School Hikes Tax 32.7%

Under pressure from the State of Texas, Clarendon Consolidated Independent School District is planning to raise taxes by 32.7%. The school system published an official notification in the newspaper on August 16th. They have scheduled a public hearing for Thursday, August 23, 1990.

The increase will mean that the owner of a typical \$30,000 house will see his bill go from \$173.04 per year to \$229.67 per year.

The school board's action was forced by the Governor and the Texas Legislature, who have decided to penalize districts whose tax rates have not been as high as richer districts in the state (See related story, below.)

Clarendon's 1989 tax rate was \$.692 compared to Groom's \$1.250, and McLean's \$1.200. Most other area towns also charged more than Clarendon's .692 rate. Memphis charged \$1.078, and Shamrock ran 1.05. Among schools of roughly comparable size, only Miami had a lower rate: \$.643. The average tax rate in Region 16 was \$.957 and the state average was \$1.010. The new tax rate will change Clarendon's figure from \$.69217 to .91869, a change of \$.22652 or twenty-two cents.

The state has mandated further increases for the next four years, but fortunately these will not be nearly as large as this year's figure, ranging from 6.3 cents to 6.8 cents per year.

The Texas State Legislature has taken a carrot-and-stick approach to local school boards. Last year the state's "guaranteed yield" to the Clarendon CISD budget was about \$222,936. If the school board passes the tax hike, the 1990-1991 check from the state should be \$302,000. Without the tax increase the state would only send \$139,236 to Clarendon. That would be a loss of \$262,900 per year for the first year and sharply larger amounts in following years.

Clarendon CISD's total tax levy runs about \$553,000, and actually collects a sum equal to about 98% of that.

Why Local Taxes Go Up

Probably no one would claim that the present tax system is totally fair. Local governments in Texas have increased their tax levies by 84% since 1984, and Donley County entities have increased their levies by 30--and that does not include proposed increases.

That information is enough to make many local taxpayers foam at the mouth and start looking for rope to hang the members of the five boards that spend local tax money. Perhaps some of that reaction is justified. But the situation is not as simple as it first appears.

Much of the local increase simply replaced revenue that formerly came from Federal Income Taxes or state revenue. A large percentage of the much ballyhooed "tax cuts" of the last decade simply transferred tax burdens from corporations and wealthy tax payers to local property taxes. In the past six years, the average property tax burden in Texas has increased by 62%. Washington shoved obligations off on the states, counties and cities, while Austin transferred expenditures from the state coffers to county and city taxpayers.

Hundreds of rural hospitals closed because Federal programs paid unfair premiums to urban hospitals and cheated rural ones. At the same time, the Texas Legislature wrote new laws that made public schools more expensive to operate, but the state did little to shoulder the cost of their mandates. They did, however, force local districts to spend far more money than before.

New Peanut Chemical Available

Texas peanut producers can use the pesticide Botran to help avoid an estimated \$9.5 million in losses from a peanut blight, Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower said today.

Hightower announced that the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has granted and emergency request from the Texas Department of Agriculture and Texas peanut growers to allow the unregistered pesticide to be used on the state's peanut crop.

"The disease pressures are strong this year," said Mary Webb, executive director of the Texas Peanut Producers Board. "It's the most severe it's been in at least several years. We're grateful for the help from TDA and the Texas A&M Extension Service to get this exemption. Wet, cool weather has led to an outbreak of sclerotinia blight, the disease, first observed in Texas in 1981, can drastically reduce or even wipe out yields from affected fields of peanuts.

Hightower said the exemption will allow peanut farmers in most areas of the state to use the pesticide until October 21, 1990. However, producers in Bexar, Comanche, Erath, San Saba and Somervell counties cannot use the pesticide until September 1, because of potential harm to the black-capped vireo, an endangered species of bird.

Without the request from TDA and the EPA action, use of the pesticide would be illegal on peanuts in Texas. Federal law allows state departments of agriculture to request such exemptions under unusual circumstances such as the wet, cool weather in Texas peanut areas.

Producers with questions may call the Extension Service, the Peanut Producers Board, or the TDA Pesticide Registration Program at 512/463-7549.

Clarendon College Calls For Volunteers

Clarendon College is calling for qualified individuals to volunteer their services to assist in the remedial program in the fall and spring. In 1989, it became mandatory for all students failing pre-TASP and TASP tests to be remediated in basic skills (reading, writing, and mathematics). To meet the TASP mandate and also to aid students otherwise needing remedial assistance, Clarendon College developed appropriate curriculum and provided a learning lab. It became clear in the planning stages that students would need flexible access to the learning lab and/or tutorial sessions at times that did not conflict with their normal course load. Remedial classes, therefore, were established in the

evenings, Monday through Thursday. Tutors in reading, writing and mathematics are badly needed. If you would be willing to give at least one evening of your time, from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. for this purpose, please phone Dr. Phil Shirley at 874-3571.

Fishing Report



Texas Parks & Wildlife reports that fishing at Lake Greenbelt is fairly good. The water is clear, 82 degrees, normal level; the smallmouth bass record was tied with a 5 pound, 1 ounce fish caught by Randy McGlaughlin of Amarillo; crappie are slow; white bass are good to 15 fish per string to 2 pounds each on minnows and nightcrawlers; catfish are fairly good in the 4 to 12 pound range; walleye are fairly slow, some in the 3-8 pounds in 12 to 18 feet of water.

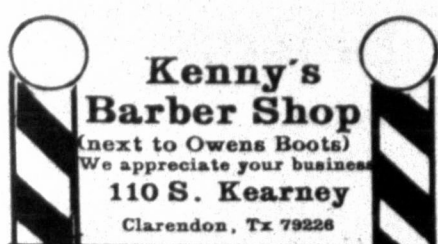

New environmental legislation became inevitable when it became obvious what current trash disposal was doing to aquifers and atmosphere of America. No one wants his well poisoned. But the costs of "solid waste disposal" (as garbage is now called) has soared higher than the Space Shuttle, and experts predict that the biggest expense is still in the future. Garbage collection will soon be one of the biggest expenditures for Donley County governments.

Area officials are virtually powerless to control any of the above expenses. A president, senator, congressman, governor or state legislator may promise "no new taxes" or similar rhetoric, that gets him elected. But seldom are they really cutting taxes. Usually they merely transfer the tax burden to less progressive collection areas. General Motors Corporation loves that change, but it is not nearly as good news for local elected officials--or for a widow living on Social Security in Donley County.

Both Schools have copies of the policy, which may be reviewed by anyone who is interested. Copies of the form are available at the schools for anyone who needs one.

Applicants must provide the following information so that school officials may determine eligibility: the names of all household members, social security number of the primary wage earner or the household member who signs the application, total household income or the household's food stamp case number (if the household is receiving food stamps). The form must also have the signature of an adult member of the household, certifying that the information is correct.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. Income must be at or below specified levels to qualify. Household size and income criteria are as follows:

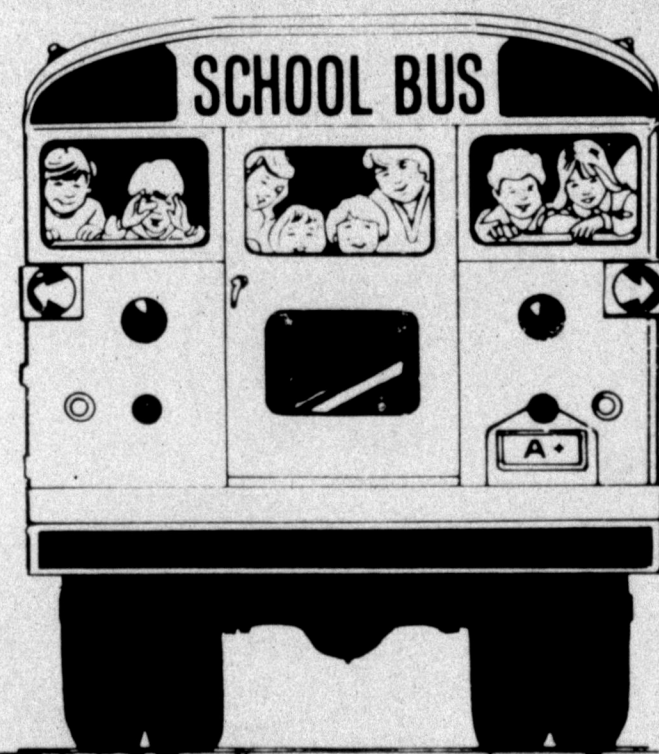

Jesus told his disciples that simple words were sufficient. They did not have to swear that what they said was true. "Yes" and "no" were enough.

Preachers and teachers have repeated that story over and over again. Yet, somehow we seem to have lost the real impact of it.

Jesus was not really preaching against profanity in that lesson hundreds of years ago. He was not concocting some esoteric doctrine about testifying in court. He was not really even teaching about what we say, except perhaps indirectly.

The heart of Jesus' message had little to do with our talking. Jesus was getting down to some hard basics of what we are.

"Yes" and "no" are adequate only when they come from a character of absolute integrity.

A mature Christian does not camouflage the situation with "ifs" and "buts". He does not leave false impressions. He does not confuse what she wants to be true with reality. No matter how painful the results, the true disciple will not shade the truth. He does not quibble or argue.

Quietly, with a humble awareness of his or her own failings, with sensitivity to the welfare of others, the real follower of Jesus simply relates the facts. And when that level of integrity—that sterling character—becomes obvious, then "yes" or "no" becomes perfectly adequate. And the compromises and deceit of ordinary life is revealed in stark contrast.

Perhaps most of us who aspire to be Christians have not yet achieved that level of candor. For us, Jesus' words are an uncomfortable goad. But they also reveal to us a breathtaking goal.

By God's grace we have been saved in order to become people of crystal character.

"Lord, help me to become a person 'in whom there is no guile.' "

The family requests that all memorial be to Rowe Cemetery in Hedley.

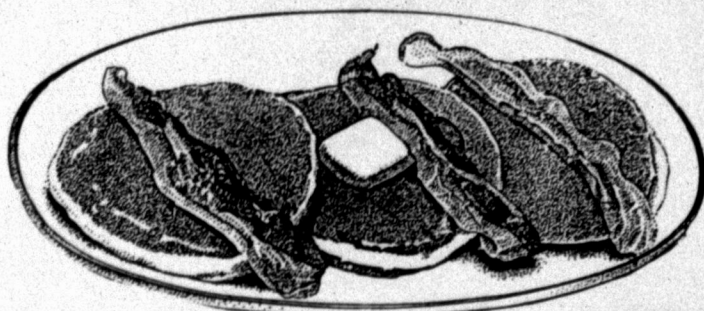

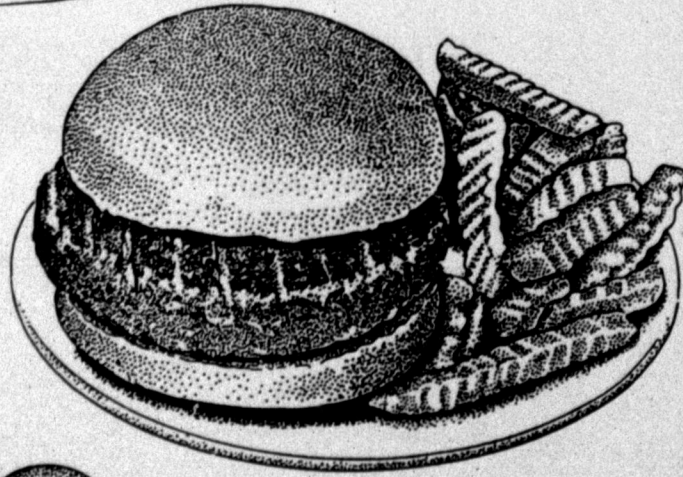

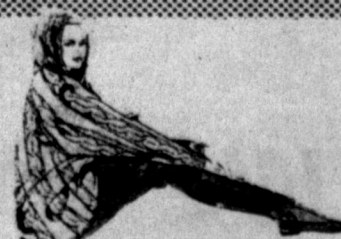

The pictures were clear in his mind: he could still see the rain falling outside the broken bedroom window and the endless watching and waiting. Memories flooded his mind and heart as he walked through the old, deserted orphanage. Everything looked so much smaller now, but the pain was just as big as ever. He knew the truth, but the feelings of longing and desperation plagued him. He remembered the endless hours he would sit on his bed with his little face flattened against the window pane, watching each car, wondering if, maybe...this one was daddy coming to take him home. But the lights would dance across the wall and disappear down the street, and daddy never came. It took long years of torment before he would finally understand that mommy and daddy went home to be with Jesus; they had died in a tragic car accident. But even now, as a grown man with children of his own, he would catch himself gazing out the window at the rain...looking for daddy.

Do you ever feel like this little boy/man? Does it sometimes seem that you are left all alone in your circumstances? As a Christian, do you often feel like an orphan? Well, you're not alone.

Just imagine what the disciples must have felt like in the upper room waiting on the promised

Comforter. But Jesus left them a marvelous promise in John 14:18 (NIV): "I will not leave you as orphans; I will come to you." He didn't leave us orphans concerning His Spirit and He won't leave us orphans concerning His presence. Remember this promise in the trying days ahead.

The angel at the Lord's ascension into heaven said these wonderful words: "Ye men of Galilee, why stand ye gazing up into heaven? This same Jesus which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven, (Acts 1:11)". Did you get that? "...in like manner..."

So, little orphans, don't feel sad and all alone. Jesus said, "I will come again..." (John 14:3). Don't cast your eyes on the wars and rumors of wars. Just keep your faces pressed against the window pane, peering out into the storm...watching...waiting. Our Father is coming to take us home from this place!

He has not left us orphans-- Wait!

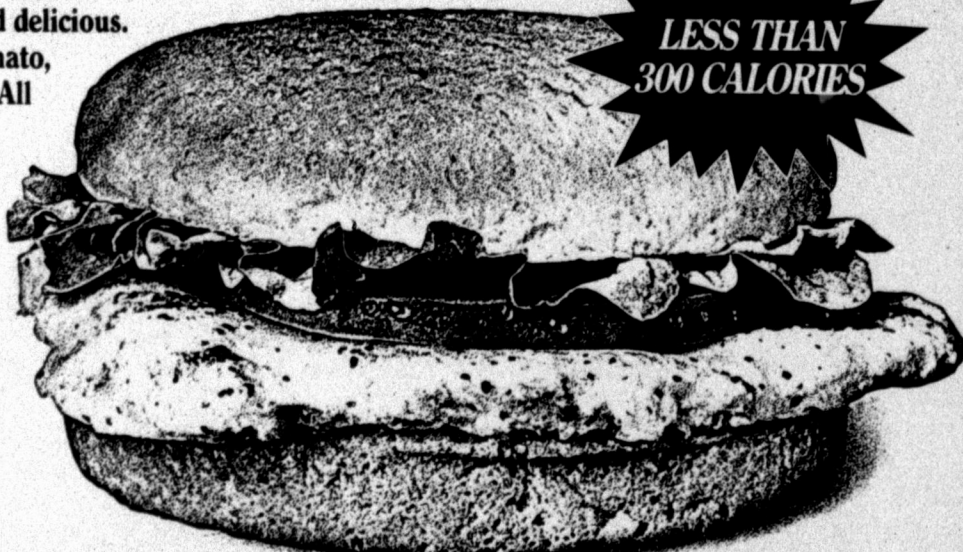

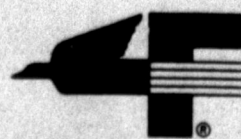

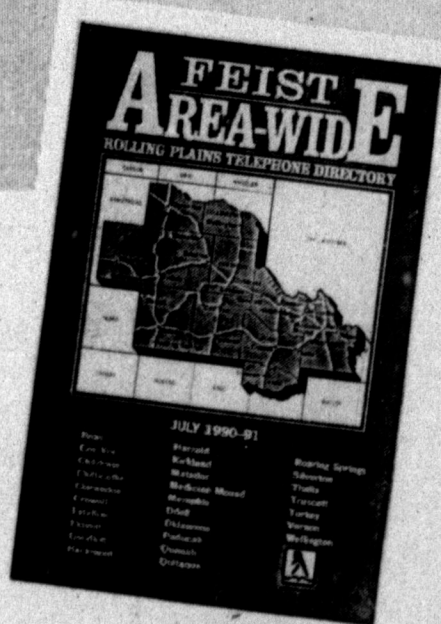

CITY MINUTES

AUGUST 14, 1990 7:00 P.M.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon met in regular session on August 14, 1990, in the Board Room, City Hall at 7:00 p.m.

Members present: Mayor James Sharrar, Aldermen David Pitts, Steve Smith, James Kuhn, McKinley Smith, and Bobbie Kidd.

Members absent: None.

Others present: Jim Roberts, Sue Howard, Ricky Rattan, San Thompson, Ernie Johnston, Roger Finch, Dude Cornell, Rick Wall, and Duane Garman.

Minutes of the July 31, 1990, meeting were read, and upon a motion by Alderman James Kuhn, seconded by Alderman Steve Smith, said minutes were approved. Motion carried.

An agreement between the City of Memphis and the City of Clarendon for use of the Memphis landfill was presented. Motion was made by Alderman Bobbie Kidd, seconded by Alderman David Pitts, to approve the Memphis Landfill Agreement. Motion carried.

San Thompson, representing the Chamber of Commerce, appeared before the Board to request \$8400 in Motel Bed Tax funds from the City to lease three signs in neighboring cities for a period of three years with payment to be made in advance. Motion was made by Alderman David Pitts, seconded by Alderman Steve Smith, that the City not expend these funds for this purpose at this time. Motion carried.

Ricky Rattan informed the Board that the Mission Cable office will be moved to Shamrock, Texas effective October 1, 1990. He also said that Mission Cable will enact a rate increase of \$1.00 to become effective October 1, 1990.

Discussion followed regarding the City Park Project and the need to dedicate the land for public park use that will be included in the Park's walking trail. Motion was made by Alderman Steve Smith, seconded by Alderman McKinley Smith, to dedicate the land to be included in the Park's walking trail for public park use. Motion carried. The City Attorney will draw up an ordinance to close any portions of alleys or streets that are included in the dedicated public park use area.

The Board then discussed adopting the current national codes for fire codes, electric codes, and plumbing codes.

Dude Cornell, County Commissioner, told the Board that the County wants a \$10,000 increase in the City/County \$57,000 annual contract with the Sheriff's office for police protection. If the City does not agree to pay the \$10,000 increase, the Sheriff's office will not continue to provide police protection for city residents and the City will have to provide their own police department. The Board took no action at this time.

Bills for the month of July 1990 were presented, and upon a motion by Alderman Bobbie Kidd, seconded by Alderman McKinley Smith, said bills were ordered paid. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Alderman Bobbie Kidd, seconded by Alderman McKinley Smith to approve the Receipts and Disbursements for the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department for the month of July 1990. Motion carried.

There being no further City business at this time, motion was made by Alderman Bobbie Kidd, seconded by Alderman Steve Smith, to adjourn. Motion carried.
