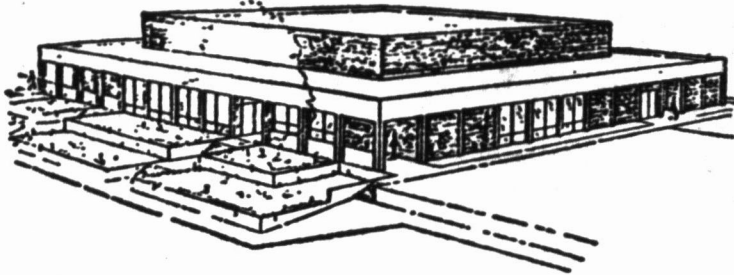

Activity Center Dedication and Open House Set

Dedication and open house of the newly constructed Bairfield Activity Center at Clarendon College in Clarendon will be Sunday, September 29, at 2 p.m. The building, located immediately west of the college gym and overlooking the track facing highway 287, was designed by Huckabee and Donham of Andrews and constructed by Hallmark Builders, Inc. of Amarillo.

The 14,000 square-foot facility, built at a cost of \$850,281, features a game room, snackbar, student bookstore, meeting room, and banquet area, and offices for financial aid and counseling. Dr. Jerry Stockton, President of Clarendon College, said the building fund for the center was initiated by Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Bairfield of Clarendon who wanted to help finance a facility to serve the needs of students and the community.

Members of the Clarendon College Board of Regents invite the public to join the College and the Community for the dedication and open house of the Bairfield Activity Center.

Fiesta Texas Digs Donley County

A new musical theme park in San Antonio sent representatives to Donley County on September 12 to get a sample of Donley County soil to be incorporated into a plaza at the entertainment center.

Actor representing Davy Crockett and Gregorio Esparza described the plans for the new park and assisted Donley County Judge Billie Christel in collecting a soil sample. (Crockett and Esparza were two of the hundred-odd defenders of the Alamo against General Santa Ana.) A number of other county employees, Trey Chamberlain (the local Chevrolet dealer) and members of the press observed the ceremony.

Historical Dedication Set

The First United Methodist Church in Clarendon will receive a distinct honor on Sunday, September 22, 1991.

Mrs. Jane Street, Chairman of Northwest Texas Commission on Archives and History announced this date for the dedication installation of United Methodist Historic Site Marker 257 at the Clarendon UMC, site of the first session of the Northwest Texas Annual Conference. The church building was constructed in 1910 and was barely finished in time for the organizing session of the Northwest Texas Conference. Historical references say that "the carpenters went out one door while the Bishop and Conference delegates came in at the other."

Dr. Robert Monk of McMurray University and a member of the Conference will fill the pulpit during the morning worship hour on the 22nd. Dr. Robert Sledge, President of U.M. Historical Society will be present. Others in attendance will be Mrs. Jane Street of Abilene. Also, Mrs. Ruth Magee of McClean, a member of the Archives and History Activities, under whose guidance, influence and inspiration the marker designation was realized. A complete list of the other dignitaries coming to the event is not available.

Everyone is invited to join with the Clarendon United Methodist Church in the worship service at 11 a.m. and the dedication service immediately following.

Dr. Zell R. SoRelle researched and wrote the document which was submitted to the Commission and Archives and History.

It might be noted that the Clarendon Church is the only UMC in the Panhandle which is entitled to this recognition.

Money to provide for this free service is a result of a fund for energy conservation by the state and federal governments.

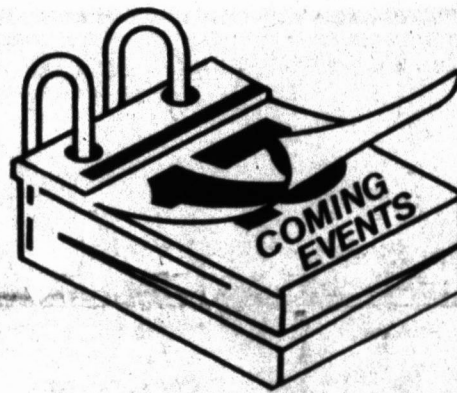
There are some basic qualifications, including one member family income not to exceed \$8,275, and two member family income not to exceed \$11,100.

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Feeling Good About Me

School Receives Gift

Students in the fourth grade at Clarendon Elementary School have received the gift = book entitled "Feeling Good About Me." It is a handsomely bound book of stories about learning traditional values and self-esteem.

"Feeling Good About Me" contains eight stories about realistic problems young people might encounter and how, using traditional values, they are resolved.

Each story has a full-color illustration and teaches such lessons

as right and wrong, appreciation of family, what it means to be a good citizen, living up to one's potential, and why (and how), using traditional values, they are resolved.

In the first story, "A Day With Granddaddy," youn Wendy is mad. The most popular girl in school has invited her to a slumber party but SHE has to go to her grandparents house on the lake, a visit she usually enjoys. During a conversation that takes place as Wendy fishes with Granddad, she learns the relative importance of the party and the visit (her values are put into perspective) and she feels good about herself and visiting her grandparents.

Other stories involve the meaning of friendship, family relationships, respect for others, loyalty and the importance of being your own unique self, lessons not always covered in school curriculums. They reflect positive influences that build a child's self-esteem.

Each story is accompanied by a teacher's guide, which covers discussion starters, lesson objectives, and follow-up applications. The purpose of the lessons is to teach young people good values and encourage discussion of values between children, their parents and other family members in a home setting.

In "Real Heroes," a war game among a dozen boys and girls results in several broken windows at school. At the principal's office, the youngsters learn from an Army veteran that being an American hero isn't something that also happens on a battlefield, but also occurs by being a good citizen, doing whatever they can for their country.

In another story that takes place in a video arcade, Brian and Darrick must weigh the chance to get free games dishonestly against the effects of such action. With the help of a lesson learned from Darrick's dad, honesty wins out.

These beautiful books are made to last and are likely to become keepsake editions for the students. High Blood Pressure and OTC Medicines

According to a recent report, 60% of the medicines Americans have at home are of the over-the-counter (OTC) variety. Anyone who also takes prescription medicines should be aware that some OTCs can affect other medicines and other health problems. In a recent issue of *Postgraduate Medicine*, Dr. John Bradley reviews the effect of four OTC ingredients on high blood pressure control:

Adrenergic Agents: Adrenalin-like ingredients such as *phenylpropanolamine*, *ephedrine*, and *phenylephrine* can increase blood pressure. Of these three, *phenylpropanolamine* is the most commonly used in OTC products. Single, immediate-release doses of phenylpropanolamine should be no greater than 37 mg; sustained-release no greater than 75 mg.

Ibuprofen: In one study, daily doses of less than 1,200 mg of the pain reliever *ibuprofen* did not increase the blood pressure of patients who were taking a prescription blood pressure medicine. Higher doses for more than a few days may elevate blood pressure.

Alcohol: This ingredient occurs in many OTC liquids to dissolve medicines. Doses providing the equivalent of more than two drinks a day are believed to raise blood pressure and should be avoided.

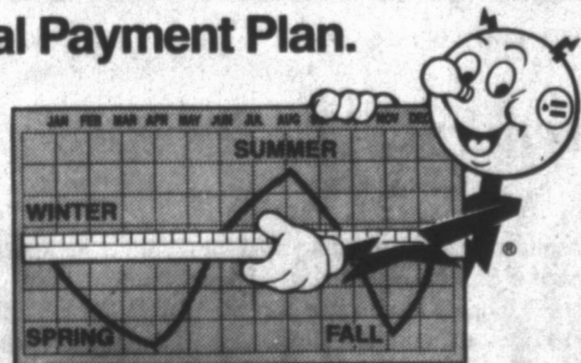

On Wednesday, September 11th, I made another trip to Amarillo to pick up groceries at the Food Bank and we are most grate-

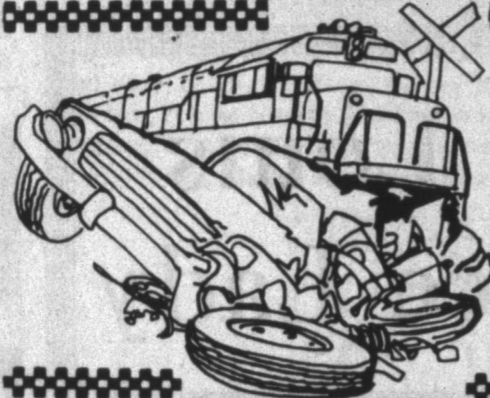

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Public Notice

On June 28, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to add a new optional service offering for business Private Branch Exchange (PBX) Trunk customers called Digital Loop Service. The application has been assigned Docket No. 10461.

Digital Loop Service provides digital transmission of circuit switched voice and data communications between the customer's premises and the central office. This service allows the customer to use a 1.544 Mbps facility capable of delivering up to 24 line terminations. Southwestern Bell will provide Digital Loop Service within the customer's serving central office where facilities are available.

If approved by the Commission, the rates for the Digital Loop Service facilities will be \$445 per month for each digital transmission loop arrangement which provides a capacity of up to 24 line terminations, plus \$3 per month for each line termination and \$9 per month for each channel termination. The proposed rate for the unlimited use of the central office varies from \$12.25 up to \$18.90 per month for each line termination depending on the rate group classification, determined by the customer's location. Southwestern Bell estimates revenue of \$2.1 million from this offering during the first year.

As proposed by Southwestern Bell, customers who currently receive digital loop compatibility through facilities installed under a special construction agreement will have the option to receive their current digital loop arrangements pursuant to the Digital Loop Service Tariff or continue to pay their current charges until they make a change of location or account. Any increase in the number of line terminations to a customer's current digital transmission loop arrangement will be provided pursuant to the proposed Digital Loop Service Tariff; however, the customer will continue to have the option of paying current charges for the existing digital transmission loop capacity. Southwestern Bell's proposal to "grandfather" existing digital loop facility arrangements is subject to review and approval by the Commission.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible, but not later than October 15, 1991. A request to intervene, participate, or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Blvd., Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757. OF PROPOSED
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
SPECIAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 5, 1991

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 114 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize home rule cities having a population of 5,000 or fewer inhabitants to amend their city charters by a majority vote of a city's qualified voters at an election held for that purpose. The amendment makes clear that home rule cities that have declined in population below the population required to initially adopt a charter may nevertheless continue to amend their charters.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing home-rule cities with a population of 5,000 or less to amend their charters by popular vote."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize the Texas Department of Transportation to expend money, from any source available, for the costs of the turnpikes, toll roads, or toll bridges of the Texas Turnpike Authority, provided that any monies expended from the state highway fund shall be repaid to the fund from tolls or other turnpike revenue.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment mandating the repayment to the Department of Transportation of monies expended to assist the Texas Turnpike Authority in the construction, maintenance, and operation of turnpikes, toll roads and toll bridges."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 26 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to invest, as authorized by law, monies of the Veterans' Land Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board, the purchase of lands, or the payment of expenses. Investment of such monies would no longer be restricted to investments in bonds or obligations of the United States. The proposed amendment would also authorize the Veterans' Land Board to invest, as authorized by law, monies of the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on general obligation bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board for the benefit of the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund, the making of home mortgage loans, or the payment of expenses. Investment of such monies would no longer be restricted to investments in bonds or obligations of the United States. The proposed amendment gives the legislature power to implement the amendment and to delegate such duties and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it deems necessary.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to further implement and enhance the administration of the veterans' housing assistance and land programs and to expand the investment authority of the Veterans' Land Board."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize the issuance of a maximum of \$1.1 billion in general obligation bonds. The proceeds of the bonds are to be used to acquire, construct, or equip new prisons and substance abuse felony punishment facilities, mental health and mental retardation

institutions, and youth corrections institutions, to repair and renovate existing facilities of those institutions and to acquire, repair, or renovate other facilities for use as state prisons or substance abuse felony punishment facilities. The \$1.1 billion is in addition to the \$900 million currently authorized by the constitution to be expended on bond issues for facilities of correctional and mental health and mental retardation institutions. The bonds would constitute a general obligation of the state. The bonds and interest on the bonds would be paid from the first money coming into the state treasury that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in a sinking fund at the end of the preceding fiscal year that is pledged to payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$1.1 billion in general obligation bonds for acquiring, constructing, or equipping new prisons or other punishment facilities to confine criminals, mental health and mental retardation institutions, and youth corrections institutions, for major repair or renovation of existing facilities of those institutions, and for the acquisition of, major repair to, or renovation of other facilities for use as state prisons or other punishment facilities."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 39 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow a county, junior college district, or municipality to exempt tangible personal property from ad valorem taxation if: (1) the property is acquired or brought into the state in an enterprise zone to be forwarded outside the state, (2) the property is assembled, stored, repaired, maintained, manufactured, processed, or fabricated in the enterprise zone, (3) the property is transported outside the state not later than 175 days after being acquired or brought into an enterprise zone, and (4) the person who acquired or brought the property into an enterprise zone is a qualified business. A county, junior college district, or municipality may exempt such property by entering into a written agreement with a qualified business that states the duration of the exemption and the terms on which the exemption is granted. Any action to exempt property must be taken before April 1 of the first year in which the property would otherwise be taxed. The term "enterprise zone" means an area that (1) has been designated as such by a state agency responsible for economic development, and (2) has pervasive poverty, unemployment, and economic distress. The term "qualified business" means a business that meets the qualification established by general law, and requires that the qualified business is actively engaged in a new business in the enterprise zone or is expanding a business that is already active in the enterprise zone. An enterprise zone is created to foster economic development in an area of pervasive poverty and unemployment.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the exemption for ad valorem taxes of certain property in an enterprise zone."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 3 proposes a constitutional amendment that would establish a Texas Ethics Commission with the powers and duties provided by law. The commission would consist of eight appointed members selected as follows: two members of different political parties appointed by the governor from a list of at least ten names submitted by the members of the house of representatives from each major political party; two

Agriculture News

Cotton Insect Problem

Cotton farmers are still no out of the woods when it comes to insect problems, although there are many fields that are mature with bottom bolls beginning to open. Bollworm moth nightly trap catches continue to indicate a large number of moths present in the county. Moths continue to lay eggs in cotton, particularly in fields that were late planted that have not matured enough. Producers should be checking these fields to make sure that small boll damage is not occurring. Damage of squares and flowers at this point is not a problem. Also, Boll Weevils continue to increase in trap catches around the county and could become a problem in selected late fields although that is not expected with the light populations of weevils experienced so far.

Overall, Donley County cotton producers do have a good chance to make a good crop if warm weather will hold out through September and part of October.

Free Irrigation Testing

The Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District and the Water Development Board out of Austin, are looking for four or five Donley County producers that might be planning to irrigate wheat in October. Free irrigation efficiency testing will be available for pump and sprinkler testing. Test can be done on pivot irrigation systems as well as side row and row watering systems. Farmers or rancher that might be interested in the free irrigation system testing should contact the Donley County Extension Office, as soon as possible, at 874-2141.

on dissolution, the assets remaining after the discharge of the corporation's indebtedness will be transferred to an entity providing water supply or wastewater service, or both, which is exempt from ad valorem taxation. The transferred assets must be property that is reasonably necessary for and used for water supply and wastewater services.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxes certain property of a nonprofit corporation that supplies water or provides wastewater service."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass laws to authorize the State of Texas to operate lotteries and to enter into a contract with one or more legal entities that will operate lotteries on behalf of the State of Texas.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing a state lottery."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 24 proposes a constitutional amendment that would increase the total amount of bonds that may be issued by the Texas Water Development Board to provide wholesale and retail water and wastewater facilities to economically distressed areas of the state. The proposed amendment increases the maximum principal amount of the bonds from 20 percent to 50 percent of the \$500 million amount authorized by article III, section 49-d-7, of the Texas Constitution. The proposed amendment would increase the maximum aggregate dollar amount of bonds that the Texas Water Development Board could issue from \$100 million to \$250 million.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to increase from 20 percent to 50 percent the percentage of Texas water development bonds previously authorized by Texas voters that may be issued for economically distressed areas."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance education loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interests.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds not to exceed \$300,000,000 to continue existing programs to provide educational loans to students, with repayments of student loans applied toward retirement of the bonds."

Loan And Grant Money Available

The Administrator of Farmer's Home Administration (FMHA), La Verne Ausman, is pleased to announce that Pampa, Texas has been approved as FMHA Eligible Rural Area, and its residents may therefore apply for federal loan and grant money.

Pampa lies in Gray County, and falls under the jurisdiction of Farmers Home Administration's Clarendon office, supervised by

David Grussendorf in Donley County. With a population of 19,959, Pampa would soon have outgrown the limits set by previous federal guidelines as to which cities are eligible for loan and grant making.

The Farmers Home Administration guidelines which cover rural area requirements had called for a community to have a population which exceeds ten thousand but yet does not exceed twenty thousand. Under a new change to the procedure, Farmers Home Administration has been authorized by its administrator to allow aid for populations of up to twenty-five thousand in special circumstances where limited private lending potential is evident.

Social Security News by Jim Talbot

District Manager in Amarillo

I read an item about Social Security in a recent financial column that gave me great concern. It said that many widows experience unnecessary financial hardship because they don't know about the benefits Social Security provides for widows.

This is important to you too if you are a widow and you haven't started receiving Social Security yet, or you know someone in those circumstances. I want to point out that, although I refer only to widows,

the law applies equally to women and men, but widowers represent less than 1 percent of the total number of people who get these kind of Social Security benefits.

The main difference between the benefits payable to widows and those payable to retirees and their spouses is that widows can start getting their Social Security benefits at age 60 rather than age 62. And if a widow is disabled, she can start getting her benefits as early as age 50. A widow can also get Social Security benefits if she is caring for the deceased worker's child who is under age 16 or disabled.

If a widow starts her benefits at age 60, she gets a smaller amount than she would if she waited until age 65. Although generally, the fact that she gets benefits over a longer period of time more than compensates for the reduction.

A widow who has worked under her own Social Security number can choose to take her widows benefits at age 60 and then switch to her own retirement benefits at age 65 if it will give her more money.

A widow who remarries after age 60 can continue to receive her widows benefits. Widows benefits are also available to divorced women if the couple were married at least 10 years.

To apply for widows benefits, you will need your own Social Security number and your husband's. You also need your birth certificate, marriage certificate, and the death certificate. A divorced widow also needs to furnish the divorce decree. If you need help getting any of these documents, you can call our office for information.

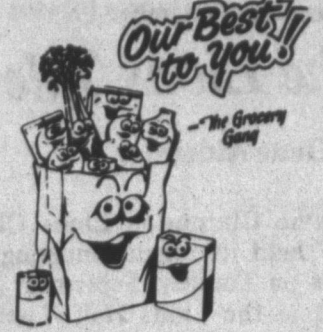

This year marks the 48th annual observance of National Farm Safety Week, co-sponsored by the National Safety Council and the U.S. Department of Agriculture; with the theme, "Safety Protects Agriculture's Greatest Resource...You!"

When you look out your kitchen window and see your land, buildings, machinery and animals, you may smile with justifiable pride. After all, it's your work, determination and management skills that made it possible. But until you look in the mirror, you haven't seen your most important asset by far -- You! Safety will help protect you, your family and employed workers:


- *Protect yourself and others by making safety part of every activity - on the job, at home, at leisure and on the road. Machines are replaceable if damaged or destroyed in an accident. But that's not true for people!
- *Protect by knowing how to prevent farm injuries and illnesses. Read and follow instructions in manuals and on labels. Note safety and health articles in magazines and newspapers. Read booklets on the subject and pay attention to safety reminders on radio/TV. But just knowing isn't enough - you must act on that knowledge to reduce risk of costly injury and illnesses.
- *Protect by inspecting all equipment and facilities for hazards. Then correct them without delay. Learn the proper safety precautions when dealing with hazards that can't be eliminated.
- *Protect by always keeping shields and guards in place, and by stopping machines before servicing or dealing with operating problems. When the job dictates, use the appropriate personal protective equipment - gloves, hard hat, safety shoes, respirator, safety goggles, etc. - to reduce risks to your health and safety.
- *Protect at harvest time by training workers and operating all equipment "by the book". Take breaks to fight fatigue, especially during hot weather. When hauling harvested products or moving equipment on public roads, drive with care and courtesy.
- *Protect by being prepared for each activity. Have the right tools, equipment and/or supplies at hand. Know and respect your limitations as well as your strengths.
- *Protect by staying fit and seeking care for health problems. Take some time to do things you enjoy to refresh and relax you and add balance to life.



D. Lee's Inc. will begin pick-up of Household and Commercial Waste on Saturday morning, October 5, 1991.

1. Residence; \$9.50 per month - \$2.00 Late fee
- COMMERCIAL:
1. First Baptist Church; \$9.50 Per Month - \$2.00 late fee
2. Canteen; \$21.00 per month - \$5.00 late fee
3. Sid Blues; \$30.00 per month - \$5.00 late fee
4. Oasis; \$30.00 per month - \$5.00 late fee
5. City Hall; \$83.00 per month - \$5.00 late fee.
