

The theater venue is located upstairs at 3rd and Kearney, atop JAMZ, and will accommodate an audience up to 100 person.


Following the opening concert, the location will present additional programs while completing the decoration and fine-tuning of the space for the fall season.

# **Protect Cotton From Thrips**

### By Tim Trimble, **County Extension Agent--Ag.**

Much of the cotton in Donley County has or is just now emerging, which means that the cotton crop is already three to four weeks behind schedule. With this in mind, producers have to be on the look out for anything that might cause additional stress and delay to the crop. One of the first insects that will be encountered (already in many fields) is thrips.

Thrips damage is for the most part under rated by producers in the area. These tiny insects suck the plant juices from cotton resulting in the reduction of vigor and in severe cases, may cause stand loses and yield reduction. One of the biggest benefits that might be derived from protection from thrips damage is, in getting the crop off to a good start. This will not only help with carliness, but will minimize the impact of wind and



sand damage. This will be particularly important this year since we are already behind.

Prevention of thrips with systemic insecticides is thought to be the best treatments. But, over the top insecticides can also be used at economical prices. Producers that used soil applied systemic insecticides should keep in mind that the heavy rains may have leached the insecticide below the root zone, or the insecticide may have broken down by now which would mean that no control would be achieved. At any rate, all fields should be checked closely and cotton, with no old leaves, should be treated when one thrip per plant is found. Once plants start putting on healthy leaves, the treatment level should be elevated to two or more thrips per plant.

As of last week much of the cotton in the two to four leaf stage was showing signs of thrips damage. Cotton that was just emerging and in the cotyledon stage had not been infested much, but by this week infestation could be expected.

# Vorheis **Receives Grant**

Texas Tech University junior Jonathon Vorheis is one of six U.S. college students to receive grants to attend a summer program sponsored by the National Science Foundation at Cornell University in Ithaca, N.Y.

Vorheis, an agricultural engineering major and native of Clarendon, will attend the 10-week Agricultural and biological Engineering Research Experiences for Undergraduates Program in Biogradation and Bioremediation, which begins June 8.

Grants for the program are awarded based on an applicant's scholarly work, previous research, a written essay and faculty recommendations. Each grant includes a \$3,000 stipend and travel reimbursement.

The program is available to sophomores and juniors who are majoring in science or engineering. It is conducted by faculty members of the department of agricultural and biological engineering at Cornell.

The 40-hour-a-week session will be devoted to six topics relating to research on aerobic biogradation of organic waste and bioremediation of contaminated soils. The topics requires an understanding of mass and energy transport, microbiology and the process of theoretical and experimental synthesis.

Participants will be required to write a final report and deliver an oral presentation on their research experience.







Studies also show the value of aspirin in the prevention of transient ischemia attacks (TIAs) and strokes. Aspirin doses of 300 mg to 1,500 mg have been reported to produce this protectant effect. According to a recent issue of *New England Journal of Medicine*, as little as 30 mg of aspirin daily will inhibit the clumping of platelets with fewer gastrointestinal side effects.

According to the article, the lower dose of aspirin has less tendency to disturb an enzyme in the stomach lining. The result is less gastric discomfort. Patients receiving 30 mg of aspirin daily also experienced less minor bleeding, fewer major bleeding episodes, and less death-related bleeding when compared to those in the study group who received over 200 mg. Reducing the dose did not appear to eliminate allergic reactions to aspirin, however. Researchers indicate that the first dose of aspirin for stroke and TIA prevention should be 120 mg, followed by the 30 mg daily dose.



# Greatrace Cars to Top 7 Million Mile Mark

The 10th Anniversary Interstate Batteries Great American Race start Sunday, June 21 on King Street in historic Charleston, SC is one

milestone-a second straight start below the Mason-Dixon Line. The world's greatest old car race will rack up a second mark sometime after up to 100 cars from across the glob head out on a 14 day, 9 state, 47 stop, 4,475 journey to a Saturday, July 4 finish at South Costa Metro in Costa Mesa, CA.

Sometime during the cross country classic the 1992 Buick Skylark Pace Car or one of 35 Buick Official cars, up to 100 racers and about 60 support vehicles will ring up the 7 millionth mile traveled by Greatrace vehicles since its 1983 inception. 

"When USA entries meet foreign competitors from Japan, New Zealand, England, and Canada, a 71 mile long transcontinental caravan results that obeys traffic laws in an exciting test that's tough to finish, let alone win."

"Our route includes Columbia, SC, Atlanta, GA, Birmingham, Montgomery & Mobile, AL, Picayune, MS, Baton Rouge & Lake Charles, LA, Galveston, Victoria, Austin, Hillsboro, Dallas, Wichita Fall, and Amarillo, TX, Albuquerque and Farmington, NM, Pinetop-Lakeside and Phoenix, AZ and Blythe and San Diego, CA enroute to the big finish in Costa Mesa," he explained.

### Health Insurance Bitter Pill

If Congress passes a nationalized health insurance program, it will be a bitter pill for senior citizens. That's the belief of the Seniors Coalition, a non-profit advocacy group that represents nearly a million active seniors.

Nationalized health programs tend to discriminate against the elderly, according to a new study by the National Center for Policy Analýsis, a Dallas-based research group.

For instance, a 75-year old living in the United States has *four times* more opportunity to receive bypass surgery than under Canada's nationalized system. Yet, determined politicans want such a system in the United States.

If they succeed, Congress will dismantle all public and private health systems—such as Medicare, Medicaid and military programs and substitute a package of "basic" health care services. And it's not clear how Congress would define "basic."

But it is clear that nationalized health insurance means lower quality, long waiting lines and higher taxes. For instance, such a proposal set forth by Senator Bob Kerrey of Nebraska will bring a 71 percent increase in state taxes, according to some estimates.

There are good alternatives to sending our health care dollars and decision-making to Washington.

Currently, 87 percent of Americans have public or private health insurance. Proposed state reforms will make health insurance accessible and affordable to millions of uninsured workers. Available cost control measures, such as managed care programs, work to keep health care expenses in check. And the federal government must accept responsibility for extending Medicaid to the poor and near-poor. A combination of public and private initiatives can provide universal access to health care for all Americans, through public or private insurance coverage. Improving our health care system beats tearing it down and shipping it to Washington. 




