Get Cars In Shape For Winter

The Texas Department of Public Safety wants to remind motorists that the winter season is fast approaching and it is once again time to repair our vehicle and especially the driver for one of the most dangerous times ahead, winter driving.

Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander for the Texas Department of Public Safety in Lubbock, said, "Winter driving can be very dangerous. Drivers are faced with many more dangers than they usually have during the rest of the year, such as driving on icy or snow packed highways, freezing temperatures, freezing rain, sleet, all creating dangerous conditions for the driver."

The most important safety tip for driving in the winter time when the streets are sleek is to remember to slow down. Remember, it can easily take from two to three times longer to stop compared to when the roads are dry.

When temperatures drop below the freezing point, drivers must remember to scrap the frost or ice from all windows before driving, to keep your headlight clean from mud and snow, and above all keep plenty of windshield washer anti-freeze mixture in the window washers for those unexpected "splashes" from other cars.

Major Cawthon also stated that when driving during adverse weather conditions to allow plenty of time and to start your trip a little early because there is no way to make up time on the streets and highways. If you are driving a four-wheel drive vehicle, remember you may be able to start off better and the steering may seem better, but it takes just as long to stop a four-wheel drive as it takes to stop a two-wheel drive.

By using a little more caution and more defensive driving, you can make winter driving alot safer.

Application To Be Accepted

Application for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought, freeze, high winds and insect damage which occurred between January 1, 1991 and June 1,, 1991 are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located at 321 Sully, Clarendon.

Gray County was recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans to cover part of the actual production losses resulting from the adverse weather conditions.

Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5%.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30% loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure

in proceeds from these programs in determining there loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until June 22, 1992 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possible over into the new farming season.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognize farmers who work at or rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Clarendon is open from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, and is located at 321 Sully. The telephone number is 806-874-3552.

Lyme Disease: Campers Beware!

According to Dr. Allen Steere, author of a recent article in the journal Modern Medicine, Lyme disease, a condition caused by ticks, can lead to heart, nervous system, and arthritic complications if the disease is not detected and treated during its early stages.

Campers, hikers, and people living in wooded areas should take extra precautions because of the presence of ticks in wooded areas. Lyme disease is caused by a bacteria that lives in ticks. Ticks bite humans and pass on the bacteria that causes Lyme disease. Symptoms of the disease are reported to appear as late as thirty days following the tick bite. The victim may experience red bumps, a bulls-eye rash, flu-like symptoms, fatigue, stiff neck, headache, chills, fever, and/or muscle aches.

If left untreated, Lyme disease often progresses into cycles of arthritic flare-ups. According to health experts, the most effective treatment for Lyme disease is with one of two antibotics, doxycycline or amoxicillin. Prevention of Lyme disease begins with the wearing of protective clothing when camping or when going into wooded areas and the use of an effective tick repellant.

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





ISDN services available with SmartTrunk Service use Primary Rate Interface (PRI) technology. SmartTrunk Service requires PRI ISDN compatible Private Branch Exchange (PBX) customer provided equipment registered under FCC Part 68 Rules. SmarfTrunk Service employs a 1.544 Mbps facility (denoted as SmarfTrunk Interface) typically divided into twenty-three B channels and one D channel. B channels are used for voice and data communications while the D channel provides outof-band signaling.

If approved by the Commission, the rates for each SmartTrunk Interface facility will be \$1,110 per month under a 36-month service contract or \$1,010 per month under a 60-month service contract. The proposed rate for the use of the central office varies from \$12.25 up to \$18.90 per month for each B channel depending on the rate group classification which is determined by the customer's location. Southwestern Bell estimates revenue of \$2.8 million from this offering during the first year.

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
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


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Clarendon Loses To Wellington

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

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

The Champion Committee is proud to announce that they have met and have chosen Carol Lane F.S.S., as the Champion Employee for the months of September and October.


