## Dr. Deyhle Sr. Wins Award

The American Association of Bovine Practitioners (AABP) has Veterinary Medicine"to Charles E. Deyhle, Sr., D.V.M., of Clarendon, Texas. The award is sponsored by MSD AGVET, a division of Merck & Co., Rahway, New Jersey.

Dr. Deyhle, a pioneer in feedlot medicine, was honored by AABP for the development of a complete herd health consulting service specializing in preventive medicine. He received the award from Dr. Gordon A. Atkins, AABP vice president, during the annual meeting of AABP in Indianapolis,

Dr. Devhle operates a father and son private practice in Clarendon, Texas which provides herd health programs for nearly two - million head of cattle and consultative veterinary services to 25 feedlots and numerous ranch clients annually.

A 1951 graduate of the Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine. Dr. Deyhle has authored or co-authored more than 20 articles emphasizing preventive medicine. In addition, he has produced a video entitled "Processing New Cattle." He has giving lectures to more than 400 groups of producers and veterinarians in 50 states.

Dr. Deyhle is active in many professional organizations including the Texas Veterinary Medical Association, the American Veterinary Medical Association, the Academy of Veterinary Consultants, AABP, and the American Association of Equine Practitioners. He Is a lifetime honorary member of 4-H and the K-9 club. In addition, he is a founded member of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Feeders Association and the chairman of the cattle Liaison Committee of the Texas A&M Development Program Target 2000 Committee.

In recognition of his contribution to preventive veterinary medicine. Dr. Deyhle received a specially designed plaque, featuring original bronze casting that symbolized the concept of preventive medicine. Additionally, a \$1,500 general scholarship in his name was giving to Texas A&M University, College of Veterinary Medicine by award's sponsor, MSD AGVET.

The "Award for Excellence in Preventive Veterinary Medicine" was established by MSD AGVET to provide greater recognition for preventive medicine and the outstanding contribution of AABP members. Through this annual awards program, AABP members will have available a continuing wealth of new ideas for planning, designing, and implementing preventive medical programs.







Head lice are tiny parasites - about the size of small ants. Lice have claws on each leg that allows them to cling to the skin and suck small amounts of blood from humans. Infestations of head lice are common among elementary-age school children. Head lice bites often produce redness, itching, and scratching for up to 24 hours after bites occur. Severe bites may result in crusting and oozing from the scalp and along the hair

Prescription and nonprescription medicines are available to help get rid of head lice. Prescription medicines include shampoos and cream rinses that are applied to the scalp for a few minutes and then rinsed away. Nonprescription shampoos should be applied a second time, 7 to 10 days after the first application. Some of the shampoo products come with a hair comb for removing lice eggs (nits) that may remain after shampooing.

Prevent head lice infestations by washing infected family member's clothes in hot water and drying clothes in a hot dryer for at least 20 minutes. Vacuum areas such as the backs of chairs and head rests that may come in contact with infected persons. Disinfect combs and hair brushes and periodically check children's hair for lice or eggs.

When differences arise, each believer must follow the Scriptures (as he understands) and refrain from judging others.

6) In every situation, Christians should be Christ-centered and emphasize those

things that encourage and build up faith in Him.

Our Lord knew that divisions weakened his Body's incentive to preach the Good News and destroyed the effectiveness of the message to unbelievers. Yet for hundreds of years, people who claimed to be Christians have divided into ever-more-numerous sects, denominations and splinter groups. This diabolical insanity must end. The torn Body of Christ must be allowed to heal.

Please pray--as did our Lord--that those of us today who believe may realize that by his grace we are one in Him, and that we may learn to live in unity.
