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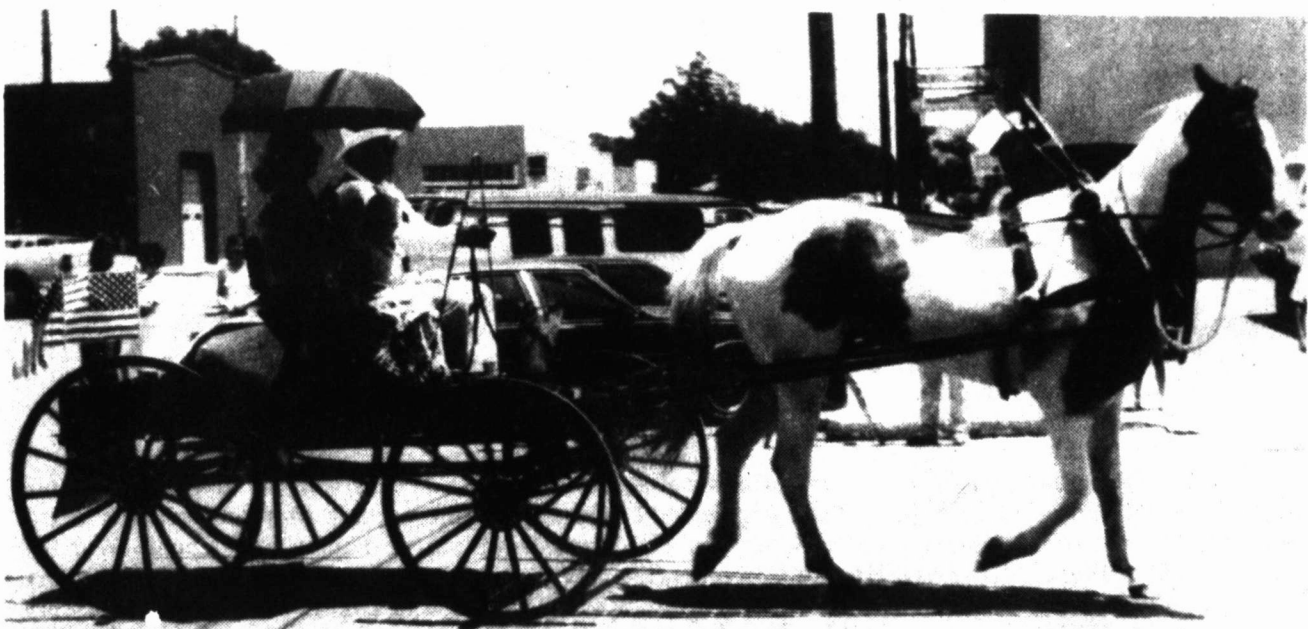

Texas Water Reports Released

Texas Water development Board Report No. 336, Public Supply Ground Water Use in the Northern High Plains of Texas, has been released. The report lists the water well facilities of 50 major entities supplying ground water for public supply use in 19 counties in the northern half of the Texas High Plains.

A map showing the location of cities with public supply ground water facilities and tables listing water well information are included in the report for the following counties: Armstrong, Carson, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore,

Ochiltree, Oldham, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, and Wheeler.

Texas Water Development Board Report No. 337, Evaluation of Water Resources in Parts of the Rolling Prairies Region of North-Central Texas, has been released.

The report summarizes the results of an investigation of potential water supply water quality problems in an area which lies with the Brazos, Colorado, Red, and Trinity River Basins and included all or parts of 44 North-Central Texas counties.

Report topics include references to topography and drainage, climate, economy, geologic framework, source and occurrence or ground water, water-level fluctuations, chemical quality, projected water demand, current water availability, and hydraulic characteristics of the region.

Safety Course Offered

A Driver Safety Course will be held at Clarendon College on Saturday, July 11, 1992. It will meet from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. in room 101. The fee is \$25.00. Upon completion of this course, participants will be eligible for a 10% discount on their liability insurance or dismissal of a traffic violation. Clinic Scheduled

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for July. Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps, and HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B).

The Texas Department of Health is charging money to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

The clinic will be in Clarendon on July 14 from 9-12 and 1-3 p.m. The clinic will be at the Texas Department of Health Office, 2nd floor, 300 S. Sully.

Spring Crop Certification

July 15, 1992 is the final date to report your spring seeded crops, ACR, and conserving use. Even if you do not have crops planted you should report zero to protect your bases.

This year certification will be made by appointment. As soon as possible after you have your crops planted call the Donley County ASCS office for an appointment.

Tolerance rules are very strict; therefore, it is very important that you give an accurate report of acreage.

Tolerance is the larger of 1.0 acre or 5% of the reported acreage not to exceed a maximum of 10.0 acres. Tolerance rules do not apply to crops or land uses when measurement service after planting has been performed.

If you are unsure of your acreage, measurement service is available from the Donley County ASCS office for a fee. The request for measurement service must be made by July 15.

Mortgage Loans Available

The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) announced today that it will hold eight homebuyer workshops throughout the state. All first-time homebuyers and real estate professional are encouraged to attend.

The purpose of the workshops is to inform the public about the department's Single Family Bond Program and the homebuying process. Lenders and representatives from the department will discuss the program and be available to answer questions.

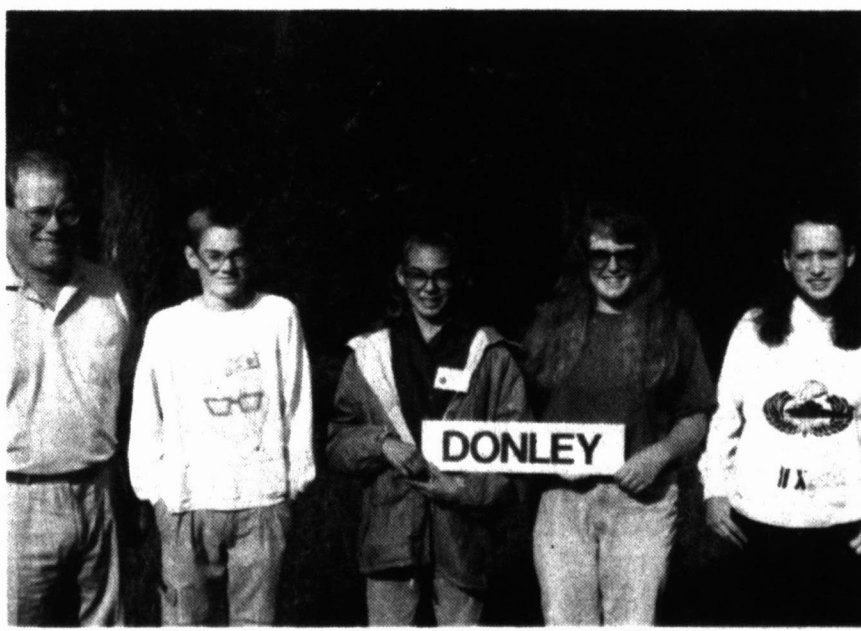
The Single Family Bond Program channels low interest mortgage money through participating Texas lenders to eligible low to moderate income individuals and families who are purchasing their first home or have now owned a home in the last three years.

The department plans to start a new bond program on July 8. Under the program, the department will offer \$132 million in mortgage financing at 7.41 percent

interest rate for low to moderate first-time homebuyers statewide.

As part of TDHCA's goal to target more housing funds to very low income person, the department is requiring that every participating lender in this program set-aside 25 percent of their funding for the first six months for very low income borrowers.

Control Horn Flies Now

Heavy winter and spring rains across much of Texas have created extra parasite problems for livestock producers.

Horn fly control has always been important for many ranchers, but this year it is even more so, said Dr. Allen Knutson, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Dallas.

These blood-sucking flies reduce weight gains and milk production in mother cows with calves, Knutson said. Weight gains worth \$2 to \$8 have been measured in experiments for every \$1 invested in horn fly control, he added.

Horn flies spend most of their time on the cow, the females leaving only for the few minutes it takes to lay eggs in freshly deposited manure. A single fly may feed up to 20 times a day.

Horn flies can be successfully controlled with insecticides because the flies spend so much time on the cow and are soon exposed to a lethal dose. Insecticides can be applied with self-treatment devices such as dust bags, back rubbers, the LiquiDuster, and ear tags, or by using sprays, boluses, and feed supplements.

Ear tags have been commonly used because they combine an effective insecticide, a pyrethroid, with the ear tag, which is a slow release device. The result is several months of control.

Schools Being Audited

In a statement that called upon the people of Texas to "make a difference" by speaking out on ways to improve the operation of Texas public schools, State Auditor Larry Alwin announced today that his Office has installed a toll-free hotline for citizens input: 1-800-TX-AUDIT.

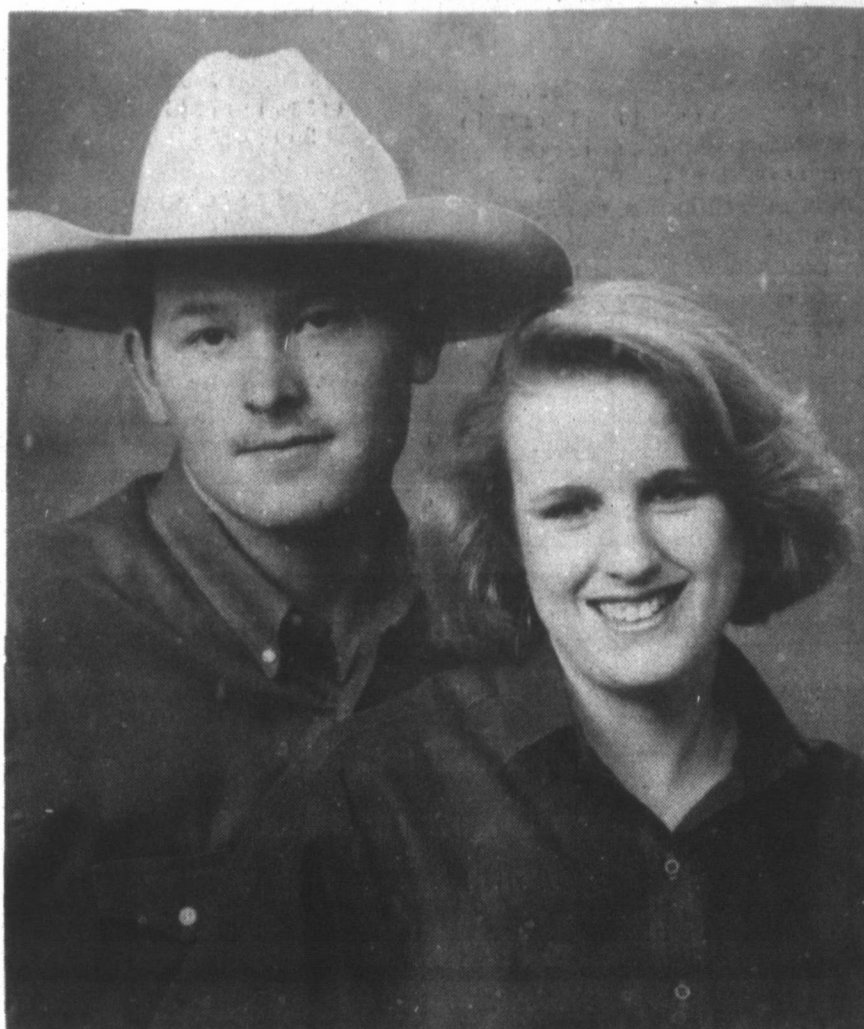
The State Auditor's Office, an agency in the legislative branch serving as the independent auditor for Texas state government, is currently conducting an audit of Texas' public schools and funds. The audit, known as MAPS (Management Audit of Public Schools), will provide the Legislature with an in-depth look at how our school districts spend their money and how our spending habits compare with those in other states. Between now and November, auditors will analyze data from 1,043 school districts and will physically visit at least 50 school districts to conduct management audits.

Alwin stated that citizen tips from the hotline could point auditors in the right direction. He said "Teachers, parents, and students can tell us first-hand about school programs that are working. They can also tell us where our tax dollars are not being spent wisely."

Alwin said the MAPS hotline is in response to citizen reaction over the past month. "People from all over the State have been calling us to report everything from outrageous administrators' salaries to the fraudulent misuse of school bus fuel." He emphasized that his Office appreciates the phone tips and that "each and every suggestion is being considered."

The 1-800-TX-AUDIT (1-800-892-8348) hotline will be manned Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. An answering machine will record detailed messages after hours.

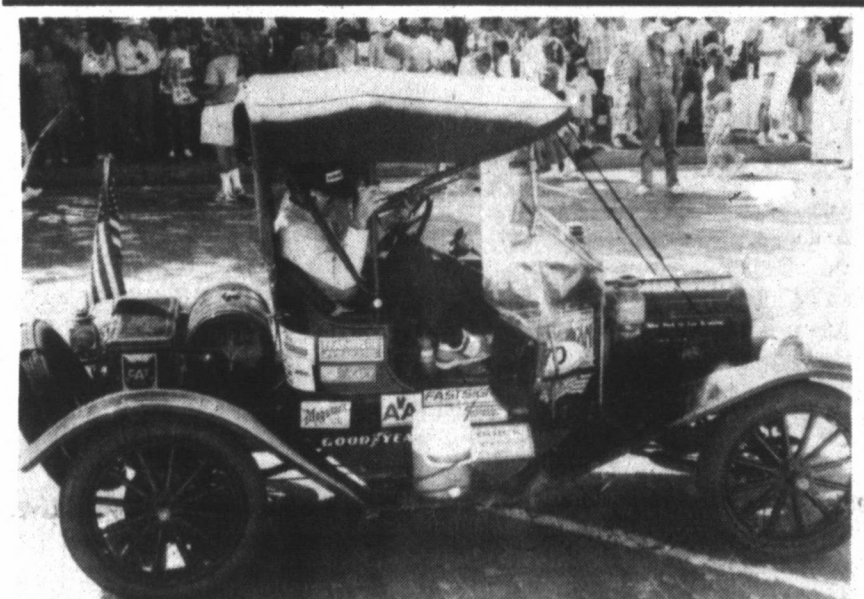

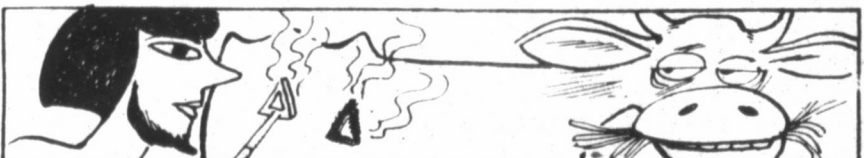
Engagement Announced

The department identified area of the state which traditionally have not participated in the Single Family Bond Program and campaigned to get representation in those areas. As a result, lenders are now participating in 17 counties that have not had previous participation.

The department is also offering a down payment assistance program for low and very low income persons. Through this program, TDHCA hopes to assist those Texans who don't have the equity to make a down payment. The loans are available at zero percent interest and do not have to be paid back until the borrower sells the home.

The 72nd Legislature created TDHCA by merging the former Texas Housing Agency and the former Texas Department of Community Affairs is dedicated to helping Texans achieve an improved quality of life through the development of better communities.

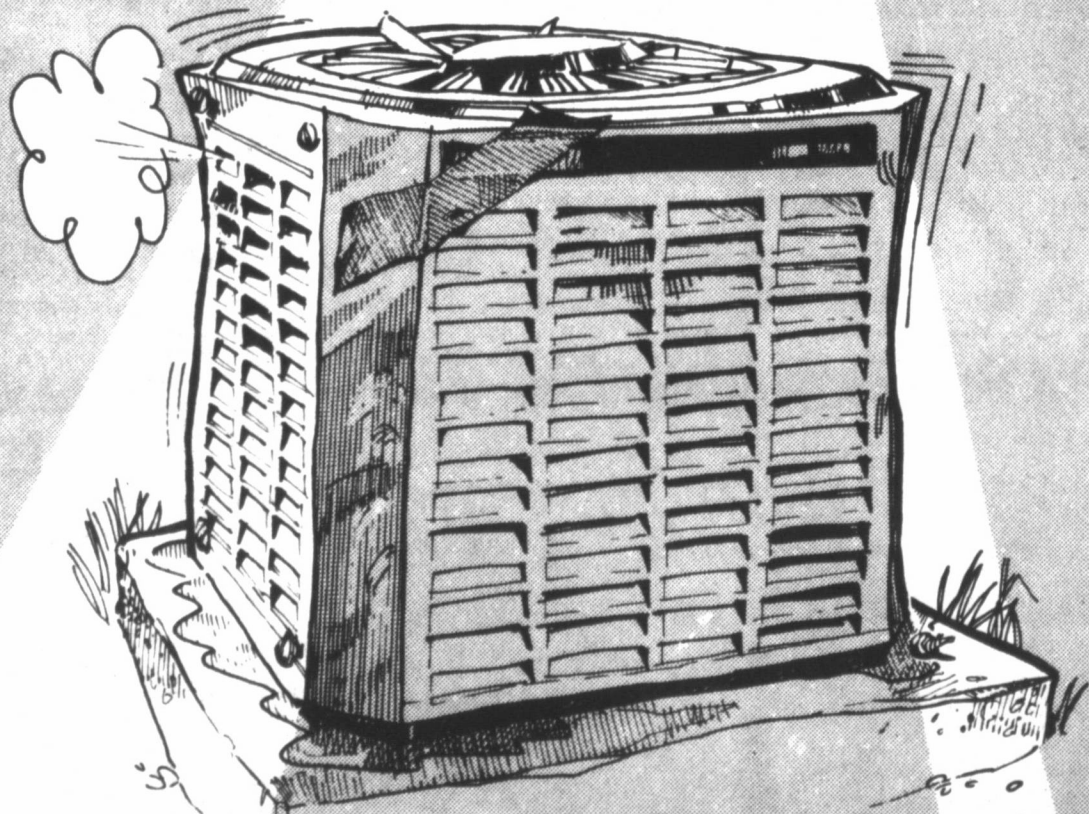

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Emergency Care of Minor Burns

According to a recent article in *American Family Physician*, each year over two million Americans seek medical attention for the treatment of burns. The U. S. has the highest incidence of burns of any industrialized nation of the world. Common causes include exposure to hot liquids, steam, flames, electricity, chemicals, and sunlight (radiation). Many who are burned must be treated in a hospital. Each year about 12 thousand Americans die from burns.

First-degree burns are considered superficial injuries in which the skin reddens and there is pain. A second-degree burn results in deeper injury to the skin, pain, and some blistering. Third-degree burns cause even deeper injury. Blisters may or may not be present. The cause, extent, and depth of a burn is important in determining how the burn should be treated.

Care for minor burns begins by immediately cooling the burned area in cold water (immerse in a container of water or in a stream of cold running water). Cold water provides some relief of pain and may decrease tissue injury. Keep the burned area clean. Do not put butter or greasy substances on burns because these materials can encourage the growth of organisms that cause infection. Seek medical attention for second and third degree-burns and burns involving the face, hands, eyes, ears, feet, or genital area.

Mr. Rodgers died at 10:50 a.m. on Thursday, July 2, 1992 in Veteran's Administration Medical Center in Amarillo following a lengthy illness. He was born September 25, 1906 in Whitesboro, Cooke County, Texas and came to Donley County in 1909. He farmed for many years in Armstrong and Donley Counties and was married to Beatrice McCracken on January 8, 1938 at Panhandle. He was a US Navy veteran of World War II, having served on the ship Portent which was sunk on January 21, 1944. He was one of only 13 survivors. After the war he continued to farm and opened the first totally automatic laundromat in Clarendon. He was a long-time member of the Clarendon Masonic Lodge #700, having received his 50 year pin in 1991. He was also a member of the Clarendon Post of the Veterans Of Foreign Wars and a member of the First United Presbyterian Church in Clarendon.

Survivors included his wife, Beatrice Rodgers of Clarendon; one daughter, Bonnie Ellen Rodgers of Las Cruces, New Mexico; and one sister Zell SoRelle of Clarendon.

Honorary bearers were members of Clarendon Masonic Lodge #700.

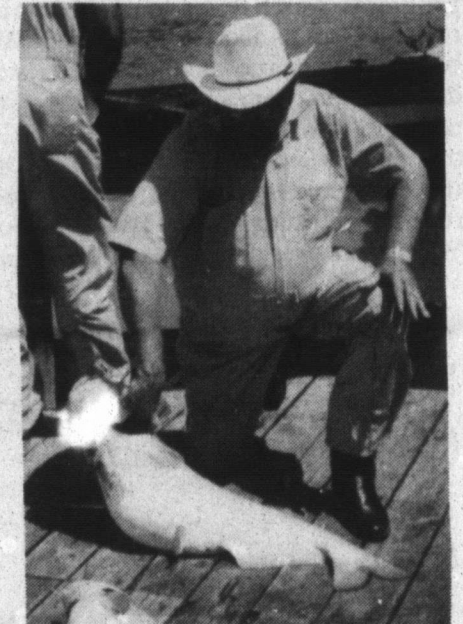

Water Commission Delays Public Meetings On Feedlot Rules

Texas Water Commission (TWC) officials announced Thursday that the proposed public meetings to consider revisions to the rules that regulate confined animal feeding operations will be held later this year.

The TWC is putting further development of the revised rules on hold, while it focuses on creating technical assistance and education programs to help agricultural producers with water quality concerns.

Dr. John Impson, manager of the TWC's agriculture section, said the agency decided to take this action after conducting several meetings with representatives of agricultural-interest citizen groups and the dairy industry. The meetings revealed that there is an immediate need for the TWC to provide technical assistance and education programs, as well as increased enforcement of current feedlot rules. The rules have been in effect since 1987.

"The TWC will continue to look at the rules regulating confined animal feeding operations, and revise them when problem areas are identified," Impson said. "However, what citizens really need now is a more focused inspection and enforcement program."

that make the tag so effective have led to their widespread use, and the increased resistance to pyrethroids in horn flies," he said.

Resistance occurs as season-long use of the same insecticide kills the susceptible horn flies, leaving only resistant pests to reproduce, he said. Soon, the resistant flies are dominant and the insecticide is no longer effective, he said.

Producers can rotate the pyrethroid tag with an organophosphate tag every one to three years. Resistance to organophosphate tags has not been documented in Texas.

Ranchers should apply tags or treat with insecticides only when horn fly numbers reach 200 to 300 per head. Research has indicated that fewer than 250 flies per animal rarely cause economic losses, he said.

Depleted tags should be removed at the end of the horn fly season.

An organophosphate insecticide spray, dust or bolus may be used to kill pyrethroid-resistant flies.

"These practices allow some susceptible flies to survive and reproduce in the spring and fall, helping to dilute the resistant genes in the population. Tolerating a few horn flies actually helps slow resistance, making insecticides like pyrethroid ear tags effective when they are most needed," he said.

Certain insecticides in feed additives and boluses also control horn flies, he said. The active ingredient is an insect growth regulator called methoprene. It passes through the cow into the manure and kills the developing horn fly larvae, or maggots.

Methoprene is neither an organophosphate or pyrethroid and therefore is effective in managing horn fly resistance by rotating insecticide does, he said.

Boluses are applied once at the start of the fly season, and an insecticide spray can be used to kill adult flies present at the time boluses are administered.

"Animals should be observed after dosing to ensure that if boluses are regurgitated, the animal is treated again," he said.

Flies migrate between herds, so fly control in bolus-treated herds is improved if horn flies are controlled in adjacent herds.

Knutson reminded producers to use unlined, rubber gloves when applying ear tags.

Social Security and the Baby Boom Generation

Are you a baby boomer? If you were born between 1946 and 1964 then you are a member of the single largest generation in American history. Social Security has devoted a lot of study to the baby boom generation...and with good reason. The Social Security system will provide retirement benefits for the 76 million members of this generation who will begin to reach retirement age in the second decade of the next century.

While we know with certainty that the first baby boomer will turn 65 in 2011, there are many uncertainties about this generation. One

is this: no one is sure just how many 'baby boomers' will be retired in 2020, for example. According to the Census Bureau, it could be as many as 50 million or as few as 48 million. It depends a great deal on unknowables—how long are the baby boomers likely to work, and how long are they likely to live?

Take the question of work. Some experts say that because of lower birth rates that followed the boomer generation, there will be fewer young workers in the early years of the next century. So, there will be a greater demand for older workers to continue working. On the other hand, the same experts agree that recent experience indicates just the opposite: workers seem to be retiring at increasingly younger ages.

A similar situation exists when we look at probable mortality rates for the baby boomers.

When Social Security began in 1935, the average life expectancy for people turning 65 was a little more than 11 years for men and 13 years for women; today those numbers are 15 years for men and 19 for women; and when the first baby boomer reaches 65 in 2011, the numbers could be as many as 18 for men and 23 for women. But that last number is iffy. New diseases, environmental hazards or unexpected increases in, for example, heart disease could cut future life expectancy. By the same token, new medical break troughs or healthier lifestyles might lengthen boomer's years after retirement.

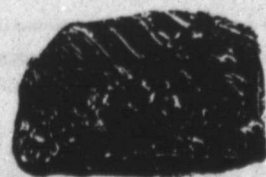
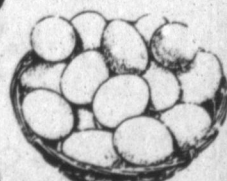
