Peanuts Look Good

As the 1991 peanut harvest begins in Donley County, producers are optimistic about a good crop. The good rains throughout the growing season account for the good reports on most farms. There have been some report of disease and some farmers have had to spray. In 1990, local ASCS records show a county average yield of 2200 lb. per acre.

Drew Thornberry, County Executive Director of the local ASCS office, reports that they have a total of 3910.3 acres planted this year; 3045.8 of which are irrigated. Donley county producers raise Virginia, Valencia, Spanish and Runners. These farmers have quota peanuts plus additional peanuts. The additionals are raised under contract for exporting and crush-

Dude Ranch Officially Opens

The Bar-H-Dude Ranch, owned and operated by the Hommel family of Clarendon, was officially opened October 8, 1991, with a morning breakfast being served to a huge crowd, followed by the ribbon cutting. The Amarillo Chamber of Commerce provided the huge scissors that were used to cut the ribbon. Numerous members of the news media, representatives of area Chamber of Commerce, Clarendon's Mayor, Jim Sharrar, along with other dignitaries attended.

Five generations of the Hommel family have enjoyed the atmosphere of the ranch, and decided that if they enjoyed it so much, that they would share it with others. Frank and Gladys Hommel were married in October of 1923, and moved to Clarendon in 1925, when Frank and his brother Ollie went into partnerships to open a service station and garage.

The Clarendon News reported the story December 13, 1934:In 1925, Frank and W.O. Hommel formed a partnership and established their garage one door north of the City Gas Company. After operating two years in that building, they moved to the Lott Building on the West side of Kearney in the center block and remained there five years. For the past three years, this garage has had its location on the South corner of the center block and East side of Kearney. The Hommel brothers purchased the garage owned by Walter Butler when they went into business. Sinclair products are sold in this two driveway fifty foot front garage and service station.

Frank Hommel was born at Bellvue and attended school in Bellvue and Alanreed. He was married at El Reno, Oklahoma, in 1923, and Frankie, Geraldine, Chauncey, and Louise Marie are the names of his children.

Factory Ready for Christmas

Prairie Cottage Candy Company is getting ready for a big Christmas season. The company anticipates the largest season ever.

Ruby Donaho, owner of the company, said recently "Our candy is sold all over the Southwest." It is distributed through two of the largest food distributors in the region: McCarty Hull and Affiliated Foods (687 stores). The factory's candy can be found in Thriftway food stores, Allsup's convenience stores and several other chains. Prairie Cottage also sell direct, including over-thecounter at the factory at 116 S.

Public Notice

On July 1, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas that proposes to maraph 3.4(G) from Section 3 of Southwestern Bell's intrastate Access Service Tariff, which concerns credits where a customer uses Switched Access Service to furnish a service which has been defined to be an exchange service. The application was med Docket No. 10463.

Because Southwestern Bell is not aware of any customers who presently use switched access service to furnish an exchange service, Southwestern Bell does not believe its revenues will be affected. However, certain interexchange carrier customers of switched access service have made claims under the aforementioned tariff. Such customers, but only to the extent they provide thange service using switched access, would be application. Based on claims made for credits (assuming such credits were allowable), Southwestern Bell's revenues would be affected by no more than \$1,168,962 annually, which is .037 percent of the Company's adjusted revenue for the 12-month period ending December 31, 1990. It is not possible to know the state of interexchange carriers might believe themselves entitled to credits, but 189 carriers have registered with the Commission pursuant to PUC Substantive Rule 23.61.

The factory employs several local residents.

One of the factory's most exciting plans involves the use of local produce. "We are aiming at producing candy with all Texas components". They will begin using local peanuts as soon as the Memphis facility can supply them.

"We're growing every day," says Donaho. The store now produces over 5,000 pieces per week. They are planning to purchase additional equipment and expand their marketing, expansion that is already under way. They will soon have a program for organizations who wish to sell candy as a fund-raising project.

Exercise-Induced Asthma and Athletics

More than 10 million Americans or about four percent of the U.S. population have asthma. According to a recent article in Pharmacy Times, one in ten persons with asthma suffers from a condition referred to as exercise-induced asthma (EIA). EIA can affect an otherwise healthy individual, resulting in serious breathing problems. This can be troublesome for highly active individuals, including athletes - amateur and pro-

EIA is a health problem that is receiving a lot of attention because it affects one of our most vital functions - breathing. Typically, after three to eight minutes of vigorous exercise, EIA causes the air passages leading to the lungs to constrict. Constriction may be mild or severe. Severe constriction of air passages interferes with the normal exchange of oxygen and carbon dioxide in the lungs.

Several prescription medicines are available for those who suffer from EIA. Physicians who treat EIA may prescribe theophylline, albuterol, or terbutaline. These medicines work by relaxing the smooth muscle sur-rounding air passages leading to the lungs. Through the use of one or more of these medicines, the person with a history of EIA may be able to participate in the same activities as does the person who does not have EIA.



Breast Cancer Clinic Set

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Cancer Council for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self examination, and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recom-mended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are:

1. Learn and perform breast self examinations every month.

2. Have a physical examination every year. 3. Have a mammogram ac-

cording to the recommendations by

Age 35-40 - One baseline mammogram; 40-50 - A mammogram every 1 to 2 years; Over 50 - Yearly mammograms.

A clinic will be held in Clarendon on Monday, November 11, 1991, from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the Clarendon Medical Center Clinic. Exams are done by appointment only. 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on September 7. Mr. Walker accepted the Award of Merit for our unit. The delegates commented that the meeting was very informa-tive and that the speaker was excel-lent. They also learned that the Texas Division had received the Golden Achievement Award for Education for the third year and that Kay Hayes had received the PACE Award again for her work in distributing educational materials

to the youth of our county.
Mrs. Caldwell and Amy Marshal, Field Representative for the district, discussed some of the latest research findings. Of particular interest was the discovery that the P-53 gene does not show up in victims of lung, breast, and colon cancer. Work is also being done to try to develop vaccines for cervix, liver, lymphoma, and melanoma

cancers. R. L. Gilkey, M.D., gave a very interesting program on the cancer cases in Donley County. He reported eight deaths attributed to cancer and the diagnosis of twentysix new cases.

FHA Reviews Portfolio

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) continues to review its portfolio for possible graduation of borrowers to private credit as mandated by Congress, Neal Sox Johnson, FmHA State Director in Temple, said today.

The FmHA credit programs are administered in a manner that will assure that they do not sup-

plant or compete with credit available to farmers, rural families and groups from other reliable credit sources. The law requires that FmHA borrowers should graduate to other credit on reasonable rates and terms when they are able to do so, Johnson said.

FmHA, as the lending arm of the U.S. Government, has long been a source of credit for farmers, ranchers and rural home owners that were unable to obtain credit through commercial lenders such as banks, savings and loan, Production Credit Associations, and Federal Land Bank. We have attempted to aid those borrowers as "Lender of Last Resort!70, Johnson said.

Nationwide, and on an annual basis, FmHA reviews its loan protfolio to determine those borrowers who have progressed to the point that they no longer need government assistance to obtain credit. This annual review is currently being conducted by the local Farmers Home Administration office, Johnson said. FmHA borrowers in your area may be contacted to furnish information and contact area lenders to ascertain their ability to move their loan to those private lenders.

The mission of the FmHA lending program is that of "Temporary source of supervised credit in modest amounts" to those who are unable to obtain credit else-

Social **Security News**

For some time now, many people in the Texas Pan-handle have been doing their Social Security business by telephone. They find that the Social Security toll-free service is quicker and more convenient than making a trip to the office. That's why it's important that people know about their new toll-free number. It's 1-800-SSA-1213 (1-800-772-1213). Using the 800 number service

and the assistance of a teleservice representative gives you the option of conducting almost all of your Social Security business by phone. This includes filing claims for retirement, disability, or survivors benefits; reporting a missing check; making an appointment to apply for benefits; or simply asking a question.

To serve you better, SSA also offers a telephone response unit that uses prepared messages to speed the processing of certain routine requests. Using a touchtone telephone, you can: obtain a request form for a Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement; request an application for a Social Security number; request verification of the amount of your Social Security or SSI benefit; order publications; and listen to general information about the Social Security programs.

Perkins Helpful

Clarendon College students eligible for Perkins assis-tance are putting over 160,800 miles on their odometers in order

to attend classes this semester. The average age of college students is getting older as adults recognize the need for training and retraining. Not all students live in dormitories on a campus. For those who don't, the daily cost of getting to class is one that has to be added

on to tuition and books.
This "miles traveled" figure is a finding of the needs assessment done to allocate the Carl D. Perkins grant Clarendon College received this school year to support students in its five vocational programs. Students in Childress, Shamrock, Pampa and Clarenodn may use Perkins funds to support their studies in electronics, licensed voctional nursing, secretarial sciences, ranch and feedlot operations, or

cosmetology. The nursing students in particular do a lot of traveling, as they are required to take part of their clinical training in area hospitals. This training is provided by hospitals in Shamrock, Childress, Memphis and Wellington as well as Amarillo.

Child care costs are also paid for eligible vocational students through Clarendon College's Perkins grant. For parents trying to support families, these costs add up quickly. Without assistance, the costs of child care would be a barrier to a better life for the whole family.

This semester's Perkins grant pays for the daily care of 28 children while their student parents are in school. Clarendon College's purpose in obtaining the Perkins grant is to make the vocational programs more easily available to area residents. SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS For the November 5, 1991, Election John Hannah, Jr., Secretary of State

This November, Texans will have the opportunity to vote on 13 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution. To help you make informed decisions on these propositions, we present the following summaries of the proposed amendments. Below you will find the proposition as it will appear on the ballot followed by a brief description of the effect the proposition will have if it is passed.

Proposition

"The constitutional amendment allowing home-rule cities with a population of 5,000 or less to amend their charters by popular vote."

Summary: A home-rule city is a city that is able to govern itself, generally through the actions of a city council or commission. To become a home-rule city, a city must have a population of at least 5,000, it must hold an election to become a home-rule city, and the measure must pass by a majority vote. Once a city becomes a home-rule city, it may adopt a charter, and this charter may be amended through an election every two years. However, under current law, if the population of a home-rule city falls below 5,000, the city is no longer allowed to amend its charter. If passed this amendment would allow home-rule critics whose populations have fallen below 5,000 to continue to amend their charters through elections.

Proposition 2

"The constitutional amendment mandating the repayment to the Department of Transportation of monies expended to assist the Texas Turnpike Authority in the construction, maintenance, and operation of turnpikes, toll roads, and

Summary: If passed, this amendment will allow the legislature to authorize the Texas Department of Transportation to spend money on turnpikes, toll roads, or toll bridges of the Texas Turnpike Authority. The Department of Transportation may use any available money that it has for this purpose. However, if the Department of Transportation uses money from the state highway fund, this money must be replaced by money collected by the Texas Turnpike Authority from tolls and turnpike revenue. Currently, the state is not allowed to use any public money to build or maintain toll roads or turnpikes.

Proposition 3

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to further implement and enhance the administration of the veterans' housing assistance and land programs and to expand the investment authority of the Veterans' Land Board."

Summary: If passed, this amendment would ease the restrictions on how the Veterans' Land Board can invest money from the Veterans' Land Fund and the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. The board may invest any money that is not to be used for the payment of principal and interest on bonds, the purchase of lands, or the payment of expenses. In addition, the board is no longer limited to investing this money in bonds or securities of the

federal government. Proposition 4:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$1.1 billion in general obligation bonds for acquiring, constructing, or equipping new prisons or other punishment facilities to confine criminals, mental health and mental retardation institutions, and youth corrections institutions, for major repair or renovation of existing facilities of the institutions, and for the acquisition of, major repair to, or renovation of other facilities for use as state prisons or other punishment facilities."

Summary: If passed, this amendment will allow the state to issue up to \$1.1 billion in general obligation bonds. The money from selling these bonds will be used to acquire, construct, or equip new prisons and substance abuse facilities, mental health and mental retardation institutions, and youth corrections institutions. This money will also be used to repair and renovate existing facilities. The bonds and interest on the bonds will be paid from the first money coming into the state treasury that is not set aside by the state constitution for other purposes.

Note: A general obligation bond is a bond that is repaid from the State's general revenue fund. Most of the money in this fund comes from state taxes and fees.

Proposition 5

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the exemption for ad valorem taxes of certain property in an enterprise zone."

Summary: This amendment deals with property owned by an individual or organization that does business in an enterprise zone. If passed, this amendment would allow a county, a junior college district, or a municipality to exempt certain personal property from ad valorem taxation. To be exempt from this tax, the following conditions must be met: (1) the property must be acquired or brought into the state in an enterprise zone to be forwarded outside the state; (2) the property must be assembled, stored, repaired, maintained, manufactured, processed, or fabricated in the enterprise zone; (3) the property must be transported outside the state within 1.75 days after being acquired or brought into an enterprise zone; and (4) the person who acquired or brought the property into an enterprise zone is in a qualified business.

The purpose of this amendment is to encourage economic development in enterprise zones. Because some personal property will not be taxed, it will be less costly to operate a business in an enterprise zone.

Notes: An ad valorem tax is a tax imposed on the value of property. An enterprise zone is an area that has substantial poverty, unemployment, and economic distress. A qualified business is a business that is actively engaged in a new business in the enterprise zone or is expanding a business that is already active in the enterprise zone. "Enterprise zones" and "qualified businesses" are designated by the Texas Department of Commerce.

Proposition 6:

"The constitutional amendment creating the Texas Ethics Commission and authorizing the commission to recommend the salary for members of the legislature and the lieutenant governor, subject to voter approval, and to set the per diem for those officials, subject to a limit."

Summary: If passed, this amendment will create a Texas

Ethics Commission that is established by the Texas Constitution. The commission will consist of eight appointed members. These members will be selected by the Governor, the Lieutenant Governor, and the Speaker of the House from lists of names submitted by legislators from each major political party. This commission can recommend the salary of the members of the legislature. It can also recommend that the salary of the Speaker of the House and the Lieutenant Governor be higher than the salary of the other members. If the commission recommends a change in salary, the voters of the state will be able to accept or reject the salary change at the next general election for state and county officers. If the voters approve the recommended salary, the salary will take effect on January 1st of the next odd-numbered year. If the voters reject the salary, the salaries would remain the same. In addition, the commission can set the per diem of the members of the legislature and of the Lieutenant Governor. This per diem could be raised or lowered every two years, as necessary. The commission will also have other powers and duties as provided by Senate Bill 1, 72nd Legislature, Regular Session (the ethics bill). Finally, this amendment provides that an increase in the Lieutenant Governor's salary will not disqualify a legislator from becoming Lieutenant Governor.

If this amendment does not pass, there will still be a Texas Ethics Commission that is established by <u>statute</u>. This commission could not set the per diem of the members of the legislature.

Note: A commission that is established by the Texas Constitution can only be repealed by the voters. A commission that is created by statute can be repealed by the legislature.

Proposition 7:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the board of trustees of a statewide public retirement system to invest the funds of the system in a manner that the board considers prudent."

Summary: If passed, this amendment will change the way in which the board of trustees of each statewide public retirement system can invest the system's funds. Currently, a board can only invest its retirement funds in securities (stocks, bonds, etc.). However, if this amendment passes, a board may invest its retirement funds in any way that it thinks is prudent.

Proposition 8:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the voters of this state to consider state debt questions in the form of ballot propositions that must clearly describe the amounts, purposes, and sources of payment of the debt only after approval of the propositions by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature."

Summary: This amendment deals with the way that voters will vote on legislative action that would create a debt for the State. Currently, all propositions that create state debt must be approved by two-thirds of each house of the legislature and by a majority of voters during a constitutional amendment election. When these propositions are passed, they actually become part of the state constitution.

If passed, this proposition would still require propositions that create debt to be approved by a two-thirds vote of the legislature and a majority of the voters. However, when these propositions are passed, they will not become part of the state constitution. Instead, they will be enacted by statute. In addition, when the proposition is placed on the ballot, it must clearly describe the purpose of the debt, the cost of the debt, and how the debt will be repaid. The amount of the debt in the proposition can not be exceeded or renewed unless the proposition says that the debt can be exceeded or renewed.

Note: Creating a debt for the State means spending money that the State does not currently have. Selling bonds is one way that State debt is created.

Proposition 9:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years."

Summary: This amendment deals with lands that are technically owned by the state of Texas. In some cases, people have purchased or acquired this land from someone other than the State. While the State still technically owns this land, some people who purchased or acquired the land did not know that the land was owned by the state. From the time that these people purchased or acquired this land, they have believed that they are the legal owners.

If passed, this amendment will allow the Land Commissioner to give the legal title for this land (called public free school fund land) to certain people. A person is entitled to receive a legal title to this land if: (1) the land is surveyed public free school land; (2) the person could not gain the land's title under previous law; (3) when the person acquired the land, he or she did not know that the land was legally owned by the state and has believed that he or she has owned the land since January 1, 1941; (4) the person has a recorded deed on file in the county courthouse and has claimed the land for at least 50 years as of January 1, 1991; and (5) all taxes on the land, including any interest and penalties for late tax payments, have been paid for at least 50 years.

Note: Public free school fund land is owned by the State. Any revenue that this land generates (through sale, rent, etc.) is placed in the Permanent School Fund.

Proposition 10

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxes certain property of a nonprofit corporation that supplies water or provides wastewater service."

Summary: This amendment deals with property owned by a nonprofit corporation that supplies water or provides wastewater services. If passed, this amendment will allow the legislature to exempt property that is owned by these corporations from ad valorem taxes. In order for this property to be exempted, the nonprofit corporation must meet the following conditions: (1) the corporation's bylaws must say that, if the corporation stops operating, any leftover assets must be transferred to an organization that provides water supply, wastewater service, or both; (2) the leftover assets must be property that can be used for water supply and wastewater services.

Note: An ad valorem tax is a tax imposed on the value of

Proposition 11:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing a state lottery."

Summary: If passed, this amendment will allow the State to operate lotteries. The State would also be able to contract with other organizations that would operate lotteries on the State's behalf.

Proposition 12:


"The constitutional amendment to increase from 20 percent to 50 percent the percentage of Texas water development bonds previously authorized by Texas voters that may be issued for economically distressed areas."

Summary: This amendment deals with reallocating a percentage of the \$500 million of Texas water development bonds that were approved by Texas voters in 1989. These bonds were to be issued to fund water supply, water quality, and flood control projects. Currently, the board is limited to issuing 20% of the \$500 million (or \$100 million) of these bonds to provide water and wastewater facilities to economically distressed areas of the state. If passed, this amendment will allow the board to issue up to 50% of the \$500 million (or \$250 million) of these bonds for this purpose


Proposition 13

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds not to exceed \$300,000,000 to continue existing programs to provide educational loans to students, with repayments of student loans applied toward retirement of the bonds."

Summary: If passed, this amendment will allow the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue up to \$300 million in general obligation bonds. The money from selling these bonds will be used to finance educational loans to students. In the past, all bonds in this program have been retired through repayments from student borrowers, not the taxpayer.


