the system.

As teachers swarmed the Capitol last session advocating health insurance to help attract new teachers, a bill granting more flexibility to local districts to provide a mechanism for alternative certification miraculously passed the House. Unfortunately, its life was cut short by a "tag" by one senator and never again saw the light

We have a practice in Texas public education of furnishing the carrot and hiding the stick. The recent health insurance program for teachers is evidence of that where we funded a billion dollar program and asked for nothing in return.

If our current system isn't producing enough teachers, it's time to make some changes. And the alternative certification program will do just that. It will allow new people to enter the classroom and may even stimulate some competition among those already in the system. The winners are likely to be the children for whom education was intended in the first place.

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


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

PROPOSITION 18

Proposition 18 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to create a program to consolidate and standardize the collection, deposit, reporting, and payment of criminal and civil court fees. If the legislature creates such a program, any new fees imposed by the legis-lature may not take effect before January 1 of the following year, unless an earlier effective date is approved by a vote of two-thirds of the members of each house of the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote uniformity in the collection, deposit, reporting, and remit-ting of civil and criminal fees."

> **PROPOSITION 19** (HJR 81)

Proposition 19 would amend the constitution to allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue up to \$2 billion of additional general obligation bonds. The Board issues bonds to pay for water supply projects, water quality enhancement projects, flood control projects, state participation in water and wastewater facilities, and projects for economically distressed areas. Current law limits the amount of bonds that the

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$2 billion."


