Producers Association in Amarillo. But in the Blacklands, wheat acreage is down 25 percent, and in the highly productive Panhandle-South Plains region it is off 15 percent.

"We anticipate that much of that will go to cotton," he said. In the fall of 1989, producers planted 6.9 million acres of wheat. They harvested 3.5 million acres of that. Some producers think about 3 million of this year's 6-million-acre wheat crop will be harvested.

"That would give the state a 90-million-bushel crop" compared to the 1990 yield of 130.2 million bushels, Nelson said. "A lot depends on the weather between now and harvest."

Corn acreage will probably be about 1.5 million acres, 10 percent to 15 percent below last year, said Carl King of Dimmitt, chairman of the Texas Corn Growers Association and executive director of the Texas Corn Producers Board.

King said problems with aflatoxin in some of the corn-producing counties, government programs and cost of production were reasons for the reduced acreage. He noted that the High Plains, which produces 65 percent of the state's food corn, wasn't troubled by aflatoxin last year, but some farmers are "shuffling around their flex acres."

Nationwide, sorghum is expected to be planted on 12.5 million acres, an increase of 18 percent, said Jack Eberspacher, executive director of the National Grain Sorghum Association in Abernathy.

### What To Do About Morning Sickness

One of the most common complaints experienced during pregnancy is morning sickness. According to recent statistics, about 60 percent of all pregnant women experience early morning nausea and vomiting, usually during the first three months of pregnancy. However, only a few women experience severe vomiting throughout the day.

Most physicians are cautious in prescribing medicines for pregnancy-related nausea and vomiting. A common recommendation is to avoid large meals. Eating small portions of low-fat foods at frequent intervals has been shown to be beneficial in some cases. Some physicians suggest treating morning sickness with soda crackers and caffeine-free soft drinks. Avoiding spicy foods and the smell of foods may help prevent the nausea and vomiting.

If these measures are not successful, nonprescription medicines that are proven safe to take during pregnancy may be helpful. A phosphated carbohydrate solution such as *Emetrol* may help reduce nausea. According to a recent article in *Pharmacy Times*, the antihistamine *meclizine hydrochloride* is considered by some to be the drug of choice for the management of morning sickness. However, no medicine should be consumed during pregnancy without the advice of a physician.

## "What causes fights and quarrels ...?"

In the New Testament, James asks Christians "What causes fights and quarrels among you?"

Most Christians who are (or have been) involved in controversy would be quick to answer "I'm just defending the truth!" Of course, curiously enough, their opponent(s) would also say, "I'm just defending the faith!" Each party claims to have the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth.

One suspects that the good apostle would be unimpressed with our answers. For that matter, most church historians would be fairly skeptical, too.

In the last half of verse 1 and in the following verses of Chapter 4, James answers the question he posed. He said that feuding and fussing were the result of wanting something and not getting it. The root of such quarrels are covetousness; the result is murder, at least in intent.

Perhaps Satan's ultimate weapon against faithful Christians is his ability to stir up hard feelings between brothers. Then--because we realize such feelings are wrong--he helps us find a justification for our animosity. Old so-and-so is wrong or stupid or unfaithful.

Yet a few verses earlier James anticipated our alibi: "Such 'wisdom' does not come down from above, but is earthly, unspiritual, of the devil."

Schism within the Body of Christ exists because of human pride and human weakness. Each believer should be ashamed of every division that separates him or her from other believers.

But Christians do not have to be alienated from each other. James describes the solution in beautiful language.

"But the wisdom that comes down from heaven is first of all pure, then peace-loving, considerate, submissive, full of mercy and good fruit, impartial and sincere. Peacemakers who sow in peace raise a harvest of righteousness."

Safe Sex and Other Myths

Safe Sex. We often hear that phrase tossed around these days. Teach our kids safe sex. Provide free contraceptives. So go some of the arguments. I have no new revelation to add to the subject. Besides, in our conservative area, I doubt that many of you need convincing of the idiocy of the "safe-sexers" stance. I simply suggest that the goal of safe-sex advocates might be summarized in this way: to provide all the benefits of sex and eliminate all the hazards.

Up with the benefits, down with the hazards. Sounds like a good thing to strive for in any situation, doesn't it?

What about doing just that when it comes to committing one's self to the Lord's work? Safe commitment. All benefits, no hazards. My kind of religion, we are tempted to say. Philip the evangelist might well have resisted the Spirit's tug at his heart in the direction of the desert road (Acts 8:26-40). After all, Philip was in the midst of a great work, and many were being converted (Acts 8:5-8).

"Go speak to one man on a lonely, dusty, desert road? I'm too busy--busy at Your work, Lord. Just look at all the results. Crowds are coming to hear Your Word. And the church is already beginning to look to me for leadership. Besides, those desert roads are dangerous. No, I think I'd better stay here, Lord. There's just too much going on. And remember, it is for You."

But, of course, Philip said no such thing. He did not take the safe route. He obeyed the Spirit's call, won a single Ethiopian officer to the Lord, and from the earliest days of the church until now, there has been a Christian community in Ethiopia.

"He that loveth his life shall lose it; and he that hateth his life in this world shall keep it unto life eternal" (John 12:25).

Safe prayer? We're good at that, aren't we?

"God bless our church."

A week later, you're back in church. The building didn't fall in. You and those around you are reasonable healthy. No one, no thing, particularly troubled you this past week. God must have heard and blessed.

"God bless America." America was not beaten in war this week. Our economic system did not collapse. The President was not assassinated. God

must have heard and blessed. "Lord, heal the sick and save the lost."

People are healed. The newspaper listed quite a few released from the hospital. Church papers report conversions all across the country. God must have heard and answered.

These are safe prayers. They're so safe, so general, that, like a horoscope, they almost have to "come true." And as is true with a horoscope, nothing is demanded of the one offering the prayer, and very little happens in his life that would not have happened anyway.

Everything the Word teaches about prayer implies obedience and the willingness to put feet to our prayers. A real prayer is specific. It's probably going to cost you time, and labor, and tears of grief as you look around and see that, as yet, God's will is not done on earth as it is in heaven.

Christ was obedient. He put feet to His prayers. He was specific. His prayer-become-action cost Him. When we pray--and work--for the Kingdom, we're doing His work, and are becoming like Him, and that's worth any risks.

There can be safe sex--one man, one woman, in the bond of one marriage. God's way. The only way.

There cannot be safe commitment. Commitment always has its risks. Commitment to God brings the displeasure of the devil. That's risky. But "greater is He that is in you than he that is in the world" (1 John 4:4).

Nor can there be safe prayer. Real prayer places you on the front lines of the Battle of the Ages. The fray is a bloody one. But the battle is the Lord's. He signs no truce; He never surrenders.

All benefits, no risks? What a foolish concept when speaking of extra-marital sex. How utterly foolish when speaking of the Lord's work. Risk everything on the Lord. He lands us safe on Canaan's side.

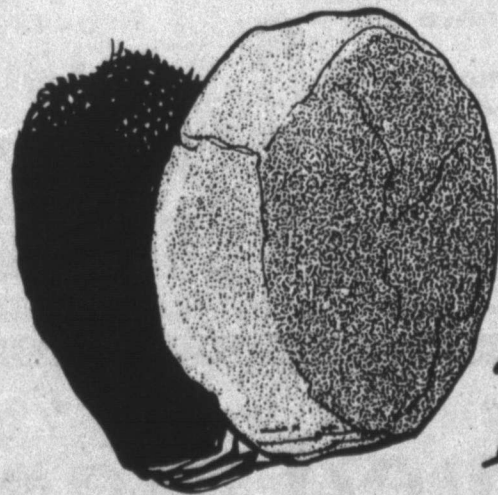
