
Loans Offered

Historical Artifact Resurrected

Centennial markers which were placed in Texas over 50 years ago are now considered historic "artifacts". The markers were placed by a special Centennial commission which was only in existence about a year or two. Unfortunately, no plans were made for the disposition of the commission's records, and the location of its research files for the markers remains a statewide "unsolved mystery."

In 1938 at the first cemetery in Donley County, a huge monument which was made of grey Llano granite stone was furnished and erected by the Texas Centennial Memorial Commission and was placed by what was then known as Highway 88. At the dedication ceremony Judge J.R. Porter presided as master of ceremonies. Rev. E.D. Landreth, was as pastor of the First Methodist Church at that time, gave the invocation. Mr. D.H. Patrick, the mayor of Clarendon, delivered the dedicatory address which was "declared by all people who heard him to be a masterpiece and worthy of its place in the literature of the Southwest."

This majestic granite marker stood proudly by the old cemetery for almost 30 years. But in 1966 when Greenbelt Dam became a reality, the bodies of the colonists were reinterred at Citizen's Cemetery south of Clarendon but the huge, historic marker was moved by the Highway Department to their storage yard. Then at the request of the Highway Department, the Wallace Monument picked up the marker and stored it in their "bone yard".

In 1990, Jean Stavenhagen, librarian for Clarendon Public Schools, was researching another Project and learned about the existence of the huge stone marker of imperishable Texas granite and wondered what happened to it. Through her intense interest and her persistence she found the monument at Wallace's business. With Jean's encouragement, the Wallace Monument Company carefully and skillfully repaired the monument and in September 1990, the stone was delivered and placed facing west in its unmistakably rightful place in the Old Clarendon Colonists' plot in the Citizen's Cemetery, one mile south of Clarendon.

The Great American Race is coming to Clarendon on June 29. The event is expected to draw in visitors from all over the region. The race features 100 horseless carriages from vintages between 1909 to 1938. All are expected to be spotless and in "like new" condition.


With such a diverse cast of mechanical characters, the object of the race is obviously not to see who can go the fastest. Instead, the drivers compete to see who can make various check points the closest to calculated times. Precision, rather than speed, is what counts.

The cars start from designated points each morning are carefully calculated intervals. Thus the antique autos will arrive in Clarendon over several hours in the afternoon. Clarendon residents will have the opportunity to visit with the drivers at the "pit stop" here. The Clarendon Merchants Association and other volunteers will provide refreshments for the touring drivers.

The race begins in Charleston, South Carolina and ends 4.685 miles later in Costa Mesa, California. Past races have attracted as many as 100,000 people to watch the old cars. Each car is usually followed by a support team carrying oil, spare parts and frequently a motor home.

Pit stops like Clarendon will be ranked by the drivers on the basis of their hospitality. The most hospitable pits stop gets \$5,000. Second place pit stop gets \$3,000 and third gets \$2,000.



Fruit Tree Fertilization By Tim Trimble,

CEA Agriculture

With recent cold temperatures it is likely that fruit trees in Donley County will have one of the smallest crops in several years. Most trees, with the exception of some apple trees, were in full bloom when the latest cold front brought night time temperatures down well below freezing. Normally now is a good time to fertilize fruit trees, but if there is a loss of fruit production for the year, some changes will need to be considered.

Our long standing rule of thumb has been to apply one pound of 13-13-13 or similar fertilizer per year of age. As with all generalities, several precautions are needed. First you should check to see if you will have any fruit set for this year. If not, then cut back by one half the amount of fertilizer for this year to avoid excess growth. Also, if dwarf trees are being grown, the rule should be changed to one pound per inch of trunk diameter. Any time you have trees that show excessive growth and a lack of fruit, then reduce the amount by 25 to 50

When applying fertilizer, spray or spread it evenly under the drip line of the tree, never in piles

Remember that if a little does some good, a lot does not necessarily do better and in most cases does harm, particularly when it comes to fertilizers and pesticides. Comptroller Decries Texas Health Care Costs

According to Texas State Comptroller John Sharp, health care costs have become a bitter pill for Texas families—and businesses—to swallow. "The skyrocketing cost of health care in Texas is akin to a runaway elevator that threatens to fly through the roof," the Comptroller said. "Escalating costs to business to provide health insurance for employees is so serious that many employers view it as the one of the major survival tests of the 1990s."

"The family picture is not rosy either. An analysis by the Comptroller's Office and a national study ... both found that family spending on health care in Texas more than doubled in the last decade, and is likely to double again in the coming decade. We found that a so-called 'typical' Texas family that was insured and earning an average income in 1991 still doled out \$5,349 for health services and supplies. On top of that, the same family's health care bill was augmented by an employer's contribution equaling \$3,693, to bring total spending on health care per family to \$9,042", Sharp said.

That typical Texas family is drawing two paychecks for a combined \$34,000 per year. Family income has gone up 74 percent; health bills rose 128 percent during the period. County, state and federal spending on health care has skyrocketed as well.

Lawn Weed Control

With the unusually wet and warm winter this year, you may have noticed the abundance of weeds in lawns. The most common weeds are Henbit with the little purple flowers, Dandelion with the yellow flowers, Goat's Beard and Oxalis (yellow wood sorrel). The question is what to do about them.

As alternatives are considered most people want to know what can I spray with to take care of the weeds. But many lawn weeds can be controlled by mowing at the proper height, fertilizing adequately and watering sensibly. This will result in a dense, healthy lawn that will minimize weed competition. When chemical control is necessary, homeowners need to keep a few things in mind.

Homeowners need to be concerned about injuries that can be caused by herbicides to trees and shrubs when using chemicals for weed control in turfgrass. Chemicals that pose the greatest threat to trees and shrubs are used for broadleaf weed control such as 2, 4-D, Diacamba, and Atrazine. Do not use chemical weed control on newly seeded lawns until after the lawn has been established and has grown enough to be moved twice.

When using herbicides of feed and weed fertilizer, it is very important to read and follow the instructions on the label; as with any herbicide using it correctly is the key to success.

Inspection Passed

For the second year in a row, Shepard's Nursing Agency passed the Texas Department of Health (TDH) inspection with no deficiencies, according to Susie Wilkinson, executive director. "The state inspects every home health agency every 12 to 15 months," she said. !69If they find deficiencies, they can ask for changes to be made. If they find severe deficiencies, the State can deny the agencies certification. We're really proud of our employees for the outstanding job they're doing, and the survey just confirms that."

Linda Lynn, RN, was the nurse surveyor from the TDH Licensure and Certification Division who came to the agency last week. During her inspection, she visited patients and checked chars, in addition to noting how physicians' orders were followed. She checked materials at all Shepard's Nursing Agency offices, including Pampa, Wheeler, Borger, Amarillo, and Clarendon.

Wilkinson said that the certification is for a period of 12 to 15 months. The certification must be obtained to qualify the agency for Medicare funding, she explained.

Another important part of chemical weed control is knowing the target weed to be controlled. Most homeowners can get good results if they know the difference between broadleaf weeds and grass type weeds. Most of the commonly used lawn herbicides are for broadleaf weeds and will not control grass weeds. Also on occasion a specific herbicide is needed for a


particular weed species to get satis-

Although it is too late to use on most bermudagrass lawns this year, one herbicide that works well for this area before bermudagrass greens up is Glyphosate (Roundup, Ortho Kleenup). Glyphosate is a contact herbicide that will kill most weeds and grasses just by contact. That's why it must be used only prior to bermudagrass greenup and only on bermudagrass greenup and only on bermudagrass lawns. It will not hurt dormant bermudagrass, but will do an excellent job on the early germinating weeds.


There are at least twenty plus herbicides that can be used on lawns for specific weed problems this spring and summer. There is not enough space or time to mention all of them and how to use each one. So for more information on what you should use, contact your local lawn and garden store or call the Donley County Extension Service.





New Strategies Needed for Preventing Risky Behavior Among Teens

Traditional strategies to prevent risky behavior among adolescents, such as simply educating teens about risks and using scare tactics, have been largely ineffective, according to an article published in the March issue of *Texas Medicine*.

New programs designed to prevent drug and alcohol abuse, teen pregnancy, teen suicide and other risky behavior need to focus on improving adolescent's behavioral skills and should involve schools and communities, the authors of the *Texas Medicine* article state. *Texas Medicine* is the official news magazine of the Texas Medical Association.

In their article, Drs. Craig Bushong, John Coverdale and John Battaglia state that standard programs to prevent risky behavior have focused on increasing adolescent's factual knowledge or on enhancing self-esteem and responsible decision making. The authors say "no clear relationship" exists between attitudes and knowledge and subsequent behavior. "Indeed, several studies have clearly shown these approaches are ineffective in changing behavior," they state.

Drs. Bushong and Coverdale work in the Department of Psychiatry at Baylor College of Medicine in houston. Dr. Battaglia is with The University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center in Dallas.

"One popular preventive program that has spent millions of dollars over the past several years without systematic investigation of effectiveness is the well-publicized 'Just Say No' campaign," Bushong, Coverdale and Battaglia write. "Data suggest that programs that use a variety of 'scare tactics are often unsuccessful in influencing behavior."

Psychiatric and behavioral problems have replaced infectious disease as the major cause of illness and death among adolescents. Seventy-five percent of adolescent deaths result from accidents, suicide or homicide. Alcohol and drug abuse remain high and incidents of physical abuse and neglect are increasing. More than 700,000 teen-age girls become pregnant in the U.S. each year, and rates of sexually transmitted disease are increasing.

The authors conclude that more effective prevention strategies may need to focus on social influence and personal and behavior skills. Such prevention programs would make students aware of social influences that encourage problem behavior and teach them specific strategies to refuse those influences.

The Texas Medical Association supports research and training in all aspects of adolescent at Texas medical schools and supports comprehensive health education programs in public schools. The Association also supports legislative efforts to restrict the availability of tobacco products to minors and to ban alcohol and tobacco advertising targeted at youths.

TMA is a professional organization representing 82 percent of the doctors of medicine in Texas and 96 percent of Texas medical students.

Social Security News

Don't confuse Reporting Requirements of Social Security, IRS

Anyone who receives Social Security benefits and who continues to work has to report his or her earnings to two government agencies -- the Social Security Administration (SSA) and the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). Earnings must be reported to IRS for tax purposes and the SSA because they may affect the amount of benefits payable.

"The fact that both SSA and IRS have an April 15 filing date apparently causes some confusion about the need to file both reports," said Jim Talbot, Amarillo Social Security office.

"Sometimes, Social Security beneficiaries think filing an income tax return takes care of the Social Security earnings report requirement," he said. "And while the IRS does share tax return information with SSA, the tax return does not provide all the information that SSA needs."

Many Americans Not Properly Vaccinated

According to the National Council on Patient Information and Education, many Americans are not protected against certain bacterial or viral infections because they have not received appropriate vaccinations. The Council reports that only 70 to 80 percent of preschool children have received all scheduled immunizations. Several thousand adults die each year from complications of *influenza*, a condition that can be prevented with proper immunization. The problem may occur from an inadequate understanding of the need for vaccinations by parents and other adults, or the failure of health care providers to ask family members about vaccinations.

According to a recent issue of *Postgraduate Medicine*, since 1983 the number of cases of *measles* has increased dramatically. The American Academy of Pediatrics is now recommending that children aged 11 to 12 receive another dose of measles vaccine (the first dose is given to infants at 15 months). The Academy further recommends that college students receive the second dose if they received only one dose. Vaccines for *H Influenza type b* can be given to infants as young as two months to prevent bacterial meningitis. High-risk persons such as health workers and IV drug users can prevent hepatitis *B* if they are vaccinated with the hepatitis *B* vaccine series.

A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$5,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$45,000.

Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owned a home on Jan. 1st (and used it as their primary residence on that date) is entitled to a \$5,000 home-stead exemption to lower their school and CED property taxes this year...and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home. (Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)

Are other exemptions available?

If you're disabled—or if you're 65 years old or older—you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the over-65 exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The ceiling does not apply to county or city property taxes, and those entities may offer other exemptions.)

Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 1991, you won't need to reapply for 1992 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home—or if you've moved to a new home—you'll need to file for an exemption for 1992. And if you turned 65 or became disabled during 1991, you need to file for the additional exemptions.

When and where should I file?





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
