Storm Damages Property

Donley County Sheriff Jimmy Thompson reports that storms on Wednesday, May 29, damaged several area structures. No injuries were reported.

Between 11:30 p.m. and midnight, deputies discovered that a twister had removed the roof from a trailer home in Howardwick. The owner, Willie Bowen, was not home.

The same evening a storm blew away a metal building and a barn roof on Highway 70 South. The property belonged to Janet Reynolds.

In the last few weeks, the department has spent many hours watching for tornadoes. They hope to be able to give warning in time for Clarendon citizens to take cover.

Very probably. "...What kind of people ought you to be? You ought to live holy and godly lives as you look forward to the day of God and speed its coming" (II Peter 3:11,12). 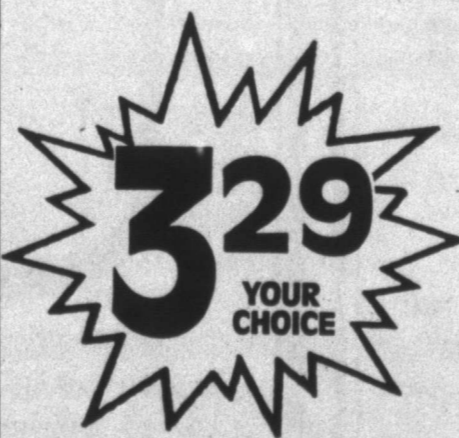

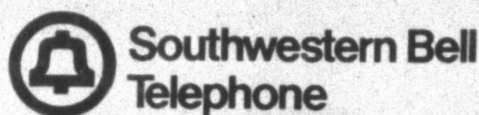

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Company), in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission), hereby gives notice of its intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas for Directory Assistance Services, effective August 1, 1991, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. The Company has filed an application with the Commission to restructure and change the rates for Directory Assistance Service.

To help recover its costs, the Company is proposing to increase the rates for Directory Assistance calls from \$.30 to \$.40 per call (after the three-call allowance). Southwestern Bell is proposing that there be no charge in the number of free Directory Assistance calls allowed each month (currently three) and that customers who qualify for exemption of Directory Assistance charges because of visual or physical handicaps continue to be exempt from these charges. The company also proposes to begin charging \$.25 per call for Directory Assistance from pay telephones.

If approved by the Commission, this proposed rate change for Directory Assistance will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.4 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. This proposed rate change would affect approximately 900,000 residence customers, approximately 155,000 business customers, approximately 500 private pay telephone owners and all customers who make Directory Assistance calls from public pay telephones.

Farmers Reminded of Planting Changes

Jerry D. Harris, Chairman of the Texas State ASC Committee, would like to remind Texas cotton producers that the rules for 1991 prevented planting for cotton are different from previous years.

Producers now have the option of crediting the acreage they were prevented from planting to either the prevented acreage of

cotton of they may choose to use the acreage as Conserving Use (CU) for payment acreage under the 50/92 provisions of the Food Agriculture, Conservation, and Trade Act of 1990.

Harris says, "If producers choose to credit the acreage as prevented planting for cotton, the acreage may then be devoted to acreage of another crop which would be considered as ghost acres for program purposes. These prevented planted acres will not be eligible for any deficiency payment for 1991.

A new provision of the 1990 Farm Bill would allow producers who were prevented from planting cotton because of drought, flood, other natural disaster, or other condition beyond the producers control to devote their acreage to Cu for payment. This acreage must be maintained as Cu for payment for the remainder of the year and can not be planted to another crop for harvest. Cotton producers who choose this option would be eligible for the 10 cent per pound guarantee without regard to the 50 percent planting requirement if the sum of the prevented planting and actual planting totals at least 50 percent of the maximum payment acres for the farm.

Harris wishes to remind producers that if the average is planted to cotton in order to qualify the acreage for crop insurance that the average would be considered as the crop to which it was planted and would be eligible for the guaranteed deficiency payment under the 50/92 provisions. Planted acreage of the crop which failed ineligible for deficiency, however, would not be at the guaranteed rate.

The Texas State ASC Committee strongly recommends that producers contact their local ASCS County Office if they have any questions concerning the prevented planting provisions of the 1990 Farm Bill.

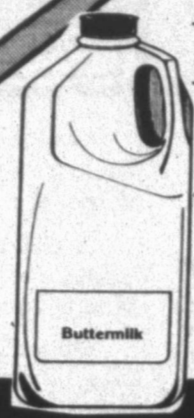
