Local Youth Awarded Calf Certificate

Maximum effort and stamina paid off for Brad Williams, a 4-H student from Clarendon, Texas during the March 2nd performance of the 1991 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

Brad was one of the 28 determined contestants who was challenged to halter and maneuver one of only 14 unruly calves across the 2.75 acre Astrodome floor into the winners' square.

In exchange for this effort, Brad receives and \$800 calf purchase certificate sponsored by Walter Terry Distributors, which will be used to purchase a registered dairy or beef heifer.

The scrambler is required to maintain monthly progress reports, monetary records and a scrapbook detailing the project. His effort will culminate in 1992 when the heifer will be returned to the Houston Show for a special showing competition with other 1991 scramble winner.

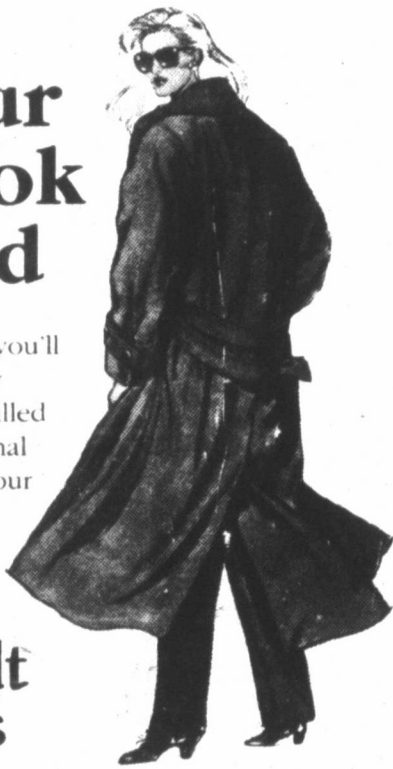

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A Letter FROM the Editor:

Caveat Emptor!

The above phrase is a legal term, a court doctrine commonly used in the United States throughout the 19th Century. Loosely translated, the phrase means "Buyer beware!"

Since the advent of the era of deregulation, the phrase has become increasingly important again. Con artists have hatched innumerable scams within the last few years, some clearly illegal, some technically legal, and many that are simply questionable.

Newspaper editors try to sort out those ads that are clearly fraudulent. No reputable newspaper person wants ads that are dishonest. But it is impossible to check out every classified ad that is submitted for publication.

In classified ads--as in all business transactions--if a proposition sounds too good to be true, it probably is just that.

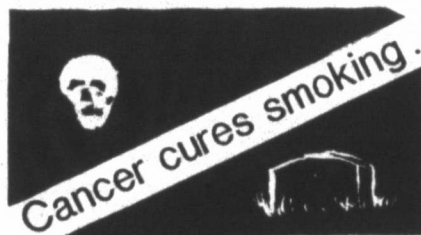
Every Donley County citizen should carefully check into any investment before committing money to it. A little investigation could beforehand could save a great deal of grief later.

Tobacco Can Cause Cancer

Health officials warn that a rising popularity of smokeless tobacco among the youth may lead to a growing incidence of oral cancer at the end of the decade. Currently, oral cancer strikes 11 per 100,000 Americans.

A 1989 Texas Department of Health (TDH) survey of about 4,400 Texas students in grades 7, 8, 10 and 12 reveals that more than 49 percent of the male respondents had tried smokeless tobacco at least once.

Some 31 percent of the 7th grade boys and nearly 70 percent of male seniors had tried snuff or



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chewing tobacco at least once. Most (about 62 percent) male students who had tried smokeless tobacco did so before age 13.

Ron Todd, coordinator of the TDH office of Smoking and Health, said, "A lot of younger kids start with snuff, the kind sold in convenient packets. And the risk of oral cancer may be 50 times higher for long-term snuff users than for tobacco non-users." He added that boys in Texas begin using smokeless tobacco earlier than do boys of other states.

He said that the percentage of 8th grade students who reported using smokeless tobacco in the previous 30 days was close to that found in a nationwide survey (8.8 percent Texas vs. 9.8 percent nationally). However, Texas 10th graders were more than twice as likely to be heavy users (20 times in the previous 30 days) than 10th graders nationally.

"We have the same problem with snuff and chewing tobacco that we have with cigarettes -- children start using it, and by the time they realize their mistake, they are addicted to nicotine," Todd said.

God and Country Award Given

Nicholas Rattan was recognized for his achievements in the God and Country program of the Boy Scouts of America in a ceremony at the First United Methodist Church on Sunday, March 3, 1991. The presentation was made by Rev. Terry Tamplen, pastor, who served as Nicholas' advisor. Nicholas received the God and Me medal and a patch in recognition of his accomplishments. He then presented a necklace to his mother and a lapel pin to his father.

The God and Me award is the first in a series of four awards that comprise the God and Country program. The God and Country award is given to scouts aged 6 to 8, this segment of the program was started in 1986. Nicholas is the 14th Cub Scout in Clarendon to receive this award.

Nicholas is the son of Pat Rattan of Clarendon and Ricky Rattan of Shamrock. His grandparents are Russell and Betty Vernon of Amarillo and Roeda Rattan and Sibyl Rattan.

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Nighttime Leg Cramps Cause Insomnia

According to a recent report, nighttime leg cramps are the fourth leading cause of insomnia (the inability to get to sleep and stay asleep). Typically, cramps in the legs during the night occur suddenly as muscular contractions that can last up to 10 minutes. The thigh or calf muscles tighten, followed by a random restlessness with movement of the legs. The cramping pain is commonly referred to as a "charley horse."

Those who have studied nighttime leg cramps believe the problem is due primarily to an imbalance of certain body electrolytes (sodium, potassium, magnesium, and calcium). The nerve impulses that cause muscular contraction may be altered by the imbalance of these minerals.

Leg muscle massaging and stretching may help reduce muscle tension and pain. Heat in the form of hot baths, water bottles, or heating pads may help. Elevating the legs many provide some relief. Nutritional supplements such as *vitamin E* have been advocated. At this time the U.S. Food and Drug Administration has not ruled on the safety or efficacy of vitamin E for leg cramps. *Quinine sulfate* has been used for over 50 years for this condition. Nightly doses of 200 to 300 milligrams have been reported to lessen the severity and duration of cramps.

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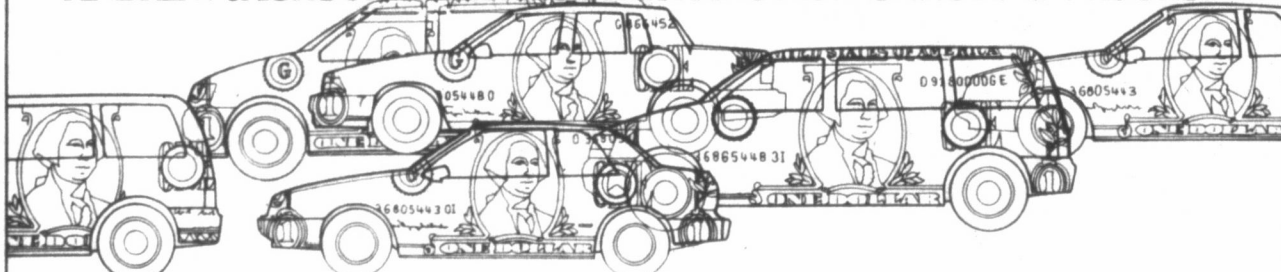

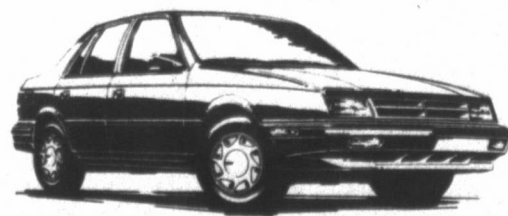
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Senior Citizens News

The old man turned to see the king coming toward him. Saul: Blessed be thou of the Lord, Amen, Praise the Lord! I did what the Lord told me to, Sam. So what brings you to Gilgal (the king's teeth shone like a bumper of pearls through his grand smile)?

Old man: Isn't that the sound of sheep and oxen I hear behind you there?

Saul: Uh...yeah! Yeah, I guess it is. We...uh...we brought the best of the livestock back to...uh...uh...sacrifice to God. Yeah, that's the ticket! We destroyed all the rest.

Old man: Well let me tell you what the Lord told me last night.

Saul: Uh...go ahead. Old man: You know what the Lord told you to do and you did it not. You chose rather to take a spoil than to obey God.

Saul: But Sam, I did obey the Lord! It was those stupid people that took those animals to sacrifice them here in Gilgal! Yeah, that's it! It was the people! Yeah!

Old man: Do you think that God was honored by your actions? Listen to this, to obey is better than sacrifice and to listen is better than anything you could come up with yourself! (the old man paused for effect) Rebellion is as the sin of witchcraft and stubbornness is as iniquity and idolatry. Because you have rejected the word of the Lord, He has also rejected thee from being king (I Samuel 15).

Then the king's crown fell from his head and landed in a manure pile left there by one of Agag's oxen.

If obedience were a cereal, no one would eat it. If it were a soft drink, no one would drink it. And since God doesn't write traffic tickets for disobedience, everyone takes it lightly and floor-boards their lives anyway. "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature (Mark 16:15)," is a commandment. Your presence with other believers at a local, New Testament church is not up to you, even if you think it is. Tithing is not open to personal interpretation, and neither is giving. To whom you should show love or not show love is not your decision; names to be drawn out of a hat. Witnessing is not up for discussion. These are all commandments.

Whether of them twain did the will of his father?"

Training Session Scheduled

The Texas Department of Agriculture will conduct a Predator Management Training Program on Tuesday, March 26, at Clarendon College in Clarendon. The training session begins at 6 p.m. and lasts about three hours. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is assisting TDA in conducting this training session.

All persons who want to use M-44 sodium cyanide to control coyotes, feral dogs, and foxes preying on livestock should attend the course. To continue using M-44 sodium cyanide, all M-44 applicators certified prior to April 18, 1988, must take this course and be recertified. The training leading to M-44 sodium cyanide also requires possession of a private applicator certification or applicator license to purchase state-limited-use pesticides. Information on obtaining these types of licenses will be covered at the training session.

In addition to the predator management program on that day, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will conduct a private applicator training session on the morning of March 26. Persons interested in attending that session should contact Tim Trimble, Donley County Extension Agent, at (806)874-2141.
