FmHA Accepting Applications

"Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by droughts, freeze, tornado and hail between January 1, 1991 and June 6, 1991, and continuing, are now being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Clarendon," FmHA County Supervisor Jacqueline Morgan said today.

Armstrong, Donley and Gray Counties are three of twenty-six in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought, freeze, tornado and hail.

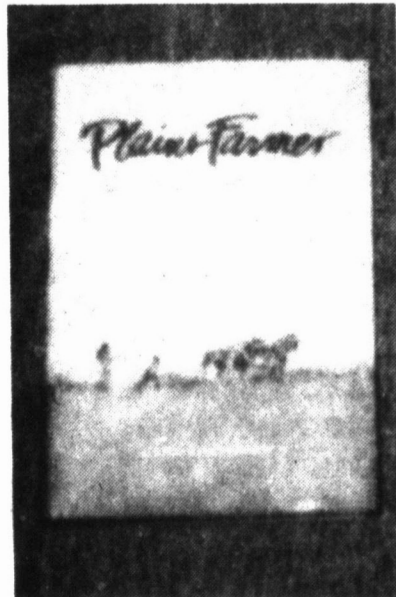
Ms. Morgan said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Morgan said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until August 10, 1992 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Morgan said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens, and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Clarendon is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Burglar Hits Hedley Bank

Hedley started the year with excitement. Some one tried to make an unauthorized withdrawal early in the morning of January 1.

About 10:30 p.m. on January 1, something set off the alarm in the Community State Bank of Hedley, Texas. The security company notified Ethelyn Grady, dispatcher at the Sheriff's office. DPS officer Dan Hawthorne, who was in the vicinity, responded to the alarm almost immediately.

Hawthorne found the glass door on the south side of the bank was broken in. He stayed at the scene awaiting the arrival of other officers.

While Hawthorne waited, a young male in blue jeans and a blue jean jacket broke the glass in the front door and fled with the officer in pursuit. In the heavy darkness, the suspect eluded the officer.

Law enforcement officers then sealed off the community of Hedley. They mobilized the Hedley Volunteer Fire Department, to join Constable Blackie Johnson. The Hall County sheriff's department sent deputies, Estelline sent a city policeman and Faylon Watson, security officer for Lake Greenbelt responded to the call. They were quickly joined by Gary Hunt, of the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife, Gary Henderson, Texas Ranger from Pampa, and Doug Wright investigator for the District Attorney's office. (Claude also dispatched lawmen, but they did not arrive until later.) The Donley County Sheriff's Department sent deputies Jake Longan, Charles Blackburn and Butch Blackburn, as well as reserve deputies Larry Taylor, Kelly Hill and Mike Spier.

Within a half hour of the alarm, Sheriff Jimmy Thompson and Constable Blackie Johnson apprehended the suspect as he fled west on Railroad Street in Hedley.

At the time he was apprehended, the suspect was bleeding from cuts he suffered when he ran through the glass of the front door of the bank. Phil Vargas, EMS Technician, administered first aid for cuts on the face and hands, before deputies Shadle and Spier carried the suspect to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo. The young man was in the Clarendon jail by 11:00 p.m. He was arraigned by Justice of the Peace Ann Kennedy in Hedley on charges of burglary of a building. Bond was set at \$100,000.

The fugitive turned out to be Jaime Avalos, 20, of Pampa, Texas. He took \$12 from the bank and a pocket-full of candy. He is charged with a Second Degree Felony punishable with 2 to 20 years in prison and/or a fine not to exceed \$10,000.

A Plains Farmer Tells His Story

In 1914 William G. DeLoach started a diary. He continued that diary for fifty years, recording the day-to-day events of life on a farm on the Plains of the Texas Panhandle. His was an extraordinary account of an ordinary life, yet fascinating nonetheless.

In DeLoach's lifetime life on the Plains changed. Farm families in 1914 were isolated. By 1964 they were as much in contact with world events as anyone else. Gradually newspapers, automobiles, rural mail carriers, telephones, rural electrification, radios, and television sets brought the world to the farmhouse.

In 1914 farming was a labor-intensive occupation. Horses or mules still furnished most of the motive power, and plowing the south 40 required miles and miles of walking behind a single plowshare. By 1964, Diesel engines had replaced horse muscle and farming was mechanized. Irrigation reduced some of the uncertainty of raising crops, but increased the capital requirements of farming.

Such trends do not sound particularly exciting when described in impersonal terms, but in the context of individual experience, they are the triumphs and failures that make life interesting.

DeLoach was a likable man. He confided to his diary what he felt was important each day. His diary is interesting because the man was interested and interesting. He raised a family and recorded the joys and problems a family brings. DeLoach was active in his community and church and commented on the opportunities and problems as they arose.

DeLoach left his diary to The Southwest Collection at Texas Tech University. Janet M. Neugebauer edited it and added explanatory notes. Texas A&M University Press published the work in late 1991.

Computer Course Offered

This is an excellent course for adults who have never used a computer and would like to learn enough to remove the fear of using a computer. This is not a hands-on type of class; however, computers will be used some during classtime to demonstrate different types of programs available.

Other specific courses in using different programs, such as DOS, WordPerfect, and Lotus will be offered later in the semester for adult vocational or college credit.

You may register for the class early or you may register between 5:00 and 6:00 on Thursday, January 9, before the first class begins.



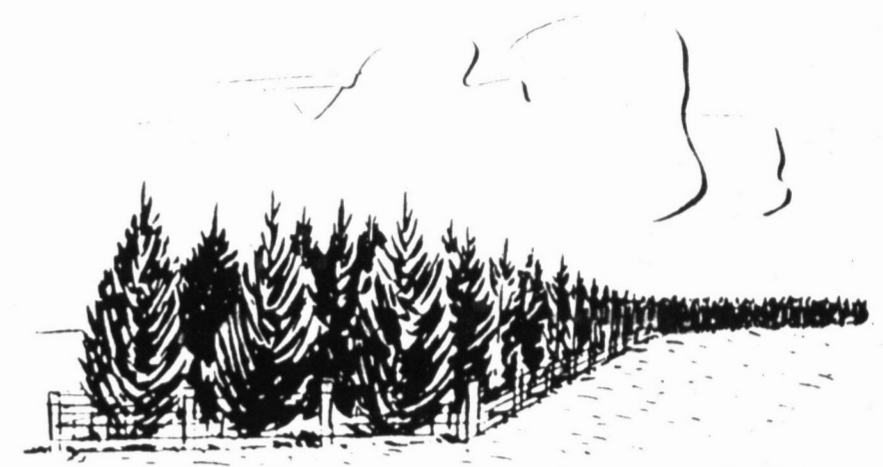

Medicare Costs Increase

The "out of pocket" costs that Medicare beneficiaries pay for Medicare coverage are scheduled to increase as of January 1, 1992, according to Jim Talbot, Social Security manager in Amarillo. The basic medical insurance premium sometimes called "Part B" will increase by \$1.90 from \$29.90 to \$31.80. However, the \$100.00 Medicare medical insurance deductible will remain unchanged, Talbot said.

Food Preserver Recalled

The U. S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) in cooperation with Micro-Dome of San Ramon, CA, warned consumers of certain hazards associated with the use of the "Micro-Dome Food Preserver" manufactured by Micro-Dome and sold and distributed to consumers after August 1987.

The CPSC urges consumers to destroy all food that has been preserved using a Micro-Dome Food Preserver, and to call 1-800-736-2330 for instructions on how to receive a \$50.00 rebate for returning the food preserver.

The Micro-Dome Food Preserver is used in microwave ovens to preserve fruits, vegetables and prepared dishes. The appliance is a plastic container that can process one standard metal lidded canning jar at a time. Generally priced at \$50.00, approximately 18,600 units were sold to consumers.

Micro-Dome informed the Commission that the top of the plastic container may blow off in the microwave if the vent stem or safety release becomes plugged. The pressurized plastic container may also explode during or after removal from the microwave, or if the container is hit or dropped. Furthermore, the plastic container may also crack and/or develop lines (called crazing) that could increase the risk of explosion. Explosion of a pressurized Micro-Dome containing hot water and food could cause severe injuries such as blind-

ness and burns from flying fragments and liquids.

Micro-Dome reported twenty-nine incidents involving the cracking and/or crazing of the plastic container, eight incidents of the top blowing off, and four incidents of the vent being plugged without the blow plug releasing. One injury was reported involving a user who sustained burns when the top of the container blew off. The CPSC recommends that consumers not use the Micro-Dome Food Preserver. It should be returned to Micro-Dome for the rebate or destroyed and disposed of in such a manner that it cannot be used in the future.

CPSC is also concerned about possible food poisoning in certain foods prepared using the Micro-Dome Microwave Food Preserver. While CPSC is unaware of any incidents of food poisoning, it is concerned that the product and its accompanying recipe and instruction booklet do not adequately ensure the safety of certain canned foods. In addition to possibly failing to kill bacteria while the food in the Micro-Dome is cooked in a microwave oven, food also can be contaminated after cooking. Eating improperly preserved food can cause serious illness such as botulism. The toxin which causes botulism is the most potent natural poison in the world. Even one taste could be fatal.

The Food Safety and Inspection Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has warned that the Micro-Dome needs more extensive testing. There are some problems. According to University of California researchers the Micro-Dome canning process was not successful. Bacteria survived. Micro-Dome denies there is a food poisoning problem.


The U. S. Consumer Product Safety Commission is announcing this warning as part of its mission to protect the public from unreasonable risks of injury and death associated with consumer products. The commission's objective is to reduce the estimated 28.5 million injuries and 21,600 deaths associated each year with the 15,000 different types of consumer products under the CPSC's jurisdiction.

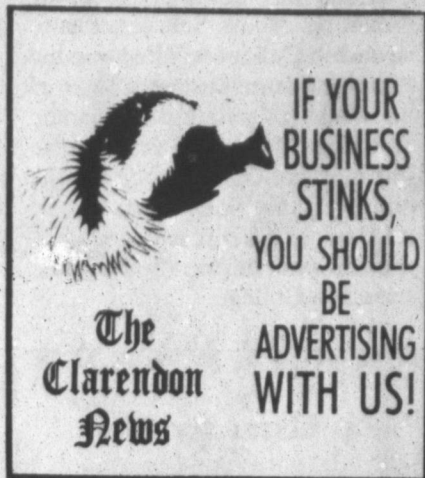

Scabies: "The Itch"

Scabies, sometimes referred to as "the itch," is caused by *sarcoptes scabiei*, a small mite that burrows under the skin of its victims. Bumps that occur on the skin may be white or grey. Burrowing by the female mite often produces a zigzag, thread-like channel under the skin's surface.

The primary symptom of scabies is intense itching which may be worse at night. Itching can be so severe as to lead to loss of skin and infection. According to a report in the journal *American Pharmacy*, the patient typically will be infested with 11 adult female mites. Areas of the body most often attacked are the soft, warm tissues such as between the fingers, on the wrists, in elbow creases, under armpits and breasts, and on the abdomen, groin, and buttocks.

Treatment of scabies is directed toward entire families since the mite is easily transferred from one person to another. The most commonly used topical scabies medicines contain *lindane* and *permethrin*. When applied topically, lindane (cream, lotion, or shampoo) attacks the central nervous system of the scabies mite. Permethrin is a newer type of medicine that acts on mite nerve cell membranes to cause paralysis. Two other medicines that have been used for years to treat scabies are *sulfur* and *benzyl benzoate*.

How To Avoid SSI Overpayments

If you receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments, you should tell Social Security whenever there's a change in your resources, income, or living arrangements. That way, we can be sure you get the right amount in your check each month, and you can avoid the hardship of paying back overpayments.

Too often, people receiving SSI forget to tell us about a change that should be reported. As a result they could end up being overpaid. This is because the amount of their SSI payment is based on their income and resources at the time they are first determined eligible. Any change that affects their income or resources may affect the amount to which they are entitled. If payment is not adjusted to reflect the change, an overpayment may result.

Since the law requires the Social Security Administration to recover the overpayment, the money is usually withheld from future checks, often resulting in a hardship.

You can avoid overpayments and their recovery by promptly telling us about any change. When you start receiving SSI, you received a booklet called, *When You Get SSI...What You Need to Know*. That booklet details all the things that must be reported. If you've lost your copy, you can call us and get a new one--free of charge. It's a good idea to keep the booklet in a safe place and look at it from time to time to help remind you about what should be reported.

Examples of changes that commonly cause overpayments when not reported are listed below. If you receive SSI, be sure to tell us if:

- * you have an increase in resources--the things you own, such as cash, checking or savings accounts, stocks, bonds, and certificates of deposit;
- * you go to work or have an increase in income;
- * you get help with your living expenses;
- * you enter a hospital or other institution;
- * you plan to leave the United States;
- * you move or someone moves into or out of your home;
- * someone who lives with you dies;
- * you or someone who lives with you has a baby, changes school attendance, or gets married, widowed, divorced, or separated;
- * your health improves while you're receiving benefits because of disability or blindness.

It's easy to report a change. Just call Social Security at 1-800-772-1213. You should report the change within 10 days after the month it happens. But remember, the sooner you report the change, the sooner Social Security can correct your check.

Avoid overpayments--report changes right away!

Farm Disaster Aid Approved

The ASC Office has recently received notification of a \$1.75 billion disaster assistance bill passed by Congress and expected to be signed by the President, that will provide disaster payments for those farmers who suffered losses in 1990 or 1991. Details are sketchy at this time, but it appears that producers will be given the option to apply for a disaster payment on 1990 or 1991 crops by farm. Sign-up dates will be announced at a later time and all disaster payments will be subject to a reduction by a national factor.

1991 Crop Loans

1991 wheat loans will continue to be available for eligible producers through March 31, 1992.

1991 Feed Grain and Cotton loans are available for eligible producers through May 31, 1992.

Conservation Program Funds Available

Donley County now has funds if you want to come in and make an application for cost-sharing. Remember not to start the practice until your application is approved and you are notified by the ASCS Office. \$3,500 is the maximum amount a person can receive in a fiscal year.

Compliance Plans

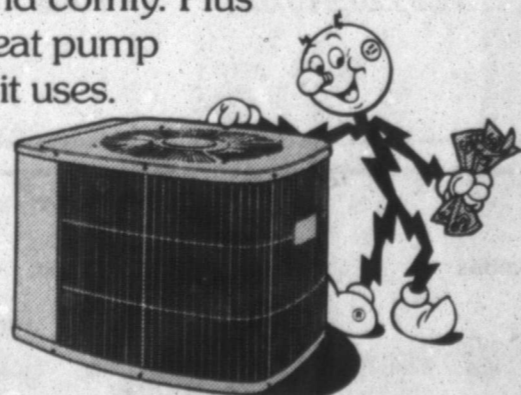

With busy holidays over and things setting back to a normal routine, how about using some of that spare time at the beginning of this New Year to discover the "Texas Connection" of more than six hundred books at Burton Memorial Library?

Biographies, Catalogs, Photographs, documents, ghost towns origins, personal experiences, cowboy songs and poetry, and histories of ranches, courthouses, early homes, and Texas fiction are only sampling of the variety of Texas heritage records that exist for the interested readers.

Several of the next "Check It Out" columns in future Clarendon Press editions will be devoted to the treasure of the information that is offered in these Texas writings.

In the remainder of today's article, I am mentioning only one book, no doubt, holds more interest for many members of our community than possibly any other book in the City Library. Some citizens may not be aware that is available to be checked out and enjoyed during one's leisure reading time. I am referring to *Make Me A Cowboy Again For A Day* written by one of Clarendon's authors, Oscar Fred Russell.




