## Hayes Receives UPI Awards

Rick Hayes, former Clarendon resident, has been recognized for outstanding broadcast journalism by United Press International Broadcasters of Texas.

A sportscaster and reported for KXAN television in Austin, Hayes was given 1st place for Best Sportscast and 1st place for Best Sports Story on October 5, at a luncheon hosted by UPI in Dallas. The awards were accepted by his wife Catherine and Jeff Klotzman, manager of KXAN, the NBC affiliate in Austin. The winning stories will be sent to national competition.

Unable to be present for the recognition, Hayes is currently recovering from an accident which occurred in Clarendon, July 5th. He and his 3 year old daughter Lauren were struck by a Burlington freight train while they were here to attend the 10th reunion of the 1981 Senior Class of Clarendon High School.

The Broncos scored their first touchdown in the 2nd quarter when Wesley Smith made a 1 yd. run. Half time score was Highland Park 10 Clarendon 6.

The Broncos scored their 2nd touchdown in the 3rd quarter when Wesley Smith ran 3 yd. to the end zone to make the score 12-10.

Wesley Smith scored his 3rd touchdown of the game with a 20 yd

run and Ricky Smith made a 28 yd touchdown with a two point conversion run by Wesley Smith. The Hornets made one more touchdown, but, it wasn't enough for Highland Park. The Clarendon Broncos went on the beat the Hornets 26-18.

Clarendon had 17 first downs, 11 yds. passing, 311 yds. rushing with a 322 total yards gained.

Highland Park had 14 first downs, 114 yds. passing, 79 yds. rushing with 193 total yards gained.

## Holiday Safety Tips

It's time, once again, for Trick or Treat. Halloween is fast approaching and hundreds of little children will be taking to our neighborhoods in search of these wonderful treats.

Major V.J. Cawthon, Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Region 5, said, "Many disasters can be prevented this Halloween, if parents and motorist will use good judgement. Small children should be accompanied by older children or adults and trick or treating should be confined to those areas that the parents are familiar with."

Major Cawthon urges that parents dress their children in non-flammable costumes and the costumes should be of light colors. He also stated that the mask should not prevent the child from being able to see. Parents should always keep their children away from Jack-O-Lanterns with candles.

Parent should also instruct their children in some traffic safety tips, insuring they look in all directions before crossing streets and to walk, not run. A flashlight carried by the child can serve as a warning to motorist, and children should be instructed to use sidewalks, whenever possible.

We, as motorists, should remember that children in play become very excited and may forget the safety rules. Let's remember to be extra careful in the residential areas and be on the lookout for kids darting into the streets. We, the drivers, need to be extra alert to ensure that this is a Halloween for all trick or treaters.

Major Cawthon stated, "If parents and motorist join together and think safety first, we can make this 1991 Halloween a safe and enjoyable evening for everyone."

An Editorial

## A Question of Credibility

On Saturday, October 26, the Clarendon Band traveled to Borger for marching contest. A convoy of parents accompanied the busses. Near Panhandle, a DPS car pulled over the second bus in the procession and issued a warning ticket.

The incident is highly questionable for several reasons. Both busses were traveling at the same speed, as were the automobiles behind them. From Clarendon to Borger, the speed was a steady 50 mph. The officer refused to state how fast the bus was actually travelling, even though the driver asked twice. The officer also refused to reveal how he had clocked the bus. However, the parents in the following vehicles can testify that the bus was not, in fact, speeding.

A few weeks earlier a former employee of *The Clarendon News* got a ticket in Chillicothe, Texas,

allegedly for speeding. Both she and her passenger insist that they were not speeding, and the editor will happily testify to her honesty and sterling character. A few months earlier the editor and his passenger had a similar experience with in Chillicothe (even the same officer). Others have reported the same experience in the same town. Furthermore, the Chillicothe "judge" is ignorant of the most basic premise of Anglo-Saxon law: the presumption of innocence until guilt is proven.

Such incidents might be less significant if it were not for the impression that they leave. Sixty people or so witnessed these false accusations, including several dozen young people. Most of those people will be called for jury duty at some date in the future. Some will serve on several juries in their lifetime. This incident will remain in their memory. Will it add to the credibility of law enforcement officers who testify at that trial? Will it increase these citizens faith in "the system"? Or will it contribute to a further breakdown of justice?

In recent years, states have come under increasing pressure from Federal authorities to write tickets. Cities like Chillicothe have come to see highways as a source of revenue, like medieval Robber Barons astride the Rhine. The result is extortion, not justice.

Ultimately, the cost is exceedingly high. Law enforcement officers and the courts lose credibility at a time when citizens are already suspicious. Merchants in towns like Chillicothe will be boycotted by motorists, losing more trade than the city picks up in revenue. And government—from municipal "judge" to the Federal chief executive—is being discredited. That price is too high.

## Diabetes Care: Insulin and Oral Medicines

It is estimated that ten million Americans have diabetes, a common health problem related to the handling of glucose (sugar) by the body. Diabetes is one of the leading causes of death in the United States and the single leading cause of blindness.

Health experts have classified diabetes into one of two different types. These two types are commonly referred to as *Type I* (insulin dependent) and *Type II* (noninsulin dependent) diabetes. With *Type I* diabetes, the pancreas gland stops producing the hormone insulin. *Insulin*, by way of injection, is required for individuals with *Type I* diabetes. Insulin injection sites include the arms, thighs, hips, and abdomen. Injection sites should be changed periodically in order to prevent local irritation of injection sites and tissue reactions. *Insulin* is not given orally because the insulin molecule breaks down in the digestive system and is not effective.

Individuals with *Type II* diabetes can produce insulin, but their bodies cannot transport the insulin to body cells efficiently. Most cases of *Type II* diabetes can be controlled adequately through diet and oral medicines. Prescription medicines commonly prescribed for *Type II* diabetes include *acetohexamide*, *chlorpropamide*, *tolazamide*, *tolbutamide*, *glyburide*, and *glipizide*.

So, please call the college (874)3571 with your requests for the spring semester or for future semesters. The college will determine which courses to offer based on your input.

Following are the courses from which you may choose: **Principles of Computers**, Jan. 13-Apr. 28 (Monday evenings) 4-hrs. credit; **Beginning Keyboarding** - Jan. 13 - Apr. 28 (Monday evenings) 3-hrs. credit; **Computer Applications** - Jan. 13-Apr. 28 (Monday or Tuesday evenings) 3-hrs. credit; **Word Processing Using WordPerfect** Jan. 13-Apr. 28 (Monday or Tuesday evenings) 3-hrs. credit; **Accounting I** Jan. 14-Apr. 28 (Monday or Tuesday evenings) 3-hrs. credit; **Lotus 1-2-3** 4-week course (Monday evenings) 1-hr. credit; **Disk Operating System** 4-week course (Monday evenings) 1-hr. credit; **WordPerfect** 4-week course (Monday evening) 1-hr. credit; **Desktop Publishing Using WordPerfect** 4-week course (Monday evenings) 1-hr. credit; **Desktop Publishing Using PageMaker** 4-week course (Monday evenings) 1-hr. credit.

Brief description of above courses: The **Principles of Computers** course gives an overview of five major uses of computers: Computer Literacy, Disk Operating System, Word Processing, Spreadsheets, and Database Management. Approximately 3 hrs. per week of outside lab time will be necessary for this course.

The **Beginning Keyboarding** course will be offered for high school or college credit. It is designed for two types of students: (1) students with little or no previous experience in the touch method of keyboarding and (2) students who wish to increase their speed and accuracy on the keyboard. The work will be completed on IBM Computers using programs designed to diagnose individual keyboarding weaknesses. Student will also learn to create business letters, tables, simple reports, and other types of documents using WordPerfect. Approximately 3 hrs. per week of outside lab time will be necessary for this course.

The **Lotus 1-2-3** course is an introductory course in spreadsheet applications. Spreadsheets are often used by bookkeepers and accountants. Approximately 2 hrs. of outside lab time will be necessary each week.

The **Disk Operating System** controls all information that is processed by a computer. This course teaches about the inner workings of a computer and is a perfect course for the first-time user. Upon completion of the course, students should be able to set up a new computer, manage documents created on a computer,

get into and out of application programs, put programs in a computer, create a menu to allow a computer to be more user friendly, and many other practical applications. Approximately 2 hrs of outside lab time will be necessary during each week.

The **WordPerfect** course will teach all of the basic functions of this popular word processing computer application program. Students who do a lot of typing on the job or at home are encouraged to bring samples of their work to class to learn how to create the documents on the computer. Approximately 2 hrs. of outside lab time will be necessary each week.

The **Desktop Publishing** courses are available using two different programs: WordPerfect or PageMaker. Students will learn how to create their own professional-looking newsletters, brochures, etc. where images, graphics, and special types of lettering are used in the same document. Students will have access to a laser printer so they can produce professional-looking documents.

The **Computer Applications** course spends 2/3 of the semester learning beginning and advanced features of Lotus 1-2-3. The last 1/3 of the semester will cover using DBase III Plus.

The **Word Processing** using WordPerfect course will teach most of the features of this program, including mail merge, search & replace, math, block moves, columns, sort & select, and spell check. The course is designed to help the student gain proficiency in using the program rather than giving the student a simple introduction to the features.

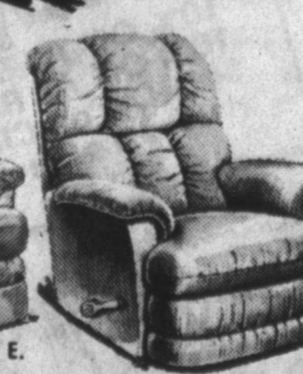
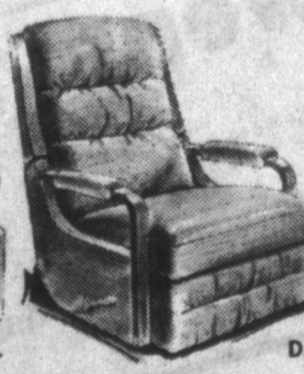
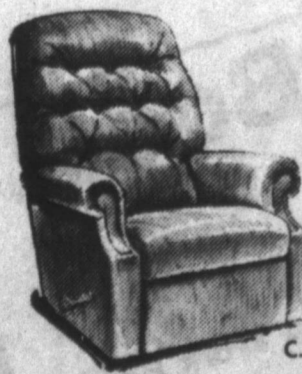

In August, 1990, Panhandle Community Services (PCS) was awarded Operation Bootstrap (OBS), an innovative HUD housing program providing rental assistance to unemployed and/or underemployed Texas Panhandle families. Our ultimate goal is to assist persons complete their post secondary education and acquire the necessary skills to obtain and retain employment at a wage rate allowing the family to become self-sufficient. Qualified applicants must be certified eligible for HUD housing assistance, will receive a needs assessment, and will be tested both vocationally and motivationally. Applicants must be able to complete their education within a two year period. Final selection of successful candidates is made by a local community council.

Currently, 64 clients are actively participating in our DBS program. Of these 64, 2 participants are from the Donley County area; they are enrolled in school and are pursuing certificates/degrees in entomology/office technician and drafting/design. Coordination of financial aid, Job training Partnership Act Assistance, various PCS services, and community resources are helping these people help themselves.

**Foundation Publications Available For Homeowners and Buyers**

Three publications that give information on foundation problems in the state have been produced by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the College of Architecture at Texas A & M University.

"The publications are designed to assist homeowners, buyers and builders on the best options when it comes to foundation design, maintenance and movement," said Dr. Susan Quiring, housing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Buying a home is the largest single investment than many people will ever make, she said. If the foundation cracks, the value of the home drops.

These publications cost from \$1 to \$2 each, and can be ordered through the local Extension county office:

**Maintenance of Existing Foundations on Expansive Clay Soils** - Includes information on foundation construction on clay soils, with watering, landscaping and drainage tips for newly constructed or older homes.

**What Prospective Custom Homebuyers Should Know About Foundations** - Discusses foundation problems arising in areas that have expanding clay soils and offers tips for avoiding pitfalls with sites, builders and maintenance.

**Homebuilder Recommendations for Slab-on-Grade Foundations** - Outlines technical details involved with slab-on-grade foundation systems; provides information on site work, pier and beam foundations, concrete curing and alternate foundation systems.

**Soil Conservation Service To Expand**

The U.S. Soil Conservation Service has agreed to expand the North Rolling Plains Resource Conservation and Development project, adding two counties to the district, U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm announced today.

"The Soil Conservation Service has agreed to add Ochiltree and Roberts counties to the Resource Conservation and Development District," Gramm said.

The district is currently composed of Briscoe, Collingsworth, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hemphill, Lipscomb and Wheeler counties.

Projects to be undertaken by the district, which can range from Soil Conservation to building roads, health centers and other improvements, are locally devised and coordinated.

Many projects may combine direct grant funding with low interest, long term loans from the Farmers Home Administration.

"These local programs are intended to focus on erosion control,

flood prevention, energy conservation, protection of Wildlife habitats and development of the rural economic base," the senator said.

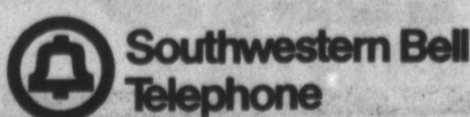
**Public Notice**

On July 1, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas that proposes to delete Paragraph 3.4(G) from Section 3 of Southwestern Bell's intrastate Access Service Tariff, which concerns credits where a customer uses Switched Access Service to furnish a service which has been defined to be an exchange service. The application was assigned Docket No. 10463.

Because Southwestern Bell is not aware of any customers who presently use switched access service to furnish an exchange service, Southwestern Bell does not believe its revenues will be affected. However, certain interexchange carrier customers of switched access service have made claims under the aforementioned tariff. Such customers, but only to the extent they provide an exchange service using switched access, would be affected by this application. Based on claims made for credits (assuming such credits were allowable), Southwestern Bell's revenues would be affected by no more than \$1,168,962 annually, which is .037 percent of the Company's adjusted revenue for the 12-month period ending December 31, 1990. It is not possible to know how many interexchange carriers might believe themselves entitled to credits, but 189 carriers have registered with the Commission pursuant to PUC Substantive Rule 23.61.

The tariff, after suspension, is proposed to be effective May 1, 1992.

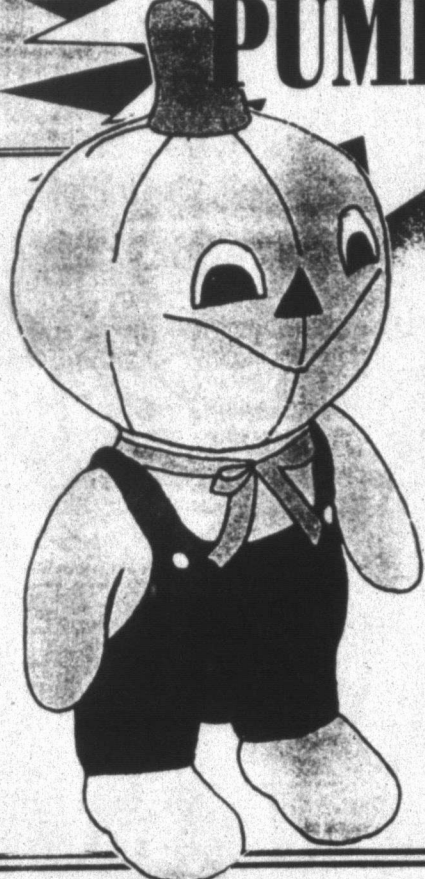

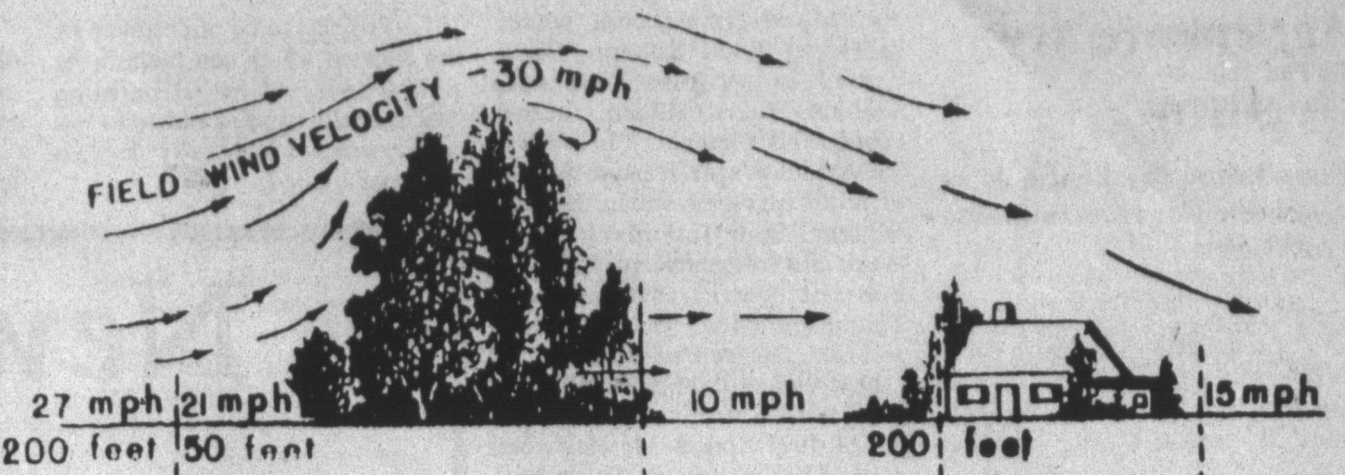

### Windbreaks Reduce Cost

Windbreaks planted around homes in this area can reduce heating costs as much as 15%. The trees also provide a beautiful setting for homes as well as food and shelter for birds.

You should begin planning now for next Spring's planting of trees. The following are some important considerations in your tree planting:

1. The young trees will need protection from the strong spring winds. Five Gallon cans, tires, shingles & etc. can be used.
2. A tilled clean seedbed will have to be prepared ahead of time.
3. The first 3 to 5 years is the most critical time in establishing a windbreak. Water is essential during this period. Young trees need 3 to 5 gallons of water per week throughout the year. A simple way to do this is to install an inexpensive drip irrigation system.

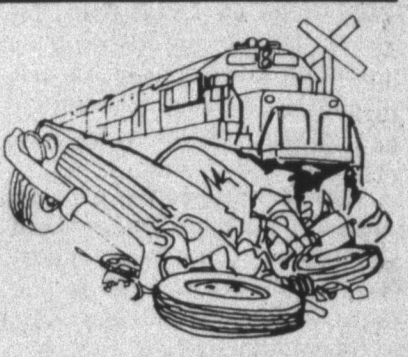
#### Elmer Lois Vines

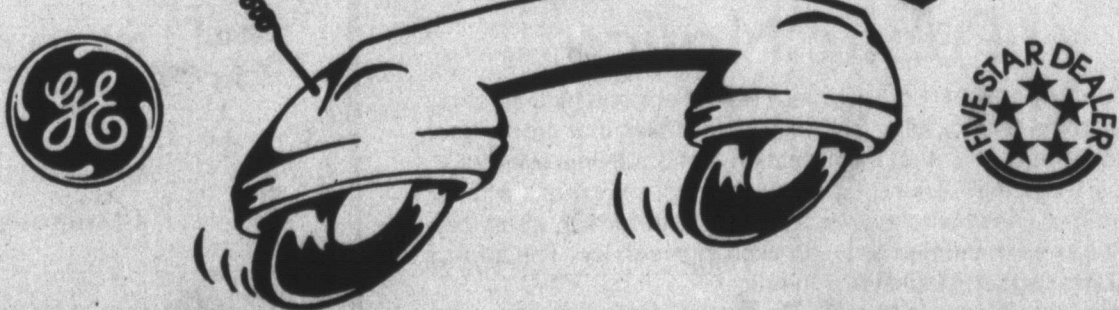

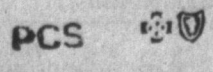

## Dear Editor

Proposition 13 on the Nov. 5 ballot should be supported by voters across Texas. This vital proposition would allow the sale of \$300 million in general obligation bonds to continue funding for the state's highly successful student loan program.

The need for the 25-year-old Hinson-Hazlewood College Student Loan Program has never been greater as more families struggle to make ends meet and the federal government cuts back on its student aid programs. In recent years, the number of student borrowers has increased dramatically --from 6,259 in 1988 to 26,389 last year. This year the total will be even higher. Without voter approval of Proposition 13, funds for new loans will run out by next spring.

The Hinson-Hazlewood program is paid for by the same people who benefit from it --students. Repayment by students, not funds from the state's taxpayers, cover interest on the bonds and retire them. Not a penny of state appropriations has ever been used to repay previous bond issues.

Hinson Hazlewood, which serves middle-income as well as

low-income students, boasts a default rate of about 6 percent. That is much lower than the widely publicized default rates for some federal student loan programs, and the Texas student loan program should not be confused with them. All Hinson-Hazlewood defaults are covered by interest earnings and federal insurance programs.

The Hinson-Hazlewood program is a necessary and reasonable measure to help educate Texas college students. I urge Texas voters to say "yes" to Proposition 13 on Nov. 5.

# TSTA Opposes Pension Fund Amendment

The Texas State Teachers Association Board of Directors this week voted to oppose Proposition 7, an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would permit the Teacher Retirement System (TRS) to invest teacher pension funds in speculative real estate deals. The proposition will be on the ballot on the November 5th election.

The TRS board is seeking voter authority to allow it to use teacher retirement funds to purchase real estate or partial equity in real estate. In real estate transactions the system is currently restricted to making investments in the form of mortgage loans on real estate.

If Proposition 7 were to pass, the TRS would be virtually unrestricted in the kinds of high-risk investments it could make - even in hostile takeover bids for companies.

TSTA President Ollie Besteiro said her organization, representing 95,000 people in the retirement system, is opposed to the move based upon past performance of real estate investments.

"We gave TRS the authority to make mortgage loans on real estate in 1983 and since that time, they have foreclosed on 10 major properties and lost money on 60 other properties totaling over \$156 million," Besteiro said. "That's money that school employees can ill afford to lose."

Besteiro pointed out that real estate investments are mercurial in nature and are largely responsible for bringing down the savings and loan industry.

"In the past decade, TRS has been extremely reluctant to share its earnings with the retirees in the form of increased monthly benefits. Instead, it has opted to use the earnings to make more and more investment loans," the president said. "This is another reason why members of the system are reluctant to expand its investment capabilities."

Besteiro said her organization is asking all Texans with family members in the Teacher Retirement System to vote "no" on Proposition 7.
