You can really lose yourself in the possibilities (just as right now I am no doubt beginning to lose some of you). I bring all this up because of a startling conclusion I have come to this week. Many, if not most, of the Democrats in America have been replaced by their doppelgangers from another universe.



As Owen sat patiently waiting for his food, I sat solely at another table working on my homework. He kept starting conversations: I began to wonder how anyone could be so nice. When his food came out, I quickly gave it to him and insinuated he eat fast. As he made his way to the register I told him his price. With a shy look he replied, "I lack \$2.03, can I run home and purpose. "No, no that's fine. I've got it." I realize now I should have just let him run home, because our ten-foot walk to the door seemed like a hundred-foot walk. He told me how embarrassed he was and how

he'd pay me back next time. Owen continued to drop in right before closing time at least two times a week, leaving an extra quarter on the table until it added up to \$2.00. 



## Meeting to focus on development of Plains Trail

The Texas Historical Commission (THC) and local partners will host a meeting in Canyon on November 20 to assist the Texas Plains Trail Region in its efforts to become a heritage tourism destination.

"We encourage everyone from museum directors to mayors to come to the meeting, learn more about what is going on, and to become involved in the activities of the board," said Janie Headrick, director of the THC's Texas Heritage Trails Program.

The meeting will be held at Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the Hazelwood Lecture Hall. For reservations, call Rolla Shaller at 806-651-5233 no later than Friday, November 14. Cost for the lunch is \$10.

The Texas Plains Trail Region is the sixth area to participate in the Texas Heritage Trails Program, a program that increases tourism traffic to cultural and heritage sites, revitalizes local economics, increases awareness of the importance of historic preservation to tourism, and fosters effective local tourism leadership. The THC will provide the area with technical, marketing, and financial assistance for at least three years.

Initial steps to incorporate the area into the program include hiring a regional trail coordinator, reporting on the region's heritage tourism readiness, and creating a travel guide.

Resources in 52 counties including Donley County, will be developed for tourism.
