Counties Declared Disaster Areas

Low-interest emergency loans are available to eligible farmers and ranchers in 47 Texas counties that were declared disaster areas due to heavy rains and hail from May 1 to July 30, Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said today.

U.S. Secretary of agriculture Edward Madigan declared 26 counties as primary disaster areas.

They are Bailey, Borden, Briscoe, Castro, Cochran, Cottle, Crosby, Dawson, Deaf Smith, Dickens, Floyd, Gaines, Garza, Hale, Hockley, Howard, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Martin, Midland, Motley, Parmer, Swisher, Terry and Yoakum counties.

An additional 21 counties were declared contiguous disaster counties

They are Andrews, Armstrong, Childress, Crane, Donley, Ector, Foard, Glasscock, Hall, Hardeman, Kent, King, Mitchell, Oldham, Potter, Randall, Reagan, Scurry, Sterling, Stonewall and Upton counties.

These declarations allow family-size farm operators in both the primary and contiguous areas to apply for emergency assistance from the Farmers Home Administration.

To be designated as a primary disaster area, the Farmers Home Administration determines whether a sufficient number of farmers in each county suffered losses of 30 percent or more. The counties designated as contiguous disaster areas were declared so because they were adjacent to the primary disaster area, but did not have the same extent of losses. Each loan application will be considered on its own merits, taking into

account the extent of losses, security available, repayment ability and other requirements.


Studies have shown that with the loss of one ton of topsoil the producers loses \$6.00 of fertilizer in that topsoil. These losses add up

over a period of time especially if producers lose 10 - 30 tons per acre per year. (The average annual erosion rate in Donley County is 26 tons per acre.) An effective windbreak will negate these losses, keeping the topsoil for the crops.

Studies consistently have shown crop production increases of up to 44% in sheltered areas. These studies take into account the land taken up by the windbreaks and crop loss next to windbreaks. However, yields do increase. Crops subjected to hot winds will dry out, forcing plants to fight to survive. Sheltered crops are to survive and produce.

Windbreaks have a positive effect on livestock. Feedlot windbreaks increase temperatures during blizzards by insulating against the wind. Feed costs are reduced because animals do not FFA livestock showmen. use up so much energy maintaining body temperature.

Social Security News

66If you are a farmer or a farm employee, Social Security has two publications that you should know about," say Jim Tolbot, Social Security manager in Amarillo. "They clarify the wage reporting responsibilities that employers of farmworkers have under Social Security and other programs of the federal Government and stress to farmworkers the importance of checking the accuracy of their wage records." The Publications are: A guide to Social Security for Farmers, Growers, and Crew Leaders (Fublication number 05-10025), tells agricultural owners and contractors of farm labor how to report their employee's earning and their own earnings to the government and explains the importance of accurate reporting. If You are a Farm Worker (Publication number 05-10074) explains that employers have a responsibility to withhold Social Security taxes from the workers' pay, match the amount that they withhold, and send the combined tax payment to Social Security and the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). It also tells farm workers how to check with Social Security to make sure their earnings are being reported properly by requesting a Personal Earning and Benefits Estimate Statement (PEBES). Social Security develops both booklets in

cooperation with the IRS and U.S. Department of Labor.

Every year, Social Security encounters problems reporting the wages of thousands of farm workers because employer reports contain inaccurate or incomplete information or because wage reporting doesn't occur at all. "Often, the problems are not uncovered until someone is filing for benefits, " Talbot warned. "And then, the claims can be delayed or benefit payments will be less than they could be. The worst case is when workers learn they aren't entitled to any benefits after years of unreported work and unpaid Social Security Taxes."

But now how the accident happened has somecontradictory explanations.



However, some of the staff at Ruby's Place tell a different saga. According to these folks, Mr. Bouyea was sitting in a booth at the cafe with a beautiful young woman. He started playing "footsie" with her and she responded a little too vigorously. That resulted in serious injury to the side of Mr. Bouyea's foot. He may, or may not, have required the attention of Emergency Medical Services. (The staff at Ruby's are said to know the name of the lady in question.)

That makes at least three versions of the tale. There may be a dozen others.



Grant Received


The Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center along with the Texas Tech University Health Science Center has been approved to receive \$60,000 grant from the Texas Cancer Council. The grant contract that began on September 1, 1992 is titled "West Texas Coalition for Cancer Control" and will focus as a planning grant for the establishment of a coalition with significant community involvement, to address all areas of cancer control, patient support and patient treatment.

"The overall goal of the project is to develop a cancer control network to address the needs of rural West Texas." Dr. James K. Luce, Interim President and Medical Director of the Harrington Cancer Center, stated band D.J. Cruzan of the home; two about the grant. 





In Texas, loan guarantees for business and industry customers totaled almost four million dollars last fiscal year. One loan was obligated to a lumber manufacturing plant located in Liberty county creating 65 new positions and preserving 49 others. Another loan was completed in Wise County, which enabled the opening of a Medical Center, employing 27 people. Falls County was the beneficiary of a loan for a newly constructed restaurant which created 8 jobs. A loan guarantee was issued for a retail and wholesale fuel distributor in Crosby County which created two positions and maintained seven others. Starr County will have a super market under construction later this year with an FmHA loan guarantee of 1.2 million dollars and will employ approximately 85 employees.

Currently, preapplications for Business and Industry guarantees in Erath, Harrison and Swisher Counties are being reviewed for loans totaling 7.1 million dollars. Applications in Collins, Dawson, Hall, Harrison, and Matagora Counties are under review for loans totaling 7.7 million dollars. These new loans would create approximately 235 new jobs and preserve

President Bush's budget, as recently passed by Congress, has allocated 100 million dollars nationally for loan guarantees to assist local lenders in meeting their local community's credit needs for the creation and preservation of jobs in rural America. "Texas Business and Industry Division looks forward to an initial allocation for fiscal year 1993 of approximately 4 million dollars to assist rural Texans preserve and create jobs, ") Johnson said.
