Havens Wins Gold Medal

Bobbie Havens, daughter of Bob and Connie Havens, captured the gold medal in the 300 hurdles with a time of 45.31, to inch out Panhandle's Angie Ogletree, who had a 45.56. She also brought home a silver (2nd place) medal in the 100 hurdles with a time of 14.90. Number one spot was captured by Latisha Anderson, Coahoma, 14.82.

Bobbie will advance to the State Track Meet in Austin, May 15, and May 16.

Broncos Win Second

The Clarendon Broncos traveled to Abilene, May 1 and May 2, to participate in the Regional Track Meet, where they captured the second place spot. They finished second with 58 points behind Hamlin's 64.

Nathan Lowrie placed in four events and qualified for the state meet in two of them, second in both the long jump (23-0), and 110 hurdles (14.91). He also placed fifth in the triple jump (43-5 1/4, and 300 hurdles (40.20).

Shane Ashcraft won first place in the discus (166-11). Billy Wilson won first place in the triple jump (45-11 1/2), and second place in the high jump (6-6), along with Ron Suiter's third place win in the **200** (22.43), to bring the Broncos to the second place spot.

All the Broncos made a good showing in Regionals. Way to go Guys!

Control Cotton Diseases

With temperatures already above normal for this time of year many farmers are making plans to get cotton planted early. When planting early seedling disease problems can be more prevalent particularly if a cool, wet spell comes through.

Seedling disease is caused by a complex of soil fungi which may occur separately or in combinations. These fungi are Pythium, Fusarium, Rhizoctonia, and Thielaviopsis. Symptoms include decay of the seed before germination, decay of the seedling before emergence, girdling of the emerged seedling at or near the soil

surface, and rotting of root tips. Any one of these fungi or several working together can produce these symptoms.

When disease incidence thins stands enough to cause a replant, several losses are incurred. These include the cost of replanting, heat units (degrees days), soil moisture and the precision planned to integrate all production procedures. Even if stands are not damaged enough to cause replanting there may be some unnoticed losses. When seedling disease fungi girdle a taproot it is seldom regenerated. The plant develops a shallow root system that may not be adequate when midsummer heat dries the upper soils and deeper water can not be utilized.

Several practices reduce losses to seedling disease. These include using rotation, quality seed, timely planting and the use of fungicides. Producers can expect increased disease control as they increase the number of control practices used.

Rotation is the first line of defense against seedling disease, but not always possible because of farm program restraints. In some fields where seedling disease has become a real problem, rotation maybe the only alternative.

Bud married the former Pearl Derrick on April 29, 1942 in Amarillo. They have lived in Clarendon for forty five years.



Eligibility for Compensation

1. You must give written notice to Hall County Hospital and state the name and address of the individual you have contacted. The notice must specify when (date and time) you contacted the physician and must be received by the hospital within 30 days of the contact with the physician. In the event two people give written notice of having contacted the same individual, the credit will be given to the individual who first contacted the physician.

2. The physician must state on the application that you have contacted him/her and verify the date of such contact.

3. When the physician signs a contract to practice at Hall County Clinic, you will receive payment of \$2,000. After the physician has practiced with Hall County Clinic for six months. you will be paid \$3,000. After the completion of one full year of practice by the physician at Hall County Clinic, you will receive the final payment of \$5,000.

Medical Center News


