

Muleshoe Chamber 1995 banquet expected to be best yet

Rincones to be arraigned in district court on Monday

Two cousins from Earth are scheduled to be arraigned in the 287th District Court in Muleshoe Monday on charges of attempted murder and aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. A Bailey County Grand Jury indicted them on Tuesday.

The men, Joe Rincon, 20, and David Rincon Jr., 23, were

arrested on Jan. 22 for allegedly beating a man, pouring gas on him and setting him on fire. Francisco DeLeon Samarron of Earth was treated for burns over five percent of his body which he received from the incident.

Samarron, who was listed in critical condition at University Medical Center during

the first few days after the incident, was released from the hospital Feb. 1.

Bail for the men was set at \$25,000 each. They both remain incarcerated in the Bailey County Jail.

They men were arraigned before Bailey County Justice of the Peace Todd Ellis on Jan. 22, but the case has since been

turned over to district court.

Court reports state that the men did the act "with the specific intent to commit the offense of murder by pouring gasoline on the man."

Reports further state, "they intentionally and knowingly caused serious bodily injury by beating him (Samarron) with hands and pouring gas and ig-

ning, and they did, then and there, use a deadly weapon - gasoline."

If convicted on murder charges, the Rincones could face a maximum penalty of 20 years in a state penitentiary and a maximum fine of \$10,000.

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Doll collection on display at junior high library

A doll collection depicting changes in schools in America from the years 1774 to 1840 is currently on display in the library at Watson Junior High School.

The American Girls Collection, manufactured by the Pleasant Company, arrived at the school at the end of January and will be displayed through February.

The Pleasant Company rents displays to public schools for educational purposes. WJHS, however, received the display to show free this month because librarian Jane Rudd won a free display which she registered for at a School Librar-

ian Convention held in Indianapolis, Ind., this fall.

Rudd said the collection reflects primarily changes in the way reading classes were taught during those year.

"The dolls are all dressed in costumes from their time period with school supplies, desks and lunch, the way they looked during their time."

Rudd said Mrs. Reid, a 7th grade teacher at WJHS, is using the display to teach students in her reading class about the history of reading. She said they are also studying some of the books which the

Unlike a year ago when they were the focus of the District 2-3A race, the Muleshoe Lady Mules didn't figure in the play-off picture as they ended their season Friday night at home against Friona.

But the Lady Mules went out with a bang anyway, beating their Parmar County rivals 46-45 in overtime.

Two key shots as the clock wore down gave the Lady Mules the victory. With Muleshoe down 40-38 in regulation, Jodie Foster banked in a jumper in the final seconds to get the game to overtime. In the overtime period, Sharon Johnson downed a long two from just inside the arc with 25 seconds left to give the Lady Mules the one-point win.

Muleshoe finished the season 5-21 and 3-7, while Friona ended the year 16-14 and 5-5.

In other District 2-3A girls action, Littlefield won the district title with a 69-36 win over Floydada, ending the regular season at 8-2. But the second play-off spot from 2-3A is yet to be decided. Shallowater upset Dimmitt 58-57 and the two teams ended the season tied for second in the league at 7-3. A one-game

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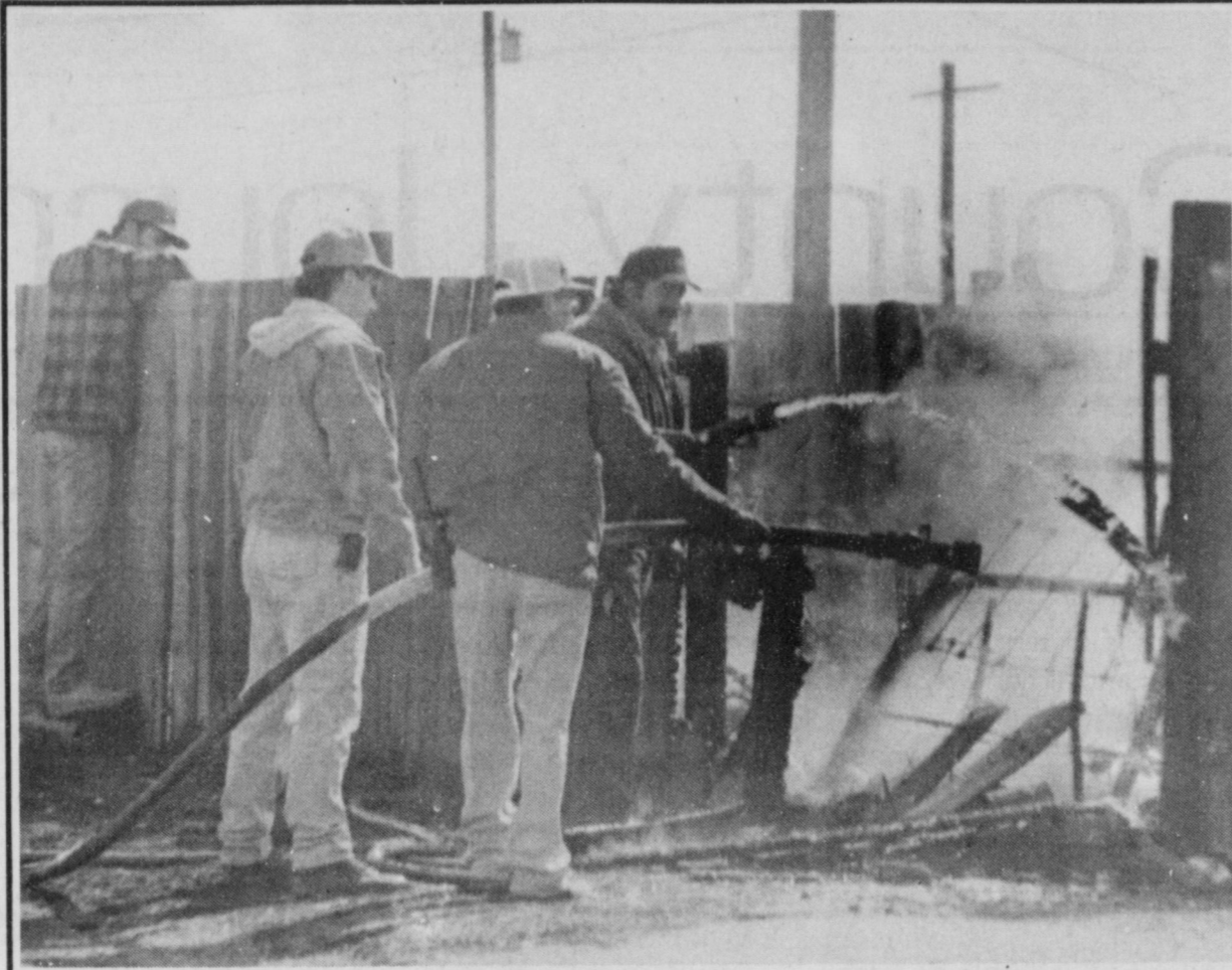

people get their money's worth.

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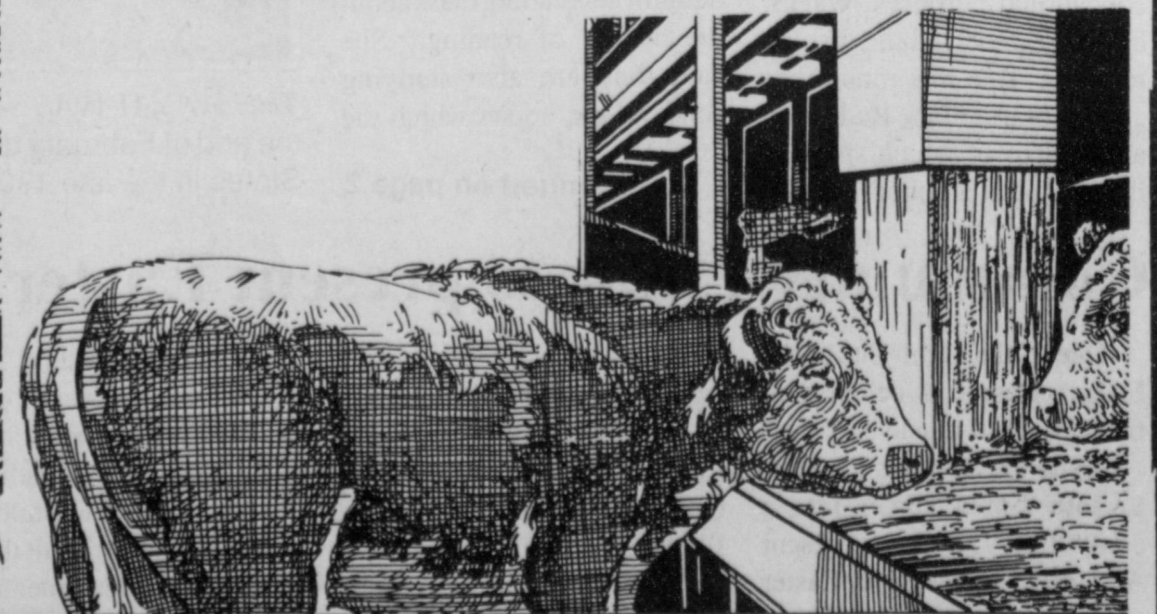
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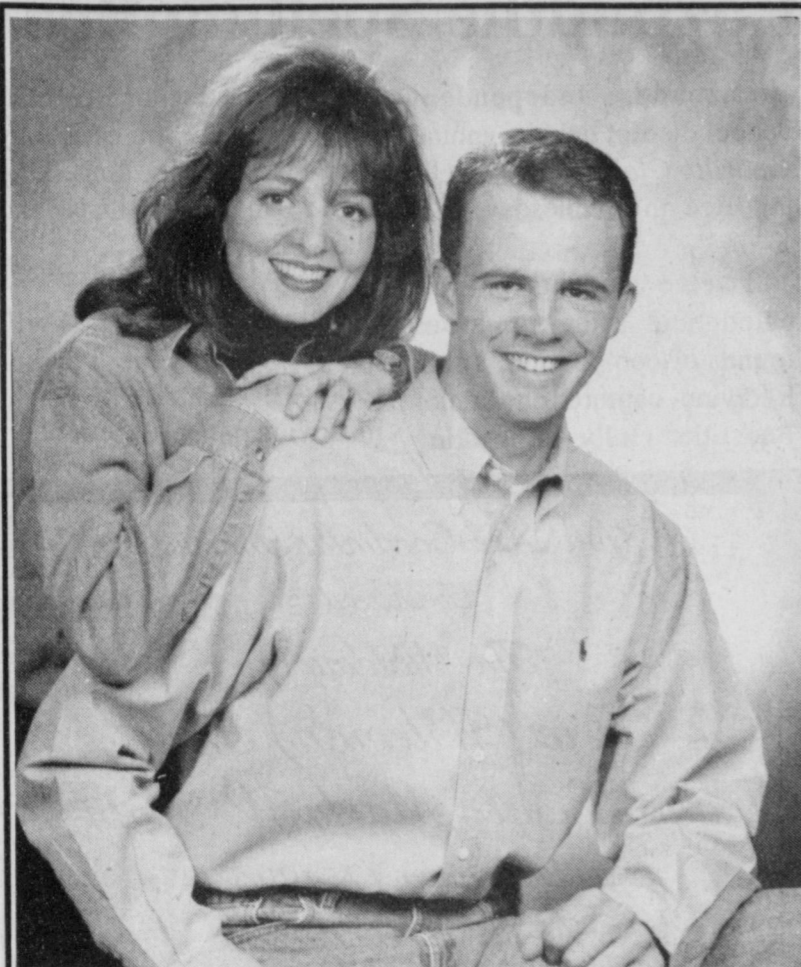

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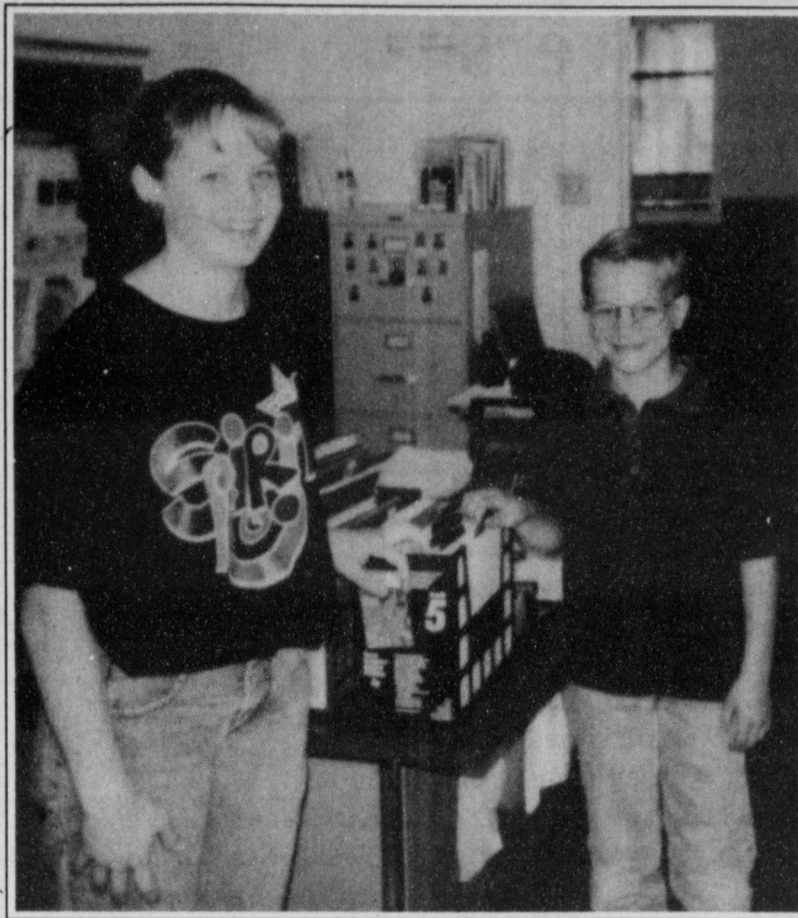

It's probably good for husbands like me to have a deadline to meet that calls for flowers, candy, and overpriced cards. I have difficulty appreciating the Madison Avenue

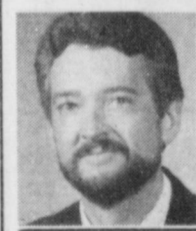
health, for richer, for poorer."

Another thing, when they laid these people off they had to pay overtime at times and how, if they just hired new people at a lower wage, are they saving any money and paying overtime and hiring new people.

I would like the questions answered to the editor of the *Muleshoe Journal* so people will know what happened and why? What do we tell these people? A lot of people here in town and wondering and me, for one, I don't have any answers. Thank you,

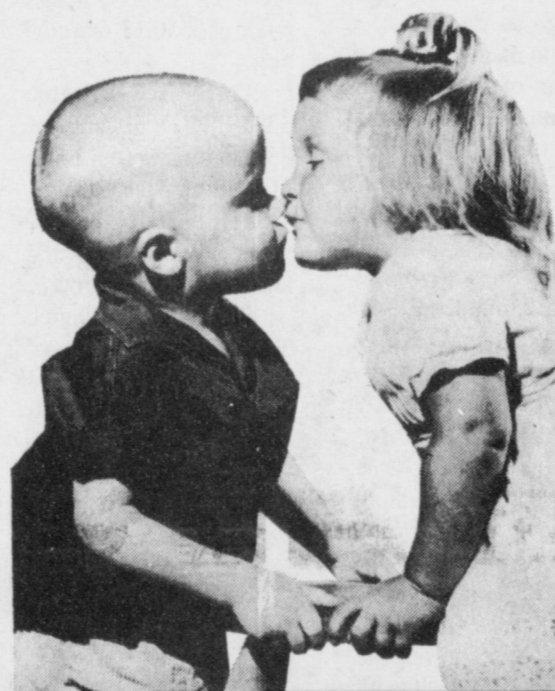

manager. "It will help provide additional service to the Muleshoe area."

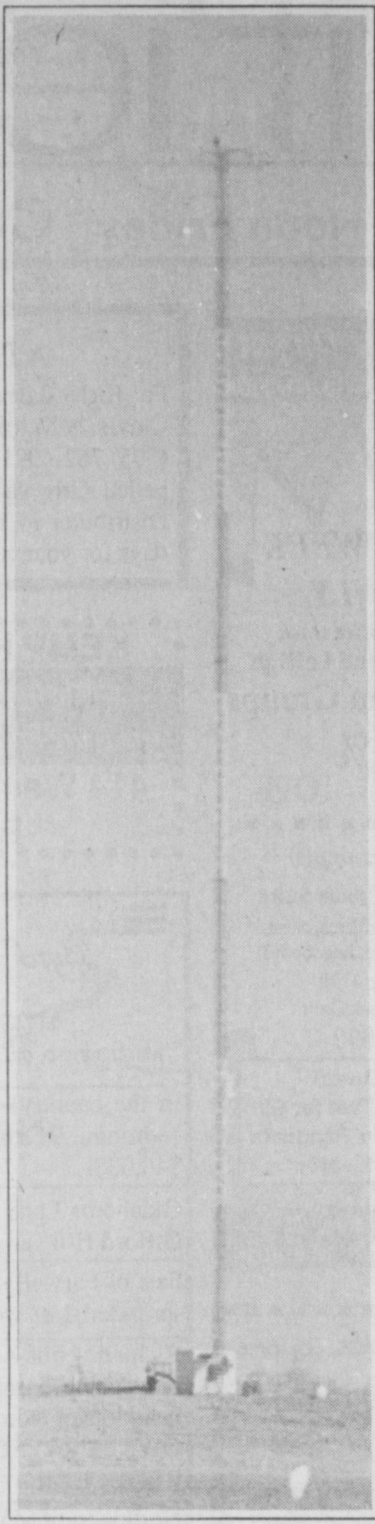
"We just want people to be aware of what this new tower is," Kidd said.

For those individuals who manage to capture, halter and bring a calf into the winner's square, the reward is a \$1,000 purchase certificate. In addition to the winners, two youngsters will be given "hard luck" calf certificates for their efforts.

The calf scramble certifi-

cates, donated by companies and individuals, are used to purchase purebred beef or dairy heifers. These calves are then raised by the winners and will compete in special competition at the Houston Livestock Show the following year.

The yearlong project is closely supervised by a county extension agent or agricultural science teacher.

Additionally, the winners are required to submit financial records, photographs and written reports detailing the animal's progress to both the show and donor.
