



# Dems suffer from gullibility on Iraqi issues

At times I wonder how anyone can, in good conscience, be a Democrat. The last several days have only intensified that bewilderment.

Last week, Majority Leader Tom Daschle made an ass of himself by throwing a crying fit on the Senate floor, accusing President Bush of politicizing the War on Terror. His comments came after a statement by Bush, who had said in reference to his Homeland Security Department proposal, "...the Senate is more interested in special interests in Washington and not interested in the security of the American people.

That quote was garbled by THE WASHINGTON POST, which had Bush saying, "Democrats are not interested in the security of the American people." That incensed

"That is outrageous - outrageous," Daschle said, pretending to choke back tears. "The President ought to apologize to Sen. Inouye and every veteran who has fought in every war who is a Democrat in the Senate."

Apologize for what? For the Post screwing up the quote? I think not. For saying what he really said? Certainly not, because Bush was right. Daschle and others think that the interests of labor unions are more important than the ability of a president to manage the bureaucracy in times of crisis.

But the big picture is not the Homeland Security Department. The focus ought to be on Iraq and the threat posed by Saddam Hussein and other terrorists.

The senate leadership, however, is "unconvinced" that the United States should be allowed to take unilateral action against Iraq. They say the Bush administration hasn't made the case against Saddam.

The Senate doesn't have a lock on this view. After the majority leader's comments came the amazing statements by three of the most liberal members of the House of Representatives. During a trip to Baghdad, Reps. Jim McDermott of Washington, David Bonior of Michigan, and Mike Thompson of California said they had the positive assurances of Iraqi officials that United Nations weapons inspectors would be given unfettered access to go anywhere they wanted to go.

McDermott even went on ABC's This Week Sunday and said, from Baghdad, "I think you have to take the Iraqis on their value – at their face value." And then he had the audacity to say, "I think the president would mislead the American people.'

For those Floridians out there, let me put it in simpler terms. This idiot just said we should trust Saddam Hussein over George W. Bush.

By Tuesday, the chief U.N. weapons inspector Hans Blix was trumpeting an agreement with the Iraqis that would let his team go "almost" anywhere ... except certain presidential properties belonging to Saddam.

McDermott, Bonior, and Thompson, along with Blix and Kofi Annan, are the Neville Chamberlains of our time. Blinded by the hope of peace, they ignore the painfully obvious fact that Saddam is a dangerous man who would like nothing more than to kill a whole bunch of people, preferably Americans.

McDermott has been widely criticized outside his party for his comments, and some have even called him a traitor. As a firm believer in free speech, I won't go that far here. But I do think that those who support the national Democrat party should take a long, hard look at the naiveté which afflicts so many in that organization.

The actions of Sen. Daschle and McDermott are embarrassing to the Democratic Party and to America, and their gullibility puts the nation at risk.

# Love of liberty, sense of duty will prevail

September 11 will be a day which will forever stay fresh in our minds.

Many of us will always remember where we were and what we were doing - whether it was having breakfast at the Pentagon, or driving kids to school, or watching TV at home. It does not seem as though a year has passed since that terrible day. Yet, it has, and we should examine how we are different.

As individuals, the events of that day have caused many of us to take a new look at our priorities. To have so many taken from us so suddenly reminds us our time on earth is fleeting. Some people are spending more time with their families; some are trying to worry less about the smaller things in life; some are working to deepen and expand their faith. Many good things have happened in the aftermath of this tragedy.

As a nation, we do not seem all that different in many ways. The media spends a lot of time talking about the "American Idol" television program. Newspapers include stories about the war but also stories about other issues, such as child abductions and corporate greed. As we move closer to another election, the partisan bickering we have come to expect seems as strong as ever - in the halls of Congress and over the airwaves.

Yet, just below the surface, a lot has changed. The war is being fought every day. Some of the battles take place away from the public eye. Some of the biggest victories are the tragedies which do not occur. Yet, there continue to be terrorists planning to attack us, seeking to inflict the greatest possible damage and loss of life.

As I travel around talking with people, I have frequently been asked how much safer we are today than before September 11. On a scale of one to ten, I would give us about a three. Most of the improvement comes from an increased awareness of the dangers in the world and of our vulnerabilities. We have taken steps to improve security in some key areas, such as air travel; and we are tracking down the terrorists one by one, as the President has said.

But, we have a lot more to do. Hopefully, Congress is about to enact the biggest reorganization of the federal government in more than 50 years by creating a new Department of Homeland Security. While reorganization is no magic

answer to terrorism, it can help make us safer by coordinating and focusing our homeland security efforts.

We also have to do better at quickly getting new technology, such as sensors and detectors, into use. We also have to continue to push for change in our military to ensure that it has the tools to fight this new kind of war. A number of changes must be made.

I cannot predict exactly how or when this war will be won. I certainly cannot say that future terrorist attacks will not be successful. But, I do believe that some way or other, we will prevail.

The terrorists see us as self-centered. They believe that we care more about our material well-being than about our freedom and that we will tire easily and grow complacent. They believe that we cannot remain vigilant over the long haul.

But, they underestimated our response after September 11, and they continue to underestimate us now. As Churchill said during World War II, "We have not journeyed across the centuries, across the oceans, across the mountains, across the prairies, because we are made of sugar

Americans have been through tough times before, and I am confident that our love of liberty and our sense of duty will see us through this struggle as well.

"We started putting some points on the board," Hoeltzel said. "We threw the ball well, and we ran a little bit. Our JV team is making progress; we just need to be more consistent."


