Antihistamines With No Drowsiness
One of the most common wamings pharmacists provide to patients is oo be careful about taking certain medicines during times when staying advising you to exercise caution while driving a car, flying a plane, or working with dangerous equipment because of the tendency of the medicine to cause drowsiness. Antihistamines usually are included in he list of medicines that cause drowsiness. According to a recent article in American Family Physician, 10 to 20 percent of ail persons who take antihistamines experience drowsiness. In some instances, the effect is so severe that it limits the medicine's therapeutic usefulness.

Until recently, all antihistamines available in the United States were hought to cause some degree of drowsiness. Since the mid-1980s, two are teffenadine (Seldane) and astemizole ( Hismanal). Both differ in chemical structure from other antihistamines but are just as effective. Unlike conventional antihistamines, terfenadine and astemizole do not enhance inpairment of psychomotor skills caused by alcohol. They do not impair iven obile ding skills. Because of a long half-life, astemizole can be given once-a-day

Plant mapping at this time of year will help you learn how to interpret your cotton's signals. You
won't waste time, money, inputs and worry trying to keep your plants going when the only cotton you'll harvest has already been made. Since the mapping technique above white bloom" (NAWB), you don't need to remove the plants from the field, although that often will help you do a bet
analyzing the samples. Remember, the white bloom
you see today will be a boll tomorrow, so it can be considered the Aviding line" on your cotton plant. tes are squares, and the terminal silles continue to form new squares, leaves and branches until the plant cuts out.
The late-bloom NAWB mapping samples will tell yo whether really stand a good chance of ever being harvested.

the time in the harvest season When adverse weather threatens or it's late in the season, a lower threshold ( 96 percent mature boll) is acceptable. Early in the harvest
