Texas Economy Gets Mixed Reviews

Material from State Comptroller John Sharp's office gives mixed information on the Texas economy.

In a press release, the Comptroller states, "Local sales tax rebates to Texas cities and counties are running \$123 million or 10.6 percent ahead of total payments this time last year." But at the same time, the same office released a map showing that poverty is

widespread across the state. Sales tax receipts were distorted somewhat by the fact that several counties were collecting new taxes, and many-- perhaps most--counties had raised taxes this year. Counties in oil-producing areas appeared to perform better than others. The statistics reflect September sales which were remitted to Austin in October.

Donely County continued its erratic trend. September was not a particularly good month for the County. Sales were off 8.96 % for the month and off 1.22 %. for the year-to-date. Yet many merchants expect October's report to be much better and November sales to be even better yet.

Clarendon was off 9.37% for the month, but only off 2% on YTD figures. Hedley was off 6.05 for September, but up 3.54 % YTD. Howardwick slipped 5.77 % for the month. but up 6.72 % for the longer period.

Regional statistics were similar. Claude (Armstrong Co.) was off 14.71 and 1.33 %. Briscoe was up 7.45 for the month, but up 0.23 % for 1991. Carson County was up a whopping 11.62 % for the month, but still off 10.81 YTD. Childress operated just the opposite, off 2.15 % for the month, but up 2.09 for the partial year. Then about 6:20 the official moment came, the lights went on, and the season was officially underway. Dan Hall of Calvary Baptist Church led the crowd in singing carols.

Stavenhagen Video, Bivens Pharmacy, The Grocery Store and several other merchants offered free refreshments. Most merchants in town stayed open until late Monday evening. They will also be open Thanksgiving until Christmas.

The event was so successful that the Merchants Association is planning an even larger event for Christmas of 1992.

Notice To Rural Residents

The State of Texas has recently enacted legislation which prohibits the disposal of motor oil and oil filters as part of your normal waste stream. Consequently, the County will no longer be able to collect used motor oil or oil filters as part of your regular service.

Scrap metal dealers have been granted an exemption to this legislation, provided they meet certain criteria. For example, the filter must be drained for a minimum of twenty four hours before it is compacted.

In addition, used motor oil can and should be recycled. Recycling greatly reduces the volume of waste which finds its way into landfills and provides for reuse of vital

Holiday Safety Tips Given

State health officials warn that improperly thawed turkeys and careless food storage are two dangerous mistakes cooks should avoid during the holiday season.

Each year during the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays, several food poisoning outbreaks occur in Texas. They usually can be traced to turkey spoilage.

Barbara Keir, director of the Public Health Nutrition program at the Texas Department of Health (TDH), said that turkey should be thawed in the refrigerator, or under running water (at 70 degrees or below).

"One common mistake is thawing the turkey at room temperature, which allows the surface to warm before the inside meat can thaw. That allows dangerous bacteria to reproduce and cause food poisoning," Keir said.

She added that thawing in a microwave oven is safe only if the food will be immediately cooked. After thawing, the turkey should be rinsed thoroughly and dried, inside

Leftover meat should be cut off the bone and refrigerated. A safety rule is to freeze any portions to be kept beyond two days refrigeration. Stuffing should be stored separately.

Keir suggested the following hints for ensuring against salmonella poisoning, perhaps the most common form of food poisoning in the home.

*Prepare turkey stuffing immediately before cooking. Dry ingredients can be mixed in advance, but eggs, oysters, butter or other moist ingredients should not be added until cooking time.

*Cook the stuffing separately or stuff the bird right before cooking - not the night before.

*When fully cooked, dense portions of the turkey, such as the thighs, should have reached at least 180 degrees Fahrenheit, measured with a meat thermometer. The stuffing should reach at least 165 degrees Fahrenheit.

*Never leave a turkey, the stuffing, or gravy unrefrigerated for more than two hours.

*If the cook uses a microwave oven, the turkey should be rotated to ensure uniform cooking.

*Cooks should wash hands cooking surfaces, utensils and all foods thoroughly and often during food preparations.



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Almost 40 million Americans suffer from one of several forms of arthritis. Osteoarthritis is a gradual wearing away of cartilage, the cushioning substance at the ends of bones. Cartilage loss causes bones to rub together, resulting in joint swelling and pain. Rheumatoid arthritis is a systematic disease that affects the membrane that lines the joints. The inflammation eventually destroys cartilage.

The primary treatment for rheumatoid arthritis pain is with a group of medicines referred to as the nonsteroidal antiinflammatory agents. These medicines can provide rapid relief from pain and joint inflammation. According to a recent report in American Druggist, the most popular nonsteroidal medicines are aspirin, ibuprofen and several prescription-only antiinflammatory drugs including naproxen, diclofenac, flurbiprofen, and piroxicam. These medicines produce their effect by inhibiting the body's production of hormones called prostaglandins.

Response to the nonsteroidal antiinflammatory agents varies from person to person. If dose adjustments are not effective in reducing pain and/or inflammation, different agents often are prescribed. Medicine side effects, which can include stomach, liver, and kidney problems, seem to occur more often in older persons.

College Receives Grant Approval

Clarendon College has received approval for a \$100,000 grant from the Amarillo Area Foundation and the Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation. This grant will provide funds to help construct a Ranch and Feedlot Operations Building.

The new facility is budgeted at \$150.000. To date, \$435,000 is committed to the building campaign by individuals, foundations, and Clarendon College. A balance of \$75,000 is needed to complete the necessary funding for the new

Deadline Nears For SBA Disaster Loan Assistance

An Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) declaration was made in May 1991 affecting agriculture-dependent businesses in several West Texas counties, as a result of agricultural losses due to drought conditions January 1 through December 31, 1990. The counties involved are: Armstrong. Briscoe, Carson, Donley, Gray, Potter, Randall, and Swisher. Walter Fronstin, district director for the Lubbock office of the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA), said today that the deadline for filing applications under that EIDL declaration is December 9, 1991. Eligible businesses seeking loan information or applications may call 1-800-527-7735.

To be eligible for the EDIL loans, a business must have sustained substantial financial losses as a direct result of the declared disaster. Fronstin said, "The loans do not cover physical losses, and farmers and ranchers are not eligible to apply for the EIDL loans. This program is available to

small business conscerns and small agricultural cooperatives without Ti credit available elsewhere, and must be considered samll by SBA's size standards." In addition to the agriculture-dependent businesses, nurseries may also be eligible to apply for the EIDL loans, Fronstin

Fishing Report

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission reports that fishing at Lake Greenbelt is fairly good. 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Read any good books lately? Many of us whose favorite pastime is reading, probably have a tendency to examine the "Best Seller" list before anxiously seeking the next book we plan to read. More will be said in future articles about "Best Sellers" which are available at Burton Memorial Library. However, while visiting the City Librarian, Mary Linn Bills, last week, she used a term, "golden oldies", during our conversation concerning classics and wholesome literature which were written many years ago. The "golden oldies" expression is possibly original with Mary Linn, but with her permission, I'm adopting it into my per-sonal vocabulary because it so amiably describes the books that I'm recommending today.

On a top self, at the back of the library, is a collection of fictitious novels written by Elswyth Thane, wife of Dr. Williams Beebe, a noted naturalist, explorer, and author. Thone has written fiction, non-fiction, and also two plays which might interest drama readers.

In her fiction, Thane writes with a certain charm as she individualizes her characters in a way which seems to make them come alive. I won't attempt to give titles of all her books, but will focus on a series of seven known as the "Williamsburg Novels" which include the elements of emotion, humor, suspense, and light romance set against various historical periods.

Each of the seven individual books provide interest on its own, but historical fiction fan would probably receive more reading satisfaction if the books are read in chronological sequence since the novels involve several generations of the fictitious Sprague, Crabb, Day, and Murray families.

Dawn's Early Light is the first of the Williamsburg Novels, and begins with the arrival of Julian Day in Yorktown, Virginia, from Southampton in 1774. Talented author, Elswyth Thane, creates

marriages, families, and suspenseful events through American Revolutionary years until a smooth transition is made into her second novel, Yankee Stranger. With increasing drama, the same families are involved as the southern belle marries a northern soldier during the Civil War period.

Thane's two following novels are Ever After, beginning with Christmas, 1896, and The Light Heart with 1902 beginning.

The final three in the Williamsburg series are titled Kissing Kin: This Was Tomorrow; and Homing. They fictitiously continue through the years, 1917-1941. The historical background of World War 1 and 2 intermitted with peaceful years contribute to the warmth and is evident through humor and emotion of the characters, and nostalgia to readers who actually experienced those years.

The Williamsburg Novels are only a sample of historical fiction waiting to be discovered in the library. "Golden Oldies" Why not "check it out"?

Changes In American **Families Make A Big** Difference

Significant social, economic and demographic changes in recent years have had a tremendous impact on individuals, families and family life. Families are smaller, more children live with only one parent, more mothers go to work, and more children live in a poverty. Family roles and routines have changed including the tradi-

tional roles and responsibilities of mothers and fathers; and, regardless of income, parents and children spend less time together.

Although these changes are by now familiar, their causes and consequences are still not fully understood. It is clear, however, that these changes have had a profound effect on family roles and relationships. Many of the changes have resulted in negative effects on family life and a decline in quality of life for many children.

Most American children are happy and healthy and grow up in families that are loving and tend diligently to their needs. Nevertheless, there is ample evidence that children are worse off in 1990 than they were twenty years ago. Children are more likely to be poor today and to spend less time with their parents. Infant mortality and low birthweight are unacceptably high; one in five is reported to have a developmental delay, learning disability, or behavioral problem during childhood; and the educationally disadvantaged account for more than one-quarter of all

American students. There is little indication that these negative trends will turn around in the near future. These changes have, over time, resulted in

big differences for families and children. As we look forward to the twenty-first century, the challenge facing us is how to strengthen and provide support to families so that they can better cope with the little changes which result in big differences for individuals.
