UIL To Meet

Public Meeting Held

Fifty Clarendon residents and business people met at the Clarendon Community Center on Thursday, March 14th at 7:00 p.m. Debbie Howard chaired the meeting.

The group was concerned about cleaning up Clarendon and promoting local businesses. They said that the streets and highways were filthy, business buildings were run down and no one was doing much to improve

The meeting discussed the relative merits of forming a Downtown Merchants Association or working through the Chamber of Commerce. Those who attended expressed a variety of viewpoints in a frank, candid manner. One business person said that he had been in business for six months, and had yet to see the Mayor. Some-- though polite--were quite critical of the Chamber of Commerce. Several chamber members explained that the Chamber has very few funds and to few active members to do what needs to be done. The Chamber secretary himself suggested a number of improvements that were needed. Chamber members implored everyone to join and participate. (One does not have to own a business to belong to the organization.) They solicited comments and criticism. The Chamber Board was, in fact, acutely aware of many of the shortcomings even before the meeting.

Many of those who at first were critical of the Chamber agreed to join and work together for the benefit of the community as a whole. Some felt that a separate organization was preferable, but all voted unanimously to work together through the Chamber for the present.

The participants discovered that they were in almost total agreement on their goals. Virtually everyone wants a clean, thriving community. Virtually everyone agreed that the Chamber has not been able to do everything that needs to be done. And virtually everyone was open to new ideas and welcomed new workers.

In all probability not a single person who attended got everything that he or she wanted at the meeting. Yet there was a remarkable consensus on the results. The meeting was beneficial. Clarendon citizens can work together. The community can do what needs to be

Town Meeting Set


Congress Bill Sarpalius will have a town hall meeting at 9:30 a.m. on Wednesday, March 27, at Clarendon College.

be planted to a cover crop. The legislation also allowed for the exemption of those areas determined to be arid by USDA. The determination to exclude Texas was based on meterological data that shows the line between non-arid and arid regions running from North Dakota through Texas. All states east of the line are not considered arid and must comply with the fifty percent cover requirement. Most states west

TDA Predator Management Training Session Scheduled For Clarendon

The Texas Department of Agriculture will conduct a Predator Management Training Program on Tuesday, March 26, 1991, at Clarendon College in Clarendon. The training session begins at 6 p.m., and lasts about three hours. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is assisting TDA in conducting this training

All persons who want to use M-44 sodium cyanide to control coyotes, feral dogs, and foxes preying on livestock should attend the course. To continue using M-44 sodium cyanide, all M-44 applicators certified prior to April 18, 1988, must take this course and be recertified. The training leading to M-44 sodium cyanide certification is free. Proper certification to use M-44 sodium cyanide also requires possession of a private applicator icense, or a commercial applicator license to purchase state-limiteduse pesticides. Information on obtaining these types of licenses will be covered at the training session.

In addition to the predator management program on that day, the Texas Agricultural Extension

Service will conduct a private applicator training session at 9:00 a.m. on the morning of March 26, 1991, in the Ranch Operations Classroom at Clarendon College.





According to the Poison Prevention Week Council, more than half a million children swallow some medicine or household chemical each year. While most recover, at least 30 children die annually in poisoning accidents. When young children are crawling, they can find poisonous products such as drain cleaners under the kitchen sink. As children get older and are able to stand, they may reach for medicines on counter tops or open medicine cabinets

If chemicals or household products have been swallowed, offer a small amount of water to the child. Then call a hospital emergency room of the local poison control center for advice as to whether or not to make the victim vomit. Keep a one-ounce bottle of ipecac syrup on hand for each child or grandchild in the home.

Poison prevention starts with keeping poisons out of the reach of children. When these products are in use, children should be observed closely. Keep poisonous products in their original containers. Medicines are best stored in a locked cabinet or on a high shelf out of children's reach.

The New Commandment

Jesus told his followers, "A new commandment I give to you: love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. All men will know you are my disciples if you love one another." [John 13:34-35]

That passage contains the real solution to the problem of religious division, even though it may not be evident at first glance. In fact some people may protest, "Surely all the love in the world would not have prevented such-and-such a schism!"

In fact, it is the only preventative.

The problem may lie in the fact that many Christians do not understand the word "love". The Biblical concept of love is not some gooey-sweet feeling. It is not some moon-struck emotion.

Love--in the Scriptures--is attitude and actions. Jesus illustrated that in numerous parables. But above all, he demonstrated it in his sacrificial life.

The apostle Paul wrote that God demonstrated his love for us in that "while we were yet sinners, Christ

He did not wait for us to become perfect (which we could not do, anyway). His love took the initiative. It acted when we could not.

Jesus' love also demonstrated his attitude. "Love is kind; it does not envy,...it is not proud,...it keeps no record of wrongs" [I Cor. 13: 4--5]. Indeed, the context of John 13:34-35 shows the Lord's attitude. Just before giving the New Commandment, Jesus had done the job that was usually reserved for the lowest slave in the household: he took a towel and washed his disciples' nasty, stinking feet. Was this what Paul was thinking about when he wrote, "Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit, but in humility consider others better than yourselves,"?

Attitudes and actions. Can a Christian become alienated from a brother whom he sincerely considers to be better than himself? Can a disciple really judge and condemn a brother if he is sincerely serving him?

No brother or sister is ever perfect. But if we truly follow Jesus, we will respect and care for others just as Jesus did: before they are perfect; while they still have their problems and weaknesses. They may even be ignorant about some things. After all, that is how we are when Jesus accepts us.

If we truly love our brothers and sisters, we will happily teach them everything we know. We will willingly learn from them all we can. We will gently correct and readily listen to correction. In cases where problems are unresolved we will be patient, "counting others better than ourselves".

Where divisions in the Body of Christ persist, both sides have failed. Schism cannot exist when Jesus's followers respect each other and treat each other as God

That is why Jesus described loving each other as the criterion by which Christians could be distinguished as his apprentices.
