## 2,000 Baby Chicks Dies In Amarillo To Feature F. F. A. Spring Project Taken Near Lelia Lake;

Stucco House Leased And Electric Brooder To Be **Used In Care of Chicks** 

Featuring poultry in their spring project, 2,000 baby chicks will be brooded by approximately 15 F.F. A. Club members, J. R. Gillham, advisor, said vesterday.

The chapter has leased a stucco building and an electric brooder will be used in caring for the chicks. The building will be divided into two parts and the yard into two divisions in order to care for chicks of widely varied ages.

The brooding program is being used in connection with the program for better chickens throughout the county. Several new varieties will be introduced to the county by the F.F.A. boys.

Among new breeds will be Columbian Wyandottes, Blue Andulusians, Speckled Sussex, Lamonas, White Giants, New Hamshires, White Orpingtons, Black Leghorns, Light Brahamas, Houdans, and Buff Cornish.

#### COMMUNISM IN CALIFORNIA.

It is said that more and more of the men and women of the motion picture colonies in California are becoming communists. A frequent change of mates under present laws entails a lot of time and expense. With the change of several mates, children in many incidents become a liability to those who do not choose to "marry to stay married."

### CANADA HOGGED THE DEAL.

News print mills in Canada, mostly owned by corporations of the States, are up against a tough spot. During the past year, prices went sky high. Mills were equipped to turn out unlimited quantities of paper. Now it appears that newspaper publishers have cut down their purchases to an economic status that threatens ruin to one of Canada's largest industries. Production has been reduced thirty percent since January 1st.

Materials are being assembled for a three million dollar paper manufacturing plant at Lufkin, Texas. Another mill costing eight million dollars is being erected near Mobile, Alabama.

Newspaper publishers in a meeting at Fernandina, Florida last week secured pledges for stock in a mill to be erected in some location in Florida near pine forests and water ways.

It all begins to look like Canada lost out by hogging everything in sight. It is being freely predicted that within two years, millions of dollars will be spent in the South for newsprint.

### THAT PRESIDENT BALL STUFF.

Those too poor to pay, are treated free at the hospital and given the same care and attention as the children coming from wealthy homes. More than \$36,000 was contributed to the cause the past year. A million is needed to care for the helpless cripples in Texas. It means an escape from a living death to our little folks. It means hope, happiness and opportunity. Your donation will be appreciated. But do it now.

### DO WE NEED AN UMPIRE?

Some years ago when the big league baseball folks could not get along agreeably, they asked Judge Kenesaw Mountain Landis to take over the job of general umpire. He resigned his position as judge, and all through these years the Judge's decisions have become law among the baseball fraternity.

As the Panhandle develops, more and varied interests of the several sections naturally conflict. There are times when the serenity of our section is fractured by blasts of accusations, all to the detriment of the peace, dignity and financial betterment of all of us.

Is it possible that a man might be secured from an outside source who could umpire the Panhandle? He would have to be a genius, but he could be had at a price. He could be another Landis in a different role.

### IGNORING THE ENEMY.

All during the process of figuring some way to help the farmer to help himself, one of the most important enemies of the producers has been studiously overlooked. That gang of leeches is no one but the speculators.

In growing any farm commodity, a bunch of gamblers on a stock market set the prices. Do these gamblers really gauge their prices according to supply and demand? Hardly. In the matter of cotton, several million bales of linter bales that are practically worthless, are carried over each year to depress the cotton market. This trash is included in the "carry over" each year.

Then on top of the gamblers in farm product prices, the farmer is harassed by the packing house trust, the machinery trust, the spinners trust, the millers trust, and in each

is found a monopoly equal to the paper trust that has a strangle hold upon the newspaper publishers at this time.

Why doesn't the government authorities give the consumers a square deal instead of talking about doles, subsidies and various other charitable means that would increase our taxes and get us nowhere?

#### AUTO STRIKES HURT NEWSPAPERS.

The lack of auto advertising the past few months in the weekly and in many of the daily newspapers is attributed to auto strikes. John L. ## BABSON'S PRAISE OF CHEMICALS IS TOPIC FOR TEXAS

Nomination of chemicals as the 'industry of the year" for 1938 by David Babson, famed economist, emphasizes the desirability of cultivating these industries' development in Texas, which has many natural attractions to offer them, says a report of the All-South Development Council.

Babson, whose previous predictions as to the nation's pace-setting industries scored bulls-eyes with selection of building construction in 1936 and aviation in 1937 chose the chemical industry for leadership in 1938, basing his choice on its "research progress, all-inclusive diversification, conservation management, and its protection against war, inflation, poli-

Because of her wealth of the raw materials, both mineral and agricultural, used in chemical manufacturing and in the fast-expanding chemical process and synthetic materials industries, the really be in the forefront of this sort of progress. A program of state "salesmanship" to industry, it said, could bring great gains for Texas in this field provided it were backed by a cooperative rather than antagonistic official attitude toward

As it is, although Texas products such as petroleum, sulphur, gas, salt, lime, clays, carbon black, potash and coal tar are prime bases of the chemical industry, the state accounted for little more than half of one per cent of the nation's chemical manufacturers values in the most recent official census. Louisiana, whose \$7,324,036 output as' \$3,849,071, has in the last year added, under its "welcome to industries" plan, \$5,540,000 worth of new and expanded chemical plants. ## Are Going to Keep Open

We, the members of the school board were elected to carry on your schools-our schools-and are faced with the necessity of providing funds to do the job. Under the law we have levied sufficient taxes to pay all costs, and now your part is to pay your taxes. You owe it to yourself and you owe it to the great majority of people living in the Clarendon Independent School District, who have paid and are paying their school taxes, and who demand from this board that our schools run the full nine months' period.

## \$41,262.00 Delinquent Taxes Due

Besides the current 1937 taxes due by Jan. 31st, there are \$41,262.00 delinquent taxes due the school. The board has tried by every fair means to collect this tax money, and have seen all local means fail. There is not now enough money in sight to carry the schools through February. The schools must run, so we have decided to place the collection of delinquent taxes in the hands of an outside collection agency, who will have no local friendships or ties to hamper them in the task.

## Penalties After January 31st

In years past we have been lenient in the matter of penalties provided by law, as a help to people facing the hard financial situation. We cannot longer pass these penalties by and be fair to those who are paying their taxes. The properties of the district stand for the taxes lawfully assessed and all penalties added for delinquencies.

## Pay Your Taxes Before January 31st to Avoid Penalties

Remember that penalties on 1937 unpaid taxes are added at the rate of one per cent per month, until July 1, 1938, when the penalty is increased to eight per cent and interest charges at the rate of one-half per cent per month are added.

## We Are Facing Our Responsibility And Ask You to Face Yours

Our school system is the greatest asset we have in the Clarendon school district. If our schools suffer, our Junior College will fall along with it. The education of our children NOW at their tender age is a matter we cannot shift to some other day. The law is plain as to the duties of the school board. We have decided to face the issue, as any other elected board must do. The property here must bear the load.

We thank you heartily for all co-operation in years past and gone, and we solicit your early meeting of all obligations due the district. If there was any easier way out to carry on our schools we would use it. Arrange to pay your current and delinquent taxes before the penalty date and give evidence of your deep interest in the children of this district.


