## "Leave the Pack Behind"

Clarendon residents are expected to join thousands of others around the state to "Leave the Pack Behind". The Great American Smokeout is scheduled for November 15.

The Great American Smokeout is a fun-filled, light-hearted celebration held each year on the third Thursday in November to encourage smokers and other tobacco addicts to kick the habit for 24 hours. It is sponsored by the American Cancer Society. The effort is the largest health-promotion event in the country.

Last year's Smokeout triggered 10.5 percent of the nation's smokers--5.2 million Americans--to give up cigarettes for 24 hours. One to three days later, according to a Gallup poll, 3.9 million were still abstaining from tobacco, according to the poll, 17.9 million smokers participated in the Smokeout by quitting or cutting down for the day.

Judy Oskam, Austin, chairman of the Texas Smokeout campaign, said, "The American Cancer Society is hoping this fourteenth Great American Smokeout will help smokers across the state stop smoking. We especially are working to help women, teens and underserved populations quit their tobacco habits."

## Broncos Bag Bucks

A first quarter safety and a fourth quarter touchdown by Randy Allen was all that was needed for the Clarendon Broncos to defeat White Deer, Friday night 9-0.

The Broncos took the opening kick-off and punted after three plays. After exchanging punts, Stewart punted to the White Deer 8 yd line, a 56 yd punt. Steven Davis then caught the White Deer ball carrier behind the line for a 9 yd loss to the 1 yd line. Next play the ball was centered over the head of the White Deer QB, who fell on the ball in the end zone, resulting in a safety for the Broncos. Score at the end of the 1st quarter was Clarendon 2 - White Deer 0.

For the next two quarters both teams would run a few plays and then punt. Late in the third quarter, Randy Allen intercepted a White Deer pass on about the 45 yd line and returned the ball to the White Deer 23 yd line. The third quarter ended with the Broncos on the White Deer 2 yd line. Two plays into the fourth quarter Randy Allen ran in from the 1 yd line for the touchdown. Jonathan Stewart kicked the Extra point and the Broncos led 9-0. This ended the scoring, but both teams played very good defense and should be commended. White Deer did not get the ball inside the Clarendon 25 yd line. Stewart's punting kept White Deer in poor field position.

Stewart punted 6 times with a 45 yd average. Randy Allen ran for 118 yds and Dusty Allen ran for 88 yds.

## Fishing Report

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department reports that fishing at Greenbelt Lake is fairly good. The water is clear, 66 degrees, 2 feet low; black bass are fairly good to 4 pounds on topwaters; crappie are slow to 2 pounds on minnows; white bass are fairly active on slabs and jigs; catfish are fairly good to 8 pounds on jugs; bass are moving into shallow water, fish to 7 pounds are caught on nightcrawlers.

## School Receives Gift

Students in the fourth grade at Clarendon Elementary School have received the gift-book entitled *Feeling Good About Me*. It is a handsomely bound book of stories about learning traditional values and self-esteem.

*Feeling Good About Me* contains eight stories about realistic problems young people might encounter and how, using traditional values, they are resolved.

Each story has a full-color illustration and teaches such lessons as right a wrong, appreciation of family, what it means to be a good citizen, living up to one's full potential, and why (and how) to stay away from drugs.

In the first story, "A Day With Granddaddy," young Wendy is mad. The most popular girl in school has invited her to a slumber party but SHE has to go to her grandparents house on the lake, a visit she usually enjoys. During a conversation that takes place as Wendy fishes with Granddad, she learns the relative importance of the party and the visit (her values are put into perspective) and she feels good about herself and visiting her grandparents.

Other stories involve the meaning of friendship, family relationships, respect for others, loyalty and the importance of being your own unique self, lessons not always covered in school curriculums. They reflect positive influences that build a child's self-esteem.

Each story is accompanied by a teacher's guide, which covers discussion starters, lesson objectives, and follow-up applications. The purpose of the lessons is to teach young people good values and encourage discussion of values between children, their parents and other family members in a home setting.

In "Real Heroes," a war game among a dozen boys and girls results in several broken windows at school. At the principal's office, the youngsters learn from an Army veteran that being an American hero isn't something that must happen on a battlefield, but also occurs by being a good citizen, doing whatever they can for their country.

In another story that takes place in a video arcade, Brian and Darrick must weigh the chance to get free games dishonestly against the effects of such action. With the help of a lesson learned from Darrick's dad, honesty wins out.

These beautiful books are made to last and are likely to become keepsake editions for the students. 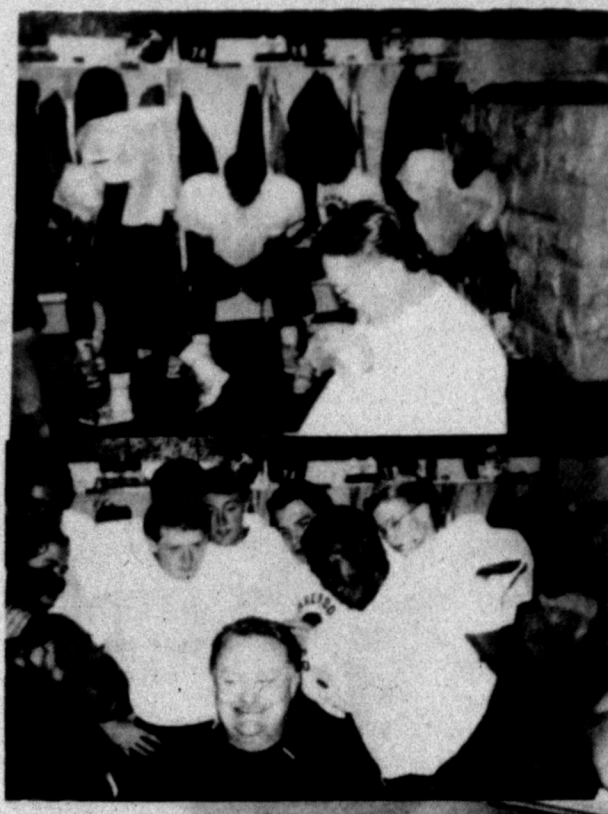

**Beta Blockers: Helpful in These Conditions**

Beta blockers, such as *propranolol, atenolol, nadolol, and timolol* compete with adrenalin-like substances for stimulation of the so-called "beta receptors" in the body. Blocking these receptors causes different types of effects, depending on receptor location and type.

**High Blood Pressure:** Beta blockers are thought to lower elevated blood pressure through a reduction in the heart rate and a decreased release of renin from the kidneys.

**Angina:** When used alone or with *nitroglycerin*, beta blockers cause the heart to require less oxygen through their effect on reducing blood pressure, heart rate, and the contractility of the heart.

**Glaucoma:** While not completely understood, it is thought that beta blockers lower eye pressure by decreasing intraocular fluid production.

**Migraine Headaches:** Beta blockers are prescribed to *prevent* migraine headache attacks. It is thought that beta blockers may prevent the inappropriate dilation of blood vessels in the head.

**Irregular Heart Beat:** A blocking of the effect of adrenalin-like chemicals on the heart may prevent certain types of irregular heart beat.

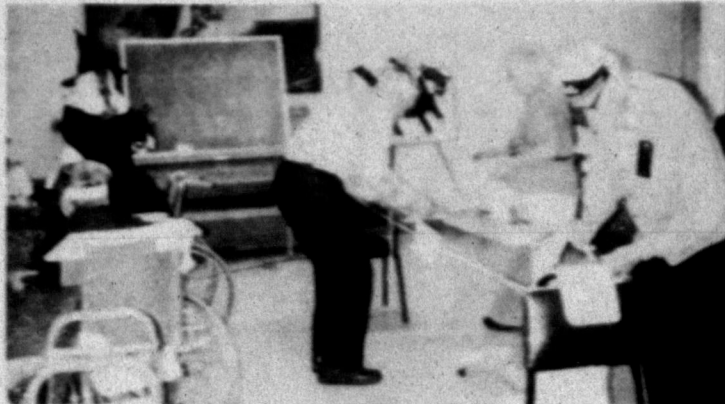

## Should We Protect Our Underground Water Supply?

The above question is one that residents and property owners in Donley County are going to get to answer in the near future. Through a petition from concerned citizens in Donley County, the Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District No. 3 has approved a request for admission into the District. This is just the first step of many to get the ball rolling on admission to the District.

Next, there will be a public hearing to discuss the admission with Donley County residents. The hearing is set for Tuesday, November 13, 1990, at the Clarendon Community Center, at 7:30 p.m. When we start looking at protecting our ground water we probably have about four options. We could annex into an already existing district, create our own district, let the state tell us what to do eventually, or hope the problem goes away.

If we look at joining an already existing district, here are some things to consider. I will use the Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District No. 3 for an example since that is the one that is being considered. The district has been in service for about thirty-four years. It includes land in five panhandle counties currently covering 1,126,080 acres. They currently have a lab and office located in White Deer, Texas. This district is governed by an elected five member board. If Donley County were added, it would receive a member on the board. The current budget is \$89,425.00, which comes from an ad valorem tax of \$.0063 per \$100 evaluation. Donley County currently has an approximate tax base of \$100,000,000, which would mean that there would be an increase in taxes of \$6,300.00 for the total county if the people voted for it. This does not include exemptions for agriculture land use. An expected tax on a \$100,000 value of farmland after exemptions would be around \$3.15, about the same for a \$50,000 house.

On-going programs and research in District No. 3 includes Water Quality Monitoring, Public Education, Data-Collections of Wells, Efficiency-Testing, and Static-Level Monitoring.

As I look at the disadvantages of annexing into the Panhandle District, it was hard to come up with good, valid reasons, other than the tax increase, and perhaps we would not get total local control like we would if we had our own district.

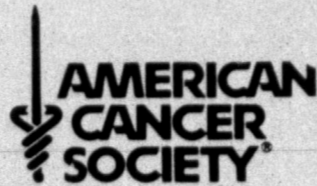
Having our own Water District would be perhaps the best deal in many people's minds, except that there is one very limiting factor: the tax rate would have to be seven to ten times that of the Panhandle District per \$100 evaluation to get enough money to run the district. Services from a single county district would be limited to the amount of money available, or tax rate. It is very probable that we would have to pay more and get less to have our own district with our current tax base.

We can always wait and let the State mandate what we will have to do at some point in time. But experience should tell us that this usually is not a good deal. If this happens, there will be no local control and penalties for violations will likely be stiffer, with very little cooperative efforts to solve any problems. But, we wouldn't have any kind of tax increase right now for waiting on the state mandates. Down the road, who knows, if there are mandates and there most likely will be, someone has to pay for them. Guess Who?

Hopefully we won't choose to do nothing and hope the problem of protecting our groundwater will go away. It is our water and life source so we should protect it, through what ever means that it takes.

against cancer. "Smoking is responsible for 87 percent of lung cancer cases, and that means 87 percent are preventable by choosing not to smoke," Oskam explained. "We hope at least one in five Texas smokers will join the Smokeout this year. Texans could make a big step toward better health on November 15."

To reach out to smokers across the state, Texas volunteers are pulling out all stops to encourage tobacco users in their communities to participate in the Great American Smokeout, Oskam said. In addition to Clarendon, activities are scheduled in most other Texas cities. San Antonio, El Paso, Fort Worth, and Austin all have inventive programs planned. In Houston the Goodyear Blimp will get in on the action.

The Clarendon News is offering a \$50 bonus to smoking employees who manage to quit for the 24-hour Smokeout, and encourages other employers to follow suit.

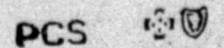

We have truly organized ourselves out of practical existence. Within our church structures are Missionary Societies, Pulpit Committees, Gospel Outreach endeavors, Evangelistic panels, Board meetings, Deason's meetings, Preachers' meetings, Vacation Bible School programs, Lectureships, For us and a host of other scavenger organizations which drain our potentials and efforts and plunder our talents. The yoke is too heavy, preventing us from becoming airborne with the resurrection tidings. These parasitical organizations extract the very life of the body of believers. Our struggle to reach others with the life-saving blood of the cross will become even more difficult as long as we give our allegiance to these organizations. In essence, we have permitted our organizations to strangle us. There is no room, no time, and no money for the resurrection message. Our fancy edifices and polished organizations are symptoms of our pride and digression. Millions of dollars are wasted on "materialistic evangelism" while millions of the world's poor go hungry, not only for food, but for the resurrection message as well. Our priorities are abused and misplaced. We have taken the simple arrangement of communicating the good news to others and developed it into a complicated mess.

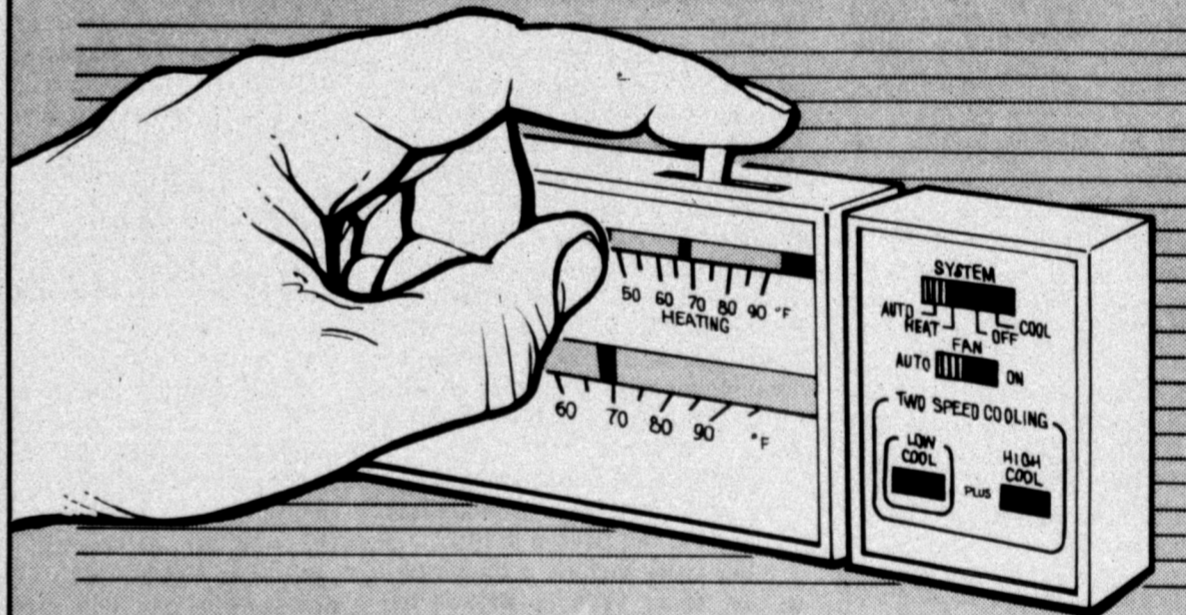
The activities, movements, and efforts of the first believers were unadorned, ordinary, unsophisticated and informal—but serious and edifying. Our temporary arrangements are complicated, rehearsed, "organized to the brim", ritualistic, formal and boring. As most everyone is elected to some church office, there is no one left to enhance the practical aspect of the program! So the officers go around in circles, involving themselves in paper work, organizing meetings, fulfilling speaking engagements, and otherwise doing nothing to convert the world. The world keeps hanging, if only by a thread, waiting for "Christians" to toss it the lifejacket of salvation. But not We are too busy keeping our churches and organizations afloat to bother with the Great Commission. Our next door neighbor needs our help, the guy down the road is lost, the young lady on the other side of town is drowning in a sea of problems, our co-worker's teenage son is over and out of his head with drugs and we sit around creating more organizations to implement the ones that have already become dormant and stale.

We need our fannies kicked—and kicked hard. For until we become more interested in more people, we will remain out of the people business. Who or what can motivate us? Probably no one or nothing until we are able to discern the urgency of the times and "get off our cans" and out of our organizations and into the world, the place where Jesus said to go. He said to get out and go, but we come in and stay! Our elaborate church buildings stand a monuments to our failures and complacency. We are dying from "churchitis". Our comfortable pews have wrecked us. The pulpit has deformed us. We still demand to be spoon-fed even though we have had ample time to become feeders ourselves. Where will it all end? In the trash heap of by-gone religions, unless we reform our entire system! And that is what this message is all about.

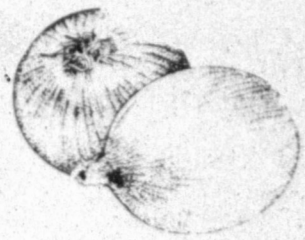

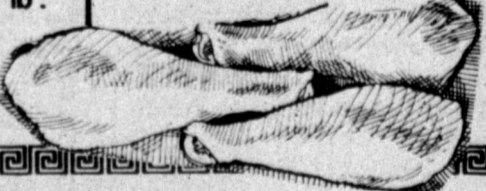
