n Friday, January 31, kid. At 17, a senior at Tascosa High School, his greatest worries were girls, soccer, and college acceptance letters. He had his fingers crossed for Stanford.

On Friday, Kyle Garner was invincible.

"I had to do everything just as quick, as fast as I possibly could," Garner said. "I wanted to go to a good college, get a good job, and do everything I could to be successful."

On Saturday, February 1, all of that felt like another lifetime.

That morning Garner suffered a serious brain hemorrhage as a result of an Arterio-Venous Malformation, a congenital disorder that is not all that rare.

"An AVM is a tangle of vessels attached to an artery that don't go anywhere,' Garner's mother, Carolyn, said. "The walls of those vessels are very thin, and when blood suddenly flows through them, they burst."

The hemorrhage was it." so violent and destroyed so much tissue that the neuro-

surgeon had to remove a large portion of Garner's brain responsible for balance and fine motor skills.

"I had absolutely zero voluntary functions, such as changing my facial expressions, and very few involuntary ones, such as breathing," Garner said.

The shock of the hemorrhage forced Garner into a coma. Mrs. Garner began keeping a journal on day one. Her first entry is simply, "Bleak, dark."

"We simply couldn't think," Mrs. Garner said. "I can't even describe the feeling of heaviness. It was like I was paralyzed; I couldn't move.'

The part of the brain responsible for thought and reasoning and memory were not harmed. If he regained consciousness, Garner would be able to think and reason, but he would be utterly unable to respond to stimulus or communicate in any way - a condition referred to as Locked-in Comatose Syndrome.

Even with the hospital staff painting a very dark picture, Bob and Carolyn Garner kept a very positive outlook for their son.

"I don't think it ever really registered in my mind that Kyle wouldn't be back to normal very soon," Mrs. Garner said, "Everyone thought we were crazy."

Mrs. Garner asked one of the doctors if Kyle would ever snow ski again. Surprised at her question, he replied that he did not think he would ever even sit up on his own.

Garner woke after 50 days in a coma. For the next six months he was in and out of consciousness and unable to communicate except by moving his finger or his evebrows.

"It was incredible," Garner said. "I always hoped I would walk, but I never thought it would happen. I couldn't believe it."

With Garner's physical health improving steadily, he felt it was time to take the next step to becoming independent and fulfill his lifelong dream of attending Stanford University.

"When I went into Stanford, there was no realistic thought that I would ever graduate," Garner

Almost eight months after an injury he was never expected to survive, Garner greeted his father for the first time with a thin, breathy "Hi, Dad."

"The most exciting moment for me was when Bob called from the hospital and said Kyle said hi," Mrs. Garner said. "When I realized he meant that Kyle really spoke, I threw on my sweats and ran to the car and drove as fast as I could to the hospital."

When she got there with tears in her eyes, Mrs. Garner got an even greater surprise. 'When I saw her," Garner

said, "I resolved to form the words that I had been wanting to say for seven months, 'I love you, Mom." It was a day of great celebra-

"I called everyone we knew, every doctor he had ever had, every friend, every family member," Mrs. Garner said.

As Garner's body strengthened, so did his outlook. "I had these grandiose visions

"During graduation the audience was chattering and talking, but when I - Kyle Garner got off my scooter to walk across the stage, there was dead silence," Garner said.

The five minutes it took for Kyle to cross the stage seemed like a lifetime to his mother.

"When he finally got to the other side the whole crowd cheered and yelled," Mrs. Garner said. "It was the hardest thing, but it was the best thing."

Garner went on to get his teaching certificate in Special Education and even began work on his master's degree in Rehabilitation Counseling. He lives on his own in Amarillo and spends almost every weekend with his family on their ranch outside of Clarendon.

Even with all of the success that Garner has had and his remarkable positive attitude, it is difficult to overlook all of the things that are forever lost.

"I thought about it once for about an hour. It was not a good hour," Garner said. "If you dwell on the things you have lost, it can be very depressing. Nothing good See 'Get Back Up' on page 3.



Judge throws Boy Scouts out of camp

The ad infinitum attacks by radical liberals on the Boy Scouts of America continued last month with the decision of a federal judge in California to kick the evildoers in khaki shirts out of a city park.

US District Judge Napoleon Jones, Jr., said in a ruling released July 31 that the Boy Scouts' lease on land in San Diego's Balboa Park is unconstitutional because the Boy Scouts of America is a "religious organization." Supposedly, the lease violates the "separation of church and state" clause of the United States Constitution.

Belief in God is and always has been central to BSA's principles and purposes," Jones wrote, according to the San Diego Union-Tribune. "Adult leaders are expected to reinforce in Scouts the values of duty to God and reverence."

That's absolutely true, and no one can deny it. The Boy Scouts does require a belief in God and reinforces a strict moral code embodied in the Scout Oath and Scout Law. However, the BSA does not in any way teach discrimination, and it does not make any requirements as to what religion its members should adhere to. To classify the Boy Scouts as a religion is simply ridiculous.

In San Diego, the Boy Scouts have had a 50-year lease on an 18-acre camp that was specifically donated to that city for use by the Scouts. The Scouts have used the land in question since 1920. That tradition means nothing to the American Civil Liberties Union and its attorneys, however.

"We believe it is long past time for the City Council to end its affiliation with this discriminatory organization and to keep open this public park land for the use of all citizens of San Diego on a fair and equal basis and not just those citizens preferred by the Boy Scouts," the ACLU's Jordan Budd said.

But the city and the Boy Scouts retort that the Scouts have made multi-million dollar improvements to the camp over the last several decades and that other groups are allowed to use the camp. The Desert Pacific Council of the BSA says it paid to construct the camp, "building nine camp sites, bringing water and power to the property, and building a swimming pool, parking lot, restroom and showers, meeting rooms, and a residence and office for a camp ranger."

In fact, in extending the lease on the camp last December, the BSA agreed to make \$1.7 million in improvements at the camp over the next seven years and to pay the city an administrative fee of \$2,500 per

The case against the Scouts was brought by a lesbian couple and an agnostic couple, and the ruling comes just three years after the United States Supreme Court found that the Boy Scouts of America does have the right to exclude homosexuals and atheists from its

ACLU spokesmen have said the whole issue in San Diego could be resolved if the Boy Scouts would change its policies. But that's not going to happen because while very few people and even fewer organizations actually still stand for something, the Boy Scouts of America does.

The problem in this case is not with the Scouts and their rock-solid values, but it is rather with the radical liberals and more specifically with radical leftist jurists such as the dishonorable Judge Jones, who was appointed by impeached president Billy Jeff Clinton.

Jones and his ilk have contempt for the traditional organizations such as the Scouts, and more importantly they have contempt for the US Constitution itself.

Nowhere in the Constitution does the phrase "separation of church and state" ever appear. The First Amendment only bans laws "respecting an establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof," and it was designed by the Founding Fathers to prevent the creation of a state religion - such as the Church of England. In plain terms, it means the government cannot require us all to be Baptists or Methodists or Muslims or Hindus, but it can't keep us from being one of those either.

These judges who use "separation of church and state" as the basis of rulings against the Ten Commandments, the Pledge of Allegiance, and the Boy Scouts are deliberately misinterpreting the Constitution to further their own political and social agendas.

The proper response to cases like the one in California is for the Legislative Branch to impeach and convict the jurists who are abusing their authority. Under the concept of a balance of powers, the Congress should step in whenever the Judicial Branch steps out of line, but it is unlikely that our present Congress will take any positive action in this respect. The Republicans are so inept at exercising power that they can't confirm any new judges, much less remove

The Boy Scouts and the City of San Diego will likely prevail if they appeal their case all the way to the nation's High Court, but it is unfortunate that they will have to waste tens of thousands of dollars from donors and taxpayers defending their rights in a frivolous case brought by two lesbians, two agnostics, and

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

Donations of blood can save many lives

In today's fast-paced world, it's easy and it's likely that to become absorbed in life's daily routine. ing the requirements and procedures for donating blood will make the process easier and more efficient. Blood donors need to weigh a minimum of 110 pounds. be at least 17 years old, not have donated blood in the last 56 days, and be in general good health with no recent major wounds.

Anyone donating for the first time can expect to spend approximately one hour at the blood drive where they will receive a mini-health check, which includes the taking of their temperature and blood pressure as well as measuring iron levels. Donors are encouraged to eat prior to giving blood.

Blood donors will also be asked about

past and present health and lifestyles. All health histories are kept confidential, and donations are collected with the utmost concern for the health and safety of the donor and recipient. According to the American Red Cross,

Reader says paving plan isn't fair to all

We have been watching and waiting for three years to see what the city is going to do for the streets that have been in desperate need of repair.

Now that the attention has been focused in this area, it seems that this is totally unfair to be taxing everyone for the water and the property tax when everyone is not going to get the benefit of having their streets repaired.

When we moved to Clarendon three years ago, we tried doing our fair share of keeping the property on our street maintained. When the large rain came and washed the street away, we never said anything to the city about grading our road in front of our house to make it smoother to drive on, and it took the city six months to get that job done.

Since we have moved here, my husband has been mowing the city's part of the streets with his own tractor and bushhog to keep the weeds down in our neighborhood. Since my husband's health has worsened, I had to call the city administrator to ask him to have someone come and do the job

We are property owners and in total support of having a great city. But taxing everyone for just a few benefiting is totally not fair. Montgomery Street (west) and Barcus Streets from Ellerbee to Parks Street also needs to be included in this proposal. With these two streets on the hill it will not keep the pavement from washing

With our taxes being \$1,200 a year and with this new proposal it will raise the rate to \$1,300, and our water bill will go up to at least \$60 a month. We would just like to see what we are getting for our tax

Editor's Note: I drove over the streets you are talking about this week, and you are absolutely correct. They do need to be paved; and in the city's first draft of the Master Plan, they would have been. In fact, that draft would have paved an estimated 95 percent of the town. Unfortunately,

that plan carried a \$4.9 million price tag, and the aldermen felt they had to back off and look at a more affordable \$2.5 million

I can empathize with your statement about the unfairness of taxes. I personally pay a lot of money in tax to Clarendon ISD, but I have no kids in school. I live in the city, but I pay taxes to support rural roads in the county. Why should I have to pay for that which I don't use?

If we want to have a thriving and attractive community, then we all have to do our part as the city administrator said this week. We need a good educational system, so we pay the tax to the school and the college. We pay other local taxes and fees to fund other local services. And if we want good streets, we will all have to pay for them as well.

Many streets are not in this plan; but I believe that if this plan is accomplished, other streets will follow in the future. It may take three years - or five or ten or more - but our goal should be to see all the streets done. This plan is the first big step.



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
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TTU to open new course

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

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

The City Council of the City of Clarendon has called an election for the issuance of \$2,500,000 Certificates of Obligation. The proceeds from these Certificates will be used to make street improvements throughout the City.

How will the Certificate proceeds be used?

If the Certificates are approved by the voters, proceeds will be used to make the following improvements throughout the City:

The project includes but is not limited to crowning of streets, laying down two-course penetration paving, and installing curbs and gutters. The plan calls for six-inch curbs and two-foot gutters on both sides of the streets. The streets will be 31 feet wide measuring from the backs of the curbs. Streets to be paved are as follows:

What will the Certificates cost the citizens of Clarendon?

In order to pay for the Certificates, the ad valorem tax rate would be increased by 15 cents. In addition, the sewer rate would increase by \$10 per month, the base water rate would increase by \$1.10 per month, and the City would use a portion of the sales tax to make payments. All rates are proposed. Final rates will depend on the interest rate for the Certificates and be subject to the approval of the Board of Aldermen.
