Law Chases Fugitives

Just before 4:00 p.m. on Thursday, January 30, four young people fled from Taylor Mart without paying for the \$15.29 worth of gas they had pumped into their vehicle. The suspects fled west on 287, then turned around and headed back east. The attendant called the Sheriff's Office, and law officers started in pursuit immediately.

Constable Blackie Johnson spotted the vehicle between Hedley and Lelia Lake and started after the car. The fugitive tried to run the Constable off of the road several times. Johnson was soon joined by DPS trooper Ray Burch just east of Hedley. One of those fleeing threw a fire extinguisher out of the window at the highway patrol car, but Burch forced the fleeing Chevrolet into the bar ditch. At that point three young white males jumped from the vehicle and tried to escape on foot, running across the rough pasture land. A young female stayed in the vehicle. She was identified as Robben Maberry, 23, of Cleburne, Texas.

The officers on the scene called for help in finding the suspects in the grazing land. Officers from Hall County responded to the call, and Donley County residents Monte Hollar, Pecos Hagler and Jim "Slim" Stevenson began combing the area on horseback. Larry Hicks began searching overhead in his ultralight aircraft. About 5:12 the men on horseback apprehended the three young men. They were placed in the Donley County jail.

The man who drove off was identified as Christopher Jerome Thompson, 19, of Cleburne, Texas. The driver during the chase was allegedly Phillip Don Phillips, 19, of Burleson, Texas. James Alexander Phillips, 21, of Burleson, Texas, was accused of throwing the fire extinguisher at Officer Burch.

The quartet pleaded guilty to misdemeanor charges and remain in jail, sentenced to 60 days in county jail and \$1,300 apiece in fines. If they cannot come up with the fine money, they will have additional room and board in the county's new facility. The four also face criminal charges of aggravated assault.

Santa Fe Donates Cars to Park

AMARILLO—Santa Fe Railway will donate eight flat cars to the city of Clarendon for use as a parking lot at Thunder Junction, where the city is planning a new park. The donation is a letter from Santa Fe to the city.

"We are pleased to be able to help Yesterday's Children with the western park underway," said Jim Fitzgerald, Santa Fe Superintendent in Amarillo.

"We were delighted to get this good news," said Pat Kaiser, president of the board of Yesterday's Children. "We will use the cars as bases for cars reminiscent of those from the late 1800's—an elegant hotel and restaurant that will serve as a focal point for the park."

The proposed hotel facility will be the first construction on the site, which tops the bluff overlooking Greenbelt Lake.

"We deeply appreciate Santa Fe's donation and extend our thanks to those instrumental in bringing it about," said Kaiser.

Fitzgerald said each railroad car measures 89 feet by 10 feet, with an estimated replacement value of \$50,000 each. They will be coming from several points around the country, with logistics coordinated by Wayne Tomasewski of ATSF's purchases and materials department in Topeka, Kansas.

That's just the opportunity you will have when representatives from the above agencies, the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, North Rolling Plains Resource Conservation and Development Area, and the city of Clarendon will be on hand for a Rural Waste Management Seminar on Tuesday, February 11, 1992, at Clarendon College. The seminar will be held at the Bairfield Activity Center starting at 1:00 p.m., and ending around 3:30 p.m. The seminar is sponsored in cooperation by the Donley County Extension Service and the Soil Conservation Service.

Farmers, ranchers, land owners and county residents with questions about rural waste disposal regulations and issues are invited to attend and express your concerns and questions. Agriculture chemical disposal, household hazardous waste, tire disposal, used oil and filter disposal, paint disposal and any other questions related to disposal regulations that you might have we will try to address.

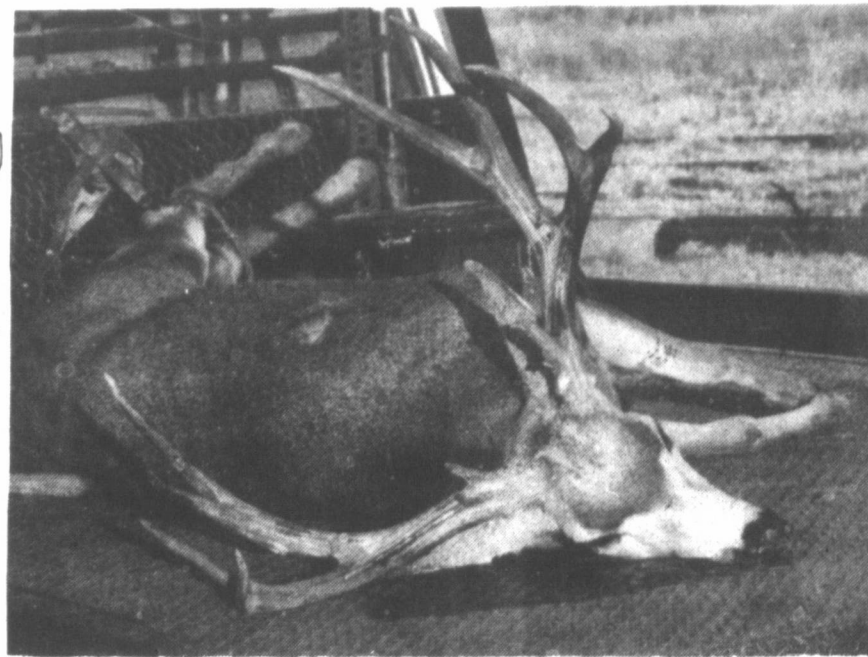

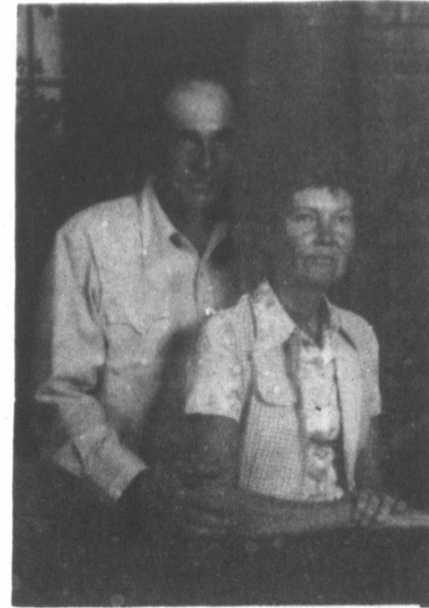

Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company recently filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) for approval to redefine the location of the demarcation point, or demarc. The demarc is where Southwestern Bell Telephone wiring connects with customer-maintained wiring.

This request will not increase customers' service rates. This request simply changes the point within the wiring where Southwestern Bell's maintenance responsibility ends and the customer's maintenance responsibility begins. As before, customers will be able to connect their own wiring directly to Southwestern Bell's network at points up to the new demarc.

Southwestern Bell is seeking approval of this new demarc location to bring its tariff into compliance with a Federal Communications Commission Order in CC Docket 88-57.

More information will be included in customers' bills beginning February 1, 1992. Persons who wish to comment on the application should notify the PUC by March 20, 1992. 



Whether hiring one person or 1,000, all employers will be affected by changes in the new I-9 form released recently by the U. S. Immigration and Naturalization Service.

The previous I-9 form, a part of the Immigration Reform and Control Act (IRCA) of 1986, mandated that all employers verify employees' legal right to work in this country.

"Probably the most pertinent change in the revised form is the increased emphasis on informing employers about the anti-discrimination provision of the law," said Dr. Dick Edwards, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The new document carries this anti-discrimination notice: "It is illegal to discriminate against work eligible individuals. Employers cannot specify which document(s) they will accept from and employee. The refusal to hire an individual because of a future expiration date may also constitute illegal discrimination."

"When the law was being debated in 1986, many in Congress expressed great concerns that the citizenship requirements would discriminate against Hispanics and others," Edwards said. "Unfortunately, these fears turned out to be well-founded."

According to Edwards, a survey showed that indeed 18 percent of the employers who described their hiring practices were being discriminatory. In Texas, this percentage was 28 percent--the highest of any state surveyed under this particular law.

However, changes in the new form should help prevent discriminatory practices, which were found to be mostly unintentional, Edwards said. The form also was revised to clear up any question as to which documents would satisfy the identity and authorization requirements.

"What many employers would do is ask to see one of the several documents listed on the old form as being acceptable," he said. "If an applicant did not have it, the

employer would not hire the person, when in fact, there were many other acceptable documents not listed."

The new form does not give a specific list, but a separate, expanded list that employers can use to match up the documents they are given by applicants.

Another change on the I-9 is the addition of a third section, which deals with reverification of temporary documents. The old form requested an expiration date, but there was no place on the form to show that employers had reverified these documents. Now, if a person lists a document with a temporary expiration date, there's a place to update it. Also, if an employee leaves but is rehired, the employer only has to fill in the rehiring date if the original I-9 form is still on file.

Edwards says following these suggestions will help employers avoid problems when complying with the anti-discrimination provision of the IRCA:

Complete the I-9 form after an offer of employment has been made. In the past, many companies would ask only certain applicants to fill out I-9 forms prior to being hired because they felt others would not have the proper documentation. Not having all applicants fill out the I-9 form at the point of application could be deemed discriminatory.

Allow the employee to decide which documents he or she wishes to provide for work authorization and identification. Do not ask to see a specific document (driver's license, Social Security card, green card, etc.). Refusal or request of specific documents is discriminatory because the applicant may not have these, but others that are valid. The employer should ask for documentation that shows work status and verification. Then, the person chooses what to show.

Do not refuse any valid document because of a future expiration date. Another practice that could be discriminatory is failing to hire someone who has a temporary document that can be updated or made permanent.

Do not ask for additional documents after a person has provided documents sufficient for

verification. What the documents should show are identity and legal status in terms of the right to work. Some documents such as the "green card" does both. If one document does not show this, another must be presented. Rather than asking for specific documents, let applicants show what they have. If the documents are not appropriate, require that others be furnished.

If the documents are not appropriate, require that others be furnished. Do not ask for additional papers if the documents presented show identity and legal work status.

Do not have a U.S. citizen-only hiring policy unless required by law or specified by government contract. For most jobs, a person does not have to be a citizen. If an employer implements a "citizen only" hiring policy this may be discriminatory unless it is specified by government contract.

Keep I-9's in a file separate from an employee's personnel file. The I-9 form contains certain information not available on the application, so the form should be filed separately. If kept with the personnel file, some could imply that reference was made to the I-9 form and that information was used in a discriminatory manner.

"Employers who do not abide by the documentation provisions of the IRCA risk sanctions that range from \$250 to \$5000 or imprisonment," Edwards said. "Penalties for violating the anti-discriminatory aspect of the law also can include hiring those discriminated against, plus a back pay and perhaps even attorney fees."

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The Leading Cause of Tooth Loss

The primary cause of tooth loss is a condition dentists refer to as *periodontal disease*. The more common name for this condition is "gum disease." Periodontal disease begins with an accumulation of plaque, an invisible film that covers the teeth. If the plaque remains and hardens, it forms a material called *calculus*. Calculus encourages the formation of pockets around the root or base of the tooth. These pockets can become filled with food particles and bacteria, resulting in infection. Often these areas become inflamed, causing the gums to recede or move away from the teeth. Since there is less support for the teeth, the teeth eventually loosen and, without treatment, may be lost. One of the signs of gum disease is bad breath that does not improve after brushing and use of mouth rinses.

Periodontal disease may occur more frequently in persons who have diabetes, or blood disorders, or who take certain medicines. Those who grind their teeth while sleeping and individuals with a malocclusion (bad bite) also may be prone to develop gum disease.

A general dentist or periodontist may choose to treat gum disease by scraping away the calculus. If this is not effective, surgical removal of deep pockets at the gum line and antibiotic therapy may be necessary.

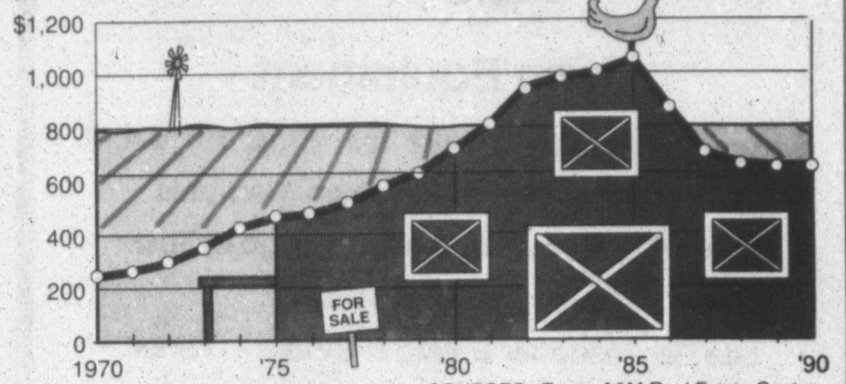

Wheat Farmers Must Act

Texas farmers must act now to control the spread of red-horned poppy in their wheat crops, according to Barron Rector, range

specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Rector said that the red-horned poppy is a recently discovered prolific weed that can spread long distances through contaminated harvesting equipment or wheat seed.

The weed clogs combining equipment, competes with winter wheat and may be mildly toxic to grazing animals, he said.

Researchers have found the

poppy in Kansas, twelve Oklahoma counties and six counties in the Texas Panhandle and Edwards Plateau region.

"It seems to be well adapted to wheat fields in this part of the country," Rector said.

Additionally, he noted, Oklahoma State University researchers have found that each plant can produce up to 70,000 seeds that are capable of germinating in both fall and spring seasons.

For these reasons, experts recommend treatment of any red-horned poppy outbreaks with a herbicide labeled for use in wheat.

Brent Bean, Extension Service agronomist for the Texas Panhandle, said that Buctril has been the most effective herbicide in controlling the red-horned poppy.

Best control is achieved when Buctril is applied in the spring when the plant is in the rosette stage of development, he said. Banvel, 2,4-D amine and to a lesser extent, 2,4-D ester also may be used, Bean said, but they have not been as effective.

Bean said that although use of Buctril is expensive, farmers would otherwise have difficulty in harvesting and may find wheat yields reduced. The problem is not yet widespread, but the weed is continuing to infest more acres every year.

Rector said the key to controlling this aggressive weed is to prevent the development of a large population through early identification and early herbicidal treatment.

The plant is best controlled during the winter months when it has rosettes that measure up to fourteen inches in diameter, Rector said. These rosettes lie flat on the ground and have a waxy cuticle that sticks up on the surface.

Dan Cornett, Extension Service agent in Hemphill County, said that farmers with small infestations can eliminate them by "hand grubbing" the plants to ensure that no parts are left in the soil.

The red-horned poppy, *Glaucium corniculatum*, grows one or two feet tall with numerous branches that have stiff hairs. The poppy is best identified in its flowering stage. During spring, it produces four bright, scarlet or orange-red petals that each have a black spot on its base. The red color fades to yellow during summertime. Each petal is about the size of a nickel or quarter.

Another identifying characteristic is the poppy's long, hairy seed pod, a slightly curved cylinder that can be ten inches long.

Rector said that as many as seventeen poppies can grow in every foot of a row, with each plant having a stout taproot. That's why it should be controlled immediately.

Researchers believe the red-horned poppy was first brought to the United States as an ornamental plant. It is native to the Middle East and Eastern Europe.

It was identified in Kansas in 1979. Today it is found in these Texas counties: Hemphill, Gray, Nolan, Collingsworth, Childress and McCulloch. Counties in Oklahoma include: Major, Garfield, Dewey, Blaine, Roger Mills, Custer, Beckham, Washita, Harmon, Jackson, Tillman and Cotton. It spread rapidly in Texas partially because it was misidentified as an evening primrose, Bean

said, and it was not controlled during the first two years of discovery.

Rector said that all farmers should look for red-horned poppy in their wheat fields so that it can be controlled immediately.

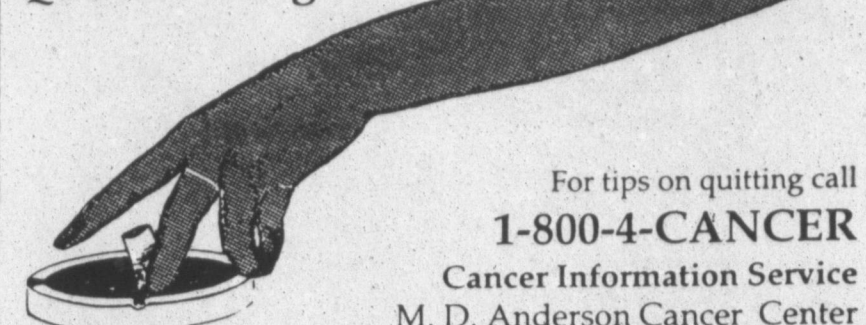

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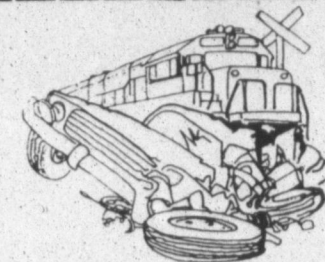

Selective Service News

Young men who will turn 26 in 1992 will be reaching an important milestone, according to the Selective Service System. Beginning on January 1, 1992, men who were born in 1966 and were required to register with the Selective Service in 1984 will be turning 26 and no longer be eligible for induction should a draft be reinstated. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept late registrations after a man reaches his 26th birthday.

Selective Service officials warn that, with few exceptions, a man who fails to register before turning 26 will permanently forfeit his eligibility for certain programs such as federal student aid, job training, and most federal employment in addition to facing possible prosecution as a felon. Some states also require registration for state student aid, entrance to state-supported colleges and universities, state employment, and permission to practice law.

Men ages 18 through 25, who have not registered, can avoid the risk of prosecution and loss of eligibility by registering promptly at any local post office. Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000, up to five years in prison, or both.

A man is exempt from registering while he is on full-time active duty in the U.S. Armed Forces. Cadets and midshipmen at the services academy are also included in the exemption. Members of the National Guard and Reserve Forces not on full-time duty must register unless they have reached age 26 or already registered.

Lawfully admitted nonimmigrant aliens (for example, those on visitor or student visas and members of diplomatic or trade missions and their families) are not required to register. Parolee and refugees who are aliens residing in this country must register.

Those who are unable to register due to circumstances beyond their control, for example, those who are hospitalized, institutionalized or incarcerated, do not have to register until they are released. After release, they have 30 days in which to register. Handicapped men who live at home must register if they are reasonably able to leave the home and go into a public place. A friend or relative may help a handicapped man fill out the form if he is unable to do so by himself.

Clarendon Gets New Mayor

The City of Clarendon got a new mayor last week after the then-incumbent mayor moved to Perryton. Jim Sharrar, the former mayor, was transferred by General Telephone Company, his employer.

City officials, acting to fill the vacancy, appointed Steve Smith, noted local gourmet, as Mayor—at least until the next election. Smith was out of town at the time.

The Clarendon News has not learned what retaliation Smith is planning against his peers. Jerry Courtney, noted local attorney, contends that Smith could probably beat the rap on the grounds that the constitution prohibits "cruel and unusual punishment". Mayor Smith did not have a printable comment as of press time.

WTU Files Lawsuit

West Texas Utilities Company filed a lawsuit, January 27, 1992, in Travis county to protect rights to property taxes it will pay to the state's new county education districts (CEDs). WTU said it will pay its \$9.8 million in taxes, including \$4 million to CEDs, by the Jan. 31 deadline.

"The lawsuit is not being filed to deny necessary funds to the school districts, but to protect the rights of the company and its customers if the tax is declared unconstitutional," said Jerry Chambliss, area manager. "Property taxes are an expense that goes into the cost of the product of service for any business and eventually are paid by customers."

"Because payments made without filing this suit would be considered voluntary payments by

the Texas courts we have been forced to file a protective suit to reduce the risk of paying double taxes. We realize that the schools need the funds. That's why we do not want to withhold the taxes pending a court decision," said Jerry Chambliss area manager. WTU joined a number of other Texas companies in the action.

Cases now are pending before the Texas Supreme Court, raising questions about the legality of the Texas school property tax law passed in 1991.

The new law groups school districts into county education districts (CEDs) in an attempt to ensure a more equitable distribution of school taxes. Property owners must pay 1991 school taxes to both the previously existing school districts and the new CEDs, with the majority of the taxes allocated among the CEDs.

The constitutionality of the new law has been widely questioned, and the Texas Supreme Court is expected to decide the issue in early February. If the court decides that the county education districts are unconstitutional, tax payments already made to those district may be considered "voluntary" and not subject to refund or credit. If the court rules that the tax is constitutional Jerry Chambliss said WTU will drop its lawsuit. WTU serves 178,000 customers in 52 counties throughout West Texas.
