 GrantThe City of Clarendon has Texas Department of Community Development Fund for 10,150 linear feet of $6^{\prime}$ water lines, 7 fire hydrants and 75 service connections and appurte
lowing locations:

Goodnight Street from Barcus to Wood; McClelland Street 7rom Barcus to Wood; Faker (SH blk S. of Wood. Br Barcus $101 / 2$ from Jackson to Carhart; Burkhead Street from Jackson to Carhart; Alley between Burkhead \& Browngrom Faker (SH 70) to Jackson; Street from Jackson to Gorst: Wood Street from Jackson to Gorst; alley between Montgomery \& Wood Street from In addition ackson. In addition a 70,000 gallon standpipe with site fencing and appurtenances will be erected. This
should greatly increase the water pressure throughout the city. The cost of the project will be $\$ 224,000$ with the Texas Department of
Commerce funding $\$ 194,700$ of the cost and the City contributing $\$ 29,300$ which has been set aside for this purpose. The project was applied for in 1988 and again in 1989, but funding was not awarded to Clarendon until application was
made the third time in 1990, and the City applying for grant funds. The contract between the City of Clarendon and the Texas Department of Commerce for this project has now been signed. Following the Plans and Specifications, Bid Advertisements and Awarding of Contracts for construction, actual construction is scheduled to begin in
October 1991.
