

Many Elderly, Poor Texans Paying Needlessly for Medicare Services

Houston (AP)-More than 100,000 poor, elderly Texans continue to pay for Medicare services they should be getting free because they don't know any better, state and federal advocacy groups say.

Under a 2-year-old federal program, elderly Americans living at or near the federal poverty level are eligible to receive all Medicare programs

But many continue to pay a \$31.80 monthly charge, plus deductible and co-payments, because they are unaware of the program, the Houston Chronicle reported in early editions today.

Families USA Foundation - an advocacy group focusing on health, economic and long-term care issues - estimates that more than 116,000 Texans are eligible for, but not taking advantage of, the free program.

Nationwide, as many as two million people may fall into that category. "There are a lot of people out there who simply don't know they are qualified," Gray Panthers Texas director Charlotte Flynn said.

"For these people, the difference in costs means they are probably not getting the kind of care they need. They put off going to the doctor because they can't afford the deductibles and the co-payments," she said. Medicare is a two-part insurance policy, providing for hospitalization

Crop Report

Cooler temperatures continue to slow cotton and peanut development. Much of the cotton in the county is in cutout, but with recent rains some regrowth could occur if temperatures are above normal and fruit set is light. In some areas cotton is showing signs of drought stress with shedding of squares and small bolls. Peanut fields are showing yellowing from

leafhopper damage, but this should not be of major concern to producers. Peanut producers should be applying fungicides on a regular basis by now to prevent leaf

Cotton insect problems have increased this past week. Very high numbers of cotton aphids persist in some fields, mostly younger fields and fields, where insecticidal applications have been applied. Recent rainfall should help reduce aphid levels to some degree. Many fields have large numbers of beneficials which are suppressing aphids in many fields.



Boll weevil activity has increased particularly northeast of Hedley. Stage of cotton development will determine if weevil damage will occur. Boll protection is the major objective at this point in the season. Bolls should be protect until the last bolls that you expect to harvest are at least one inch in diameter. Many fields will be past the point of sustaining heavy weevil damage. But, increased weevil populations at this point could increase the amount of weevils that go into overwintering.

Bollworm moth activity increased also this past week which would indicate that eggs and small worms may be found this week.



Budworm activity has been fairly light as of Monday. Producers should inspect all fields for possible outbreaks of bollworms but especially those fields that are not showing moisture stress. With the recent rains many fields that were showing signs of moisture stress may be-



WTSU Awards Professor Emeritus Ranking

The title of Professor Emeritus has been bestowed on 27 retired West Texas State University faculty members. Representing more than eight centuries of combined service, the recipients are the first in the history of the University to receive the ranking.

Dr. Marian Z. SoRelle, professor of speech, of Clarendon, Texas, was among the professors honored.

The titles were officially confirmed by the Texas A & M University System Board of Regents at its July 23 and 24 meeting, upon nomination by Dr. Barry B. Thompson, WTSU president, and a recommendation by TAMUS Chancellor Herbert H. Richardson.

"I felt the time to recognize the contributions of so many people who have given their lives to education and especially West Texas State University was long overdue," Thompson said. !69These people have contributed a great deal to the University and their fields, and it is important that we not forget those contributions."

Nominations of deserving individuals were made by faculty members and administrators with faculty ranking. The prime selection criterion for conferring the title was "a significant contribution through long and distinguished service to the University in administration, teaching, research and professional service. Any person with faculty rank who has retired from the University after at least 10 years of full-time employment is eligible for consideration for Emeritus rank."

Nominations were submitted to a standing Emeritus Rank Committee, chaired by Dr. Joseph L. Cox, professor of music. Other committee members included Dr. James B. Davis, professor of accounting; Dr. F. Darrell Munsell, professor of history; and Dr. Kenneth R. Van Doren, professor of mathematics.

Recipients of the Emeritus ranking were honored at summer commencement exercises August 20. Each will receive a certificate from the University as well as extra privileges including listings in the *University catalog*, invitations to academic and other University functions, invitations to faculty meetings where they will be extended privileges of the floor but no voting rights, and the use of services and facilities such as Cornette Library and parking.

Medicare News

Medicare was designed to help elderly Americans get, and pay for needed medical care; it is unfortunate indeed that many older Texans qualify for free Medicare services but do not know it.

Under a federal program, elderly Americans living at or near the federal poverty level are eligible to receive all Medicare services free. Currently, the elderly pay \$31.80 monthly Medicare fee plus deductibles and co-payments for secondary coverage. For those who fall within the guidelines of the federal program, all those costs are waived.

and physicians' fees. Normally, \$31.80 a month is deducted from Social Security checks for Medicare. In addition, recipients pay the first \$625 annually in hospital costs, \$100 for physician charges and 20 percent of other costs.

The new law exempts those charges for people below the federal poverty level. A single person with a monthly income of \$588 or less and total assets of \$4,000 or less is eligible for the program.

A couple is eligible if its monthly income is at or below \$786 and 0their assets total no more than \$6,000.

The Texas Department of Human Resources administers the program. The federal government pays for 64 per-cent of the program, with the state taking care of the balance.

Doctors Must Limit Medicare Overcharge

Editor's Note: The following information was contributed by Charlotte Roan who acts as a local Ombudsman for the aged and their families. Persons may contact her in Claude at 226-6701.

Beginning in January 1992, doctors can charge no more than 20% beyond what Medicare allows. But doctors, Medicare carriers and beneficiaries are misinformed or uninformed about Medicare's limits on balance bill-

The Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) which administers Medicare, is sending directives to its regional offices and

to insurance companies that process claims. It enforces the law which forbids the excess billing of Medicare patients.

Still unresolved, however, is whether people who have been overcharged can get refunds. While now conceding t hat beneficiaries needn't pay bills that exceed the legal limits, HCFA says it lacks the authority to order doctors to refund patients money. The law does not explicitly state that enrollees are due refunds when they are overcharged.

HCFA now requires that beneficiaries be told that they are not responsible for billed amounts in excess of the limiting charge for a covered service. This information will be on the Explanation of Medicare Benefits (EOMBs) in every instance when the limiting charge is exceeded. By 1993 the exact amount of the limiting charge




