elevator that threatens to fly through the roof," the Comptroller said. "Escalating costs to business to provide health insurance for employees is so serious that many employers view it as the one of the major survivaltest

New Strategies Needed for Preventing Risky Behavior Among Teens
$\mathbf{T}_{\text {such as as sim strategies to prevent risky behavior among adolescents, }}^{\text {reating teens about }}$ have been largely ineffective, according to an article published in the March issue of Texas Medicine.
New programs designed to prevent drug and alcohol abuse, teen pregnancy, teen suicide and other risky behavior need to focus on improving adolescent's behavioral skills and should involve schools and com--
munities, the authors of the Texas Medicice article state. Teass Medicine is the official news magazine of the Texas Medical Association.
In their article, Drs. Craig Bushong, John Coverdale and John Battaglia state that standard programs to prevent risky behavior have focused on increasing adolescent's factual knowledggo or on enhancing self-esteem
and responsible decision making The and responsible decision making, The authors say "no clear relationship"
exists between attitudes and knowledge and subsequent behavior "Indeed, several studies have clearly shown these approaches are ineffective in changing behavior," they state.
Drs. Bushong and Coverdale work in the Department of Psychiatry
at Baylor College of Medicieine in houston. Dr. Battaglia is with The University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center in Dallas
"One popular preventive program that has spent millions of dollars over the past severara years without systematic investigation of effectiveness is the well-pubibicized Just Say No campaign,", Bushong, Coverrale and Battagilia write. "Data suggest that programs that use a variety of 'scare
actics are often unsuccessful in influencing behavior") Psychiotric und bessauiu in infuencing behavior.
as the major cause of illness and death among adolescents. Seventy-five percent of adolescent deaths result from accidents, suicide or homicide. Alcohol and drug abuse remain high and dinidents of physical abuse and neglect are increasing. More than 700,000 teen-age girls become pregnan
in the U.S. each year, and rates of sexually transmitted disease are increas
ing. The authors conclude that more effective prevention strategies may need to focus on social influence and perssonal and behavior skills. Such prevention programs would make students aware of social influences tha encourage problem behavior and teach them specific strategies to refuse those influences.

Many Americans Not Properly Vaccinated
According to the National Council on Patient Information and Educa tion, many Americans are not protected against certain bacterial or vira Council reports that only 70 to 80 percent of preschool children have received all scheduled immunizations. Several thousand adults die each year from complications of influenza, a condition that can be prevented with proper immunization. The problem may occur from an inadequate understanding of the need for vaccinations by parents and other adults, or he failure of health care providers to ask family members about vaccina tions.
According to a recent issue of Postgraduate Medicine, since 1983 the number of cases of measles has increased dramatically. The American Academy of Pediatrics is now recommending that children aged 11 to 12
receive another dose of measles vaccine (the first dose is given to infants at 15 months). The Academy further recommends that college students receive the second dose if they received only one dose. Vaccines for $H$
Influenza type $b$ can be given to infants as young as two. Influerza type $e$ can be given to infants as young as two months to prevent
bacterial meningitis. High-risk persons such as health workers and IV drug users can prevent hepatitis $B$ if they are vaccinated with the hepatitis $B$ vaccine series.

## A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

## A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at $\$ 50,000$ and you receive a $\$ 5,000$ homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth $\$ 45,000$.

Who qualifies for an exemption?
Anyone who owned a home on Jan. 1st (and used it as their primary residence on that date) is entitled to a $\$ 5,000$ home stead exemption to lower their school and CED property
taxes this year...and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, taxes this year... and it doesn't matter if your home is a house
condominium or mobile home. (Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)

Are other exemptions available?
If you're disabled-or if you're 65 years old or older-
you are entitled to an additional $\$ 10,000$ school tax
you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the over-6 exemption, you're also entited to a permanent, locked-in
"ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The ceiling does not apply to county or city property taxes, and those entities may offer other exemptions.)

Do I have to apply each year?
No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 1991, you won't need to reapply for 1992 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home-or if you've moved to
a new home-you'll need to file for an exemption for 1992 And if you turned 65 or became disabled during 1991, you need to file for the additional exemptions.

When and where should I file?
Applications should be filed by April 30 at your appraisal
district office. If you need more time, contact us by April 30
