Among other issues, Callahan County Commissioners discussed a road in the Cottonwood Community at their Feb. 14, 2004 meeting.

The road, number 444, leading a 911 address, is in Precinct #4, and is shown as a county road on a 911 map, J. P. Rolan Jones said.

A resident living there, however, does not allow traffic to travel the road at a certain point, he reported.

Road 444 lies in Commissioner Grider's precinct, it was noted. Commissioner Grider said that to her knowledge, the road has not been maintained as a county road for many years.

Judge Jones said the road might have been taken over as a county road at one time, and ask which criteria is used in deciding if a road is a county road.

A 911 address or a map does not make a road a county road, presiding Judge Roger Corn said, and added that it would mainly be up to the precinct's commissioner to decide,

He continued that House Bill 1117 would clarify the definition of a county road, but that it take a year or so.

Commissioner Hicks commented that a road can be taken in to county road status at a later date, but that it must be brought up to certain specifications.

"I don't consider it a county road now, because it hasn't been maintained," Commissioner Grider said.

A motion to that effect made by Commissioner Grider, and seconded by Commissioner Hicks - carried with no opposition.

Further regarding county roads: Commissioners discussed HB 1117 maps received from the Allison-Bass Law Firm.

A motion was made by Commissioner Grider, seconded by Commissioner Farmer, to contact Rhonda Vestal (911) to sit down with each individual commissioner to discuss the maps. The motion carried unanimously.

"If there are any questions, they can be solved now," Judge Corn said.

TPA Board Supports Legislation Requiring Name Publication

Austin - The Texas Press Association Board of Directors on Jan. 20 voted unanimously to support legislation requiring publication of the names of finalists for the position of school district superintendent and for the position of college president.

House Bill 415 by Todd Baxter, R-Austin, requires school districts to release the names of applicants for the position of school superintendent who have been interviewed twice, under the Texas Public Information Act. A Senate companion to Baxter's bill is expected, but has not been filed to date.

Historically, newspapers and taxpaying citizens of Texas have been frustrated by school districts that bring a single finalist into the public eye after having interviewed several applicants. When a school district closes off the list of finalists, the lack of information essentially and detrimentally removes the community - the stakeholders - from the process, a TPA press release states.

Some local Radio and TV stations and Emergency Management offices may also relay this warning in your area. The practic tornado warning will be canceled at 10:20 a.m.

The warning will be issued for the following counties: Throckmorton, Haskell, Fisher, Jones, Shackelford, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan, Sterling, Coke, Runnels,

Coleman, Brown, Irion, Tom Green, Concho, McCulloch, San Saba, Crockett, Schleicher, Menard, Sutton, Kimble, and Mason counties.

Black History Month Black Confederate Hcritage

"There are at the present moment, many colored men in the Confederate Army doing duty...as real soldiers, having muskets on their shoulders and bullets in their pockets ... " Frederick Douglas, former slave and abolitionist (fall, 1861)

How many?- Easily tens of thousands of blacks served the Confederacy as laborers, teamsters, cooks and even as soldiers. Some estimates indicate 25% of free blacks and 15% of slaves actively supported the South during the war.

Why?- Blacks served the South because it was their home, and because they hoped for the reward of patriotism; for these reasons they fought in every war through Korea even though it meant defending a segregated America.

Emanicipation? President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation did not free a single slave. Issued at a time when the Confederacy seemed to be winning the war, Lincoln hoped to transform a Stonewall Jackson, and was

This fact sheet is prepared Great Britain (and France) from intervening on the side of the South. The proclamation allowed slavery to contine in the North as well as in Tennessee and large parts of Louisiana and Virginia. It applied only to Confederate-held slaves, which Lincoln had no authority over, but not to slaves under Federal control.





AUSTIN - One month you notice that your bank statement has not arrived when it normally does. Or maybe your bank or credit union unexpectedly turns down your loan application. Maybe you aren't your complete self anymore: Someone has assumed your identity, at least your Social Security or driver's license numbers, and is illegally making use of your oncegood credit. Generically, it'scalled identity theft and state officials say the problem is growing increasingly worse.

With that in mind, Sen. Juan Hinojosa (D-McAllen) has filed Senate Bill 122, a bill that would enable the attorney general's office to pursue legal action against anyone who swipes credit card information or personal checks. The bill also would allow the AG's office to seek

restitution and even to impose penalties on firms that allow a security lapse in regard to someone's personal information.

The National Budget Allows Us to Set **Priorities**

Our country, like most households, operates on a budget which seeks to balance our spending with our income. Budgets are a time for serious discussions weighing needs and wants with the available resources. In Congress it is a difficult process which can take a great deal of time.

The tone of the budget debate is usually set by the President's recommendations for spending. The two separate houses of Congress then work on their versions of a budget, which becomes the blueprint for the appropriations process.

I was encouraged by President Bush's overall proposal of a \$2.7 trillion budget because the announcement means we will have a serious effort to reduce our budget deficit after several years of higher spending to fight the war on terrorism.

As a fiscal conservative, I greeted increased expenditures over the recent past as painful necessities to protect the American people.

Several years ago, our national economy was buffeted by several extraordinary events The economy entered a recession after the internet bubble burst and a wave of corporate scandals rocked the markets. In the midst of this adjustment, the 9-11 attacks took place, killing thousands and paralyzing our economy. Since that time, we have gone to war in Iraq and Afghanistan to upend terror-sponsoring regimes and free millions of people. While we have been victorious, the effort

has been, and will remain, ity under the Constitution to expensive. But for a safer and more secure homeland, that cost is a relative bargain.

As our nation dealt with these challenges, Congress and President Bush passed bipartisan tax relief which jump-started the economy and led to strong job creation and lower unemployment. This year, with our economy on the upswing, and after initial expenses to bolster homeland security,

we are in the best position yet to begin reducing the deficit.

President Bush's budget envisions increasing defense spending by 4.8 percent. Spending on the Department of Homeland Security would rise by 7 percent. The proposed budget would scale back increases of discretionary programs to 2.1 percent, which is less than the rate of inflation.

The budget for the 2006 fiscal year beginning in October plans to reduce

the budget deficit by 8.6 percent in the first year alone, excluding costs involved in Iraq and Afghanistan. Economists say the most important measure of spending is the ratio of debt to the size of a nation's economy, or Gross Domestic Product (GDP). The President's budget projects a budget deficit amounting to 3 percent of GDP for 2006, down from 3.5 percent this year.

If we follow this roadmwe can cut the budget denc. by half to 1.5 percent of GDP by 2009, according to White House budget officials.

The President's budget marks a desire to adopt a more conservative fiscal philosophy on government spending. It is a good starting point and I share his commitment to discipline. However, it is Congress which set spending levels and allocate resources. Within the framework of a conservative

budget, I will fight to increase some programs critical to Texas which have been shortchanged in the President's budget, and will work to find savings in other areas. The state and Criminal Alien Assistance program, which reimburses states for the costs involved with illegal aliens, is one example of a program which appears underfunded. NASA's traditional science programs and Amtrak are others. We must assure our farmers all have the help necessary to keep making healthy food for our country and for export. Holding the overall line on expenditures will be often difficult, but we know we have an ally in the White House as we rein in

spending. In times of tighter budgets, as you may guess, it is sometimes hard to secure funding for projects in our home states. The level of scrutiny always increases when funding is more restricted, but I remain optimistic. I have always approached budgeting as a serious matter, and have presented my colleagues with the best evidence available that particular projects are good, not only for Texas, but for our nation.

If I continue using that yardstick, I believe we will gain what is right for the Lone Star State and stick to conservative fiscal principles which will make our nation and economy stronger in the long run.

Show Emergency Workers You Care-Slow Down Or Move Over

Texas Highway Patrol activated. troopers want drivers to show emergency workers

care, not only on Valentines Day but everyday. Beginning today, drivers pulled over by DPS troopers for traffic vio-' dions will receive a flyer that reminds them to slow down or move over for stopped emergency vehicles


This reminder packs an added punch because it's the law. Since the slow-down or move-over law took effect on Sept. 1, 2003, DPS has written 2,304 citations and 14,404 warnings to drivers who have violated the law. Although DPS has issued several press releases concerning this law, troopers

continue to see drivers who do not slow down or move over for emergency vehicles with lights activated, including police, emergency medical service and fire vehicles.

The slow down/move over law requires drivers nearing stopped emergency vehicles with emergency lights activated to either slow down or change lanes. Specifically, the law states a driver must either slow down 20 miles per hour below the speed limit or vacate the lane closest to the stopped emergency vehicle that has emergency lights activated if the road has multiple lanes traveling in the same direction. (If the speed limit is below 25 mph, the driver must slow down to 5 mph.) Drivers should only move over if they can safely and legally do so; otherwise, they should slow down.

"Our Highway Patrol troopers spend a large part of their time working on highways and roads with vehicles speeding past," said DPS Director Col. Thomas A. Davis Jr. "Just the slightest slip of the wheel can endanger them. This law requires drivers to give them and other emergency vehicles the space they need to perform their duties safely."

A violation is punishable by a maximum fine of \$200. If the violation results in property damage, the maximum fine increases to \$500. Panel co its of Chief Justice





Update On 79th Legislature; Schools Still A Major Concern The 79th Legislature conOther funding would come Services. There was also dis-

tinued deliberations in Austin last week, attempting to stretch the available money over a multitude of needs.

The financing of public schools continued to occupy a lot of discussion, for the moment taking attention from such other basics as water needs and lagging social programs.

It is estimated that the schools will need at least \$5 billion more than the \$30 billion being spent on education in the state. One concern is that last year, in Sept. 2004, a Travis County District Judge gave the Legislature just one year to come up with a different formula for school funding.

The Senate has worked on a plan, and the House has one bill or more under consideration, but nothing definite has been decided yet.

One thing leadership from both Houses apparently agreed on a week ago - that the Department of Public Safety needs more funding. Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and Speaker of the House Tom Craddick have both announced that they support a pay raise and stipend program for the DPS. They note that the agency has additional homeland security duties since the 9-11 attack.

Other discussions during the week highlighted the Trans Texas Corridor, Gov. Rick Perry's \$184-billion plan to build several gigantic highways around the state.

from Corporations based in foreign counties, who would put up the money for construction and have a long-running program to collect tolls on the use of the highways.

In places the highways would be almost a quarter of a mile wide, and have multiple lanes on each side. The concrete and rail corridors would have enough room for cars, busses, trains, trucks, pipelines and utility cables. They would have little access to small towns along the route, being geared for large cities.

Although the Legislators don't seem inclined to block this plan (they voted FOR it about two years ago) they are at least beginning to question some of the stipulations.

The Farm Bureau and other organizations have come out in opposition.

The proposed first phase of the project is a 300-mile stretch of tollway from San Antonio to the Oklahoma border. It would run near 1-35.

Other matters considered this week included a continuation of the fight for slot machines in the state. One lawmaker proposed a video gambling retailer in each of nine geographic regions across Texas. The money would go to schools.

There was a lot of discussion on adult and child care in the state. One El Paso Judge gave accounts of seniors "living in poverty" who had fallen under the jurisdiction of the cussion on the mind-altering drugs sometimes given to children in foster homes. Advocates are calling for strict rules on the use of the drugs.

In other concerns, one State Representative is asking that the Comptroller conduct a fig. nancial review of the Company that manages the state's electric grid. Twenty-three indictments have reportedly been made against former top officials with the Reliability Council of Texas. These allege organized criminal activity. misapplication of funds, commercial bribery and theft by receiving stolen property.

Not much "reliability" apparent there!

The next week of the 79th Legislature promises to be just as interesting as this last one. Stay tuned!

Agricultural Viewpoint

> Things To Know Abou! Bulbs

Why don't flower bulbs in the ground freeze in the winter? Bulbs are designed by nature to withstand cold winter temperatures. Indeed they rely on winter's cold to trigger the biochemical process necessary to bring the bulb to flower in spring. While winter soil may actually freeze to depths beyond which the bulbs are spring.

planted, soil temperature will rarely fall below 29 degrees F or 30 degrees F. At these just below freezing temperatures. winter in the cells of the bulb may freeze but the cells will not be harmed. Also, as it true for many hardy plants, cold temperatures trigger starches in bulbs to break down molecules. acts in much the same way as salt on a winter sidewalk. The sugar in the bulb, like the salt on the sidewalk, lowers the temperature at which water freezes. This fortunate chemistry helps to keep bulbs safe and snug in their winter beds. Other factors that help keep soil temperatures within tolerable limits include an insulating snow cover and, in colder areas, a nice layer of mulch over the bulb bed once the ground temperatures have dropped.

What is it's already early winter and I still have not planted my bulbs? When best plans fail and you still have not planted your bulbs by early winter, the answer is -- just plant the bulbs as soon as you can, even if you have to chip into the ground. Bulbs are not dormant, they are alive - and they won't last much longer if left unplanted. If you can get them into the ground (either in pots or in the garden), chances are good that they will grow. If you do not plant them soon, you may as well toss them out.

Bulbs that get less than 10-14 weeks (depending on their type) of sustained cold emperatures still come up by may be shorter than usual. If they are types or varieties that perennalize to naturalize, they will come back normally in future years if their foliage is left to die back after bloom in Thursday, February 17, 2005

more late season trick up their sleeve; they pot up unplanted bulbs for indoor forcing, or as container plants. With containers, you have the advantage of being able to control the initial soil temperature by adding your own soil. Choose the light potting soil mixes sold at all garden retailers. Move small containers to an unheated garage or other cool, yet protected place. In spring, use the potted bulbs as accent plants or bring them indoors. Remember these are last ditch measures. Once the time for all planting has arrived in your area, the sooner bulbs are safely

in the ground, the better. What is the difference between a daffodil and a narcissus? The simple answer is NONE. Narcissus is the Latin or botanical name for all daffodils, just llex is for hollies. Daffodil is the common name for all members of the genus Narcissus, and its use is recommended by the American Daffodil Society at all times

other than in scientific writing. What is a jonquil? In the southeastern U.S., all yellow


daffodils have traditionally

Expert gardeners have one been referred to as jonquils. However, according to the official book of daffodils, the Internationally registry and Daffodil List, maintained by Great Britain's Royal Horticultural Society, only certain daffs can truly be called jonguils. These have several vellow flowers, strong fragrance, and rounded foliage, as defined under Division 7 and Division 10 in the official registry. However, in the South, should a gardener ask to show you his or her jonguils, it is recommended that you allow good manners to triumph over erudition. Admire the flowers and enjoy the sweet smell.

When is the best time to plant tulips, daffodils and most other bulbs in fall? In most areas, the 'window' of time for planting bulbs in fall is fairly wide. Here is a practical way to plan:

Time to start planting bulbs: once night time temperatures drop into the low 50s or 40s for two weeks.

Time to finish up: once hard frosts are coming. Generally bulbs root best in the period six weeks or more prior to the ground freezing.



TSCRA News Update February 14, 2005

NCBA team evaluates Canada's beef systems

At the request of the National Cattlemenis Beef Association Executive Committee, nine U.S. cattle producers traveled to Canada last month to get a first-hand account of Canadaís beef product systems.

Labeled a "fact-finding mission," the delegation was charged with probing into key issues concerning resumption of trade between the two countries, including:

- Cattle inventory and economic impact on the U.S. market

- Feed ban procedures and compliance
- Canadian BSE surveillance
- Border crossing procedures
- Structural changes in the Canadian industry resulting from the border closure

"There is no question this issueóresumption of trade with Canada has been at the top of U.S. cattlemen's minds and a primary topic of conversation," said Jamie Willrett. Illinois cow-calf producer and feedlot operator. "In many cases it's been difficult to discern fact from fiction.

"NCBA's producer leadership felt it was important that an independent team of U.S. cattlemen go up there and found that while boying Board take a look, ask tough questions and determine whether ispengiform encephalopathy what we saw and heard made sense."

The NCBA delegation arrived Monday evening, Jan. 17, and returned Thursday evening, Jan. 20.

During the intense three-day period, the delegation met with

Can-Fax (Canada's independent economic analysis firm), the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA), visited multiple feed mills and feedlots (including a flyover of Alberta's "feedlot alley" that represents 700,000 head of Southern Alberta's 1.1 to 1.2 million head on feed) and toured of one of Alberta's largest beef slaughter facilities and a rendering facility.

"Our task was to get as many facts as we could to help inform NCBA members on the situation in Canada," explained Willrett.

"It is important to know that any policies or recommendations in response to these facts will be made by the members. The delegation was not asked to, nor did they choose to take, a position one way or another on the issues related to the USDA rule," he emphasized.

News Glance

Canada plans to expand access for U.S. cattle. The Canadian Food

Agency announced proremove import restrictions on a wide range U.S. cattle and beef products. Based on guidelines for the World Organization for Animal Health, the CFIA plans to permit the importation of live cattle born in 1998 or later, beef from animals of any age from which specified risk material has been removed and various other commodities. With respect to bluetongue and anaplasmosis, the proposed regulations will allow for year-round access for U.S. feeder cattle destined for slaughter into Canadian feedlots. The proposed regulations have been published with a 30-day comment period ending on March 1, 2005.

Canadian Food inspection Agency

The risk of transmitting BSE to humans is very low ported in the British medical journal Lancet. The study can be transferre to humans in the form of Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease, it takes massive consumption of specified risk materials like brains and other parts associated with the central nervous system to produce an infection.

The human infectivity rate from consuming diseased cattle products is seven to 20 times lower than the infectivity rate for cattle consuming the same products. It is estimated that a human would have to eat some 3.3 pounds of infected neural tissue to be at risk of developing the disease. The study concluded that "existing public health measures can prevent transmission of BSE to man."


