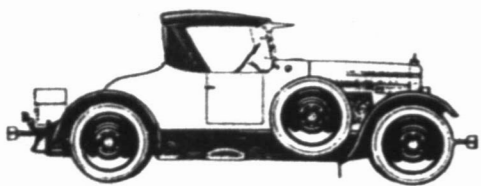

Watch Early Season Cotton

Plant monitoring has become a standard technique used by many top cotton producers in the United States for making effective crop management decisions during the growing season.

The grower wants to produce all the high quality lint and cottonseed possible, and do it on a regular basis. While it's true that every part of the cotton plant has a purpose, there's not much of a market at the gin for stalks, stems and leaves.

Plant monitoring, or mapping, shows you how to coax your cotton plant into getting on with the main job at hand -- manufacturing materials that help you pay the bills.

The first step will be to collect sample plants that represent average conditions throughout the field. Mentally divide each field into four blocks, and pull five typical plants from each block, avoiding the field edges.

A good method is to bring the plants back to your pickup, spread them out on the tailgate or hood, and begin your inspection.

Begin counting nodes (branches) starting at the bottom of the plant and note at which node the plant goes from vegetative (straight) to fruiting (crooked) branches. The cotyledonary scars will be your "zero" point, and the first branch above that will be node number one.

Record the number of main stem nodes with no branches and the number of nodes with vegetative branches only. Continue up the main stem, counting the number of fruiting branches and the number of first position (fruiting sites closest to the main stem) aborts or damaged squares. Since damaged squares invariably shed, include all first-position squares that show injury or insect feeding as aborts.

Then use a tape measure to measure the plant's height from the cotyledonary scars to the terminal of the plant.

After you've done this for all 20 plants, average each number to calculate total nodes per plant, average vegetative branches per plant, average first fruiting node, square retention percentage, and plant height.

What it means
During the first prebloom check, your main concern is going to be where the plant is beginning to square. If your crop is running behind schedule for squaring, you need to find out early enough to do something about it.

In general terms, if you're planting an early-maturing variety, you will want to see first the fruiting branch at node 5 or 6. This varies from one region to another.

If your crop is fruiting late (higher up the mainstem), a plant growth regulator can be effective in causing the plant to start putting on fruit instead of growing more vegetative branches and height.

If you find that the plant is squaring on time but fruiting sites are being lost, you can be fairly certain insects are responsible. Environmental stress such as water deficit or shading usually do not cause fruit to abort until later in the season.

Work in California indicates that the maximum yield, square retention on the first position should be at least 75 percent, with the exception of the bottom fruiting node. Examine fields with square retention less than 75 percent for causes of shed.

Vegetative branches per plant can indicate the potential to grow rank. Low plant densities and skimpy stands increase the number of vegetative branches. Plant conditions that result in slow main-stem leaf growth such as cool temperatures or thrips also increase the number.

Fields with more than two to three vegetative branches per plant should be managed as if they were planted to a higher density because

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Antibiotics Used to Treat Acne

Acne is a skin condition which often occurs in teenagers with the onset of puberty. Acne develops in the area of hair follicles and the adjoining sebaceous glands. These glands produce a mixture of fat and wax called sebum. As androgen (a hormone) levels increase during puberty, so do levels of sebum. High levels of sebum are "fuel" for the development of acne. An organism referred to as *Propionibacterium acnes* that normally lives on the surface of skin begins to multiply in the presence of increased sebum. Antibiotics used in the treatment of acne are directed at decreasing organisms in sebum and reducing inflammation.

One of the continuing debates in acne treatment is whether or not antibiotics applied to the skin are effective in killing organisms present in sebum. Physicians who prescribe topical (creams, gels, and lotions) antibiotics such as erythromycin, clindamycin, and tetracycline attest to the value of such medicines in mild to moderately developed acne. Critics of this approach claim that most antibiotics have poor penetration in the skin. They further claim that antibiotics given orally are much more effective and should always be used in severe cases. According to a recent issue of *Hospital Medicine*, all oral antibiotic therapy for acne should be slowly tapered off before it is discontinued.

Conference Scheduled

Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro will open Waste Wise, a solid waste management conference May 28-29 sponsored by the Texas Agriculture Extension Service at its North Dallas Center.

"Policy makers across the state face the growing problem of how to manage solid waste reduction mandates," said Susan Quiring, chairman of the conference. "Public demand for recycling programs coupled with new regulations of landfills and incineration pose a real challenge for communities everywhere. We have planned to showcase programs that work to decision makers in cities and counties, environmental groups and education."

The conference features leaders of successful waste reduction and management programs from around the country, both private and commercial. The opening sessions focus on local, state and federal regulations plus panels on yard waste and paper and plastic recycling. Jim Lyman will discuss Montgomery County, Ohio's state-of-the-art incineration facility opened in 1991. Other topics to be covered during the conference are medical waste, marketing of recyclables, and household hazardous waste.

Dallas County Judge Lee Jackson will moderate the Friday morning session on Community Programs and Services with W. Woody Raine, who originated Austin's well-known curbside recycling program, Carrollton's Recycling Coordinator Donna Douglas and Joan Walker with the City of Farmers Branch. Pete Lane, Ohio Extension agent, is set to describe how to conduct an amnesty day for waste pesticide disposal.

Concurrent sessions of Friday afternoon include curriculum for youth involvement in waste management and tours of a

landfill and materials recovery facility.

Several legislators serving on environmental committees will moderate panels, including Representatives Keith Oakley, Pete Patterson, Ron Lewis, and State Senator Bill Sims, chairman of the natural resources committee.

Waste Wise opens at 8:30 a.m. Thursday, May 28, at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center, 1736 Coit Road in Dallas and closes at 4 p.m. Friday, May 29. Exhibits include the Recycled House, developed by the Dallas County Extension Service, featuring such household items as a picnic table made from 2,000 recycled milk jugs.

American pharmaceutical companies charge American consumers much more for the exact same drugs they sell in foreign countries at much lower prices. An investigation by the Senate Special Committee on Aging found that in 1989, one hundred 1 mg tablets of Alivan, a commonly prescribed drug, were selling for \$7.18 in Canada, while Americans were being charged \$48.96. One hundred tablets of Tylenol 3 with codeine cost \$5.58 in Canada, while Americans were charged \$18.13. These are just two of the many outrageous overcharges uncovered by the Committee.

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America Salutes Team USA

Sign, Seal and Deliver is America's Olympic involvement program. The Touch the Torch program ignited the flame. Now, Sign, Seal & Deliver will spread the Olympic spirit to our communities. This grass roots program is designed to bring home the Olympic Games to every city and town in the country, bring post offices and communities together to show their support for their team, and bring messages of goodwill

from the American people to the athletes competing in Barcelona. This will be a first-of-its-kind program in Olympic and postal history. Here is a brief description of the program's main components.

U.S. Olympic Spirit Week took place May 11-17. During that week, 28,000 post offices displayed their own pieces of a giant postcard featuring a "best wishes" message for the team. The postcard piece was the focal point during the Olympic Spirit Week activities. For \$1, customers and employees signed the postcard piece. They also received two preaddressed personal postcards, which are replicas of the giant postcard—one to keep as a souvenir and one to use to send personal best wishes to the

team. At the end of the week, the giant postcard pieces were mailed back to Washington D.C. Seventy percent of the proceeds went to the U.S. Olympic Team.

On July 12, the 28,000 pieces of the postcard will come together for form the "world's largest postcard" (larger than three football fields) in America's Salute to Team USA. At this event, the Postmaster General will extend his best wishes to the Olympic athletes preparing to leave for Barcelona while the giant postcard, bearing hundreds of thousands of signatures, will convey the best wishes of Americans.

The Postal Service will deliver the preaddressed postcards

sent by American's to "Any U.S. Olympic Athlete" competing in the Olympic Summer Games. A Team Message Center will be set up in Barcelona, Spain, to distribute the postcards so that every athlete receives best wishes from home each day during the Olympic Games.

Call to Action

Dear Editor

This letter is for all of those people who are upset about the changes made in 8th grade graduation this year and for all future 8th graders who will be affected by the changes. We would just like to set the record straight.

It is true that 8th grade parents wanted to change the morning ceremony to an evening time for the convenience of parents, relatives, and friends who would attend. Therefore, a meeting was held during which options were discussed and a committee selected to present our proposal to the administration. Now it appears that time was not the only change made. Neither the 8th grade class nor their parents wish to be blamed for the other changes which were made by the administration. This is the price we pay for wanting a more convenient

time in order for more people to participate in the recognition of the 8th grade class and their academic achievement.
