Candidates Need to Sign Up

Anyone who wants to run for the board of alderman, hospital district board or school board should sign up between February 20 and March 20. Each of the entities will hold elections on May 4.

State law provides that anyone who wants to be a candidate should sign up not earlier than 45 days before the election date and not later than 30 days before the polls open.

Each of the governing bodies has two or three slots open. The boards of the college and county are not involved this year. Absentee voting will begin April 15 and run through April 30.

Hawkins Receives PhD.

During the fall commencement ceremonies over 6,000 degrees were awarded at Texas A & M University. Dean Hawkins, of Clarendon, Texas was awarded the Ph. D. in Physiology of Reproduction. Dr. Hawkins dissertation was entitled "Anterior Pituitary Content and In Vitro Secretion of Heterogenous Isoforms of Bovine Luteinizing Hormone: Effects of Endocrine Milieu and In Vivo Progestin Treatment." While at Texas A & M, Dr. Hawkins also conducted cooperative research at the King Ranch, Kingsville, Texas, and the Texas Experiment Station, Uvalde, texas, involving serving capacity testing of bulls and its influence on conception rates. Dr. Hawkins was among the first to implement this type of fertility testing in Texas. While at A & M, Dr. Hawkins attended and presented his research findings at seven scientific meetings in six states. this summer he will present a research paper at the International Society for the Study of reproduction, Calgary, Canada.

Dean was also the recipient of the Dr. A.M. "Tony" Sorenson award for his achievements in research and teaching at A & M. Dean is a 1980 graduate of Clarendon High School and received his degree from Clarendon College in 1982. His B.S. and M.S. degrees were received from Texas Tech University in 1984 and 1986, respectively. He is the son of Jerry and Glenda Hawkins and presently is employed as a National Institute of Health postdoctoral fellow by the Physiology department of Colorado State University Veterinary Medicine School.

Boy Scouts Honor Estlack

Helen Estlack was one of five people to be honored with the Silver Beaver Award at the Golden Spread Council Annual Volunteer Appreciation Dinner held at St. Paul's United Methodist Church in Amarillo on Saturday, February 9, 1991.

The Silver Beaver Award is presented annually by the Boy Scouts of America to adults who have demonstrated outstanding service to boyhood through the BSA and other fields such as civic, religious, professional, educational, etc. It is the highest adult award that may be bestowed on the council level.

Each year the council selects three to five candidates, nominated by their peers, from the top 26 counties of the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles to be presented to the National Court of Honor. With their approval, the officers of the National Council of the BSA then affix their signatures and the corporate seal to a certificate. This is presented along with a miniature Silver Beaver suspended by a blue, white, and blue ribbon to be worn around the neck.

Estlack began working with scouts as a merit badge counselor in 1965, and became involved with the Cub Scout program in 1979. She coached 24 boys to earn the Texas Medal between 1986 and 1989. 

Proper Use of Inhalers in Asthma Treatment

Asthma is a common lung condition that affects more than 9 million Americans (about four percent of the population). According to a recent issue of the Mayo Clinic Proceedings, asthma is the most common chronic condition treated by pediatricians and the leading cause of childhood

disability. Medically, asthma is a narrowing or obstruction of the small air passages in the lungs. Typically, asthma causes chest tightness, breath-

Prescription medicines given by way of a metered-dose inhaler have been found to be effective in treating asthma. Such medicines include

albuterol, terbutaline, and metaproterenol. Some studies have shown that

very few patients actually use metered dose inhalers correctly. The most common problem relates to inhaling and holding the breath for the proper

amount of time. The correct procedure, according to most references is: remove the inhaler cap; shake the inhaler container; hold the container up-

right; tilt the head back slightly; inhale and exhale through the mouth or nose normally; seal the lips on the inhaler mouthpiece; breathe in slowly

and deeply through the mouth to activate the inhaler; hold the breath for

10 seconds; exhale slowly through the nose; use one puff of medication;

He said the week encourages producers to get their sprayers calibrated accurately, brush up on safety measures and follow the correct chemical mix, rinse and fill




